Low oxygen still a concern in L. Manitou

SANDFIELD—The Old Sandfield Schoolhouse Hall was, as is traditionally the case, filled to capacity by members of the Lake Manitou Area Association (LMAA) and community at 7 pm on August 8 as they gathered eagerly to learn more about the state of their lake. In any event, the news is not great for future development on the Island's largest lake.

This year, the topic on LMAA agenda was entitled 'More Secrets from the Depths of Lake Manitou Part II,' delivered by Queen's University PhD candidate Clare Nelligan, who brought to the table a clear and concise presentation that outlined the findings to date of her study of sediment cores taken from the bottom of Lake Manitou's east and west basins. Despite the scientifically complex nature of her work,

Ms. Nelligan was able to effectively share the information she has interpreted to date.

'The sediment acts like a natural archive," she explained. Information is contained within the layers in the form of the remaining traces of the plant and animal life contained within those layers. "Lots of things live in the lake itself, they die and become trapped in the sediment."

An innovative coring machine is lowered to the lake bottom and then hammered home with a dropped weight that seals the top of the tube "just like you would by putting your finger over the top of a straw," she said

Northern Stone asks Assiginack to help maintain unopened roadway

Quarry operator clear that potential is in place for major economic driver

ASSIGINACK—Tracy knows her stone and she knows that with the assets in the ground at her Jay Bryant quarry she is sit-ting on a potential economic boom for Manitoulin Island that is unmatched by any other to be found in Assiginack. But while they may say that good help is hard to find, that is especially help trained in the niche skills required by a quarry, Ms. Thomas has a plan to deal with that, provided she can get a little help from her governments.

Ms. Thomas recently played host to one of the largest gatherings of public and private funders assembled to tour a project on Manitoulin, courtesy of the good officers of LAMBAC, the Island's Community Futures Development Corporation.

"We are looking at ways to help the business," confirmed LAM-BAC manager Michael Addison. 'We are trying to bring partners together. In three years this is the first time we have been able to assemble that large a group at the

Bringing that large of a group together is vital to finding the pathway to success as the scale of the project would likely far outstrip the available resources of any of the individual federal and provincial agencies. But by working together in concert and finding synergies where they may be able to intertwine, along with some innovative partnerships with local organizations that may go a long way toward dealing with transportation issues.

One of the major stumbling blocks for the Northern Natural Stone expansion is the state of the road leading into the operation. Jay Bryant Sideroad lies about 25 kilometres south of Little Current off of Highway 6. It, like many Island sideroads, is not an "official" municipal road. It is an unopened road allowance with a road use agreement between the Township of Assiginack and a of previous owner property/business that stipulates the business owner assumes

The story behind the spelling of Wiikwemkoong

The famous line from Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet' "What's in a name?" proposes that "a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." But names hold far more within their bounds than scent, colour or thorns. With the publishing of each weekly edition of The Expositor the phones begin to ring, as concerned readers call to inform us that we have misspelled "Wikwemikong." We haven't—we are endeavouring to use the correct spelling.

Those who follow these pages closely will have noticed a number of changes that this news organization is implementing when it comes to our reporting of news in Manitoulin's largest and oldest community. The Expositor rarely uses the official Canadian designation of Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territories as "Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve" as that title is both historically inaccurate and offensive to a good number of the members of that First Nation. Wiikwemkoong is also more accurate representation of that community's name in the common script.

These changes can sometimes be unsettling for those who have known Wiikwemkoong as Wikwemikong all of their lives, and readers might well wonder why The Expositor would make such a change, after all, what's in a name? Plenty.

The very first thing an Anishinabe person will say in striking up a conversation with someone they do not know, after the formal boozhoo or informal aanii, is their name, their community, their clan and even the names of their parents and grandparents. The Anishinaabe place themselves within the constellation of the larger First Nation community so that the other person they are meeting knows who they are and where they come from. A lot of history is encapsulated in names—and a lot of pride.

Now a close observer will note that there is some inconsistency in the use of Wiikwemkoong and Wikwemikong in the paper. When an organization's official name, such as the Wikwemikong Tribal Police, we will usually use that name until it has been officially changed by that organization. But largely we will endeavour to use the spelling preferred by that community. This is not a nod to "political correctness," it is simply correct and there is no compelling reason to not be accurate and a host of good reasons to not continue a historical wrong.

In the grand scheme of things, it may be a small effort on our part to help set things right, to correct a wrong that is symbolic of so many wrongs that still block the path to reconciliation in our nation and closer to home here on Manitoulin Island. Just as we were quick to adopt the name changes of West Bay to M'Chigeeng, of Sucker Creek to Aundeck Omni Kaning (stay tuned, according to local language authorities this one will likely need tweaking in the future), so we are making every effort to adopt the change in spelling of Wiikwemkoong. It is not an exact science and there is no official lexicon or authority to which we can defer, so bear with us as we take ginger steps along this path.

This paper has also recently changed the capitalization on the word Indigenous. While we have long capitalized the word Native, when used as an appellation for Anishinabe, or any of the other nations indigenous to these territories, we have been slow to adopt the term Indigenous the way we would the terms French or English for those nationalities. It is a fundamental declaration of this paper's recognition of the nation to nation relationships that are the foundation of Canada.

The Expositor often utilizes Anishinabe terms, such as ogimaa for chief, the aforementioned Anishinabe as a group term representing the Three Fires of the Ojibwe, Odawa and Potowatamie, sometimes with a bracketed translation to assist those who may be unfamiliar with those terms. We are far from perfect or consistent in this policy, so again, please bear with us.

A rose by any other name might smell as sweet, but when it comes to the use of words to convey information, the choice of words used and how they are presented can say a lot. As we move along the path to building a mutually respectful relationship between the descendants of the original inhabitants of this land we call Canada and those who came later, and as an organization whose very foundation is based on words and striving to get things right.

So thank you to those who call The Expositor to correct any errors that might appear within the reports we deliver to our faithful readers, and please do continue to call us out when we get something wrong to keep us on our toes, but in the case of the spelling of Wiikwemkoong, this newspaper stands by its story.

History Day

Kagawong History Day brought Mike Pearson back to Manitoulin

KAGAWONG-Audiences attending the History Day in Kagawong presentations are always treated to a fascinating glimpse back through the mists of time, but this year the rear view mirror displayed a very familiar face for many in the seats—that of the late Liberal Prime Minister the Honourable Lester Bowles Pearson, known simply as "Mike" to many Islanders, and who represented Manitoulin as a federal MP for 20 years.

Mr. Pearson's life and times was illuminated through the lens of those who knew him best, with his granddaughter Patricia Pearson delivering the keynote address and a number of close Pearson family members in attendance. Sitting in the front row were Landon Carter (Lucy) Pearson, the daughter-in-law of the former prime minister through her marriage to his son Geoffrey Pearson; Barbara Hannah (another Pearson granddaughter) and her partner Gwen Shandroski; as well as Patricia Pearson's husband Ambrose Pottie.

The evening began with a greeting by Old Mill Heritage Centre curator Rick Nelson, who acted as emcee for the evening. An official welcome was provided by Billings Museum Board Chair Dianne Fraser, who read an official communication and congratulations from Prime Minister Justin Trudeau who regretted not being able to attend.

The main event of the evening, however, was the keynote address by Pearson granddaughter and writer Patricia Pearson who took the audience back through the mists of time to provide an intimate perspective on the man who, as an eight-year-old child knew her grandfather first and foremost through "the smell of his blazer and the merriment in his

She described a man who was "unpretentious," but with whom "you always knew where you

'He was playful, but brilliant," she said. She described a man who, in counterpoint to what is going on south of the border these days, spent a lot of his time in thoughtfulness and "was not a

The people of Manitoulin and East Algoma responded by embracing his philosophy of building a better more peaceful world "and the world is better for

Throughout her presentation, Ms. Pearson returned to the theme that, thanks to the continued support of Mike Pearson, Canada has its own iconic flag, a universal healthcare system that Canadians repeatedly identify as their proudest national institution and bilingualism, which is currently once again growing across the nation.

But Ms. Pearson also dispelled any inclination to see her grandfather through a total rose tint. While he was often far ahead of his time with his vision and consensual approach to government (a good thing as he never enjoyed a majority government), he was also a man of his time.

Ms. Pearson alluded to the Algoma Fishing Club an artifact whose sole unspoken raison d'etre was to funnel funds to offset the extra expenses incurred by the party leader outside of his official government (or party) role. "It was probably totally illegal," admitted Ms. Pearson to loud laughter from the audience.

Ms. Pearson said that her

father was always characterized by outsiders as the CEO, but that his own often espoused role was more often expressed as the jani-

One of his proudest moments, noted Ms. Pearson, was the presentation of a sacred eagle feather by the community of Wiikwemkoong.

Barbara Hannah, another Pearson granddaughter, was also at the presentations, spoke briefly about the man she "knew as a grandfather."

She recalled asking her grandfather to give her a shout out while giving a major speech. He told her that would not be possible. But then he said, 'I will give

you a signal, I will tap the side of my nose'," she recalled. As the 12-year-old watched the speech closely she saw him reach up and tap the side of his nose.

In another anecdote that painted a picture of the man, the doting grandfather, she recalled how she was an avid hockey fan and would watch the games with her grandfather at 24 Sussex Drive. One evening the championship game between rivals the Montreal Canadians (her favourites) and their arch rivals the Toronto Maple Leafs would go long past her bedtime. While Mr. Pearson made no attempt to overrule her parents, he demonstrated his diplomatic skills by promising to


Mary McGurk (Elliot Lake) and Alice Wolgemuth (Thessalon).

The prime minister's message read, "My wife and I would like to congratulate you on your election as the 1966 Award students from the high schools of Algoma East. We have planned a busy schedule for you which I think you will find interesting. We hope that you will return home with many memories of a pleasant visit to the capital of Canada. We are glad you are coming and look forward to meeting you." It was signed "With kindest personal regards, Lester B. Pearson, P.C., M.P., Prime Minister of Canada.'

And what an interesting time was had over the following two days, as the students not only met Mr. Pearson in his office, they had lunch with the prime minster and his wife, toured the parliament buildings, climbed the Peace Tower, met with then Governor General Georges Vanier (who looked every inch the French Canadian patriarch), but also joined the prime minister at his Harrington Lake cottage retreat and got an up close and personal private viewing of the famed RCMP Musical Ride as they rehearsed.

Following a review of the film, the audience was treated to a slide show narrated by Mr. Nelson that featured photographs from the past (including a photo of Mr. Pearson reading The Expositor that Mr. Nelson exhorted the newspaper to rerun on its front page) and the presentation of a sacred eagle feather to Prime Minister Pearson.

Following the evening talks, formal and informal, there were two special presentations made. One was of a framed selection of

Yoko Ono. The teenaged Ms. Hannah, an avid Beatles fan, was overjoyed when her grandfather presented her with the poster.

History Day in Kagawong presentations were segmented in half by light refreshments and a chance to engage in conversation and/or take in the many exhibits on hand at the Park Centre, including the aforementioned signed 'War is Over' poster.

The second half of the lectures included "never before seen" film footage of a 1966 school trip by nine Grade 12 and 13 Algoma-East high school students (one deserving student from each of the riding's high schools) that included sometime Expositor contributor Margo Little (Gore Bay, who was at the matinee session), Milford George (Little Current), Vicki Farquhar (Mindemoya, who was at the evening session), Daniel Manitowabi (Wiikwemkoong), Regina Samulski (Blind River), Robert McEachren (Chapleau),

Little Current arsonist denied bail after breach of probation

Clinton Haggart, age 34 of Sudbury, was denied bail in a Sudbury court last week after his surprise, and illegal, appearance in Little Current during Haweater Weekend.

The man, found guilty of purposely setting fire to three Little Current properties in 2014, had been denied access to Little Current as part of his sentencing earlier this year but, just days after getting out of the Sudbury jail for a separate charge of assault and breach of probation, Mr. Haggart was spotted in the community on Saturday, August 12.

Police were called and Mr. Haggart was arrested soon after, without incident.

Mr. Haggart was denied bail on August 10 and will make his first appearance in Gore Bay court on August 22 to answer to his newest charge of breach of probation.

Haweater Weekend a quiet one for OPP

The Haweater Weekend Festival celebrated its 50th anniversary between August 4 and August 7. The annual festival, which occurs in Little Current, was once again a successful and well attended event on scenic Manitoulin Island.

Provincial Ontario Police (OPP) members responded to 83 calls for service in the Little Current Detachment area over the course of the weekend. A strategic operational plan resulted in proactive police activities combined with direct patrols and enforcement efforts by Manitoulin OPP, S.A.V.E and H.S.D members. These efforts resulted in the 17 arrests includ ing the apprehension of one impaired driver, 10 Criminal Code charges and 35 Liquor Licence Act were charges also laid. The majority of the calls for service involved minor incidents related to noise complaints and Liquor Licence Act offenses. There were no reports criminal code related incidents at any of the Haweater Festival venues

Manitoulin Detachment Commander Staff Sgt. Kevin Webb extended his appreciation to all the volunteers. He said, "Our members value and are committed to the partnership between the OPP and event organizers to ensure a safe, secure and enjoyable event for everyone."

Dawn Orr, Paul Skippen, Bruce Wood and Mayor MacNevin voted in favour of the increase, while Councillors Koehler and Melissa Peters voted against it.

"I'm opposing it because I feel the increase is too low," said Councillor Peters.

"I'm opposing it because I feel it is too high," added Councillor Koehler.

"I don't like raising it, but small incremental increases to the rates is better than just leaving it and having to do a big raise," said Councillor Erskine.

Speed reduction

Council carried a motion to amend Bylaw 2015-32 as amended in November 2016 to reduce the speed from 836 North Channel Drive to 80 Cedar Cove from 60 km/h to 20 km/h.

Meeting rescheduled

Council rescheduled the Tuesday, August 15 and Thursday, August 17 meetings to Tuesday, August 22, due to the mayor and a number of councillors being away at a conference.

Country Fest donation

The organizers of Manitoulin Country Fest, Kelly and Craig Timmermans wrote a letter to council stating that they were disappointed council had decided not to donate all the requested items from their deputation earlier in the summer.

In the letter, the Timmermans made it clear that Country Fest is a not-forprofit organization and asked council to reconsider the donation of the NIM bins and chairs.

Town CAO Dave Williamson responded to inquiries from council that the dollar value of the donation would equal \$1,200 and would need to come from the town's donation line.

Councillor Orr asked how much there was left in the donation budget. Mr. Williamson responded \$730.

"I maintain that our donation budget is misnamed," said Councillor Erskine. "We use those funds to make investments into the community and

our 'donation' budget line is too low. I think this is a worthwhile investment into our community and has very good economic impact on our community—it helps employ youth and has positive economic impacts."

Council carried a motion to donate \$1,200 to Manitoulin Country Fest.

Pride Manitoulin

Council reviewed a letter from Pride Manitoulin requesting council approve the Pride parade route for August 20 at 11 am and permission to close the streets as the parade moves through town. The route will see the parade start at the Manitoulin Hotel and

Conference Centre at Sim Street, continue down Water Street and end at the Little Current United Church on Robinson Street.

The group also asked that council consider adding one or two temporary rainbow crosswalks to downtown Little Current.

Mr. Williamson explained that he spoke with the manager of public works and that it would cost roughly \$500 to paint one.

Councillor Koehler expressed concern with the legality of painting the crosswalk.

Councillor Erskine thought it was a great idea, but noted that time was



Young Eagles soar with veteran pilots at Manitoulin East Municipal Airport

LITTLE CURRENT—If you ask those who have spent their lives flying above the clouds, they will tell you that they acquired their passion for flying at a very young age. As with most passions, those

who have been bitten with the flying bug dearly want to share their love of flying with a new generation—enter the pilots of the Young Eagles youth flying program.

Lloyd Richards of Timmins brought the Young Eagles program to Canada decades ago and, since then, has taken 2,500 young flyers up in his plane to experience the joy of soaring above the clouds. Mr. Richards continues to serve as the Experimental Aircraft Association Young Eagles field representative.

This year's Young Eagles flights almost didn't take place, as 45-knot winds and intermittent rain on the originally scheduled flight day forced the cancellation of that day's flights. Fortunately, the next morning proved more amendable to taking to the air and 44 young aviators got the opportunity to go aloft.

"Here in Little Current it's 15 for sure, might even be closer to 20," said Mr. Richards. "I made a commitment 25 years ago that I would take 1,000 kids up. Ten years ago we hit our first million and I had 1,000. We just kept going."

This is the 25th anniversary of the Young Eagle program. "We kind of want-

ed to get 2,500," he said. "We have a special pin for anybody who flies 25 this year and I was short six. I got eight today so I'm good," he laughed.

Katie and Maggie Chapman of Little Current are old hands at flying (their father Joe Chapman owned his own plane for a time). The two sisters are regulars at the Young Eagles flights and they were enthusiastic about the experience. "It was great," said Maggie, who is convinced her father will be buying a new plane when she gets a little older so she too can learn to fly

Following the flights there are hot dogs and pop while a flight certificate is filled out to commemorate the event.

As part of the fundraising, Island artist Heli Cotnam created a painting of a plane in flight that was won in a silent auction by Bob White.

Assiginack will apply to FedNor on Burns Wharf Players' behalf

MANITOWANING—Assiginack passed a motion at its last meeting to put forward a grant application to FedNor on behalf of the Burns Wharf Theatre to see the facility turned into a four-season operation that will allow the theatre company to move back in.

The grant application notes that, "the Township of Assiginack, in partnership with the Burns Wharf Theatre Committee, is seeking financial support to complete a renovation project to enhance the Burns Wharf Theatre building. The renovation will increase the building's use from a seasonal venue to a year-round venue; maximizing its usage and developing a four-season arts and tourism space."

The theatre has been closed since 2013 when, due to new provincial codes for heritage buildings, the township deemed the building unsafe because of fire and accessibility issues," the grant application continues. "Upgrades are required to meet accessibility and safety regulations. This is seen as an opportunity to develop a fourseason tourist destination. The architect's report identified the following required renovations to ensure safety and accessibility: build and exterior ramp; install four exterior fire doors; interior renovation to create firebreak walls; create an accessible bathroom; renovate current bathrooms; improve existing green room and actors' change rooms. The exterior ramp accounts for a substantial amount of the renovation budget-about one-third of the funds being requested. The goal is to renovate this building into a safe, accessible and energy efficient year-round community arts space."

After extolling its many virtues as a

tourism destination, the grant application notes that the short-term goal is to renovate and be back in the theatre offering theatrical and musical performances, art and theatre workshops, summer programming, an arts and crafts retail space and artist-in-residence programs.

"In five years, the goal is to develop Burns Wharf Theatre into a year-round vacation destination that benefits Manitowaning and surrounding communities through partnerships," the application continues. "Manitowaning needs an anchor business/attraction that encourages tourists to spend some time in the community. The goal of Burns Wharf Theatre is to offer programming and a variety of activities that appeal to visitors and local people."

The estimated cost of the project is \$750,000 with a FedNor contribution of \$287,500 requested. The Township of Assiginack has pledged \$60,000 toward the project, if funding is successful, with the Burns Wharf Theatre Players chipping in \$15,000 generated through fundraising, including the company's ongoing Gilbert and Sullivan summer productions. These have been held the past two years at Debajehmujig. It is hoped the remainder will come from Heritage Canada, \$262,500, and Trillium, \$125,000.

Councillor Leslie Fields noted the many references to a "four season" space.

"Were the quotes provided sufficient for four seasons?" she asked.

"No," CAO Alton Hobbs responded. "I find it slightly misleading" she s

"I find it slightly misleading," she said. Councillor Hugh Moggy reminded council that FedNor told the Players they would be more successful if it were four season.

Council approved the grant application.

Manitoulin Star Party and Solar Eclipse Party coming soon at Gordon's Park

TEHKUMMAH—Picking up where the Perseids Meteor Party left off, the Manitoulin Star Party runs from Friday, August 18 to Monday, August 21 at Gordon's Ecotourism Park.

The weekend begins with a wine and cheese welcome campfire on Friday, August 18 and with it a chance to get to know the great people that will be your neighbors, camping on-site in the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada's (RASC) designated Dark Sky Preserve at this event. Then, familiarize yourself with the characters in the great drama of the universe with a guided astronomy session and laser sky tour.

As the sun sets, revel in the emergence of a great blanket of stars spreading from Party, a once in a lifetime opportunity

horizon to horizon in the darkest skies in Ontario, and let yourself be overwhelmed by the vastness of the universe around you as you have never seen it before. The Manitoulin Star Party also falls on the August new moon, which means little to no moon glow to steal the spotlight from the stars!

The eclipse hits its maximum coverage (approximately 70 percent) at 2:25 pm and finishes off at 3:41 pm. Registration includes a livestream video through a solar telescope with RASC lifetime member Francois van Heerden for a unique opportunity to see the eclipse projected on a large screen.

Bring the whole family out to the Dark Sky Preserve to have a fun-filled time marveling at the beauty of our solar system. Explore your creative side by making an eclipse-themed mobile which represents the various stages of the eclipse. For the young, and the young at heart, face painting will also be available during the event to help you get into the eclipse spirit.

Ontario Foundation, Parks, Smith Family Foundation, Lafarge Inc., Burpee-Mills Recreation Farquhar's Committee, Dairy, Little Current Medical and Scott's Veterinary Services. He said there were many more who have supported the project who wished to remain anonymous-but were none the less important to the success of the interpretive exhibition.

Ryan Gardner, parks superintendent who oversees four operating parks, praised the members of FOMB and the contributors of the new exhibits. He spoke of how well the community and parks system worked together to create a beautiful site for people to visit, enjoy and learn about natural Ontario.

Using the science of paleolimnology (the study of the physical, chemical, and biological information preserved in freshwater deposits, primarily from lakes) those cores are divided up into a key chain of slices mere millimetres thick that can help trace the history of the lake's climate and environment back through the centuries.

To effect there is no arcane magic to this scientific crystal ball gazing, rather the secret lies in understanding the characteristics of the tiny creatures whose glasslike skeletons, teeth and chemical residue are secreted within those sediment slices.

Ms. Nelligan explained that there are miniscule creatures who thrive within very limited and distinct environments. Including, most especially, oxygen levels. But in order for those remains to be useful for investigative analysis, those creatures (or plants) must be very abundant. "So we can find it, there has to be a lot of them in the sediment," she said. "It also has to be something we can are able to infer information from. Pollen is good, as are certain types of zooplankton."

Other indicators from the sediment include physical characteristics of the layers, particularly colour, but also the chemical composition of the matter itself. "We normally look at the biological component," she said. There are species of candidates for study that thrive in a wide spectrum of conditions "but these don't help much," she said. Instead, the researchers focus on those whose lives are conducted within a very narrow set of conditions. By knowing those conditions and counting the number of those creatures (perhaps hundreds upon hundreds on a single prepared slide) that are contained within each slice, researchers can gain an accurate photograph of what was taking place in the lake ecology at a set point in the lake's history.

Three types of creatures/plants are examined: chironomids, diatoms and chlorophyll-a.

Chironomids are those non-biting midges that can be found in clouds around lakes. Their larva, bloodworms, are good indicators of oxygen levels.

Clorophyll-a refers to the pigments to be found in plants. "It is what gives lakes that dark colour," she said.

Lake trout lakes are relatively rare, with only one percent of Ontario's 250,000 lakes playing host to the species. Ontario has 21 to 25 percent of the lake trout lakes worldwide. The species are fond of cold lakes of less than 15 degrees Celcius.

Between the influx of sulphur and oxygen depletion, lake trout environment "is being squished." Increased nutrients equals depleted oxygen. So, between the advent of global warming and the encroachment of human agriculture and urban sources of nutrients, Ontario's lakes are under severe pressure.

Ms. Nelligan explained the oxygen regeneration cycle, where the spring introduces new oxygen into the water, the summer months create a blanket of warm water that stops circulation and leads to lower levels and the fall, where the

water cools and once again oxygen is mixed back into the water.

The west basin has a great deal of agricultural activity, while the east basin is much more heavily forested, she noted.

Interestingly, while preliminary study indicates a lot of variation in the historic levels, there is not a succinct finding of a trend.

Ms. Nelligan then explained the study of water is conducted through the use of a Secci depth disc. Essentially a disc is lowered into the water until it disappears from view, then raised again until it appears. The measurement gives the depth of clarity in the lake.

Climate change is having a remarkable impact on Lake Manitou, with the number of ice free days dropping 21 days in the past 44 years. "That's half a day per year," said Ms. Nelligan. In geological terms that is hardly a blink of an eye.

Lake Manitou has benefited from a great deal of citizen science over the years and that has helped a lot with establishing some baselines as well.

At the end of summer, in 2011, the dissolved oxygen levels in the west basin was 2.5 milligrams while in the east basin it measured 6.2 milligrams. "Both fall below the standard," said Ms. Nelligan. That is what led the province to indicate the lake capacity was reached in 2017.

There are plenty of questions still to be answered, she noted. "Why are oxygen levels so low? Hopefully my research can inform the particular strategies."

Ms. Nelligan's work will be posted online at http://post.queensu.ca/~pearl/, but because of the labour intensive nature of the work and its complexity, it may be a matter of at least months if not years before all of it has been analyzed and posted.

will go a long way towards the overall cost of the project and will cover a huge portion of it at the Mindemoya site"

Community of Christ celebrates its 'faith journey' this September

by Alicia McCutcheon PROVIDENCE BAY—The Manitoulin Community of Christ Church is celebrating its storied past on the Island with a special weekend-long event in September and all are encouraged to attend.

Pastor Weston Leeson is the unofficial history keeper of the Community of Christ Church and spoke to The Expositor about its beginnings on Manitoulin.

The first church, then called the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, was built along Holiday Haven Road (as it is now called) near the shores of Lake Manitou in the Manitowaning area.

"It started in a family home in Clover Valley and then moved to Lake Manitou," Pastor Leeson explained.

Missionaries, typically hailing from southwestern Ontario, first came to Manitoulin in 1898, including Missionary John Shields. Some of the first families who joined included the McGillis, Lockeyer, Bryant, Coe, Vanzant and Corbett families.

The first baptized member of the church was Margaret Charlton on August 18, 1901 by a G.E. Tomlinson, missionary.

In 1907 the church branched out, starting a congregation in Little Current that year and eventually building a church in 1940. (The church was located on Campbell Street West in Little Current and when it was decommissioned as a church, was sold and transformed into a gym but later caught fire, in 2014, a result of the arson of the former curling club located next door.)

In 1908, a Sandfield group was formed and led by Pastor Gordon, meeting in homes in the community and in 1916, officially formed a congregation. Sandfield, Pastor Leeson noted, was unique in that many of its members came by boat, using Lake Manitou to help spread the word. The roads in and around Sandfield at the time were little more than carriage trails, so boat was a more convenient method of travel.

One year later, in 1917, a Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints congregation was formed in the Slash area of Assiginack Township. The first missionary in the Slash was Elder R. Howlett.

"Brother Howlett went through many hardships, for example having many rotten eggs thrown at him," a history of the Slash branch states. "At that time, travelling was difficult as the Slash was a newly settled area. Roads were scarce and horse and wagon or walking were the only means of travel. Brother Howlett was known to have taken off his shoes and wade through water in order to visit homes."

In 1921, many members of the Sandfield branch moved to Providence





Bay—including the Arnolds and the Beaudins—as the mill there had brought them work. They began to meet at the Berry Hall, eventually buying the undertaker's house which was turned into a church in 1923 and the congregation still meets in this same location.

In 1925, the Sandfield branch officially became the Providence Bay branch. That same year, a big conference was held that included the head of the church and all the Island members.

In 1952, Silver Water also built a church that included a few members, mostly the Noble and James families. It was located where Stop 540 Restaurant is today.

Manitoulin's first missionary, John Shields, started with a Manitowaning group, but was responsible for seeing the congregations grow to the Slash, Sandfield, Silver Water and even as far as Cockburn Island and on to Drummond Island in Michigan.

The branches were most successful at the first part of the century, with many of them shuttering by the 1950s. The Lake Manitou branch closed in 1952; Silver Water in 1955; the Slash in 1984; and Little Current in 2010.

"Providence Bay remains Providence Bay," Pastor Leeson said, noting that people are travelling from across Manitoulin to attend services there

"Four years ago, we rebuilt the church basement, making it wheelchair accessible," he added. "The church is entirely different from those early days as an undertaker's house."

Pastor Leeson said the Community of Christ's celebration "is one of a journey of the people—a faith journey of the people."

"We're trying to bring back the people the church had over the years," Pastor Leeson said.
"We're not asking for people to come back to church, but to recognize their family's history in it."

The celebrations get underway on Friday, Sep-

tember 8 with registration, finger foods, music and entertainment at the Providence Bay Hall. Saturday, September 9 will begin with a breakfast from 8 to 10 am at the curling club with a worship service getting underway at 11 am in the hall followed by lunch in the hall. After lunch, head to the nearby Community of Christ Church for a walk through the Community of Christ's Island history. On Sunday, August 10 there will be another breakfast followed by a worship service, lunch and a blessing for the journey home.

Registrants are asked to pay \$50 which includes food for the weekend.

Old Knetchel's Mill reopens its doors as Cooper Wood Products in Mindemoya

MINDEMOYA—After sitting vacant for over 35 years, the old Knetchel's Mill in Mindemoya has reopened its doors as Cooper Wood Products.

Tim Cooper and his brother Rob Cooper, both originally from Mindemoya, have reopened the mill, leasing the land from their uncle who purchased the mill in 1983.

"Tim's dad Lloyd Cooper was the head sawyer at Knetchel's Mill," explained Tim Cooper's wife Annalee Cooper. "Tim and Rob own a trucking company in the States which Rob is very passionate about, but Tim was looking to switch gears so we started talking about moving to Manitoulin and reopening the mill a couple years ago. He wanted to return to his roots and get back to working with his hands."

The couple moved to Mindemoya in November of last year along with their two children and began work on the building, which has been vacant since it closed in the '80s, reaching out to Lloyd Cooper for advice when needed.

"We replaced the circular saw from the '60s with an industrial band saw," explained Mr. Cooper. "It is much more efficient—it creates 37 percent less sawdust."

"We are trying to reduce the amount of waste, using the top of trees for fire wood and the saw dust for pellets," said Ms. Cooper.

Mr. Cooper, along with his three employees, spent the winter cutting wood in addition to setting up the new band saw and fixing up the building.

"We have four employees currently but

we are hoping to grow as we get into new markets," said Ms. Cooper.

Cooper Wood Products is focusing mainly on hardwood, but are also milling white pin and cedar.

"A good chunk of our wood is going to the States for furniture," said Mr. Cooper, who noted that currently they sell their wood green but would like to eventually get their own kiln to dry wood on-site.

"It has been a lot of work transferring over the new business but we filled our first order in June," Ms. Cooper shared.

The Cooper family owns 500 acres in Mindemoya that they have been harvesting, but are looking to begin purchasing logs in the next few months (information is available on the Cooper Wood Products website)

"When my dad (Lloyd Cooper) worked here there were nine sawmills on the Island," said Mr. Cooper. "It was one of the largest markets. I'm hoping to help bring that back—it's a big opportunity here on Manitoulin."

Knetchel's Mill was constructed in the spring of 1967, with Ray White as the original contractor. The first crew was: Bill Montgomery, Dave Spry, Ernie Pine, Dale Harper, Len Young, Wayne Cooper, Loren Metta and David Stapleton. where she still maintains a second home in Palm Beach. Ms. Boyd's return to Toronto in 2016 was by air ambulance, having fallen in her Palm Beach garage. She suffered a broken knee and shoulder in the fall, after slipping on an errant piece of cardboard, and required a double surgery, performed at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto—but an observer today would never guess the true extent of her injuries she had not mentioned it, she moves as lithely and gracefully as ever. But at the time she found herself helpless and terrified that she would pass out before being able to summon help. Thanks to a "Good Samaritan" who heard her cries from his balcony, she was rescued by the local firemen and a

paramedic. Although, until seven years ago, Ms. Boyd has been known almost exclusively for her unique classical guitar style and never sang during her performances, her voice is obviously quite powerful...the Good Samaritan was summoned by her desperate cries from a block away.

Thankfully, that ordeal is fading into just another episode in a fascinating life that has included romantic links to the late Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Elliot Trudeau (an eightyear romance), father of the current incumbent Justin Trudeau. "That story is all in my first book," she laughs, referencing her first memoir, the best selling 'In My Own Key: My Life in Love and Music' which is now being

responsibility for the maintenance and upkeep of the road. An industrious beaver and this summer's very wet weather have each taken their toll. While the road is still navigable (The Expositor dropped by for a tour earlier this month), customers, especially those with large transports, have expressed reluctance to travel the road. Meanwhile, Ms. Thomas and the business are recovering from the challenges of a private domestic matter and they are both beginning to find their feet again—leaving tight resources to tackle the road and keep the doors open and people employed.

Ms. Thomas is a very determined entrepreneur, however, and she has been lobbying her local government to help her to bring badly needed employment to the municipality.

"I was disappointed that nobody from the town came to the meeting," said Ms. Thomas, who said that she had extended the invitation. But Mayor Paul Moffatt said that he was not aware of the invitation. "I would like to have been on that tour," he said. "It would be very interesting, I

Both Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha and Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes were also on the site tour and were very impressed with the potential.

"There is huge potential there," said Mr. Mantha when contacted after the tour. "There is an opportunity to develop a trade that was once required that could become big once again—to turn a rock into a precious stone as the saying goes. I know College Boreal has been in discussions to look at working together with them. With the right investors and investment, and with MNDM and FedNor working together on it, there is great potential for targeted training, growth and, very importantly for that area, employment growth

Ms. Thomas is working on a soft skills course with the college that will assist with job readiness training in the local work force, and there are discussions around creating a course that would teach the very niche skills required of

heavy equipment operators in a quarry environment. "It's challenging," said Ms. Thomas. "I have people coming to me with a piece of paper that says they are qualified heavy equipment operators, but when I put them on a machine it becomes very clear that the skills they have don't match the requirements of the job. There is a very good reason quarry operators, such as myself, require experience. If you get on my \$250,000 loader and break it in the first half hour of working, production is down. We can't afford that.

As for the soft skills training and other issues, Ms. Thomas noted that there is a big difference in the new workers coming to her today. "I don't know where the disconnect is," she said, but she has a theory. "Kids used to work with their dads. They learned how to change oil in a machine, how to use a chainsaw or other equipment," she said.

Young workers are also missing key concepts such as ensuring they can have regular attendance at work and coming to work properly prepared. "This is hard, thirsty work," she said. "I have people coming into work without water, without food, without the proper work clothes, you just can't do this job like that."

The two top reasons cited for absenteeism on her job site are "my child is sick and I can't find a babysitter" and "I can't find a ride." These are challenges that will have to be addressed in order to be able to have a steady and dependable workforce.

"Hopefully, working together with partners we can find ways to fix these things," she said.

Ms. Thomas currently has 1,027 skids of dressed stone in her yard. "At this point I really should have over 2,000," she said. The inventory is essential if she is to tackle the large contracts that will be the lifeblood of her operation.

"In 10 years I could be employing 80 workers, in 12 years, 150 workers," she said, "the market is there."

Ms. Thomas has spent years building a market for the unique stone products available from Manitoulin's rock. She has variegated stone that looks stunning in a wall or building face, super hard glaciated stone with an incredibly smooth finish that would be highly sought after, if she could get it out of the ground.

In the meantime, there is that road.
"They used to help out," she said of the municipality.

But for the Assiginack council to assist they need to see a business case and, very importantly, receive a specific request directed to council.

The potential economic benefits make working together a highly desirable route to success that will benefit all sides. "I know stone," asserts Ms. Thomas, but admits that negotiating the shoals of public and private funding "is something she will need help with."

LAMBAC manager Mike Addison noted that his organization is willing to work with Ms. Thomas to put together the business plans she will need as a guide to the future.

...continued from page 12 the 96-year-old prince who recently retired from public duty. "He was the head of the World Wildlife Federation you know," she smiles. "Right now I am deeply concerned about what is happening to our environment and one of my songs is called 'A Prayer for Planet Earth.'

Besides playing in most of the major venues across the world, Ms. Boyd has always tried to include performance in smaller venues "from Kathmandu to Calcutta to Moose Factory, whenever I could fit them in," she confided. On her CD 'The Return...to Canada with Love' Ms. Boyd recorded a song 'Little Towns' dedicated to those audiences that over the decades filled her concert

Former Expositor scribe Dave Schinbeckler of Mindemoya can attest to her history of playing intimate venues in smaller towns, he recalled interviewing Ms. Boyd when she played Espanola 30 years ago. Mr. Schinbeckler caught sight of the online reference to Ms. Boyd being on Manitoulin posted by The Expositor just following the interview. Mr. Schinbeckler, himself a talented guitarist, made no secret of his envy of this reporter's opportunity to interview her this time around. "She is simply amazing," he said.

"I know several people who come up here to Manitoulin Island," said Ms. Boyd. "I have always wanted to come to visit, now I am glad I have, it is such a beautiful and serene place. Quite a refreshing contrast to Toronto."

Ms. Boyd said that she has always found the quiet peace of a rural setting a good place to write.

The globetrotting performer returned to the stage in 2009 after a sixyear hiatus due to a condition that impacted her being able to perform. "Nothing was physically wrong with my body at all." she said. "The media always seem to get that wrong, and my hands have always been fine."

Musician's Focal Dystonia occurs when you over practice any instrument and the maps in the brain start to get confused, she explains. Not one to give up, the consummate professional relearned her technique and is definitely still in very fine form, to which The Expositor can attest as she played her recently written 'Song For Ontario' on her friend's guitar for this scribe. We will not print Mr. Schinbeckler's envious response upon hearing that bit of news.

Ms. Boyd's music has always been infused with love, a love for her home province (although she was born in London, England), a love of nature, a love of the environment and a love of animals—but her greatest love is for the guitar.

"I fell in love with it when I was 13," she said. It is a serious affair that has cost. "My husband told me that there were three of us in our marriage, him, me and my guitar. He told me the guitar would have to go. After 14 years I asked him for a divorce, but we are still good friends."

Often songwriters gain inspiration from their own lives, but sometimes they borrow the stories told from their friends and sisters or plucked from their imagination—and that can bring some amusing moments in life. For instance, the line 'I should have met you many years ago' prompted an excited query from her mother. "She called and said 'who did you meet?'," she recalled with a laugh. "I told her 'no one!'," Ms. Boyd smiled as she added, "I am still single, but

always hopeful I'll find love again.'

"My first song on the CD with a syncopated Latin rhythm is called 'Femme Fatale.' I was never that, but I confess to being an incurable romantic," she said. Ms. Boyd noticed that men were attracted to her romantic image (see photo of the guitarist included with this article or any OF the innumerable album or magazine covers that feature her). "But I seem to have been the one who invariably left them, even since back when I was a teenager.'

Ms. Boyd relates in her new book how she has worked and collaborated with many men in her circle, but most of those she spoke about during coffee, including Prince Philip she firmly placed in the category of friend, not romance.

"One of my new songs is called 'Nothing's as Cruel as Time' and another 'People Who Care For the Animals'," she said. "My songs are often very personal and somewhat autobiographical."

Ms. Boyd recalled seeing a quotation on a church billboard by Henry David Thoreau, 'There is no remedy for love but to love more.' "I wondered if anyone had used that for a song," she said, and set down to write the song 'No Remedy For Love' that she dedicated to Leonard Cohen, who told her he liked the demo she had sent him. "It's a rather cynical song that does not express my own philosophy on love however," she remarked. That would be one of those vicarious sources of inspiration noted earlier.

Ms. Boyd said that she is happy to "inspire boomers that it is never too late to reinvent oneself" and that she is "still excited to tour," which is great news for her Island fans. She is currently reviving her repertoire from her three Christmas CDs for her 2017 Christmas tour performances. "I would love to come back to Manitoulin to play," she said gazing out over the lake, before adding the qualification: "In the

In the meantime, Ms. Boyd is enjoying a few days of well-deserved peace at her friend Mary Inkster's cottage. "I have met a couple of her sons and they all play music," she said. She enjoyed what she described as a wonderful spontaneous evening of music

they shared a couple of days ago.

Camp fYrefly offers workshops for Island LGBTQ2S youth

WHITEFISH RIVER—Mnaamodzawin Health Services hosted Camp fYrefly at Rainbow Lodge in Whitefish River earlier this month, a national leadership retreat for LGBTQ2S youth.

'The camp was founded in 2004 by Dr. Andre Grace and Dr. Kristopher Wells and is designed to help youth develop the leadership skills and personal resiliency necessary for them to become agents for positive change in their schools, families and communities," the camp website notes. "Camp fYrefly exists because caring adults believe that all youth are entitled to a

world that embraces diversity rather than fearing it. fYrefly stands for fostering, youth resiliency, energy, fun, leadership, yeah!"

"The camp was started at the University of Alberta and aimed to help foster mental and physical health for LGBTQ2S youth," explained anya gwynne, Camp fYrefly coordinator. "The model for the camp is based on peer to peer engagement and encourages the development of ones whole self."

Mnaamodzawin Community Health Nurse Kelly Bayer learned of Camp fYrefly and reached out to the coordinators

"We provided a workshop on queer sex education with the whole group to discuss important things like consent and relationships," explained Ms. Bayer. run by two trans youth discussing what their transition journey was like and how to navigate the medical system; and lantern making, an impromptu crafting activity where the group discussed things that bring us light in our lives while make glow in the dark lanterns."

Ontario Camp Director Spencer Harrison explained that while the camp has been held in western Canada for several years, 2017 marks the camps expansion to Ontario.

ent women who raised the two most important people in her life.


Delaney's favourite things about Manitoulin Island are the beautiful sights and the tight knit communities that make you feel like you are a part of a big family.

Visiting Manitoulin?

Tehkummah Township: a pastoral panorama

by Isobel Harry

TEHKUMMAH—With the ferry the focus, passengers coming to and leaving Manitoulin Island often drive or cycle right through the village of South Baymouth to points beyond, blithely unaware of the pastoral paradise that is the Township of Tehkummah. Oh, there are lodges and camps, campsites, trailer parks, tipis, resorts and bed and breakfasts, restaurants from all day-breakfast to

fish and chips, fine dining and sunset dinner cruises, shops and art galleries galore and countless natural attractions from fishing to dark sky astronomy and horseback riding. But what we're after this trip is a peek behind the scenes into the countryside of Manitoulin's most southerly township, a quiet, scenic outpost on the east side of the Island.

In South Baymouth—a great starting point—on

summer day, the grounds of the Little Schoolhouse Museum host Tehkummah Fire Department's (TFD) annual barbecue, yard and bake sale to raise funds for equipment to keep the 25 volunteer firefighters (including 15 first aid responders), three trucks, an ambulance and two water pumpers operating at peak efficiency. Community folks and visitors browse the bargains while munching offerings

from the grill and the bake table, pausing only to watch the majestic entry of the Chi-Cheemaun into port.

In the Museum, among the photos of early settlers, mills and the fishing industry, are displays of farming tools, a hundred-year-old 'Log Cabin' quilt, the community's first telephone switchboard, and artifacts of WWI and WWII donated by local veterans' families. The adjacent 'little schoolhouse' was built first as a

with a mystery at its heart

church in 1891 before being converted to a school in 1898; the authentically furnished classroom seems as though it was in use just yesterday, blackboards cleaned and woodstove ready for a new school day.

Local author Patricia Hall (better known as Pat around these parts) is here with her two volumes of poetry, 'A Fragile Thread' (2013) and 'Mind Storms and New Beginnings' (2016), chatting with the curator of the Little Schoolhouse Museum, Loretta Mucha, and summer intern Phillip DeBruin; both Ms Hall and Ms. Mucha attended the school next door. Pat Hall has lived in the little nearby village of Tehkummah since 1947 when her family (her dad was

born on Manitoulin) moved here from BC. She has been the Tehkummah correspondent for this newspaper "for about 35 years," hand-writing her widely-read 'Tehkummah Talk and Times' weekly column, chatty anecdotes of animal sightings, drives around the township and of euchre games, lunches and concerts at the Community Hall. Her mom (who will be 101 years old in November) features in daily card games and meals out at favorite local haunts, as do locals and their comings and goings, their visitors, their joys and trials. "I've met so many people through my column," says the lifelong writer. "Readers contact me all the

time. When I was ill last year, I received 340 get-well cards!"

We decide to take in some of Pat Hall's beloved home turf of Tehkummah on this iffy-weather sort of day that suddenly has become Manitoulin-summer-perfect. Sailing past South Baymouth's plentiful offerings (saving those for another day), we cruise a little way up Highway 6 to Lakeshore Road. "Here," says Ms. Hall, "are my Secret Gardens." All along this road is a profusion of pink and white sweet pea flowers everywhere, climbing up grasses and trees and clinging to rocks and shrubs, perfuming the air



...continued from page 5A with an indescribable sweet scent. "A Mr. Jackson had property near here with a beautiful garden where he planted sweet peas, so many they eventually overran the place and have become wild," marvels Pat as we breathe in this legacy of sensory delights.

Concession roads may seem a bit of a maze to the visitor in Tehkummah, its gently hilly terrain, forestlined bends and lazy curves a far cry from grid-style road layouts. In any case, it's far preferable to ditch the GPS here and just follow all your senses around, like Pat Hall, appreciating the spectacular flora, fauna, and undulating views along the way.

The village Tehkummah proper is home to the Fire Department, Community Hall (also known as the Seniors' Hall), Municipal Hall, Library and Post Office. The much-loved R.A. Ward's Store has been here since 1922, the interior looking exactly as it did then, supplying dry goods, gas and groceries as the community's general store for almost a century, still run by the founder's descendants.

Tehkummah Township is traversed by the Manitou River and the Blue Jay Creek, both successful rehabilitation projects of the Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association (www.manitoulinstreams.c om), restoring these critical

resources and their fish populations. The meandering paths of the water, babbling brooks in some spots and still pools in others, create the most bucolic vistas imaginable.

We've come to Michael's Bay Road, off Government Road, where Pat Hall used to come as a child to pick wild strawberries and play by the falls beside the old 'ghost town' site of Michael's Bay. Here, in 1867, on the site of a former Odawa settlement that dates to the 15th century, there was a prolific mill that cut and shipped millions of feet of pine, squared timbers and lath. A lighthouse was constructed in 1870 and a town plan laid out in 1879 for the population that would grow to several hundred souls by the mid-1880s.

The whole town burned in 1914, razing the mill and the homes and businesses to the ground. All that is left today of this former boomtown is a large expanse of flat field next to the falls where the mill was, now almost totally hidden by large trees. Ms. Hall points to wild asparagus that pops up every few feet. While this is an overgrown, unremarkable piece of land, there is an undefinable feeling to this place, of those who came before, a sense of the excitement of the lumber boom, the bust years that followed and of the ultimate tragic fire.

In a complicated series of events involving foreign investment and divestment, ably documented over the years by this newspaper, the Michael's Bay Historical Society (MBHS) persists in its mandate "to preserve the history and artifacts for all citizens and visitors to enjoy and to educate others about Manitoulin's first permanent settlement. The goal," reads an entry on Wikipedia (MBHS will soon have a website), "is to protect the town site, which includes several cemeteries, from commercial or resdevelopment." idential



Michael's Bay became a very busy lumber port by the mid-1880s, with a population of several hundred; several cemeteries have been uncovered since the town burned to the ground in 1914, including this Methodist burial ground on Michael's Bay Road.

Efforts by the Township of Tehkummah and the Michael's Bay Historical Society to acquire the town site land are ongoing—it is now under the auspices of the Federal Government and outstanding Anishinaabe land claims must be settled.

For now, the old 'ghost town' site is closed to public access; the Municipal Park and boat launch on the left down Michael's Bay Road give an idea of the expanse of the bay. It is possible, however, to visit one of the five cemeteries in Michael's Bay that have been identified by the MBHS. A Methodist burial ground is signed on the right on Michael's Bay Road; in the leafy glade small white crosses blooming in the dense ground cover mark the 43 graves that were found here. The mystery of Michael's Bay is experienced viscerally, deep in the

heart of Tehkummah, a moving remembrance of the past that merits consideration in the present to safeguard its future.
