Kevin Boyd of Hanmer claimed the week one prize of \$1,000 for his 21.69 lb Chinook salmon—the same fish that is also topping the Salmon Classic leaderboard. Mr. Boyd hauled in his lunker from the waters surrounding Providence Bay.

"There's a lot of big fish starting to show up with coho up to 20 pounds coming in to the weigh stations," Salmon Classic organizer Dave Patterson shared. "I can also say that many of those fish are being caught at a depth of between 75 and 85 feet off the south shore of Manitoulin."

"The North Channel continues to produce the most fish with Clapperton and Heywood Islands being the top spots," Mr. Patterson continued. "They started off at around 10 and 12 pounds in the North Channel, but they're consistently getting bigger with 16 pounds-plus becoming more the norm."

He said that fish seem to be hitting all types of different lures, from spoons to plugs, with Lyman plugs proving popular. Purple has

Visions of American, Canadian owners of Norton's Creek over a century contribute to unique fish sanctuary

Outdoor classroom created as memorial

MANITOULIN—The story of tiny Norton's Creek in Manitoulin Island's Bidwell area as an important brook trout fishery and now a fish sanctuary is an interesting one that spans nearly a century and celebrates the visions of two men, one American, the other Canadian.

In late July, the family of Robert (Bob) Hutton, his friends and Manitoulin neighbours gathered at a clearing by the side of the Bidwell Road just where Norton's Creek flows out under the road and on into Lake Manitou.

They were there, with the coordinator, board chair and past chair and many board members of the Manitoulin Streams organization, to unveil a plaque as a permanent testament to the late Bob Hutton's dedication to conservation and to also dedicate a space on the Hutton property, adjacent to the creek, where school children can come and learn about the life cycle of the brook trout in a unique outdoor classroom.




Mr. Hutton, who passed away in 2013, was an agricultural entrepreneur from the Southwestern Ontario town of St. Mary's, close to Stratford.

Jean Hutton, Bob Hutton's widow, told The Expositor that when they were children, she, her sister Leslie Fields (now of Manitowaning) and other family members would come to Manitoulin Island, to the Bidwell area, to stay with their grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Gard Gammage who had a cottage on Lake Manitou.

Later, when Bob and Jean Hutton had their own camp on the lake in the same area, Mr. Hutton became fascinated by the nearby Norton's Creek, a natural brook trout habitat, which rises from springs in the fractured limestone and flows on down to Lake Mani-

"When we first put it (the submarine cable) in (in 2013) we had

with the in-water work, and that it had to be done in late July/August as to not affect fish spawning.

Cultural events of inclusion bind our country together

It is Monday, August 1: Civic Holiday (in southern Ontario, old Ontario, some call it Simcoe Day) and Haweater Weekend and the Island's other giant celebration, the Wikwemikong Cultural Festival and Powwow, are behind us for 2016.

These events were successful community celebrations and captured people's time and attention for a while in their respective communities and this will happen again this coming weekend with the Manitoulin Country Fest country music event, in upcoming powwows at Zhiibaahaasing and Whitefish River First Nation and at country fairs in Providence Bay, Manitowaning and Wikwemikong.

These are happy times for our small Island communities.

But in less than one week the 2016 Summer Olympic Games will begin in Rio de Janeiro, the first time the international sporting event has been held in a South American city.

Many, perhaps nearly everyone, will watch superb athletes compete for supremacy (or for personal best place finishes) in their respective

And yet, in contrast to the happy celebrations that are a very important part of the summer cycle of activities on Manitoulin Island, the Olympic Games begin against a backdrop of the suspicion related to the increasing difficulty in targeting athletes taking performanceenhancing drugs, a practice which is completely contrary to the ideals of fair play and level playing field sportsmanship on which the modern Olympic games were founded over a century ago. It is becoming more difficult because, we are led to believe, the level of sophistication and subtlety of these drugs is keeping just ahead of methods of detecting them in cheating athletes.

Hopefully this controversy (that has already seen some entire classes of athletes banned from Olympic competition from particular countries) does not overshadow people's enjoyment of this muchanticipated spectacle of excellence. It is inevitable, however, that the suspicion of drugs, not discovered in the screening process, may give some champion athletes an unfair advantage and so the whole notion of pure sport is very much spoiled by the cheaters, some of whom are apparently supported in their deceit by their home countries as part of the quest for medals for domestic political advantage.

This is unsettling as has been the last two weeks of political conventions in the United States that, while they were convened to formally nominate presidential candidates for the two main parties, they also served to demonstrate to the rest of the world the level of political divide that exists south of the border just now as bigotry and vitriol seep into what should be discussions and debates on the most prudent way to move the nation forward both at home and abroad.

These conventions, because of the attention Republican Party frontrunner and now candidate for president Donald Trump has garnered this late winter and spring, in the primary cycles, came to dominate not only the American but Canadian front pages and news casts over the past two weeks.

This is not typical. Canadians who enjoy knowing all about the political spectrum as well as "news junkies" are the people who, traditionally, would follow the ebb and flow of the U.S. political scene in the years when the president's job is on the line.

But this year is different and most of us know more about Mr. Trump and his Democratic rival Hillary Clinton than we would previously have ever thought necessary.

It is inevitable now that the mean-spiritedness that is bound to characterize at least some of the election rhetoric, especially after the controversial Olympics wind down and from then on until Election Day in November, will become part of the daily news diet.

A young man from Georgia visiting our region last week (his spouse is originally from Espanola) observed that he felt he was living through a second Civil War in his country. The high stakes, levels of anger, one side is directing against the other that is defining this race for the next American president he felt was increasingly defining his homeland.

So the message for us all is to revel in the benign community activities on Manitoulin like the ones already referenced and the ones that will fill out the summer and early fall and to absorb as much goodwill and community spirit from these positive activities by way of an emotional buffer against the suspicion and negativity that will certainly cloud aspects of people's enjoyment of the Olympic spectacle and to help us guard against the northward creep of suspicion of "the other" that will surely be a hallmark of this fall's U.S. presidential elec-

Adding our own Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's commitment to "sunny ways" to the positive feelings engendered by events like Mindemoya's Homecoming Weekend, Gore Bay's Harbour Days, Lions Summerfest in Manitowaning, Kagawong's Summerfest, Haweater Weekend, the Wikwemikong Cultural Festival (aka the Wikwemikong Powwow) and the traditional powwows that take place in Aundeck Omni Kaning, M'Chigeeng, Sheguiandah, Sheshegwaning, Whitefish River. Zhibaahaasing, and the rotating powwows of Kaboni, Rabbit Island, South Bay all the other cultural activities is surely a partial antidote to the pervasive culture of negativity to which we will certainly be subjected this summer and fall from events over which we have no control.

A message from the Lake Manitou Area Association

Save the fresh, clean waters of Manitoulin Island

To the Expositor:

Have you considered what a privileged people we are to live on Manitoulin with what seems to be an abundance of fresh water all around

We need to appreciate the beautiful, clean, pure water we enjoy and use daily. It is indeed a treasure to which many people in the world do not have access. Do you realize that this gift, as it is now, may not always be available to us?

Fresh clean water is a scarce resource in the world. More than 97 percent of the water on earth is saline, and occurs in seas and oceans. About 2/3 of the available fresh water is trapped in glaciers and ice caps. The remainder, or less than one percent of the total fresh water on earth, includes water in our atmosphere, lakes, rivers and streams, wetlands and the ground. (Health Canada 1997).

Without water, there can be no life. We realize that we must do more than just enjoy water and consume it; we must become its caretakers as well. The "quality" of water is a very fragile thing and sometimes a very small contaminant or a careless practice can greatly affect a large volume of water. It is generally easiest to prevent problems than try to remedy them after the damage has been done.

Pollution Prevention occurs when people change their plans, practices, and habits in order to reduce the generation of pollution and waste at the source. It also includes making smart choices both in what we buy and in how we use the products.

Because we strongly believe that "The Solution to Pollution is Education," we are asking you to read this information and consider what you can do to protect the water quality of Lake Huron and the lakes on Manitoulin Island.

If we follow the guidelines, listed below, we will greatly reduce the amount of phosphorous that enters the lake and we will avoid fuelling the algae growth, which depletes the available oxygen in the water.

We urge you to adopt at least some of these practices into your lifestyle at your cottage or home this summer. Also, please share this information with your neighbours, because Healthy Shoreline Practices benefit everybody.

It's all about looking after the environment. If each one of us does his or her part to respect, protect and conserve the environment, then the environment will do its part and look after us.

Then we will continue to enjoy living on the waterfront that is so spe-

cial to each one of us and we will protect it for our children and our grandchildren.

The Healthy Shore List:

How does your waterfront check out?

plant a buffer zone of native vegetation close to shore

The tangle of roots filters impure runoff from your cottage and slows erosion of the soil

· swear off pesticides and herbicides

They end up in the water and are bad news for aquatic life • opt for a floating or pipe dock

It causes the least disturbance to the shoreline lakebed • "soften" hard walkways and drives





Pokemon craze meets Haweater Weekend 2016

LITTLE CURRENT—It's hard to escape the Pokémon Go craze sweeping the globe, as hordes of mobile phone waving walkers seek out the Pokémon balls, eggs and other virtual items associated with the location-based augmented reality game. This Lions Haweater Weekend plenty of Pokémon Go players of all ages could be seen wandering the streets of Manitoulin communities in pursuit of their digital prey.

So successful is the Pokémon Go mobile game, with its built-in market based on two generations of game players and a plethora of familiar toys, cartoons and other marketing merchandise associated with the highly successful brand, its much anticipated recent launch in Canada took down the company's servers, despite the company's best preparations.

Dan and Aiden, two visitors from Thunder Bay, were spotted in the parking lot of St. Bernard's Roman Catholic Church, a local Pokéstop.

"This is a Pokéstop," explained Aiden, a preteen Pokémon veteran who was tutoring the whitehaired Dan in the intricacies of the game. "Here you can get all your Pokémon things you need."

The duo turn the usual master and student relationship on its head, like much of the digital revolution, with the younger leading the elder through the intricacies of the virtu-

al world

"I don't know anything about this," admitted Dan as he scratched his white hair with a bemused expression. "He's the expert," he said, pointing at his younger companion.

The two gaze down at the tiny screen of a smartphone, where a virtual egg is showing signs of cracking. Upon hatching, Aiden exclaims excitedly, "It's a Snorlax! That's a 'rare'!"

The higher the level of trainer, the better the chance of hatching a rare and powerful Pokémon.

Okay, let's back up a bit for the benefit of the uninitiated.

Pokémon was a game launched in the early days of computer gaming, created in 1996 by Japan gaming giant Nintendo (remember Game Boy?) and was a roleplaying game (remember Dungeons and Dragons?) that involved game cards and a related television program. Pokémon is short for pocket monster, of which there are about 150 instances that were collected on cards. These "monsters" have special powers that the trainers help hone into battle readiness. The Pokémon gain levels and powers through time and training. There are bug, fighting, fire, flying, dragon, electric, ghost, grass, ground, ice, normal, poison, psychic, rock and water Pokémon and within each of these types are several critters that have different abilities. There are various ways in which the Pokémon can "evolve" into more powerful forms.

Okay, that's the basics of the history.

Now fast forward through two generations of Japanese anime style cartoon program aficionados of all ages (no seriously, literally Pokémon has a pre-school to adult fan base), and there you have the base market for Pokémon Go.

But Pokémon Go takes that fan base and melds it with the new geo-location gaming and augmented reality, where players use the GPS location ability of their smartphones to map progress through the real world and a map of an overlaid virtual world filled with Pokéstops you can locate where Pokéballs (used to capture Pokémon), Pokémon and the other tools and paraphilia needed to play the game.

It seems that St. Bernard's Catholic Church in Little Current is just such a Pokéstop (best not to let Father George Gardner catch you playing in the pews during a sermon though), as is Three Cows and a Cone (where staying glued to your smartphone screen is fine).

It's the combination of movement through the real world as you play in the virtual world that makes Pokémon Go so different, albeit providing some controversy. Luckily, it is not necessary to get inside buildings or onto properties to collect the Pokestop bounty.

Pokémon Go is the antithesis of the static digital game play, as you have to move to groove. "Pokémon eggs, where do you get eggs?" asks Dan. "I got you one at the last stop," replies Aiden, just a hint of virtual world weariness in his voice, taking the phone from his mature stu-

dent and deftly navigating through the screens as Dan's eyes and mind frantically try to keep pace with the movements. "Here it is."

In order to get the egg to hatch, Dan will have to walk for two kilometres. The program knows if you are travelling at mechanized speed, so no shortcuts allowed.

"It's great," says David Erskine of Sudbury, who plays the game with his wife Francine. "I have mapped out a whole route and we walk every day." The game has inspired generations of often too sedentary people to get out and explore the world.

Since so many Pokéstops are located at historical signs and markers an added bonus is that players who normally ignore those signs are now stopping and reading about them, bringing an educational aspect

to the game.

Pokémon Go is a free downloadable game. although there are monetizing aspects to it where players can advance faster and higher by spending real dollars on the virtual world. It is currently being touted as a game changer, pun somewhat intended, and points to a future where the digital and real worlds will continue to interact and become

Oh. and the Snorlax? According to the Internet, it "is a huge, bipedal, dark blue-green Pokémon with a cream-colored face, belly, and feet. Its body is composed of mostly its belly, where most of its fat reserves accumulate. Its head is large, with small, pointed ears and two pointed teeth protruding from its lower jaw. It has large, hind feet with three claws and a circular brown paw pad, and its arms and five foreclaws are short. Snorlax are often found in mountains and forests and wake up only to eat and seldom for exercises. It is not a picky eater, as its strong stomach allows it to eat even moldy food without feeling any ill effects. When hungry, it is not satisfied until it consumes 900 lbs. (400 kg) of food. Snorlax is docile enough to let children and small Pokémon bounce on its large stomach."

Now get out there, snag a Pokéball and capture one, or hatch one like Aiden, your Fitbit will thank you for it.

Billing's History Day features the stories of the Franklin Expedition and Allan Tustian

KAGAWONG—The Billings Heritage Museum's popular History Day is coming fast upon us, and this year the main attraction is the illfated Franklin Expedition and the recent discovery by a Canadian diving team of the wreck of the Erebus, flagship of famed arctic explorer Captain Sir John Franklin, but as has been the tradition of History Day, there is an added bonus with the presentation of a locally produced documentary on the military career of Mindemoya's Allan Tustian.

"The fate of the Franklin Expedition is the Holy Grail of the Canadian arctic and the search for the Northwest Passage and remains one of the most enduring mysteries of Canada's far North," said Old Mill Heritage Centre curator Rick Nelson. "We originally wanted to pair this presentation with the one on LaSalle's Griffon that we presented at last year's History Night, but unfortunately scheduling conflicts made that impossible."

The Franklin expedition departed England on the morning of May 19, 1845 in two state-of-the-art reinforced hull steam driven ships with a crew complement of 24 officers and 110 men—all of whom disappeared into the arctic mists, leaving only a few cannibalized bones behind to compound the mystery. Despite numerous rescue and recovery expeditions fueled by what was at the time an unimaginably immense reward, little more was known about the fate of the expedition—but on September 9, 2014 the Canadian Victoria Strait Expedition discovered the wreck of the HMS Erebus and with it a wealth of information about

Franklin Expedition.

Marty Magne, director with the Archaeology and History Branch of Parks Canada, is an expert on the find who will be coming to give a presentation on the Victoria Strait Expedition and the Franklin Expedition. Mr. Magne has been delivering such presentations on the discovery of the ship and the Franklin Expedition and the question and answer session following the presentation promises to be very informative.

Following a short intermission after Mr. Magne's presentation, the History Night crowd will be treated to a documentary on the naval career of Manitoulin's own Allan Tustian.

"We filmed the documentary a few years ago," said Mr. Nelson. "We have ran the documentary here in the museum but it has never really had a public viewing. It's a slick documentary presentation with accompanying photos of the WWII era. It is a well put together presentation of his naval career."

Mr. Tustian survived a buzz bomb attack in London, England, helped keep the channel clear during the D-Day invasion and took part in the pursuit of many U-boats. "He was one of the very first radar technicians," said Mr. Nelson. "Radar was very new at the time and he was one of the first to use it on a ship."

History Day will take place at the Kagawong Park Centre on August 11, with a 3:30 pm matinee and a 7:30 pm evening show. The program is sponsored in part by Manitoulin Transport. Although free, a charitable donation to the museum is gratefully encouraged.



Island shot putter prepares for first year of college after world championships

EVANSVILLE—Island shot putter Joseph Maxwell has just returned from competing at the IAAF World Under 20 and is now preparing for his first year of college at the University of Tennessee (UOT).

The 18-year-old Evansville athlete officially accepted a track and field scholarship to (UOT) earlier this year and will be leaving for school later this week.


"It was a really tough couple of days after the competition, but now I'm looking forward to putting it behind me and taking a break until I leave for school next week," said Joseph last Friday.

"I really under performed in Poland," he said. "A week has passed but it's still really hard for me to even talk about things, that's how disappointing my performance was. I competed the morning of July 19 in the shot put qualification round. Everyone gets three throws in the qualification and the top 12 out of that qualification round move on to the final, which takes place the same day in the evening. I went in with a goal of making the final and that was something well within my reach."

"We arrived in Poland five days before my competition so I had lots of time to prepare," continued Joseph. "My training over there was great and I felt in the best shape of my life. On the morning of the nineteenth I woke up early feeling more ready than ever. I warmed up and was led to the main stadium for my qualification. My first throw in the competition was excellent, it sailed out and landed right around 19 meters but on my follow-through, I clipped the outside of the circle with my foot which ruled the throw a fault and it was not measured. My second throw I took very safely but I did not finish the throw well so the distance was not nearly as far as the first. By the time of my third and final throw it was pouring rain. I tried my best, but the rain caused the shot to slip out of my hand on the release. As it turned out, my first throw would have been far enough to make finals had I been able to stay in the circle."

Joseph told The Expositor that failing to make the final was, and still is, a huge disappointment. "Words don't really do it justice, but this has been one of the hardest things I've ever had to deal with," he said. "Since the end of last season, world juniors had been my goal. It's tough to train all year and then fail to meet your hopes and expectations. Having my parents with me in Poland was certainly a big help, but it will take time for this to fully sink in and for me to move on."

Apart from the disappointment of his performance, Joseph said

He said his new schedule will entail daily morning classes and afternoon training five to six days



Nearly a century before, Ohio politician and businessman Beman Dawes had also established a summer residence on Lake Manitou, just south of Norton's Creek.

An avid fly fisherman, as was his wife Bertie, according to great-grandson Tim Boland, Mr. Dawes acquired the lands surrounding Norton's Creek and set out to develop a private trout stream in the 1920s.

Mr. Boland attended the Hutton dedication service and brought with him an original watercolour drawing, done on a copy of the property's survey document, that indicates the seven timber bridges Mr. Dawes had constructed together with the masonry dam that is still in place adjacent to the outdoor classroom that now houses Mr. Hutton's memorial. Another dam was located further upstream, the drawing shows.

Other details on the drawing show successful fishermen, cartoon style, landing their catches and a farmer driving cattle along the Bidwell Road. It also notes the stream's outflow into the lake is a healthy 1,979 gallons per minute. The fall of the creek is 37 feet from its spring-fed source to Lake Manitou, according to the drawing.

Mr. Bolan notes that the family lodge on Lake Manitou still display numerous trophy fish caught not only locally but from around the world and says that, "most of them were caught by my great-grandmother Bertie

The senior Dawes hosted their friends to fishing expeditions on the creek but, after their deaths, the property was kept in the family but not used in this

Mr. Hutton approached Mr. Boland's mother about purchasing the property and renewing it, Mr. Boland said, the family agreed.

"We felt this was a good use for the property." And this way, it would be renewed in the late Beman Dawes' vision and "we could still come and enjoy it," he added.

Ms. Hutton said that they purchased the stream and its surrounding property in 2008 and got right to work bringing it back to life.

Manitoulin Streams coordinator Seija Deschenes recalled, "In 2008, Bob Hutton came to my office in Manitowaning. He had just purchased the (Norton's Creek) property and had remembered that, when he was younger and visiting Manitoulin, going there to fish for brook trout.

"He asked what could be done to bring this stream back as a fishery and brook trout habitat," she recalled.

By this time, Manitoulin Streams had rehabilitated Bass Creek as a walleye spawning area sanctuary, improved the Blue Jay Creek and Manitou River and was also planning work on the Mindemoya

Ms. Hutton said that her husband took some cours-

es himself and Ms. Deschenes said that Manitoulin Streams had embraced the project and had involved College Boreal outdoor conservation management students to analyze the stream to determine whether there was any remnant of a brook trout population remaining there.

When they reported that there was no longer any of the species left in the stream, the stream rehabilitation process began almost immediately.

She said the first thing to do was to keep livestock out of Norton's Creek as areas of the stream had been much widened by cattle wading in to drink there.

The process then moved on to rehabilitate the stream itself by constructing "weeping weirs", made from rocks, placed strategically in the stream.

Manitoulin Streams board member Delmer Fields of Manitowaning (also a brother-in-law to the late Bob Hutton) collected rocks from fields on his property and brought them to the creek. Conservation Rangers, working with Manitoulin Streams through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, placed them in the stream to slow down the flow of water.

Dead trees from the area were moved to the edges of the stream and placed there to begin to provide fish habitat and hundreds of trees have been planted by board members and other volunteers along the creek's banks, on both sides, in an effort to renew the environment to what it would have been when Mr. Dawes purchased it as a healthy brook trout stream.

Ms. Deschenes explained that the next step was to introduce "eyed" brook trout eggs into the stream each year in early December. This activity is often reported in this paper as a photo/essay and involves students from several area schools.

The eggs are harvested from females in Lake Nipigon, fertilized with milt from males from the same lake and then shipped to the Hell's Lake Hatchery in Englehart where they are raised to the eyed egg stage (the embryos are by now multi-celled and show two black spots that resemble human eves).

The eyed eggs are shipped down to Norton's Creek from Englehart and then volunteers work hard to place them in the water in "Scotty Boxes". The eggs hatch in compartments in these specialized nurseries, affording the fish some protection at their earliest stage.

Ms. Deschenes explained that, when the embryonic fish have absorbed their yolk sacs, they squeeze through a small hole and out into the stream, arriving there with a much better rate of survival.

She explained that 10,000 eyed eggs begin this phase of becoming adult brook trout in the river each year.

Ms. Deschenes said that the Manitoulin Streams group had been working hard with Bob Hutton until his death and continues to work with his family. She noted that much of the preliminary work leading up to the planting of the eyed eggs takes place in Graham Hutton's large garage

building at his cottage.

In her remarks at the dedication of the memorial, Jean Hutton spoke of how her husband's dream has become a reality, just as Ms. Deschenes explained the process to The Exposi-"When we decided to cre-

ate this park, Wes Rydall and Bobby went above and beyond to make it turn out this well," Ms. Hutton said, referring to the outdoor classroom. "The white pea gravel was trucked in and the stone benches were placed facing the creek so that students could see the dam while listening to their teacher," Ms. Hutton



completed by mid-September of this year.







"We found the perfect stone for the plaque which can resemble a wolf baying at the moon or, from the side, a polar bear."

"The plaque itself was carefully selected with the help of Bob's brother, Murray. Our family has helped with the cutting of trees, planting flowers and erecting the rest of the split rail fencing in the park," she continued.

Ms. Hutton was enthusiastic about the "beautiful fish carving showing the different stages in the life of a brook trout," created by Delmer Fields. It is mounted at the front of the outdoor classroom. "The artistry and carpentry skills involved in creating this carving actually took my breath away when I first saw it," Ms. Hutton said of Mr. Fields' larger-than-life sculptures.

She went on to thank Delmer Fields on behalf of her family. "It has deeply touched our whole family. We thank him from the bottom of our hearts."

"Because of this wonderful dedicated team," Ms. Hutton concluded, "Bob's vision has become a reality where future generations may learn about and enjoy this gift of nature"

Ms. Deschenes, attesting to the success of Mr. Hutton's vision, noted that Manitoulin Streams research confirms that the

brook trout are surviving in the stream to become adults, are then reproducing and then the idea is that, over generations, the fish become "stream smart" and as adults move out into the lake, where a brook trout fishery is once again being created, and then return to Norton's Creek to spawn and reproduce.

Indications are that this is precisely what is happening.

Mr. Dawes' and Mr. Hutton's visions vary slightly at this point. Mr. Dawes developed the stream as a place where he and his friends could fly fish. Now, in the Huttons' hands, it is a fish sanctuary leading to an experience for anglers in Lake Manitou.

To visit the outdoor class-

room and Norton's Creek, travel up or down the Bidwell Road. Watch for the sign indicating the lane to Uncle Steve's Camp.

The Norton's Creek outdoor classroom and the Bob Hutton memorial are located in a clearing, by the creek, on the other (east) side of the road from the Uncle Steve's Camp lane.

And, by the way, Norton's Creek memorializes a pioneer postmaster who presided over the Bidwell Post Office many years ago when this tiny hamlet was able to boast not only a post office but stores, a school, church, homes and Orange Lodge hall. Jean Hutton sleuthed out the creek's namesake.



Following the in camera meeting with local politicians, a reception featuring a splendid spread of finger foods, hosted by the Municipality of Central Manitoulin, was laid out to fuel the informal small talk.

The governor general in person proved to be everything one could ask for in a representative of Canada's head of state, Queen Eliza-

"I think it is important to meet with members of the communities that we represent," said Ms. Dowdeswell when asked why she was spending her summer visiting communities across the North in what might be termed 'the barbecue circuit' if she was a politician. "I am definitely not a politician," she emphasized with a laugh. The lieutenant governor's role, she noted, is strictly non-partisan. "But the lieutenant governor's role comes with the power to convene."

In that event, her roundtable meeting with local First Nations and representatives of local First Nations focused on "social cohesion in the community"

Following the reception, the lieutenant governor departed from her scheduled itinerary to drop in at Central Manitoulin Welcome Centre, where she was greeted by a number of volunteers and curator Pat Costigan in period dress, summer students and Central Manitoulin Historical Society president, and Councillor Ted Taylor who, along with Mayor Richard Stephens, took her excellency on a tour of the facility. On her tour the lieutenant governor learned about the historical settlement of the Island and how the land had been parceled out to homesteaders in 100-acre lots.

Central Manitoulin, the lieutenant governor travelled to Wikwemikong, where she visited the Mishibinijima Private Art Gallery established by world renown Anishinabe artist James Simon. All it takes is a simple snap of a picture of bumble bees you see in your garden, park or campsite and upload to bumblebeewatch.org

The Canadian member of Friends of the Earth International, one of the world's largest grassroots environmental organizations, is partnering with Bumble Bee Watch to deliver the first ever Great Canadian Bumble Bee

Count. Bumble Bee Watch, created by scientists from the Xerces Society, York University and Wildlife Preservation Canada, is an ambitious citizen-science project that asks people to take pictures of bumble bees when they see them, note their location and upload the information online, where they will be verified by a team of "For our researchers. Great Canadian Bumble Bee Count," the website enthuses, "we want to help Bumble Bee Watch's researchers by seeing how many bumble bees we can find across Canada from now until August 15!

Boatbuilding traditions on Manitoulin

by Isobel Harry

MANITOULIN—From earliest days, getting to, from and around the world's largest freshwater island necessitated travel on water. Before roads were built on Manitoulin, First Peoples and new settlers walked long distances through bush and blizzards to cut wood, hunt and visit small settlements, while fishing, lumbering and trade with the mainland required having a water-worthy vessel as a matter of survival.

The story of Manitoulin's early boat builders is a compelling one, as told by Bill Caesar, a passionate historian of the Island who lives on a bay within sight of the LaCloche mountains. His blue eyes twinkle as he displays first some antique boat fabrication tools and later his collection of rare fossils.

On a cycling tour of Holland, Bill and Mary Caesar found



a magazine article entitled 'Sailing Indians of the Northern Great Lakes' that was to be the inspiration for Mr. Caesar's small but absorbing book, 'Northern Craft: Boats and Boat Builders of Manitoulin and Killarney.' The former history teacher, author of several popular books on fossils, shipwrecks, lighthouses and boat builders is a living inventory of the past 150 years of boat building on Manitoulin Island and in the region.

The earliest boat pictured and described in 'Northern Craft' is a dugout canoe, essentially a vessel hollowed out of an elm tree. An early account is told by the late Marion Seabrook of her family arriving at their homestead on Lake Mindemoya in 1874 by a dugout canoe that then spent years "lying on the beach in front of their home, partially buried in sand." This very canoe is in Jack's Museum in Mindemoya (not open currently), and another similar dugout is in the Little Schoolhouse and Museum in South Baymouth.

The birch bark canoe, explains Mr. Caesar, was "a great gift from the First Nations' people to those who came from Europe seeking a better life. Some of the most beautiful examples of these boats were made by the Algonquin and Oiibwe people.

Mr. Caesar tells the story of Norman Middaugh of Big Lake, who went to live with the Algonquin people of the Golden Lake Reserve in Algonquin Park in about 1917. Known as 'the blue-eyed Algonquin,' he spent 15 years trapping and learning how canoes were built, eventually ending up in Burwash Prison for six months for trapping within the park's boundaries. Mr. Middaugh returned to Manitoulin, eventually building many canoes for tourists who loved his fine craftmanship; one of his last canoes now hangs in the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in

More examples of locally built bark canoes or models can be found at the Centennial Museum at Sheguiandah and the Killarney Museum. The Net Shed Museum in Meldrum Bay and the Wm Purvis Marine Museum in Gore Bay's Harbour Centre have wonderful marine displays.

Another remarkable but little-known vessel was built on Manitoulin, commonly known as an 'Indian working sailboat,' but also

called a 'Mackinaw boat' or 'Collingwood skiff.' "Beautiful sheer, double-ended design, massive sail area and a centre board which allowed them to navigate in extremely shallow water and to be pulled up on the shore," says Mr. Caesar, and in 1848, 50 of these were launched in Wikwemikong alone. "Each one was different, defying any attempt to group them as a 'class' of sailboat." They between 18 and 30 feet long, with one or two masts and "extremely seaworthy" on Lake Huron and Georgian Bay from about 1845 for the next hundred years for the five generations of Ojibwe, Odawa and Pottawatomi who built them. Carrying handcrafts, maple sugar, fish, corn and blueberries to Manitoulin and passengers to and from the Sault and Parry Sound and points between, the sailboats were a common sight all over the North Channel and southern waters. A master boat

The master of ceremonies this year was Allan Manitowabi and Ryan McMahon, while Wesley Cleland took on the role of arena director. The smoke dance singer was Jordan Smith of Tuscarara, New York. The head drum judge was Gary Parker of Tonawanda Seneca, New York, while the head dance judge was Elizabeth Webkamigad of Wikwemikong. The head veteran this year was Robert Eshkibok of Wikwemikong.

The head dancers were Alex Copenace and Caitlin Big George. During grand entry the Anishinaabek Eagle Staff was carried by Bnaaswi Biiawah. The Wikwemikong Eagle Staff was carried by Wayne Pitawanakwit and the Addicition and Recovery Addiction Staff was carried by Daniel Pelletier. Flag carriers included Ray Trudeau with the Flag of Wikwemikong, Jerry Cleland with the 1764 Wampum Flag, Reid Christie with the POW Staff, Martin Kimewon with the US Flag, Rene Espaniel with the Native Canadian Flag and DJ White with the War of 1812, Forgotten Ones

Drum groups this year, which kept the heartbeat of the powwow, were host drum Whitefish Bay, High Eagle, High Ridge, Shake Island, Wild Cubs, Gewaabaajiufrs and Battle Nation.

Among the many dancing competitions was a crowd favourite, the women's fancy iron special and men's fancy iron special. Celine Morrison was the women's winner, while Adrian Trudeau took home the men's

Azhibakones Trudeau was named the new Little Miss Wikwemikong and Cheyenne White, Miss Wikwemikong 2016.

Special guests this year were the Wushu Project from Toronto performing the Lion Dance. The Lion Dance has been part of the Chinese culture for hundreds of years and was performed on special occasions such as weddings, store openings, festivals and celebrations. The lion, a symbol of power, wisdom and good fortune, brings happiness, longevity and good luck. In addition, the dance has now become a national level

In addition to the great dancing, amazing regalia and food, there was an art show, craft vendors and workshops. Many of the workshops focused on heritage and culture and included regalia and dance, the Seven Grandfather teachings, and a history of the Ojibwe language.

...continued from page 5A builder named Fournier from Sagamok "sailed the last sailboat into Little Current harbour in 1939." Some models are upstairs in the museum at Turner's in Little Current, but no actual old boats seem to exist anywhere except in photographs.

Sheshegwaning First Nation on Manitoulin's West End became wellknown in the 1920s and '30s as a boat building centre largely through the work of Joe Samson, legendary crafter of "exquisite birch bark canoes and graceful sailboats." A photo of Joe Samson in the Wismer Collection of the Gore Bay Museum shows the tall, slender builder with a 22foot square-sterned 'Indian Sailboat' under construction; one of his four-foot birch bark canoe models is occasionally on display in the Wm Purvis Marine Museum. The Commanda family were also renowned boat builders in Wik-wemikong Unceded Indian Reserve in those days, adds Mr. Caesar.


Big lake steamships plied Lake Manitou before the turn of the 20th centurya note discovered on the back of a photo in Turner's museum describes how the 'Della S.' took passengers two days a week "down Lake Manitou to Vanzant's where they were met by George MaCrow [sic] who took them into Manitowaning to shop.

We sail through the his-

tory of 'Killarney Boats,' built by Charlie Low for fishing; only one such working boat exists intact today, the 'Fatima,' built in 1951, moored at Killarney. famous mahogany cruiser built by one of Charlie's sons and launched in 1947, named the 'Jodie G,' has been sailing for over 60 years, with a few meticulous refurbishments along the way.

Bill Caesar tells the story of the 'Jane Miller,' the only passenger ship ever built on the Island sank in 1881 off Colpoy's Bay on the Bruce Peninsula; of 'home-builts' by Allan Morphet and Douglas Hall; of the small and practical 'lumberyard punts' or 'barnyard skiffs' built of scrap that "could hold 20 kids" and of the Berry family of Kagawong, "the most important boat building establishment in Northern Ontario over the last century." The Berry Boats operation no longer builds the oak and white cedar designs of the early days, but is still involved in boats in Kagawong today, run by Oliver Berry's great grandson, Oliver Newlands; two original Berry boats are in the Kagawong museum. The Purvis family's "long and glorious history of maritime activity" glimpsed, with a reference Buck Longhurst's detailed history of the family's fishing operations, including building several tugs in Gore Bay Harbour, published as 'A Family Tradition,' available in the Marine Museum.

And then there's Ham's Marine—still operated by Dave Ham in Manitowaning after more than half a century in business, first

building the 'Manitoulin Punt,' a flat-bottomed wooden fishing boat that sold for \$50. After buying Henley Boats in the late 1990s, the company now builds distinctive heavy-duty aluminum boats "ideally suited to the local conditions."

"Before the bridge was built, before the train came, almost everybody built boats," says Mr. Caesar. Examples of the earliest ones do exist on the Island, but many have gone to museums in Ottawa and elsewhere. "I like to have our things stay here," Mr. Caesar muses. "It's our heritage." He laments the loss

of the solid brass foghorn from the Meldrum Bay Lighthouse to the Museum of Technology and of birch bark canoes to other institutions. He notes, however, that he knows of one "excellent Island woodworker," Kurtis Aelick, who "may build an 'Indian sailboat' replica," and so the historian quietly awaits the day he might clap eyes on it.

Books by Mr. Caesar, including 'Northern Craft,' are available at The Expositor bookstore and Ten Mile Point Trading Post.



One of many dishes that I like to make this time of year are vegetable salads. They are quick to put together, are healthy, and in most cases the vegetables are either growing in your garden or you can get them at the farmers'

Green Bean Salad with Cilantro Pesto

I get lazy with green beans. I don't take off either end and just say, eat the whole bean, that is why we have teeth! I also used all of the cilantro, leaves and stem and found out that it had great flavour all the way down the stem and it never became bitter. Parsley is different—unless you'll be using the herb in a soup or stew-be picky and use just the leaves.

2 garlic cloves, chopped coarsely

2 1/2 cups fresh cilantro leaves and stems, trimmed

1/2 cup olive oil or sunflower seed oil

1 scallion, sliced thin

4 tsp lemon juice

Salt and pepper

2 pounds green beans

- 1. Toast walnuts and garlic in a skillet over medium heat, stirring often, until fragrant, 5 to 7 minutes; transfer to bowl. Let cool.
- 2. Process cilantro, oil, scallion, lemon juice, walnuts, garlic, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper in food processor, scraping down sides of bowl as needed, until smooth, about 1 minute. Season with salt and pepper to taste. (Pesto can be refrigerated for up to 2 days). You can also use a blender.
- 3. Bring 3 quarts water to boil. Meanwhile, fill large bowl halfway with ice and water. Add green beans and 1 tablespoon salt to boiling water and cook until crisp tender, about 2 minutes. Drain green beans and transfer to ice bath, and let sit until chilled, about 2 minutes. Drain green beans and transfer to bowl. Add pesto and toss to coat. Season with salt and pepper to taste and serve.

Summer Vegetable Chopped Salad

A quick and easy salad. Use romaine lettuce hearts and add the lettuce just before serving so it doesn't become

3 cucumbers, peeled, halved lengthwise, seeded, and cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1 1/2 pounds cherry tomatoes, quartered

Salt and pepper

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 clove garlic, minced

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1 yellow or red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded, and cut into 1/2 inch pieces

1 small red onion, chopped fine

8 ounces radishes, trimmed and sliced thin

3/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

1 romaine lettuce heart (6 ounces), cut into 1-inch pieces

- 1. Toss cucumbers and tomatoes with 1 teaspoon salt and let drain in colander for 15 minutes.
- 2. Whisk vinegar, garlic, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper in large bowl. whisking constantly, drizzle in oil. Add bell pepper, onion, radishes, parsley, and drained cucumbers and tomatoes and toss to coat. Let sit for at least 5 minutes or up to 20 minutes.
- 3. Add lettuce to bowl and toss gently to combine. Season with salt and pepper to taste, and serve.

We need to plan and be pro-active not reactive to the issues we face. We need more frequent community events that will bring our people together. The following are events that can be done for little cost to the band, with a great benefit to the community as a whole. For examples; summer camp for our kids, bring back family dances, cultural gatherings and teaching our heritage, bi-annual community yard sale, family oriented sporting events, etc.

We need more services that the community members can benefit from for their health and wellbeing but this means community member involvement to be successful. For examples; community transit service, community run gardens and community hunt must continue, community harvest for fruit/medicines/etc., community farms must be started that will produce livestock for immediate benefit to feed our struggling families, for example chicken, turkeys, pigs, cattle, local fish. We also need an investment into an energy project or heating systems that will reduce our operating cost and utilizes local resources. Wood pellet and stove manufacturing would be one industry to pursue. Another is a water bottling factory because we have this unlimited resource.

We have high unemployment here in Wikwemikong. The jobs need to be for our people first. If we do not have the personnel to do the job then hire someone until we have trained one of our own. Temporary jobs need to be just that, temporary, until one of our own band members is qualified to do that job permanently. We have a lot of educated people in our community. Let's start to maximize these human resources.

Together we can improve our community but only when we participate can we change for the betterment of all. Be the change you want to see. Voice your opinions, they matter.
