Coding in the classroom Part II of a series

Scott Leblanc's Grade 3 teacher, Doreen Duncanson, set his career as a computer programmer in motion

EDITOR'S NOTE: Coding in the classroom has leapt to the forefront of global discussions of curriculum for the 21st century as schools in the United Kingdom have incorporated the language behind computers into classroom instruction through all grades. This second segment of a multi-part series explores what is happening in the United Kingdom, while the second segment will relate an early local success story on coding in the class-room and the final part will focus on current coding inclusions in Ontario, the Rainbow District School Board and Island schools.

by Michael Erskine MANITOULIN—Personal computers have been appearing in homes since the late 1970s (earlier examples of what were termed 'microcomputers' were mainly sold in kit form to a tiny esoteric group of uber-nerd hobbyists from the back of magazines like Popular Mechanics), but it wasn't until well into the 1980s that the first wave of home computers really began to establish a beachhead in homes.

Interaction with these new-fangled inventions remained largely hit-or-miss even, up into the 1990s, and for many young students the

This personal computer was considered state-of-the-art in its heyday. Its luminescent green phosphor text-only screen would seem outrageously archaic to today's graphical interface generation, but helped played a crucial role in launching the modern technological age and nurtured a nascent love of logic in Mr. Leblanc's early school years.



Fish and Game Clubs of Manitoulin encourage future generations of anglers

GORE BAY—The United Fish and Game Clubs of Manitoulin (UFGCM), with support from the Gore Bay Fish and Game Club (GBFGC), Little Current Fish and Game Club (LCFGC) and generous funders are continuing to grow angler education and Manitoulin's fishers through two new projects—the addition of the Gore Bay Fish Hatchery and a microhatchery at C.C. McLean's Public School. "We had to rebuild the old Gore Bay Fish Hatchery

a few years ago," said Jim Sloss, a member of the GBFGC and chair of the UFGCM. "The old pump house is a very small building (the current hatchery) and doesn't have a lot of room. We saw that the Doug Smith Family Foundation was looking for projects and put in an application to expand the hatchery. Our application was accepted and we have received \$30,000 to build a room onto the north side of the

"It will provide an area for the public—summer

residents, community members and students to come in for a tour and see what we do," added Mr. Sloss. "We can't start building until we plant our current crop (of fish) in April. After that, we will be able to start construction. Thanks to the solid funding and support from the Doug Smith Family Foundation we will be able to bring school groups in and grow our educational program, as well as create an interesting attraction for visitors to the community.

Earlier this month, the UFGCM also started a micro-hatchery at C.C. McLean.

Mr. Sloss said he worked with Richard Elliott Jr. of the Lake Huron Fishing Club (LHFC) which has established similar micro-hatcheries at numerous schools along the Bruce Peninsula.

Mr. Elliott not only helped the UFGCM with the logistics of the micro-hatchery, but also found funding for the project through Bruce Power. Other fun-

Eastern Woodland colouring book features Island artist Duncan Pheasant

Manitoulin Expositor sponsors colouring contest

MANITOULIN—The work of Little Current artist Duncan Pheasant is seeing a steady growth in popularity, following the Eastern Woodland style and set at a price range that lies within reach of most, and that popularity is only likely to grow further now that Toro Publishing has produced a colouring book, 'Woodland Animals of Manitoulin Island,' based on his work.

'I have been selling art to Pat (Hess, who operates Concept Air in Kagawong) on and off for a while now," said Mr. Pheasant.
"We were bouncing ideas around

for a book when we came up with the idea of a colouring book."

Mr. Hess and his partner Rachel Ball formed Toro Publishing and Ms. Ball, being an accomplished trained graphic artist, processed the collection of 25 images the trio chose for the project. "She took the colour out of the paintings and designed the book itself," noted Mr. Pheasant. "I chose artworks that I had already completed (and in some cases already sold, those images appear courtesy of their current owners). It took Rachel about two months to pull the

The book is much more than

simply a colouring book, however, and many people had a hand in its content. The colouring book features animals that are native to Manitoulin Island and includes both their English and Anishinaabemowin names.

"I had a lot of help from Alan Corbiere and Lorraine Debassige in M'Chigeeng," said Mr. Pheasant. "They helped with the proper names in Ojibwe for the animals."

Part of the project was easy, but some of the work involved a fair bit of effort, noted Mr. Hess. "Stripping out the colour was the easy part, but the images needed

Hydro One to manually read 36,000 rural meters

TORONTO—Numerous media reports over the past week have revealed that Hydro One, the Crown agency responsible for delivering electricity to Ontario homes and businesses, is throwing in the towel on 36,000 of its smart meters in rural areas across the province and will be sending in personnel to manually read those meters, just like in the "old days."

An interesting question that immediately came to mind in The Expositor office was: are any of those meters on Manitoulin? The answer from Hydro One is: "we don't know."

"Smart meters measure when and how much electricity customers use, and transmit this information through a secure network to the Independent Electricity System Operator who then transfers the data to utilities for billing," explained Tiziana Baccega Rosa, senior media relations advisor with Hydro One. "In some parts of Hydro One's service territory and for some customers, the communications network is not strong enough to consistently transmit the information.'

Ms. Baccega Rosa went on to note that, "Hydro One has reviewed individual meter reading and communication reliability and has requested to move certain customers to manual meter reads where necessary. Hydro One received approval from the Ontario Energy Board for this request in March 2015.

The utility began notifying customers who will now have their meters read manually in December 2015, she went on to explain, confirming that "approximately 36,000 customers will now have their meters read manually."

But due to the fact that the 36,000 customers who will have their meters manually read are spread across the province, where the utility has approximately 1.2 million subscribers, breaking down where each of those cus-

tomers are regionally has not been done. "They are really very dispersed," said Ms. Baccega Rosa. She went on to confirm that the manual reading was to commence "immediately." Customers whose meters are being read manually were informed that this would be happening back in December.

The cost for smart meter installation and use is \$.79 per month and applies to all Hydro One customers, supplied Ms. Baccega Rosa. "The charge was approved by the Ontario Energy Board through to October 2018 as part of Hydro One's distribution rate filing. There will be no change in fees for these customers as they will now need to have their meters manually read." So there will be a very small savings for those customers.

Stéfanie Power, media relations officer with Measurement Canada, explained that the electricity meters used by Hydro One must "be approved for use in Canada by Measurement Canada as meeting the requirements of the Electricity and Gas Inspection Act; have their accuracy verified as being in compliance with the requirements of the Electricity and Gas Inspection Act before being placed into service; and have their accuracy verified based on a mandatory inspection frequency.

But she went on to add that, "only the measurement aspects of smart meters are approved and verified by Measurement Canada, but Measurement Canada investigates complaints of suspected inaccurate measurement involving financial transactions based on measurement, including those related to residential electricity meters.

"If a homeowner suspects their electricity meter may not be measuring accurately," writes Ms. Power, "they should first contact their utility's customer service department and ask them to

Green energy research plays to Canada's strengths

It's all well and good that Iran, with its conservative religious leadership and avowed hatred of Israel, has agreed to lose interest in developing nuclear weapons and has been rewarded by the world's nations by having sanctions, that had been levied against it, now dropped.

These sanctions were aimed at the one commodity Iran has to offer the world: crude oil

The world, in particular the middle east, is now doubtless safer for the fact that Iran is not officially contemplating nuclear weapons.

But the dropping of the sanctions against the purchase of that nation's oil means that the already beleaguered Canadian oil sector will continue to be hit hard.

The oil that Canada produces from the Alberta oil sands and from those provinces where oil and natural gas are extracted by means of fracking (shale oil extraction) will continue to be negatively impacted as Iran gears up to sell its lower cost raw petroleum products on the world market, joining neighbouring Saudi Arabia whose raw oil at recent budget prices has already directly impacted the Canadian products whose extraction costs, and hence selling prices, are much higher than their middle eastern competitors based on the lower wellhead production costs in the middle east.

Our dollar has, daily, less purchasing power because of the continuing decline in this particular resources sector so the world's new open door policy with respect to Iranian oil is not good news for the Canadian economy, in particular that of Alberta and other oil producing regions of our country.

Saudi Arabia, by lowering the international prices of its raw crude oil, has brought this situation about singlehandedly. Iran's product, which will of necessity be priced competitively, will just add to our domestic problems.

It is tempting to conjecture that Saudi Arabia is dumping its oil with an eye on the day when the world has moved to a less carbondependant economy and is intending to "make hay while the sun shines" before their product falls completely out of favour and is replaced by renewable energy sources as the nearly 200 nations participating at the November climate change conference in Paris agreed

Whatever is going on, Canada's higher-priced crude oil products will be out of favour for the foreseeable future and thus this sector of our economy will be dislocated in the long term.

The world will, however, continue to run on energy whether it's green or "dirty" and it makes sense for Canada to read the tea leaves and work now to become a world leader in not only the development of but, more importantly, the manufacture and export of green energy technology and systems.

The new federal government cabinet is meeting just now in New Brunswick in preparation for its first budget.

Government revenues have fallen, and continue to fall, in response to Canada's idle oil production industry and the lack of customers for our pricier products.

Pipeline proponents will argue that improved transportation of the raw petroleum product, whether east- or south-bound, will go a long way towards encouraging greater domestic consumption of Canada's oil reserves.

That will doubtless be a topic for discussion at this pre-budget cabinet retreat.

But, in the long run, is investment in expensive-to-transport for an expensive-to-extract resource a good idea?

Will it not be a better bet for Canada to partner with the bright minds at work across this country busy developing all manner of alternative energy resources?

Canada has the benefit of a four-seasons climate model and we are also an Arctic nation.

Expertise on green energy, suitable for every region and every season, will not only be in demand internationally but can help to change our economy to one, at least somewhat, based on this expertise and related manufacturing and export opportunities

Hopefully, those people currently controlling the levers of power will use this influence to bet on the future, and new jobs, and not so much on the past where jobs, as we are seeing, come and go very much at the whim of other nations whose eggs are pretty much exclusively placed in an oily basket.

First Nation farm start-up aid offered by Indian Agricultural Program of Ontario

ONTARIO—The Indian Agricultural Program of Ontario (IAPO) is seeking First Nations individuals who are interested in starting their own farming business and are currently accepting applications for its Beginning Farmers Program.

IAPO is a non-profit Ontario corporation owned by the Status Indian Farmers in Ontario that seeks to empower First Nation communities through financial and training support for farmers.

"The Beginning Farmers Program is designed as a four-year program," Mark Leahy, business advisor with IAPO, explained to The Expositor. "It helps set up new farmers aged 16-35 who are interested in farming livestock, crops, honey, maple syrup, aquaculture or mixed farming."

Ms. Leahy said that there are two elements to the program: financing and training.

"With financing, we can provide a 30 percent grant up to \$15,000 for \$45,000 projects," said Mr. Leahy. "The individual is also required to contribute five percent of their own equity into the project. The remainder of the funding is a loan through LAPO."

"The training is over four years," continued Mr. Leahy. "The idea is to support the participants for the first four years of their farming business to encourage success.

This includes two workshops a year on topics such as business management, training and record keeping. Individuals are also provided a mentor with experience in a similar type of farming."

An essay in support of nuclear power options for Ontario

Nuclear power must play a significant role in future energy planning

To the Expositor:

Shane Desjardins ends his thought provoking letter in the January 6 edition of The Expositor with a significant question that needs to be answered—why do we never seem to hear much about the only really viable and realistic source of future energy? A source that is carbon-free (attention climate change fear mongers!) abundant, relatively cheap and safe. Yes, I am talking about nuclear energy.

All we seem to hear from the "green movement" (eg. Green Peace and their many offshoots) is that we must rid ourselves of all fossil fuel sources of energy, and we must do it yesterday! Renewable energy, they say, is the only way to go regardless of cost. Oh yes, and they are quick to point out that the cost of not going renewable makes the actual cost of renewable pale in comparison. That's just another scare mongering tactic—a "red herring" really. Well, let's consider in a calm intelligent manner, what the energy alternatives are and what the real financial costs are. Looking at some costing research I will just point out some key conclusions. (If you wish to see the details check out 'Let's Run the Numbers: Nuclear Energy vs. Wind and Solar,' by Mike Conley and Tim Maloney, April 17, 2015). There are four significant conclusions at this point in their research,

(Note: these figures are based on US data but can be validly and proportionally applied to Canada.)

- 1. The cost to generate the total US base load electric power, using a 50/50 mix of wind and solar would be \$29 trillion and require an area of land equivalent of the state of Indiana.
- 2. The cost to generate that power using concentrated solar power, would be \$18 trillion and require a land area equivalent to West Virginia.
- 3. The cost using AP-1000 Light Water Reactors, would be less than \$3 trillion and require a few square miles of land
- 4. The cost to supply that energy using the latest generation of nuclear reactors known as Molten Salt Reactors would be about \$1 trillion and require about the same land area as the Light Water Reactors. This type of reactor requires no water cooling, can not melt down and they are able to use existing stockpiles of nuclear waste as a sec-

ondary fue

These numbers, though difficult to comprehend, are realistic. The only large scale, carbon free energy sources available to us with the present state of technology, are nuclear and renewables (hydro isn't in the same league on a nation wide basis). The lowest cost way to a carbon free future (if, in fact we need to have that) is nuclear, so why do we not hear more about this alternative? Why is such an obvious choice not in the public eye the way renewables are being forced upon us? Fear seems to be the most likely reason. and this fear arises out of ignorance and propagated by alarmist type stories in the media such as the recent article in the January 5 Toronto Star entitled 'Is Toronto ready for radiation?' with its statement "Lessons can be learned from nuclear tragedies in other parts of the world..."—a rather inflammatory statement. Fear mongering tactics on the part of environmentalists discourage a serious consideration of nuclear energy. A more reasonable, intelligent approach to the issue of nuclear energy lies in understanding and quantifying the true risks involved and then framing our response accordingly, thus making our decisions based on knowledge rather than

Life is a risky business–everything we do has some degree of risk. There is risk in travelling, there is risk in staying at home (some 25 percent of all fatal accidents occur in the home); there is risk in eating and risk in not eating; there is risk in working and even more risk in not working!! There is risk in exercising and risk in not exercising. You get the idea–risk is an unavoidable part of our lives. So just what is the degree of risk involved with nuclear energy? To begin with, in over 16,000 cumulative reactor-years of commercial nuclear power operation in 33 countries, there has only been three significant reactor accidents. That in whole history of civil nuclear power use!

1. Three Mile Island (USA 1979) in which the reactor was severely damaged but radiation was contained and there were no adverse health or environmental consequences. The worst dose of radiation received by people closest to the plant, was equal to about half the dose of one chest x-

2. Chernobyl (Ukraine 1986) in which 31 people were

killed and there were significant health and environmental consequences. There was good reason for the failure of that reactor. Comparing the safety of that reactor to today's reactor technology would be like to comparing the safety features of a 1950s automobile with a 2015 model.

3. Fukushima (Japan 2011) in which the effects of loss of cooling due to a major Tsunami (nothing to do with the reactor itself) were adequately contained. This was a triple melt-down and caused no fatalities or serious radiation doses to anyone.

Of all nuclear accidents and incidents, only Chernobyl and Fukushima resulted in radiation doses to the public that were greater than those from exposure to natural sources eg. having a medical x-ray, lying in the sun, radon gas etc.). Apart from Chernobyl, no nuclear workers or members of the public have ever died as a result of exposure to radiation from a nuclear incident. In fact, more people have died from installing rooftop solar panels than have ever died from the construction or use of US nuclear power plants! This is not to say that we should not take reasonable steps to minimize our risks. To give some degree of risk perspective lets look at a brief sample of common risks. These are quantified on the basis of Loss of Life Expectancy i.e the average amount by which one's life might be shortened due to that particular risk:

Living in poverty: 3,500 days (9.6 years and the leading cause of premature death in the world); being a male (vs female), 2,800 days (7.7 years); smoking, 2,100 days (5.8 years); cancer, 980 days (2.7 years); being 15 pounds overweight, 450 days (1.2 years); alcohol consumption, 230 days; driving a small car, 60 days; coffee (2 cups/day), 26 days; firearms, 11 days; air line travel, one day; living near a nuclear reactor, 0.4 days [equivalent to a 1 in 5 million chance of death per year.]

In summary then, looking at nuclear energy from each of financial, life-threatening and climate change points of view, nuclear energy must become a very significant part of our future energy planning. As the saying goes, "it's a no-brainer!"

Although we would never turn the clock back to those relatively primitive days, the notice of Lorne's passing brought back some wonderful reminiscences. Rest in peace, Lorne.

Manitoulin Island has many such well travelled roads & road allowances. Some are used by cars and trucks to access real estate and waterways for fishing. Others are well travelled routes/trails used by snowmobilers, four-wheelers, hikers and mountain bikers and bring joy to locals and visitors alike. We fully support Billings in their endeavor to protect public access to this

road that has been used by many for decades.

Our Island has seen a great increase in cycle tourism in the past few years. Manitoulin Island features over 800km of road cycling and over 45km of off road cycling as found on MICA's "Manitoulin Island and La Cloche Mountains Cycling Routes and Road Map."

Allowing restricted access and selling road allowances will make it increasingly difficult to offer abundant options to islanders and our cycling visitors. Our visitors choose to stay here on average 6.5 days because Manitoulin has so many routes to offer. MICA strongly supports any and all efforts to protect road allowances, given roads and trails and keep them accessible to the public.

To make Manitoulin an active living destination, we would like to encourage all Municipalities to pass resolutions that express the protection of public road allowances, access to water, well travelled trails, given roads and such (e.g., Baker Trail, Mud Creek Rd, Mac's Bay Rd, Carter Bay Rd, Simcoe Point Rd, Harron Trail, Fraser Rd, Arda Rd, to name just some).

Manitoulin OPP Festive RIDE results

Festive Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) roadside checkpoints conducted by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have become a familiar part of the holiday season and an effective coun-

termeasure to the road safety issue of impaired driving. Impaired driving remains the leading cause of criminal death in Canada.

One drink can reduce your ability to concentrate and slow your reaction time. The more alcohol in your blood, the more your ability to operate a motor vehicle is affected. Drivers who blow over the legal limit of .08 or who refuse a breath test will have their driver's licences suspended immediately for 90 days under Ontario's Administrative Drivers Licence Suspension Program. This 90-day suspension is separate and distinct from any criminal charges. Immediate roadside suspensions of driver's licences are issued by the OPP to drivers who register a blood alcohol concentration in the "Warn Range" of .05 to .08. Offenders will not be allowed to drive from that point on for a minimum of three days.

The Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP conducted the annual Festive RIDE campaign from Monday, November 23, 2015 to Saturday, January 2, 2016. During the 2015 campaign, 2,264 vehicle drivers were checked by police. Of those drivers checked, two were found to be impaired by the consumption of alcohol and charged accordingly. One driver was issued a roadside "Warn Range" suspension. Three vehicle occupants were charged under provisions of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

While the OPP does increase the number of RIDE stops over the holidays, RIDE checks continue throughout the year. The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving.

OPP traffic stop catches impaired driver

At 9 pm on Thursday, January 14, a member of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) conducted a traffic stop on Highway 6 at the Sheguiandah First Nation. The driver was arrested after he failed the approved screening device test for alcohol on the roadside.

As a result of this investigation, a 40-year-old male of Sagamok Anishnawbek First Nation has been charged with impaired driving and exceeding the legal limit of alcohol in his blood, contrary to section 253(1) (a) & 253(1) (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada, and care or control of a motor vehicle with liquor readily available, contrary to section 32(1) of the Liquor License Act of Ontario.

The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Wikwemikong on February 17, 2016.

The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving. Anyone who suspects a driver is driving while impaired is urged to call police by dialing 9-1-1 immediately.

OPP and OFSC launch Provincial Snowmobile Safety Week

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs (OFSC) are launching Provincial Snowmobile Safety Week (January 16 to 24) with a message for snowmobilers to focus on their own personal safety and the well-being of others.

Central Manitoulin Council Notes

Groundwater reports accepted

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor on a recommendation from the Water/Waste and Education Committee that council accept the 2015 Annual Groundwater Monitoring Reports for the Mindemoya, Spring Bay and Providence Bay landfill sites submitted by Amec Foster Wheeler Environment & Infrastructure.

"It was nice to get the report on the Spring Bay groundwater," said Councillor Stephens. "We will now be able to move ahead with those sites because there is no leachate going into the water—we will be able to close that up."

Financial reports accepted

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Patricia MacDonald that the recommendation from the Water/Waste and Education Committee that council accept the year-to-date financial report ending December 2015 be approved as pre-

First reading on Mindemoya Drain passed

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor that council accept the recommendation from the Water/Waste and Education Committee and pass bylaw 2016-06, being a bylaw for the final cost levy for the Mindemoya Drain.

"Ås you know, we didn't proceed with a 1-2-3 reading as staff were preparing a report that answered a number of questions posed at the public meeting," noted Councillor Stephens. "By giving it only its first reading, that report will be able to go to the public."

"I think there was some confusion on the provincial funding (due to the work being carried out alongside another project)," said Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "There was no drain funding in that provincial funding, no direct link to that funding.

Mayor Richard Stephens noted that there were

Riding within the law and making smart choices is the only way to ensure an enjoyable ride that gets you home safely to your family at the end of the day.

With the campaign underway, the OPP and OFSC are reminding snowmobile enthusiasts to stay off the lakes and waterways for the time-being as conditions are generally poor in many parts of the province.

Stay on OFSC Prescribed Trails and don't ride impaired, speed or ride after dark.

Last winter, the OPP investigated 15 snowmobile-related fatalities, a decrease from the previous two winters (21 in the 2013-14 season and 18 in the 2012-13 season). While the OPP and OFSC are relieved to see fewer lives lost, data clearly indicates that riding impaired, speeding and riding after dark continue to be major contributing factors in snowmobiling incidents: 58 percent of snowmobile-related fatalities involved alcohol or drugs; 57 percent involved speeding or riding too fast for conditions; and 58 percent occurred at dusk or after dark.

In particular, the OPP and OFSC are looking to middleaged males to ride with extra care and control this winter as 87 percent of last season's snowmobile-related fatalities involved male riders and 58 percent were riders or passengers between the ages of 35 and

The campaign is also a great opportunity to caution all snowmobilers about avoiding

road running wherever possible. Where snowmobiling on the side of a public road is legal and necessary to access trails, you should always: adjust your speed to the conditions; watch out for parked vehicles and motor vehicles emerging from driveways; always give motor vehicles the right of way; be extra cautious when approaching intersections; observe and respect all traffic signs; and slow down wherever snow banks obstruct your view.

The motoring public is also being reminded to watch for snowmobiles along roads or those that cross roads at snow-

The OPP is committed to saving lives on Ontario's highways, trails and waterways through the reduction of preventable injury and death. Initiatives are developed and delivered through the Provincial Traffic Safety Program.

The OFSC is committed to proactive leadership in promoting safe, responsible riding, on and off Ontario snowmobile trails, by building safer snowmobiling knowledge, attitudes and behaviours through rider education, safety legislation development and enforcement.

to be smoothed out and simplified a bit to work in the colouring book."

In addition to the black and white images, an image of the artwork with its original colours are included in the book for reference for the aspiring colourists along with the importance of the animals' roles in Ojibwe culture.

Mr. Pheasant has been creating art since high school. "But I really got serious about it around the year 2000," he said, noting that he prices his art to make it accessible for people in the community.

"I was trying to help him expand his market," said Mr. Hess. He became convinced that there was a market for Mr. Pheasant's work in Sudbury and began posting in online marketing sites.

It was a CBC program about the top 10 books in Canada that sparked the idea of creating a colouring book. "Four of those books were colouring books," he said. "There was one artist in Alberta that had sold 2,000 books in just 14 days." Colouring books, it seems, have become all the rage.

Mr. Hess pitched the idea to Mr. Pheasant and received a very positive response. "He was totally for it," recalled Mr. Hess. The publisher's original idea had been to publish a book of stories created by Mr. Pheasant. "He is an awesome storyteller," he said, but the colouring book really captured the imagination. "It really took off from there."

Took off is right, the book sold out of its first run of 250 copies and is now available in Coles bookstore outlets

"We got everything set up in Ms. (Heather) Jefkins Grades 4/5 class," said Mr. Sloss, "and the students seem excited.

micro-hatchery includes a 75-gallon tank with the complementary equipment including a heavy table to hold the tank and a new chiller.

Members of the UFGCM provided the class with instructions for raising the Chinook fingerling salmon, but are also on call to help the class.

Due to the timing of the project, this year the students are raising the fish from a fingerling stage, but next year they will be start-

ing with eggs.
"We are very happy we were able to make this micro-hatchery possible," said Mr. Sloss. "We also have surplus funding and hope to extend this program to other schools on the Island in the future."

"With the micro-hatchery in our classroom, students have a daily reminder about the importance of safety for both themselves and our fish," said Mr. Jefkins. "They carefully monitor the fish, and when one of the small Chinook had a 'raw mark' near its fin, they reported this to me immediately. We were able to contact Jim Sloss for advice and reassurance about why and how this could have occurred. They are very vigilant about the water temperature and reminding me when water testing needs to be done and when feedings

need to be done. In addition, they are very vigilant about washing their hands because of concerns about allergies within our classroom. All the students know that the safety factor needs to be recognized for both our students and fish populations.'

Ms. Jefkins said that the students take turns daily feeding the fish every two hours and that she comes in to feed them on the weekend, with the help of other teacher volunteers who fill in if she is away.

She said that the hatchery fits in very well with the Grade 4 curriculum focused on habitats and communities.

"We are hoping to work with the volunteers from the Gore Bay Fish Hatchery to learn more about the stresses put on natural fish populations in local lakes

as well as what we can do to help alleviate some of those stressors," Ms. Jefkins said. "In addition, we are excited to be part of the Chinook salmon stocking program. As a teacher, I think this is an excellent educational opportunity for my students. I am very grateful that Jim Sloss phoned me last spring to see whether I was interested in hosting this program in my classroom. This has been a great experience and we've really only had the fish for two-

weeks.

If they are not satisfied with the actions taken by their utility, homeowners may contact their nearest Measurement Canada office and ask to have their meter tested. While Measurement Canada does not charge for this service, the utility may charge for the removal from service of meters for testing."

Whatever the findings of Measurement Canada the agency "only reports on the findings of its investigation," noted Ms. Power. "It is up to the parties of the transaction to determine what subsequent actions are to be taken."

Tom Imrie of Kagawong, who has been a vocal critic of Hydro One, had a very negative experience in dealing with Hydro One when a smart meter was installed at his cottage, replacing the older meter that had served him for years. Mr. Imrie said that he wound up being hit with a massive energy bill when the utility claimed that his old meter had inaccurately read his energy usage, according to the information being sent by the new smart meter.

"I didn't notice anyone reading the meter when they removed the old one with what looked like a giant set of tongs," he said, having observed the entire process of the replacement of his old meter with the new smart meter. But later, that old meter was to cause him significant grief.

"They hit me with a bill for \$600," he recalled. That charge was based on a reading from the old meter that had been removed from his cottage, but when he complained and was sent an image of the old meter, something didn't look right. "I had stained my cottage brown with a spray gun and there was overspray on the meter," he said. The meter in the photograph he was sent did not have any such brown overspray on it, he told The Expositor.

Mr. Imrie wound up paying the bill, and continues to have issues with Hydro One's billing even up to the current day. He recalled the chair of Hydro One taking part in a teleconference two years ago where the issue with smart meters came up.

Mr. Imrie is not among those customers who were informed that their meters would now be manually read.

There was really very little in the way of information that came back to the communities," said Ms. McGregor. Essentially, the researchers would come, study, collect their data and leave behind a vacuum of information for community members.

MARRC was formed in 2001 to provide guidelines for researchers collecting data from First Nations communities. "Initially, when we were designing the guidelines, it took a year or so of discussions," she recalled. "But those guidelines didn't address biological sampling."

The current MARRC guidelines have largely been successful, and the relationships between researchers and the communities have improved greatly since their inception, noted Ms. McGregor.

But the time has come to address the issues surrounding biological sampling.

"There are many samples (such as hair, blood or skin samples) that are taken for medical purposes," noted Ms. McGregor. "Basically what we are interested in here are biological samples taken for research purposes." While there are ethical and privacy guidelines that govern medical samples fairly well, when it comes to guidelines for samples taken for research purposes, there is really very little in

"This came to our attention when we were approached by a research group seeking guidance for their project," said Ms. McGregor. "We realized that the guidelines did not address biological sampling.'

A literature search conducted by MAR-RC soon made it clear that the issue of guidelines for biological sampling isn't just a local issue. "There really isn't any-

With the growth of research projects that seek to target medications to specific groupings through DNA and other biological specifics of populations and individuals, that is a line of research that is likely

On the privacy front, there are concerns that impact First Nations communities. "Because our communities are so small, there are concerns that would not be an issue for larger communities," she noted, giving a hypothetical example involving Whitefish River First Nation (WRFN). "Say you are conducting a study of cervical cancer among women between 45 and 55 that found 50 percent of the women had cervical cancer," she said. "In WRFN there might be 15 women in that cohort. That is the kind of things that we look at."

The consultation is seeking input beyond issues of privacy and disclosure however. "We need to address the cultural and spiritual aspects as well," noted Ms. McGregor, citing the example of groups for whom hair is sacred. "What is done with the samples after the research is completed," she asked.

In order to gain a broad range of inputs, MARRC has invited local community leadership, chiefs and representatives of councils, health leaders including health directors, as well as elders groups and interested community members.

"We are hoping for a good dialogue," said Ms. McGregor.

"A recent review and analysis of the delivery of group education sessions on Manitoulin Island and its surrounding areas over the last five years found that Gore Bay had the lowest senior population concentration, the lowest senior driver attendance and the accompanying costs to deliver the program in Gore Bay was three times higher than in Espanola and

Gore Bay last year. "The new group education session delivery structure for Manitoulin Island and its surrounding areas allows the ministry to deliver its mandatory program to more seniors by providing one group education session in Mindemoya and two group education sessions in Espanola each month," continued Minister Del Duca. "This provides senior drivers greater flexibility in scheduling their appointments due to an overall increase The Expositor spoke to Gore Bay Mayor Ron Lane about the GES now being

offered in Little Current who said that he hopes the MTO is still considering bringing back the Gore Bay sessions.

"I've written two letters to the MTO about the program's (GES) need in Gore Bay," said Mayor Lane, "and Mike Mantha has been working on it on our behalf as well, but I haven't heard anything back in a while.'

"The program starting up in Little Current is news to me," Mayor Lane continued. "I have no issue with it being in Little Current, but we still need it in Gore Bay. This program is for seniors who are 80 plus. They would be able to stay in their own community for the program, not have to travel to Mindemoya, Little Current or Espanola. I will be contacting the MTO again to see what is going on."

interest (and the means as microcomputers were still prohibitively expensive for

most families).

Former Mindemoya resident Scott Leblanc, who at 42 now lives in Creemore, Ontario and works as a programmer in JAVA and JSP for the popular online shopping website shop.ca, was lucky enough to experience a near perfect storm of exposure to computers, both at home and school thanks to his father and Duncanson, a Doreen teacher at Central Mani-Public School toulin (CMPS).

"It actually all started with a PET (Commodore PET) computer my dad (Larry Leblanc) would bring home some weekends from Pontiac School in Wikwemikong," recalled Mr. Leblanc, his father Larry Leblanc was working in Wikwemikong at the time. "I used to mess around with that."

The ante was upped a little while later when on a family trip to Grand Rapids, Michigan to visit a former teaching colleague of his father's they discovered that the local college was "throwing out a bunch of PETs, so we took one back with us across the bor-

The family still has that original PET, noted Mr. Leblanc, and his 10-monthold son got a chance to check it out when Mr. Leblanc and his family came home to the Island for

Then Mr. Leblanc's interest got a strong boost when Ms. Duncanson started up an extra-curricular class for interested students. Scott, then in Grade 3, iumped at the opportunity to hone his nascent skills.

"It wasn't a large group," he recalled, "maybe four or five students.'

"I was the teacher at the school who took the computer courses," recalled Ms. Duncanson. Computers were still in their very earliest stages at that time. "You had to write your own programs," she said, "and we did exactly that."

Although she became quite proficient with programming in those early forms of programming languages, Ms. Duncanson said she is now quite happy to let others create the programs she uses. "I learned a lot about computers and although I use my iPad to read a lot these days and I understand what underneath it all, I am 72 now and I am happy to have a niece living on the Island who helps me to set things up when I need it," she laughed.

Ms. Duncanson recalled her school receiving older Commodore PET computers from Manitoulin Secondary School when that school upgraded to newer models. "They were not new by any means," she

One of the key challenges for students interested in computers in those days was that few families had computers at home. "Not many kids had computers at home," she noted. "Most of those who did were teachers' children, or the children of professionals."

That dearth of computers tended to limit the number of youth, and parents, who understood the tsunami of technological change that was approaching the Island's shores.

"Most of the students were the children of farm families and computers were far outside their everyday lives," she noted. have certainly Times changed, however, as today farmers are among the most computer-savvy businesspeople around and computers and software technology has revolutionized their production. "Just look at Alex Anstice (a Tehkummah dairy farmer whose online Twitter posts invite the public into the day-to-day lives of farmers)," pointed out Ms. Duncanson.

But at the start of it all, there were "maybe 10 kids" who really got excited about programming and computers. "Most kids just weren't aware of it," she said.

To put it in perspective, the early PET computers used a phosphor green screen whose graphics were largely limited to constructs made up of dots, Xs, Os, dashes and slashes.

Strangely enough, most children today are just as oblivious to the roots of the programs that they use everyday on their smartphones, tablets and personal computers.

But the early interest sparked by Ms. Duncanson's after school group and the availability of having a computer at home gave Scott Leblanc an edge as he moved up the scholastic ladder. His earlier experience in programming gave him step up in later courses of study.

"I studied BASIC in high school, and PASCAL, as actual high school courses," he recalled. "At the time I was also studying it on my own." In time he programmed a first aid application.

Programming today involves many tools, he noted. "It is all still essentially using a text editor code.

Mr. Leblanc said he agreed with the idea of teaching kids about the coding process in schools would likely be a positive thing, even if students didn't go on to programming careers, per se.

As to programming itself, he notes that at its core it remains very much the same as it was those many years ago. "It is logic," he said. "I approach it the same way."

Today, although the Rainbow District School Board, and other Ontario boards, do not incorporate coding to the extent it is incorporated being throughout the United Kingdom's education sys-

beating his dog in his apartment."

"The tenants were concerned that if something wasn't done quickly the male was going to kill the dog," the press release continues. "The police officers in attendance were aware that a previous complaint about this same type of behaviour was received on November 30, 2015 and had been referred to the OSPCA for investigation, but it appeared that the abuse was still continuing despite a visit from an animal protection officer."

Police arrested the male for animal cruelty and seized the dog "to prevent the continuation of the offence and to protect the animal from further abuse." states the release. "As a result of the incident, a 28year-old Espanola resident was charged with one count of causing unnecessary suffering to an animal, contrary to section 445.1(1) (a) of the Criminal Code, and one count of breach of probation contrary to section 733.1(1) of the Criminal Code. He is to appear in Espanola Court on March 15, 2016 to answer to his charges."

The press release goes on to explain that due to the inability of the police to continue to care for the animal at the police service building and the inability to find another government agency who would take custody of the 13-month-old (Alsatian) shepherd, it was returned to the owner pending the outcome of his court case and possible prohibition against owning ani-

"My partner Bleu (Fisher) saw the story about the dog on Facebook," Sam Miller explained to The Expositor. "The resident's name was mentioned and we recognized him as someone who used to live on Manitoulin. We understood from the story that the dog had been returned to the owner after he was charged pending the outcome of his court case, and that he had refused other attempts to adopt the dog."

"We sent him a Facebook message, keeping our personal feelings about the situa-

tion to ourselves, encouraging him to do the right thing and surrender the dog," continued Ms. Miller. "He eventually agreed to surrender the dog to us for \$40 and we were able to pick him up."

Ms. Miller explained that she and Ms. Fisher were pleased to welcome the dog into their home on a temporary basis, but already having five foster dogs, kept the shepherd on an interim bases until they were able to arrange for a more permanent foster home.

"We were so happy that the Espanola resident surrendered Chester and that we were able to find him an amazing foster home," shared Ms. Miller. "He is a big, hyper and happy guy. The night we brought him home was really emotional for us and for him."

"We were overwhelmed with comments (on Facebook) about us adopting him," continued Mr. Miller. "We just want to clarify that that was never our intention. It was just to get Chester out of his current home and into a loving home that would properly care for him, which we have been able to do. He will have a much better life now."

Chester's foster family is with Pet Save Sudbury who posted on Facebook that he is looking for his 'forever home.'

"Everyone meet Chester," states the post. "He is full of energy and is approximately one-year-old. He has had a rough life of abuse but thankfully he found his way to Pet Save. His ideal home would be an active family. He is great with people and dogs. His now owner would have to agree to obedience as this poor guy has been taught too much."

The couple is currently working on starting their own rescue organization and noted that while the media attention for Chester has been great, there are lots of other incidents of dogs being helped by individuals and organizations across Northern Ontario.

...continued from page 6 economies provided to the drain project due to the concurrent work being done, but that there was no provincial funding for the drain. "The cost of the total project was \$2.5 million, but \$1.44 million was being funded," he noted. "But there is more funding that needs to be reconciled."

"Is there an anticipated delay in this project?" asked Councillor Dale Scott.

"They're ready to go at the third reading," replied Mayor Stephens, noting that there would not likely be any delay in the project due to the delayed readings of the bylaw. "There is no reason to rush it through."

Library budget accepted

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Ted Taylor and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens that council accept a recommendation from Water/Waste and Education Committee to accept the library board minutes of November 2015.

Providence Bay kitchen construction moves forward

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor that council accept a recommendation from the Property Committee that, subject to the oversight of construction and layout by the maintenance municipal supervisor, the Providence

Bay Community Centre Board is approved to move ahead with the kitchen renovation project.

The original motion was "subject to the approval of the layout," but was changed to include oversight of the construction as

Councillor Stephens asked what the total cost of the kitchen renovation project will be, to which Councillor MacDonald replied "\$29,000." She noted that costs were being kept down significantly by extensive use of volunteers. "The Providence Bay community has always been great at giving tremendous support," she said, going on to cite the example of the Community Centre Project.

"Do we have a policy on volunteers?" asked Councillor Stephens. "Do they have to be licenced?"

"They have to undergo a little bit of training—for safety," supplied CAO Ruth Frawley, adding that plumbing and electrical trade work were not part of the volunteer component.

"We are lucky to have a number of tradespeople (willing to put in their efforts to the project)," not-Mayor Richard Stephens.

Revised RFP for new fire hall

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Ted Taylor and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens that council accept a recommendation from the Proper-Committee that the revised Request for Proposal (RFP) for the Mindemoya Fire Hall Design and engineering plans be distributed to the specified design and engineering firms.

CAO Ruth Frawley supplied that there were four different firms being approached for the RFP, one of which is from the Island and one based in Espanola.

Mayor Richard Stephens inquired of the CAO "as to where we stand as to the property?"

Ms. Frawley noted that she had signed her half of the deeds required and that another signatory had also signed, but that one party was not available. It is anticipated that the final signature would be forthcoming soon.

Fire Hall committee streamlined

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Patricia MacDonald and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor that council accept a recommendation from the Property Committee that the sub-committee of the Property Committee. entitled The Committee for the Design and Construction of the Mindemoya Fire Hall, be dissolved and its members be designated as special advisors for the Mindemoya Fire Hall proj-

"The idea is to avoid the duplication of having to re-do it at the subcommittee and committee level before bringing it to counexplained Mayor Richard Stephens.

Councillor Derek Stephens noted that the original concept was that the committee would be made up largely of staff members who would conduct meetings during regu-

lar business hours. Councillor MacDonald said that she believed that issue was addressed during discussions, noting that a component of the RFP deals with if the successful bidder chooses to meet outside of regular committee meetings time.

"It was just to avoid duplication," reiterated reiterated Mayor Stephens. "We needed to streamline it."

"So it will be the whole committee, the staff and special advisors," noted Councillor Dale Scott.

Multi-year accessibility plan approved

Council passed a motion moved by Councillor Patricia MacDonald and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor that council accept a recommendation from the Property Committee to accept the Multi-year Accessibility Plan, 2016 Update.

"2025 is the deadline," said Mayor Richard

Councillor MacDonald said that she believed that the municipality has made some progress, with all of the municipal buildings now sporting signs in braille. "We are way ahead with it," she said, but adding "some issues are more difficult to deal with."

"Expensive," interjected CAO Frawley.

"It would be nice if some level of government would find accessibility important enough to fund it," said Councillor MacDonald.

Northeast Town makes changes to proposed 2016 budget

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council reviewed the 2016 proposed municipal budget, reducing the budgeted donations to \$18,100.

Councillor Bill Koehler suggested to council that they reduce the overall proposed municipal budget by \$13,000 by paying for the \$6,000 doctor recruitment out of the donations budgeted line item instead of it being its own line item; donate \$2,500 to Manitoulin Streams instead of \$5,000 and that it also be taken from the donations line item; and to not donate \$2,000 to the Great Lakes Cruising Coalition.

"The donation line item would stay at \$13,500 with \$8,500 of that committed (to doctor recruitment and Manitoulin Streams)," explained Councillor Koehler. "The remaining \$5,000 would still permit 25 donations at our average

donation rate of \$200. This still leaves the \$10,000 from McLeans Mountain LLP available and the Lions Club donation line item at \$4,000 and the Manitoulin Secondary School bursary line item of \$600.

Council agreed with Councillor Koehler's suggestions and advised staff to make the changes to the proposed budget.

Council also made a recommendation for staff to renew the municipality's landfill agreement with Aundeck Omni Kaning for another year (as of March).

The two changes resulted in the proposed increase to the levy dropping from six percent to 5.1 percent.

The NEMI Taxpayers' Association also made a deputation to council with suggestions to reduce the

budget.
"The proposed increase on the levy is distressing to began NEMI taxpayers," Association Taxpayers

spokesperson Ilsa Gieselmann.

The Taxpayers' Association suggested that council look at reducing the donations line item(s).

It also suggested council reduce the leachate management line item to zero from 2016 as money collected from taxpayers from 2013-2015 has not been fully

The association also suggested that council budget less for the landfill loan, as the municipality budgeted for \$72,045 in 2014 and 2015 even though the actual amount by December 29, 2014 was only \$36,022.64.

"Our last concern is this idea of 'global budgeting' whereby we rob Peter to pay Paul," added association spokesperson Irene Callaghan. "If we look at the treasurer's reconciliations from the audits, we can clearly see surpluses in the years when more scrutiny was given to the actual line budget items. A more controlled form of budgeting whereby each line item should be as close as possible to the amount proposed in the budget may give a better result than deficits. Taking care of every dollar matters to the taxpayer. They are entrusting their funds to you, our council, to spend prudently and efficiently.'

Following the deputation, Mayor Al MacNevin asked CAO Dave Williamson to address the Taxpayers'

Association's suggestions.

"Thank you for all your hard work and suggestions," began Mr. began Williamson. "It is clear that you have put a lot of work into your concerns and suggestions.'

Mr. Williamson addressed the suggestion of eliminating the leachaid management line item for this year. He explained that they money will be used this year towards a plan for the continuation of the landfill.

He noted that the budget



It was one of those days, that the sweet tooth was kicking in with full force and I succumbed. So as not to feel too guilty about the sugar fix, I decided to use whole grain flours like oat flour and almond flour, and natural sweeteners like maple syrup, honey or Medjool dates. It really does make a difference in how you feel when you indulge with healthier fixes.

I baked two recipes at the same time because my philosophy is "do it while the mood strikes!" One recipe is chocolate and the other one was to use up some over ripened fruit.

Fudgy Mocha Pudding Cake

I didn't have any Loon Song oat flour so I just took Loon Song oats and pulverized them in the food processor. I didn't get them as fine as the flour but the pudding had a nutty texture at the end. Follow the recipe because it works. The cake should look underdone when it comes out of the oven—the sides of the cake will be bubbly with chocolate sauce and the top of the cake will be firm in some places and gooey in others. The cake is a "melt in your mouth chocolate explosion!"

- 1 Tbsp ground flaxseed
- 1 1/2 cups oat flour
- 3/4 cup plus 1/3 cup coconut sugar
- 1/3 cup plus 2 Tbsp cocoa powder
- 1/3 cup chocolate chips
- or chopped chocolate
- 3/4 tsp fine-grain sea salt 1 1/2 tsp baking powder 3/4 cup almond milk or

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly grease or line with parchment paper an 8inch square glass baking dish.
- 2. In a small bowl, whisk the flaxseed and 3 Tbsp water together. Set aside
- 3. In a large bowl, mix together the oat flour, 3/4 cup of the sugar, 1/3 cup of the cocoa powder, and the chocolate chips, salt and baking powder.

- 4. In a small bowl, whisk together the flaxseed mixture, almond milk, oil, and vanilla.
- 5. Pour the milk mixture over the flour mixture and stir until thoroughly combined.
- 6. Pour the batter into the prepared baking dish and smooth out the top evenly with a spoon.
- 7. In a small bowl combine the remaining 1/3 cup sugar with the 2 Tbsp cocoa powder. Sprinkle the mixture evenly over the batter in the baking dish.
- 8. Slowly pour the hot coffee over the batter, ensuring that the coffee completely covers the mixture. The cake will look like a disaster, but this is normal.
- 9. Bake for 27 to 33 minutes, uncovered, until the cake is semi-firm on top but bubbly and gooey around the edges.
- 10. Let the cake cool for 5 to 10 minutes before digging in. You can serve the cake with ice cream or vogurt.

Apple Crumble

The recipe just calls for apples, but I had a small bag fresh cranberries that were getting mushy, couple of pears with brown spots and about one heaping cup of frozen mango that had seen better days. I added it all in with the 5 soft apples.

cover is reportedly slightly deeper than that of eastern Manitoulin. The east end groomer was to begin work on Monday of this week, but was in need of significant repair so snowmobilers on this part of the Island can expect to get riding by the end of the week.

According to Snowdusters spokesperson Brad Middleton, there is at least one foot of snow in the bush of Western Manitoulin

The Gore Bay to Kagawong trail was groomed first with the West End groomer spending Friday and Saturday travelling to Meldrum Bay and back.

The trail from Gore Bay to Providence Bay and Mindemoya was expected to be complete by yesterday (Tuesday).

"It will take a big part of the week (likely beginning Friday) to make the first pass through all of the trails on eastern Manitoulin," Mr. Middleton said.

The Snowdusters did have a few words of warning for snowmobilers:

"To begin with, we often get complaints by sledders after the first initial groom/pass each season, saying that the trail is still rough with a few rocks and stumps crunching underneath the sled," Mr. Middleton said. "That is only natural. We are grooming at a time of year when the snow is the least deep. As more snow falls throughout the winter, those imperfections quickly disappear with each subsequent pass the groomer makes over the trail. In no time at all, it turns out like a highway."

"Also," he continued, "the first pass

"Also," he continued, "the first pass each season is made not so much to smooth out the trail but more to freeze the base. Once the base is frozen in from the first pass over with the big machine, the second and third pass will smooth out the rough spots."

Mr. Middleton also noted that because of the unusual amount of rain Manitoulin got in November and December, some of the trails still have water holes

across them, with depths varying from a few inches to upwards of one foot. This is especially the case where the trail passes through low lying areas or swampy areas.

"Lack of cold weather up until now hasn't helped," he added. "The big groomer crashes through the thin layer of ice on these water holes. These large industrial machines have no trouble getting through, but you and your sled might. Hopefully, over the next few nights, these water holes will freeze up solid and the problem will be solved for the rest of the season."

Mr. Middleton cautions snowmobilers that the ice trails, however, are not open and the Snowdusters highly recommend that snowmobilers stay off the lakes entirely for the time being. "Depending on how much cold weather we get, it might be as long as two more weeks before travel on even the inland lakes can take place," Mr. Middelton said.

The usual trail from M'Chigeeng to Kagawong (the one that goes north from MSS), will not be usable this season due to a landowner dispute. Snowmobilers wishing to do so will have to travel on the lake from the bottom of West Bay at M'Chigeeng around to Kagawong. "Do not do so until you are absolutely sure there is enough ice," Mr. Middleton urged. "Manitoulin Snowdusters will not be running a stake line this year to help out." He explained that the club is currently exploring possibilities for other land routes in Billings Township other than the route now closed because of landowners' disputes.
