First families of refugees welcomed to **Manitoulin**

MANITOULIN—Three Eritrean refugee families being sponsored by Island communities arrived on Manitoulin on February 18. The Little Current refugee family of seven was collected from the Sudbury Airport by a welcoming committee and have spent their first days resting in their new home following a harrowing three-day journey into the unknown that saw them travel through several countries to reach the shores of Manitoulin.

Due to the large size of the one Little Current family, the government consented to fly them to Sudbury, rather than the committee having to arrange transport to the Island from Toronto. Other families, including a second family destined for Little Current, were met in Toronto by their sponsoring committee and have also arrived safe and sound on the Island.

A.J. Bus Lines supplied a 48passenger bus to bring the refugee family to their new home and the driver donated her time to the effort. A number of the Little Current family members stepped off the plane to a Canadian winter wearing only flip-flops on their feet and without winter clothing to protect them from the elements.

by Robin BurridgeMANITOULIN—Dr. Roy Jeffery made a presentation to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor board, proposing an assisted living facility adjacent to the Manor. The proposal was positively received by the board, leading to a motion asking for support from Island municipalities for the board to investigate the proposal and its

"In my practice I see a lot of geriatric patients that are trying to manage living in their homes,' began Dr. Jeffery. "They are often independent enough to live on their own, but staying in their homes without any assistance is challenging. I see that there is a

gap between living at home and living at the Manor. These individuals need some assistance, but not full time nursing care.'

'I am asking the board to consider parting with some of the Manor's property and donating it to a not-for-profit organization so that we can seek funding to build a 20-unit assisted living facility," continued Dr. Jeffery. "Individuals would be able to have their own place, but close enough to the Manor that they could contract services such as meals, some nursing and housekeeping."

Dr. Jeffery stressed that there was a need for this type of facility on Manitoulin, and that by build-



MANITOULIN—It's official, the Manitoulin branch of the Quality Deer Management Association has risen from the ashes and found a new vibrancy following a recent meeting to re-establish a chapter of the organization on the Island.

Peter Craig, the newly-minted president of the Manitoulin QDMA branch, explained that while Manitoulin had been in the forefront of the early QDMA movement, it had languished out of existence over the years.

A lot has changed both on and off the Island over the years, noted Mr. Craig, who agreed to step up to help guide the local branch. He said that he was very pleased with the number of people who have joined him in putting together the local branch and the energy and enthusiasm those volunteers have exhibited for the QDMA concept.

"I think people in general have

heard about it from television," he said, adding that changes in people's attitude and approach has been gradually growing over the last few years to create the right atmosphere to nourish the organization locally. "The top down approach doesn't work well," said Mr. Craig, noting that the QDMA concepts are more grassroots oriented and based.

Northeast Town to make controversial changes to municipal animal control bylaw

LITTLE CURRENT—The community services and public works committee reviewed changes to the Northeast Town animal control bylaw and made a motion to recommend the changes to council.

One of the major changes was defining a 'kennel' and limiting kennels to areas zoned for the purpose of boarding and breeding dogs and associated commercial activity and only on property of at least five acres

Under the changes, kennels are defined as "a building, structure or fenced area (or part of) where dogs are kept, raised, boarded and used for commercial purposes including but not limited to the keeping of rescue animals and operating doggie daycares."

Councillor Laurie Cook said she was concerned with the definition of kennels and didn't want to see animal rescue operations in the community shut down.

"Individuals who rescue animals are providing a valuable service and I don't feel it is something that we should discourage," said Councillor Cook.

Councillor Dawn Orr said she supports individuals trying to help animals but that an animal rescue or a doggie daycare would have the same affect on neighbours

affect on neighbours.

Councillor Cook said she also felt that the restrictions for kennels, that they must be on properties that are at least 10 acres, was too much.

"Ten acres is a lot, I'm sure five acres would be sufficient," said Councillor Cook.

Councillor Paul Skippen said that in rural areas five acres wasn't very

much, to which Councillor Orr agreed.

Another addition to the bylaw included a clause that if a dog kills live-

stock, the owner is responsible.

"The owners of any dog that is found to have killed livestock or poultry will be held responsible and shall reimburse the municipality for

any and all costs incurred," states the bylaw.

There were also provisions added for barking dogs such as, "No person shall allow a dog to unreasonably disturb the peace, quiet, comfort or repose of any person or neighbour in any dwelling unit for a period of 30 minutes by way of barking, crying or howling. Failure to do so con-

stitutes a breach of the bylaw."

If the changes and the additions to the bylaw are passed at the next Northeast Town council meeting on March 1, anyone who is having issues with a neighbour's barking dog can contact the Rainbow District Animal Control (the town's animal bylaw enforcement agency) and request a noise log. The individual will fill out their information, the date, time and duration of the noise, and submit it to the Rainbow Dis-

The changes, though not yet approved by council, have caused a stir in the community, with some residents concerned about what the changes will mean to pet foster homes in the Northeast Town.

Ont. could have legislation in place enabling doctor-assisted death this June, says Manitoulin physician

ONTARIO—Manitoulin Doctor Stephen Cooper said that he is anticipating that the province of Ontario will have legislation in place enabling doctor-assisted suicide by this June.

Dr. Cooper (who is the Manitoulin Health Centre Chief of Staff and Chair of Rural Practice for the Ontario Medical Association) explained that the Supreme Court ruled last year, recognizing the right of consenting adults who were enduring intolerable physical or mental suffering to end their lives with a doctor's help. He added that the court suspended its decision for a year to allow Parliament and provincial legislatures to respond and bring in corresponding legislation.

School, jobs important to successful refugee resettlement

It's official: as of late last week, Manitoulin is the new home to the first group of political and economic refugees since 1980 when the Island hosted a family of Vietnamese "boat people."

The families now here (with others expected to come soon) are originally from a tiny, war-torn country on the Horn of Africa: that part of northeast Africa that protrudes, horn like, into the Red Sea/Gulf

They have virtually no English and they arrived here, literally, with the clothes on their backs and, in the case of some, wearing only flip-flops on their feet as they walked across the frozen, snowy ground to refuge in the home provided for them.

The five refugees families that are already, or will soon be making their homes in Little Current, Gore Bay, Mindemoya and Manitowaning, have thrown themselves on the mercy of the people of Manitoulin Island, brought here by an earnest and well-intentioned local core refugee resettlement group made up of individuals from across the Island who, on learning there was an unusually high critical need for communities in western nations to become involved, came together with the vision of hosting families.

Until the refugees began to arrive last week, that is all the sponsoring group knew: they were preparing, in each of the Island communities previously named, to welcome families of seven, or three, or four or whatever had been assigned to them.

The Manitoulin Island resettlement group chose to work with the Mennonite Central Committee (MCC), which in turn, would liaise with the federal government and bear the responsibility for required paperwork and documentation

Manitoulin Island communities then, through the group of people who came together from all over Manitoulin in a helping spirit, are the hosts to families provided to them by MCC: a large, international organization well known for its good works.

The MCC has been dealing with refugee resettlement for many years and it is their policy, developed through experience, that for the first few weeks that refugees are setting into their new homes and

communities, local media like The Expositor are requested not to interview refugee groups or individuals until they have become settled and have become comfortable with their new surroundings. This newspaper is happy to comply with that reasonable request so don't expect to see much in the way of direct interaction with our new residents published in the paper for the next few weeks.

The young people in the families will make their way to our local schools, just as the children from the Vietnamese boat family did more than 35 years ago, where they will meet other children and begin to learn English.

Then there are the adults who we must also involve in the life of our communities as they, too, want to begin to master English and start the process of becoming productive members of our Canadian

They also want, eventually, to work. In fact, the first two enquiries made by the first family to arrive on Manitoulin last week, when they were met at the Sudbury airport by a group of Manitoulin Island wellwishers, dealt with the possibility of finding work for the adult men in the family and about school for the younger children, all of whom are girls.

Moving into a new country, a new climate, a new culture, and with a new language to learn will be difficult enough.

But for adults, eventually finding employment of any kind and for any duration will be key to how quickly they can begin to get on with their lives in Canada.

Please be thinking about this and if you have suggestions for jobs that could be accomplished, even on a part-time or occasional basis by people who are only now learning English, please pass them on as you think of them to a member of the refugee resettlement committee in your community. If you don't know anyone in this group, please email your interest to editor@manitoulin.ca and the paper will connect you to a local committee member.

Murchie Wright

Murchie Wright is a fine gentleman with a generous spirit and a kind heart. His current abode is Manitoulin Centennial Manor. He has a comfortable room there where he can enjoy his quiet time and exercise his computer skills. This retiree never gives up an opportunity to share a few stories with a friend. He has led a busy, colourful life that started on the east coast and eventually brought him to Manitoulin. He realized the treasure he had here and was compelled to put down roots and stay. Murchie loved to use his ingenuity to modify and fix almost anything. "He worked hard at everything he did," son Greg attests. "There is not a lazy bone in his body. Dad was always building things and gadgets for his kids, including gocars, boats, motors, dune buggies and swing sets.'

Murchie was born to Myrtle, nee Turner, and Hubert Wright in Arthurette, New Brunswick on January 10, 1931. "I was named after Murchie Roberts Turner, an uncle I never met. He was a civil engineer and he helped build the CPR railway between Andover Plaster Rock in New Brunswick. Part of an earlier CPR stretch ran close to my greatgrandfather's homestead. In the late 1800s, long before I was born, a wood-fired train rambled by his home and the sparks from the engine started his house on fire. I had never heard of a train starting a house on fire before. The family built another house closer to the road and further away from the tracks. When I was a little older, I loved putting dimes on the tracks to see how they looked after being flattened."

Murchie had an older brother, Marvin, and a younger brother, Harry. His little sister, Madeline, died at age 12 of mastoiditis, a leading cause of death in children before the discovery of antibiotics. Marvin became a contractor and worked on many jobs; younger brother Harry joined the Air Force and served in New Guinea and Europe as an electronics and electrics technician. He helped assemble the first Harvard trainers and single engine Beavers and Otters for his RCAF pilots.

"My parents lived in the northern part of New Brunswick, in Perth-Handover, near the border with the States. My dad was a fruit and vegetable inspector for the government. He travelled to many farms and checked for problems the farmers faced, including potato diseases, a serious issue for eastern Canada."

"I loved to lie in the grass and read. Sometimes I would look up in the air and wonder how far I could go up. My mind loved to wander. I think that helped me become comfortable being alone A perfect day was reading or daydreaming and seeing nothing bad." Hockey was never a favourite pastime in the winter. "We did give it a good try on the river from time to time. If you missed the puck, either a chunk of bark or a horse turd, it would take forever to retrieve it, either from a distant snow bank or a quarter mile down the river."

"I used to hunt for birds with the family's .22 rifle. My mother would ask me to fetch some partridges for supper and I would reliably bring back two big ones and a smaller one. They were so plentiful on our farm." Murchie also loved to fix anything he could find. "I fixed bicycles and other stuff so became a bit of a hoarder. collecting parts and items to fix. My mind was always inquisitive, wondering how I can best repair the item." He also liked to make toy revolvers out of wood.

One summer, the young lad had

a blind deer for a pet but when the days got shorter and colder, his dad had to put the fawn down because he knew it had no chance of surviving in the wild. "That was a tough day," Murchie confirms. "We had pigs too and I loved to feed them some of mum's apple cider that had gone bad. The pigs would get drunk, run about, squeal a lot, and fall down. It was great fun if nobody found

In the early 1940s, at 10, Murchie was deployed for the war effort. He was asked to count and identify airplanes flying over his house. "I had to call a central number and report any sightings. I got to know, quite well, the 10engine and four-engine bombers that came from the American air bases. My dog Buster liked to chase the planes when they came into sight.'

In his mid-teens, Murchie was diagnosed with tuberculosis. "I spent my 16th birthday in the local hospital. Marvin had come home with the disease and unwittingly infected me. In fact, Marvin had just recovered and left the hospital bed that I got into. We found out I had the same malady when I developed pleurisy. Pleurisv was common in people infected with tuberculosis. Murchie still shudders when he recalls the needle they used for the pleurisy. "It appeared to be three feet long."

At that time, it was believed only fresh air and sunshine could help with the healing of this disease. It was winter so the room was very cold. "We often woke in the morning with snow on our beds." The teen spent nine months in a ward with 16 people, most of them very elderly and slowly dying. He was the youngest one in there. "That was frightening experience, but I sur-

While Murchie was in the hospital, his high school burned down. "When I got home, a new high school had been built. He had to take a provincial exam after Grade 11. There was no Grade 12 at the time. "I was opti-



nearby orphanage in St. John's. Sandra had developmental issues related to a problematic forceps delivery. She was a sweet little girl and a baby sister to the Wright children. Before Murchie left New Brunswick, he found someone else he liked of the 'longhaired people we share the earth

Her name was Margaret and the two had met in school before. "She was five years younger, only 17, so we needed a letter from her parents to marry. I bought her a ring, she came to Toronto, and we were married on May 31, 1952. Our wedding photos were taken on Uncle Harold's and Aunt Gertrude's verandah. I think that was the only time I ever smiled for a photo. I find it really hard to

smile on demand." There was no time for a honeymoon, the groom

mistic that I would do well." Murchie had achieved honours in math but this provincial exam had been standardized and perhaps not correlated with all the local curricula. The test was so challenging that only one person in the class passed it. Nevertheless, Murchie, the only boy in his class, was still part of the first graduating class for the new school. He was scheduled to give the valedictorian speech. "I got up to speak but I choked up and couldn't find my voice, so I asked one of the other students to read it. She did quite well on my behalf.

The New Brunswick lad left school and worked with a land surveyor that summer. "I really enjoyed the concept of working with grades of land and finding distant level spots. It came easily to me while some of the engineers found it difficult to comprehend at first, but this was just a summer job not a career move."

"My aunt Hazel wanted me to be a teacher and she suggested I board with them while attending classes. They lived in Andover, near the States. I had different had to get back to his training.

The decision to apprentice in Toronto had been made quickly. This opportunity was not available to anyone over 21 years of age and Murchie was already 21. Uncle Harold and a friend of his helped by declaring him to be 19, to give him some breathing room.

Life in Toronto was exciting and there was always lots to do. By the time the couple had two children, they decided they had to find a bigger place. A house on the west end of Toronto fit the bill and they rented it for six years. "Eventually, we realized it was just too expensive to live in Toronto.'

"In 1957, I got a job at the General Motors' dealership in Little Current, ACME Motors, so we moved north. I could have gone to a Ford dealership in Parry Sound but we decided to try Manitoulin. I remember stopping at Whitefish Falls by the big hill there. Margaret looked around and started to cry, upset at the rough road and the abundance of trees with little else to show. We thought briefly about going back to Toronto but decided to forge ahead. Once we settled in Little Current, which seemed like New York City after all those trees in the Whitefish area, we quite liked our surroundings. I stayed with Acme Motors for 25 years."

Baseball became a favourite sport in the early years on Manitoulin. A few of those early baseball trips to Killarney were on Justin Anglin's work boat. Fastball in Little Current was a popular sport, attracting several teams, including Ellis Cleaners and the Legion. Murchie helped out with Little League baseball and softball in the 1960s. He and Charlie McCulloch coordinated and built the first ballfield at Low Island with volunteers and donations. The CPR helped by loaning some of their heavy equipment.

Mitchell and Kevin were born on Manitoulin and the Wrights became a family of six. The family made a terrible discovery when Margaret was just 37-years-old. She had developed malignant melanoma and it was in a later stage which made it challenging to cure. Murchie spent a lot of time driving to Toronto to see Margaret, often accompanied by his mother-in-law and his sisterin-law, Glenna.

He witnessed the CN Tower being put in place in Toronto while driving on the Queen Elizabeth Way. It was a momentous occasion and it gave him something else to focus on for a few minutes. "For Margaret, they tried all kinds of new experimental meds, including a form of chemotherapy, but nothing worked in the end." Sadly, Margaret died at age 42. It was very hard on Murchie and the children. In time Murchie found a new partner. "I really liked my mother-in-law so I wound up marrying her other daughter, Glenna," he adds, smiling. "She already had six kids of her own, so we became a blended family of

After Acme Motors, Murchie got work with the Canadian Pacific Railroad. He wanted to apply for a teaching job, training mechanics at the high school in West Bay, but he needed Grade 12. Instead, he decided to become the shop foreman for the repair shop for CPR and he wore his white cap proudly. "We fixed what they broke for 10 years." Murchie became a highly valued employee because he and his team got very good at repairing all the machinerv.

The CPR shipped iron ore pellets from INCO to Chicago and Detroit via the CPR coal dock in Little Current. They used selfloaders to fill the holds of the big ships. After they pulled out their operations in Little Current, there was a plan to build a recreational area over the industrial land at Goat Island, across the channel from downtown Little Current. They planned a ski hill and a swimming pool but that didn't happen, likely due to the costs involved. They did clean out most of the coal and later the iron ore."

Murchie partnered with Ross Blum and operated M & R Shell at the top of the hill, where the Hilltop Shell station is now located. This business burned in the late 1970s and Murchie returned to Acme Motors for a spell until a back injury made this work impossible.

Hockey was also a favourite diversion. Murchie worked to bring Jr. Hockey to Little Current and the Island in the late 1960s. The Manitoulin Islanders survived for three or four seasons. He was a key volunteer for the Little Current Minor Hockey League for many years. "We picked up the kids after school and headed to Elliot Lake, Blind

There will also be a reading course taking place at 4E starting on March 5.

"Join artist/academic Sophie Edwards in a collegial, intellectually engaging exploration of walking via a range of texts from geographical and literary to cultural and political,' states the course description. "Participants will

"At the time they (Tribal Police) couldn't afford one officer for that specific job," Trudeau Sgt. explained, adding that this role in the force fell by the wayside for a number of vears in exchange for regular policework.

A sergeant supervisor since 2010, the officer officially started his new job on Monday and will be tak-

ing the full complement of courses at the Ontario Police College in Aylmer to get up-to-speed on all his new duties, including media detail.

"It's going to be a real change, but something different, and I'm really looking forward to it," he told The Expositor. "It's a role for accessibility and visibility in the community," he added, noting that it will be broad—from animal control to school bus safety and everything in between.

Sgt. Trudeau said he plans to get involved in community programs this summer—a chance to get to know the youth of Wikwemikong. He also hopes

to change the mentality of the people when it comes to dealing with police.

'Sometimes I'll be in a lineup in a grocery store and parents with a young child will point to me and say 'you behave or else!',' the officer said. "I want to change the thinking that 'we (police officers) are people to run from,' to 'we are people to run to'.

Sgt. Trudeau said he's also looking forward to collaborating with agencies such as Kina Gbezhgomi, mental health services and vouth services, "I'm also looking forward to working with my fellow community services officers across the Island," he added.

ing it adjacent to the Manor, it could be beneficial to both. "I have seen this type of arrangement work in similar places and the Local Health Integration Network is very supportive of this and Justin Trudeau's new infrastructure funding could be utilized if we have a shovel ready project when the funding becomes available," Dr. Jeffery told the board.

Dr. Jeffery also noted that the Manor is built on less than a third of the available land owned by the Manor.

In a report distributed to the board, Dr. Jeffery stated that approximately 33 percent of the Island's population is at or near the age of retirement and that the population forecast for Manitoulin Island is that this segment of the population will grow to 44 percent by 2020 and 48 percent by 2035, more than doubling its current size.

'In terms of sewer and water services, the municipality has indicated that both water and sewer capacity will be available to accommodate additional residential development at the site," added Dr. Jeffery. "Accordingly, there appears to be no major barriers from a planning and servicing standpoint should the Manor wish to allow us to proceed with the development of the proposed concept plan.

Pat McDonald, representing Central Manitoulin council on the board, said that her council has been looking at developing an assisted living facility in their municipality, so they would most likely be in support of the concept.

"I agree, it would be a good thing for all of Manitoulin," added Manor board chair and Assiginack Mayor Paul Mof-

"There is no point squabbling where it is on Manitoulin, it is something we need here on Manitoulin," added Mr. Moffat, noting that the project seemed like a good idea.

"The time is right and I know my council will support this," said board member and Northeast Town Councillor Dawn Orr.

The board carried a motion, moved by Ms. Orr and seconded by Ms. McDonald, which stated that: "The Manitoulin Centennial Manor Board submits the following motion to its member municipalities for consideration and support: Whereas a proposal has been submitted to the board by Dr. Jeffery for the establishment of a not-for-profit multi-unit seniors assisted living facility; and whereas the proposed assisted living facility/ and whereas the proposed assisted living facility would require the board to relinquish a portion of its land to the not-for-profit board; and whereas the proposal is contingent upon funding being available, as well as determination of the financial benefits if any to the Manor; therefore the Manor board seeks the concurrence of its member municipalities to investigate the proposal and determine its compatibility with and benefit to the Manor including compliance with

their councils for consideration, they also requested that the board have copies of two past assisted living feasibility studies that had been done in recent years for board members to review.

...First families of refugees welcomed to Manitoulin

Bundled up in afghan blankets the family members were whisked onto the bus in which the temperature had been hiked on their behalf by the driver. The Ethiopian refugee camp in which the families have been living, some for as much as 15 years, enjoy an arid average temperature of 85 degrees yearround (that's 30 degrees in Canada's Celsius measure-

"I wrapped my coat around the shoulders of the mother, she was so tiny it went around her three times," said Little Current spokesperson Linda Ersk-

described the family members as "delightful" and "so sweet" and although the committee enjoys the services of a local woman who speaks Kuman, a language understood by the younger members of the family, the mother is even more isolated as she only speaks Tigrinya, the main language of Eritrea.

Still, the male members of the family have been out and about in the community already where they have been receiving a hearty welcome.

"It was so wonderful to see people stopping in the street to welcome them to the community," said Ms. Erskine. She noted that even though Island residents greeting the refugees did not share a common language, the expressions

and tone of those people who stopped to shake their hands and say "welcome to Canada" was unmistak-

On their first morning in Canada, the Little Current family awoke to a breakfast prepared by the volunteers who are staying with them through the first few days in shifts. Regeat Asmeash of Little Current performed a traditional Eritrean coffee ceremony, using the traditional equipment, raw coffee beans, spices and frankincense. The wherewithal to hold the ceremony was contained in a gift box assembled by Little Current resident Dale Shain with the assistance of her daughter, and the mother of her Eritrean partner in Toronto.

The heady scent of frankincense drifted up from the small square of charcoal that Ms. Asmeash had lit and set on the stand for that purpose. Miraculously, the burning incense did not set off the fire alarms in the house and the comfortable sense of ease settling over the volunteers and the family highlighted the whole purpose of the ceremony.

Guests watched as the coffee beans are roasted by hand in a small cast iron frying pan, before being ground to the right consistency in a mortar and pestle. "I usually use an electric grinder," admitted Ms. Asmeash.

The coffee ceremony is a leisurely affair, harkening

to a time when families would sit and discuss the doings of their days, how things are going with their school work and at work and the pace is unrushed. A platter of popcorn is taken around the room by one of the young refugee children, in fact, the children each leapt to help clean up and put away the dishes following meals and to serve the popcorn and flatbread unbidden.

The first question posed by one of the older male refugee family members as we awaited the coffee speaks volumes. "Is there work?" The second question posed by a younger family member was "when do we get to go to school?" The third question asked regarded whether there was any football (that would be soccer to most Canadians).

Interviews and photographs of the refugee families will be a while in forthcoming. Aside from the considerable language barriers that remain to be overcome, the Mennonite Central Committee media guidelines preclude such until the refugees are settled and comfortable and recognize they are under no obligation to surrender their privacy.

"Remember, that while media attention is helpful for promoting sponsorship and humanitarian aid," read the guidelines. "it should not ever interfere with the establishment and maintenance of a safe and welcoming environment for newcomers.'


A key element in the policy is to understand the underlying power dynamics at play in the sponsor/newcomer relation-Those dynamics complicate requests for interviews and photos, "as the sponsoring group, earnest questions carry much more weight than one might anticipate.'

"Newcomers often feel as though they must follow the requests of their sponsoring groups-even though they most newcomers are uncomfortable being filmed or having their story broadcast. continue the policy guidelines. It is important to remember that even when giving newcomers an option to say no, many will feel obliged to say yes anyway."

To this end also, committee members are urged not to share contact information (address, email or phone number for example) of any of the recent arrivals.

The guidelines also caution committee members about the use of social media and posting details on such sites as media outlets have access to those sites and may show up uninvited.

Committee members are encouraged to share their own experiences as a sponsoring group, however Those stories, notes the policy, "will satisfy the need for a local connection to an international story."

Regional Body) and the Great Lakes Compact Council (Compact Council) the session was a required step in the diversion review process as mandated by the Compact. On stage listening to over three hours of comment were representatives of the eight Great Lakes states and the provinces of Quebec and Ontario, with Jennifer Keyes, manager of the Water Resources Section of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, representing Ontario.

"The process has been interesting and informative," Ms. Keyes said. "Yesterday we were given a tour of Waukesha, and the region, and we were able to ask questions and have frank discussions. We are learning a lot."

"This is fascinating to watch," said Peter Annin, author of Great Lakes Water Wars. "The process outlined in the Compact seems to be working well. We are seeing history being made."

After years of study, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources determined that Waukesha's request to divert 10.1 million gallons a day was justified and met the conditions specified by the Compact. The state then forwarded the request to the Regional Body and the Compact Council, initiating the review.

"We are heading home Friday," Ms. Keyes said, "with lots of information to consider. On April 21 the Regional Body votes on the Waukesha proposal and we send our Declaration of Finding to the Compact Council." Ontario and Quebec are voting members of the Regional Body. The finding, while influential, is only advisory.

The Council, composed of the eight Great Lakes governors, will make a final determination in May. All eight governors must vote in favour or the diversion request cannot proceed.

Supporters of the diversion proposal commented that using Great Lakes water was the only real option for Waukesha, citing public health issues caused by radium and other contaminants in the city's well water.

"The Waukesha water diversion request before you addresses a serious public health threat in a way that does not threaten Great Lakes water levels or water quality and that does not deplete our deep or shallow groundwater aquifers," said Steve Baas, senior vice president for public policy with the Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce. "The request strengthens our regional economy"

A spokesperson for U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), who is in a tough re-election campaign, urged the Great Lakes states to approve the city's request. Others speaking in favour were primarily Waukesha's elected officials and city employees.

Dozens of speakers said the Waukesha proposal does not meet the Compact's requirements and should be rejected.

Milwaukee mayor Tom Barrett said that Milwaukee had long wanted to work with Waukesha as it would benefit both cities, but could not do so because Waukesha was asking for water to supply an expanded service area in violation of the Compact. He questioned the move on the part of Waukesha to buy water from Oak Creek, farther away.

Racine Mayor John Dickert objected, saying that Waukesha's return flow would be discharged into the Root River, which winds through Racine. Racine, he said, has worked hard to clean up its harbour and beaches. "We do not want what Waukesha wants to send us. We don't want pharmaceuticals, phosphates, microbeads, any of that. We don't want to be Waukesha's toilet." Mayor Dickert also said that approving the Waukesha diversion request would "crack the compact. You crack this egg and you are looking at some serious legal battles."

State Representative Cory Mason (D-Racine) said, "the DNR got it wrong. Waukesha is asking for almost double the amount of water it currently uses. This is not a water improvement plan but an urban sprawl plan."

Former Wisconsin DNR Water Section Chief Todd Ames, one of the architects of the Compact, said that the only justification for a diversion is to provide potable drinking water to existing customers, which is not what Waukesha proposes.

Karen Hobbs, deputy policy director for the Natural Resources Defense Council, said Waukesha is not doing enough to conserve water, as required by the Compact.

Waukesha's conservation goal of reducing demand by 1 million gallons a day by 2050 "represents roughly one-quarter of one percent in additional annual water savings each year," she said. The city's conservation effort "is too reliant on voluntary and educational measures. There are no mandatory measures; there are no robust conservation plans."

Other organizations contributing comments in opposition to the Waukesha diversion included the National Wildlife Federation, The American Civil Liberties Union, Clean Wisconsin, Milwaukee Riverkeeper and Midwest Environmental Advocates.

The volume of comments on this historic first test of the Compact has been enormous. But more are still welcome at waukeshadiversion.org. The deadline for comments is March 14. Eventually, all comments will be posted on the website.

the residents of both communities regarding the Island Specific Claim" and both the First Nation's and the municipality's "wish to strengthen and build on the partnership of the people based on historical and familial ties," according to the preamble of the MOU.

To that effect, the purpose of the MOU is to: improve cooperation and communication between the parties; build partnership relationships; engage in discussions on a bi-annual basis to address concerns of the claim and any other items of mutual interest; investigate collaboration research, public education and funding opportunities to promote the history of the Killarney and islands area and investigate the potential for joint initiatives that will benefit both parties. The MOU was signed on behalf of Wik-Ogimaa (chief) wemikong Peltier and Killarney Mayor Ginny Rook. Following a roundtable of introductions between the two groups, Chief Peltier welcomed the Killarney contingent to the Wikwemikong territory and described his community for the Killarney contingent.

Chief Peltier pointed out that Wikwemikong has 8,052 members, some 3,500 of whom live in the communities on the reserve, making the First Nation one of the largest in the province. Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve (a name used less and less these days, but still the official title of the reserve) also contains the largest land base of any First Nation in Canada. "With the lands being returned to us, our land base is only going to grow," he said.

"I think this is wonderful. I am thrilled," said Mayor Rook before the ceremony. Mayor Rook and all but one of her council members were at the ceremony. "We have a wonderful opportunity here to work together to the benefit of both of our communities. I think we are setting a really great precedent." Mayor Rook went on to note that "everybody I have met here has been welcoming and friendly." The mayor joked that she is looking forward to a tour of the community with the chief "on a warmer day."

Following the opening remarks, the two leaders exchanged gifts to their communities and councillors. In addition to the usual flags, pins and mugs that are ubiquitous gifts at such ceremonies between communities, Mayor Rook was presented with a handmade quilt bearing the symbolic figures of a star and an eagle. Chief Peltier also presented each visitor with a book outlining the many plants to be found within the Wikwemikong territories.

The attendees were treated to a fish dinner complete with a mixed berry dessert before members of the Wikwemikong staff and council and local agencies, such as the Wikwemikong Heritage Organization and the Wikwemikong Development Commission, presented an executive summary of the work and projects the band has, and is, undertaking.

their own approach to management."

"One of the biggest misconceptions is that QDMA is all about trophy management, it is not," he said emphatically. "It's the farthest thing from it."

A lot of people have different approaches to managing deer herds on their property, pointed out Mr. Craig. "Some people try to shoot nothing under six points, a two-and-a-half-year-old. There is no set definition of exactly how you go about it."

But there are proven best practices and the QDMA provides information and education on what has been proven to work to improve deer herds.

"Who am I to tell some guy how to go about improving his property?" queried Mr. Craig. But the information is there for those who wish to access it and the QDMA works towards assisting those who want to know how best to improve the herds on their land, from the planting of food plots to grooming stands of trees in the best way to help strengthen the herd. "It's all about an exchange of ideas."

The QDMA also has youth programs, like the rack pack for 18 and under and 3D archery shoots.

The QDMA holds a big banquet fundraiser each year, it is a standard part of helping to finance the work that they do.

...continued from page 3 additional four months to produce a new law.

"Though it was extended four months, anyone can make a submission to the court for an exemption to end their lives," said Dr. Cooper. "So doctor-assisted death is now possible."

He said that the biggest thing when the legislation is passed is that patients will have to meet certain criteria.

"You can't have just ended a relationship and want to end your life," said Dr. Cooper. "It will likely be that you will have to be a competent individual with a diagnosis of something terminal in nature who is experiencing undue suffering."

Dr. Cooper also anticipates that physicians will take on a specialized role with doctor-assisted death.

"Most likely you will talk about doctor-assisted death with your doctor, who will refer you to a specialist," said Dr. Cooper.

As for the process itself, he said it will likely be that the patient is given an IV of a sedative, followed by a high dose of a narcotic—an overdose.

"The big issue is the moral issue," Dr. Cooper

noted. "The process is fairly simple, but the issue is who will decide (who qualifies) is more complicated."

As for the future of doctor-assisted death on Manitoulin, Dr. Cooper said that MHC has had some primary discussions.

"We have talked about it conceptually, but not in detail yet as we are still waiting for details from the province," said Manitoulin Health Centre CEO Derek Graham. "Right now nothing has changed as there are no formal mechanisms in place. We won't be making any changes until clear legislation is in place and ethical guidelines are developed. At that point we will likely look at it through several committees and develop a process."

River or Spanish. Often we wouldn't get them home to the West End of the Island until three in the morning." Occasionally, AJ Bus lines would donate a bus. At the time, Murchie's family claimed he spent too many hours at the rink.

Others must noticed his hard work. About 1970, Murchie was honoured as Citizen of the Year in Little Current. He became a member of the Little Current Recreation Commission, a volunteer support committee for the town, eventually becoming their chairman. Murchie is proud that he was part of the group working with the late mayor Allan Little and his council to get artificial ice in the old arena. That arena sat where Valu Mart is now. Before the artificial ice, Murchie kept his players in shape with basketball in the off season. "It was a bit of a challenge teaching them this game. The artificial ice made the conditioning task easier."


Murchie had a bout of heart disease in his 50s and had to leave work after the bi-pass surgery. "The shock of the surgery seemed to affect my memory and made my supervisory work for the CPR more difficult. I got a disability pension from them and I retired."

The children all did well. Gregory got his degree in Biology and Environmental Sciences from Waterloo and worked for the town as manager of community services. Mary Lynn, his wife and a nurse, spent many years working at the Manitoulin Health Centre. Prior to her retirement, she was director of nursing care for the Island's two hospitals. Terry drives a loader for Pioneer Construction in Sudbury. Murchie is also a proud great-grandfather again. Mitchell worked at the Dennison Mine and the Ontario Hydro Nuclear Plant at Pickering. His wife Shelley works in home care. Kevin has his own business fixing roofs. He lives in Kagawong.

"I have macular degeneration now from a baseball thrown by a left-handed pitcher many years ago. I misjudged where the ball was going and got it right in the eye. I thought it would curve away from me, but I was wrong." Murchie also has Charles Bonnet Syndrome, a common condition for people who have lost their sight. It causes him to see things that aren't really there, known as visual hallucinations. The brain sees two images of everything and tries to align them.

His older brother Marvin later moved to the States, the place of his birth, but he never really got over the tuberculosis. He found a wife. He bought a van and got portable X-raying equipment and got a job helping others with the disease in the States and in Mexico.

"My favourite television show is the Big Bang Theory. When I was younger, I found the canned laughter was irri-

tating, especially when I was trying to fix stuff. I couldn't focus, so I always asked my kids to turn it off. Now I get a kick out of watching the reruns," he comments, smiling. "I can't read anymore and even reading my calendar is hard. The squares are so small. I can see the numbers but the writing is almost impossible when you see double," the elder shares.

"Looking back, there isn't anything I still want to do that I haven't done already," he insists. "I love all the seasons; each has something unique and wonderful to share. I could fix bicycles or snowmobiles so I was busy all year. My strengths have always been diagnosing and fixing cars. In my later years, comput-

ers took over and did much of the diagnosing. I taught myself how to use a computer and took pride in being able to do the work and keep the number of mistakes low using new technology."

"I am not afraid of much now," Murchie adds with certainty, "except calling my grandchildren by the wrong name. I am proud of my children and grandchildren and my greatgrandchildren. The only regret I have is swinging at that curved pitch that damaged my eye."

"I have never been sorry that I came here. It kind of reminded me of my early years in New Brunswick, living at home, on our old farm. I have always enjoyed being in a small town. My kids did most of

their growing up here. I got my first real job here so Manitoulin has always been important to me. It was also much more affordable living on the Island than trying to make a go of it in Toronto. Manitoulin is a special place for me and that is why I am still here today, living in the Manor."



When the gossip grapevine is really going strong you can learn a lot of interesting things (and then of course you read the local paper to make sure they have the information right!) I was part of a recipe grapevine when Maria came home with a wonderful hearty recipe. She got it from her friend Kate, Maria made it and changed it a bit of course (and it was awesomely good) then I got it and I did a little changing of the ingredients and voila, try this one on your family and friends. The putting together was all done the night before by Maria and all I had to do was add a couple of ingredients and turn it on (thanks Maria and Kate). I must confess—we tried this and could not stop eating.

Tomato, Spinach, Tortellini

You can make this recipe vegetarian or add chicken for diced tomatoes but you can use plain diced tomatoes adding dried oregano and basil for extra flavour. The best part of this recipe is the time factor—short and sweet. You will need a large slow cooker. The first time Maria made it she put it in the smaller slow cooker, left for work, came home to find half of it on the counter top.

2 cans 28 fl oz diced Italian tomatoes

1 medium onion, diced

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 1/2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms

2 chicken breasts cut into cubes or slices (optional)

1 small package of fresh or frozen tortellini

1 small package of frozen chopped spinach

18oz package cream cheese cut into small cubes 1 1/2 cups vegetable or chicken broth—you may need

Sea salt and fresh ground pepper to taste Dried oregano and basil for extra taste

You will need a large slow cooker. Add everything to the slow cooker except the tortellini. Place the slow cooker in the fridge overnight. The next day remove from the fridge and add the tortellini. Set the timer on the slow cooker on high for 5 hours or low for 8 hours. Towards the end add salt and pepper to taste and more liquid if needed.

Best management practices can reduce the risk of barn fires

Barn fires can cause a devastating loss of livestock and assets for owners in addition to emotional and economic hardships for families, businesses and communities There are best practices to follow to reduce the risk of barn fires: have qualified professional complete assessments of all farm buildings; have all electrical equipment inspected yearly by a licenced electrical including contractor, wiring, mechanical and heating systems; when heat lamps are required, protect the immediate area with non-combustible sheathing and keep the area around the heat lamp clear of clutter or bedding materials that could catch fire and only use heat lamps with the CSA or ULC label; establish good housekeeping practices eliminate clutter inside and outside the buildings to reduce the risk of fire spreading; be sure to check exposed electrical



...continued from page 15 equipment for corroded parts and repair all damaged fixtures or equipment as soon as possible; avoid storing dangerous fuels and chemicals such as gasoline, cleaning fluids or solvents inside barns; ensure that all applicable regulations are followed when constructing or renovating farm buildings; make sure all equipment and motors are in good working condition, and free from dust and debris; always keep a fire extinguisher on hand; and

make sure a reliable source of water is available and easily accessible by fire departments. Ontario encourages owners of farm buildings to follow these best management practices when working with livestock in farm buildings. Planning ahead to reduce risks and prevent accidents will help protect employees, family members and animals.






