## Rainbow School Board predicts stable numbers at Island schools as budget set

School populations expected to decline through much of balance of board catchment

SUDBURY—Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) approved a budget of \$185.5 million for the 2016-2017 school year at its regular meeting on July 5, 2016. Changes in the Grants for Student Needs and ongoing declining enrolment resulted in a budget shortfall of \$2.7 million.

"In 2015-2016, we estimated a reduction in our grants of approximately \$4 million over three years," said RDSB Chair Doreen Dewar. "This is the second year in which we are experiencing a significant loss in revenue.'

"The continuing shortfall will force us to make difficult decisions," the chair added. "We must align our expenditures with our revenues for the long-term financial sustainability of the board. We will be looking at school consolidations to reduce costs and ensure the viability of programs.'

The 2016-2017 budget represents

a net reduction of 10 full-time equivalent positions in both teaching and non-teaching staff as well as savings in overall operations. The budget includes ongoing funding for a Summer Kindergarten Camp in late August. In order to balance the budget, close to \$2.4 million was withdrawn from the accumulated surplus reserve.

RDSB Board is projecting a decline of 270 full-time equivalent

## Central land transfer sparks legal challenge

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The transfer of just over an acre of municipal park property to private businesses has raised alarm bells with descendants of the original donor of the property and sparked a legal notice from a lawyer's office that a challenge of the sale may be forthcoming, but the municipality maintains those concerns are unfounded.

"A little over two acres" of property was sold to two Mindemoya businesses whose properties abut the 44-acre Wagg's Wood, as the property is generally known locally in Mindemoya, leaving 42 acres remaining in the park.

"What we had originally, was that (a local business) came to us with a request to purchase the land. They had purchased the old Martin home next door and they wanted to straighten out the lot lines," said Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens. "That involved about an acre and a half all told." Another local business approached the town following the first request asking for similar consideration.

There were three properties involved in the transfer, which the municipality maintains did not require a severance due to the severed

## Jeanette Corbiere-Lavell honoured with doctorate by York University

TORONTO—Few women in Canada have stood higher on the ramparts of human rights and the dignity of Anishinaabe-kwe than Jeanette Corbiere-Lavell, whose battle with the Canadian government (and more than a few Native leaders of the day) over Native women's rights to retain their status following marriage to non-Natives in a case before the Supreme Court known as the Lavell Case paved the way to victory in that battle.

In a convocation ceremony held on National Aboriginal Day this year, Dr. Corbiere-Lavell was honoured with an honourary Doctor of Laws degree from the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies II at York University. This is Dr. Corbiere-Lavell's first honourary degree.

Lavell's first honourary degree.
"I think it is great," said Dr. Corbiere-Lavell of the recognition. "This may help open some doors." In typical fashion, the long serving human rights activist was already pondering how the honour could be used to tackle her latest challenges.

"My role as a grandmother is to protect the water and the environment," she said. "When we look around us and see and hear what is happening, especially here on the Great Lakes, and Lake Huron especially, we have to do something about it, not only as Anishinaabe people, but everyone."

Dr. Corbiere-Lavell, a member of the Wikwemikong Unceded First Nation, is best known for the Lavell Case, which challenged the Indian Act before the Supreme Court of Canada after she lost her Indian status by marrying a non-Native in 1970. Her failed challenge inspired a later case with Mary Two-Axe Early that brought the issue of status removal to the United Nations International Human Rights Commission. In 1985, the Indian Act was amended to remove the discriminatory clauses

Dr. Corbiere-Lavell has served as president of the Native Women's Association of Canada, was a cabinet appointee to the Commission on the Native Justice System, president of the Nishnawbe Institute and president of Anduhyaun Inc. After earning her teaching degree, Dr. Corbiere-Lavell worked both as a teacher and school principal in her community. She is a recipient of the 2009 Governor General Awards in Commemoration of the Persons Case, honouring Canadians who advance gender equality. As to whether she will be using the honourific of

# Newspaper, Extra delivery will resume as usual this week

CANADA—As of press time Monday, it appears that any disruption to Canada Post service is off, at least for now, meaning that your Manitoulin Expositor, Manitoulin West Recorder and Manitoulin Extra will resume their normal publishing days and means of delivery.

On Sunday evening, July 10, Canada Post Corporation issued a notice stating that it was revoking its Monday, July 11 lockout (notice of the lockout had been given 72 hours earlier, on July 7), this after the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) had asked for a 30-day 'cooling off' period—a suggestion to which Canada Post had responded that it would only accept the cooling off time if the union would agree to binding arbitration if, after the 30 days, the two parties could not find common ground. The union had previously turned down binding arbitration and reiterated this position prior to the employer's lockout notice. Talks began again on Monday with CUPW stating that it has no plans to issue a 72-hour notice of work disruption.

At issue are the employee pension plan and wage parity between rural and urban mail carriers, with rural, mostly female, carriers asking to be paid by the hour, like their urban counterparts, who are mostly male.

Canada Post is looking to change its pension plan to see new employees covered under a defined contribution plan as opposed to a defined benefit plan, meaning employees would no longer be guaranteed with a set payment upon retirement.

Last Thursday, July 7, Manitoulin Publishing Co. enacted its emergency delivery plan to get the Manitoulin West Recorder and Manitoulin Extra to its customers. This acted as a test run in case of strike or lockout and meant that those living in Manitoulin's towns and First Nations would receive their paper and Extra at a set place of business, as had been advertised in the publications over the previous weeks, and those delivered on rural routes would either receive them in their end-of-lane mailbox or in a bin found at their usual community mailbox.

This week delivery will resume as usual, through Canada Post, for our subscribers.

## Canada must guard against spiralling into US gun culture

For Canadians, the particular gun violence that we have been witnessing in the neighbouring United States is shocking, disturbing and most thoughtful people have been grieving for the increasing levels of hospitality and the impact this has to have on families, neighbours and cities

Of particular concern is the seeming increase in strife between white and African American citizens as witnessed by police shootings of black civilians in a number of US jurisdictions over the past few years and then, last week, the assassination of five police officers in Dallas, Texas by a sniper whose stated intention had been to kill as many members of the police force as possible. His victims were all white and he was an African American reserve army veteran who has seen active duty in Afghanistan. He was killed by police.

For virtually all Canadians, judging from recent interviews with police staff, civilians and experts in violent behaviour from across Canada in recent weeks and days, these kinds of recurring incidents are baffling and disturbing.

Gun violence in this country including police shootings of civilians, are rare enough to merit much public comment and investigation when they do occur. In Toronto in recent years, there has certainly been an increase in homicides by firearms, virtually all related to gang activity and to the illegal drug trade.

It would be fatuous to suggest or even think that individual police forces across the American nation condones the shooting of black civilians as some radical elements in the US have suggested.

But the ready access to all manner of firearms and the culture of guns that many US citizens embrace is surely a factor when American police officers choose to "shoot first and ask questions later."

The second amendment of the American constitution enshrines its citizens' rights to own and to "bear arms" and this simple declaration, written into the document that, above all, has determined how Americans would deal with one another in law and how their social fabric would be woven over time, seems to have become increasingly more important especially in recent time.

American politicians of every stripe and at every level are now routinely put on the spot about their position on this second amendment constitutional right respecting the ownership of guns and no one expecting to be taken seriously as a candidate for whatever elected position they're seeking does anything but pledge their support to this open-ended promise of a richness of materiel in perpetuity.

Even impassioned pleas for some form of US gun control measures made by the parents of children killed in a number of school shooting rampages have failed to sway politicians away from full support for the right to own guns because they, in turn, fear for their jobs come the next election cycle even if they may in their hearts agree with the need for some type of gun registry and controls.

The more guns, the more violence would seem to be the message and some policemen have doubtless overreacted and "shot first" because of only the possibility that the person they're dealing with could be armed.

In Canada, in our culture, police can be relatively assured that the person they're talking to in a seatbelt check is not armed. In the United States, there can be no such assumption and the recent rash of what, in Canada, we see as overreacting police officers that has led in several situations to tragic circumstances drives home this contrast between our nations' approach to gun ownership.

The Chretien Liberals did instate mandatory registration of rifles and shotguns (hand gun ownership in Canada has been strictly regulated for several decades) and one of the promises that helped propel Steven Harper's Conservatives to power in Ottawa was the promise to abandon the "wasteful gun registry."

There has been enough second amendment creep across the 49th parallel that rural Canada largely resented the notion of gun registration so even though Canadians' and Americans' relationship with their firearms is measurably different, Mr. Harper's promise to discard the fairly new at the time gun registry program won many rural votes for the Conservative party and its candidates.

But last year, Canadians threw out the Conservatives with a vengeance and elected a large Liberal majority government once again; and no one talked about the gun registry at all: we tried it, a sufficient number of people responded negatively to it, it was abandoned and we live our lives as we did before.

In the US, though, the preoccupation with this particular constitutional guarantee has seemingly had the effect of encouraging and embracing the ownership of lethal weapons with an organization like the National Rifle Association (NRA) devoting tremendous time and treasure to both encouraging gun ownership and lobbying against any forms of gun control.

In this environment, it's not difficult to imagine the overreaction of police and (in his mind) the corresponding eye-for-an-eye view of the African American sniper who murdered the Dallas policemen last week.

America has so much talent and energy and is, indeed, the most technologically advanced nation in the world.

She is our neighbour and good friend and it is tragic to see over and over the spiraling consequences of the embrace of weapons.

It's all well and good to say that people should arm themselves or their school or their nightclubs in the interest of self defense, but that too just adds to the terrible spiral where everyone, with some justification, can be more or less afraid of everyone else and the police forces are on the pointy end of where this has led, the issues of race notwithstanding.

Our own country should guard against ever going down this same road and all we can hope for our American friends of neighbours is for some common sense compromises to limit who has access to guns.

### Manitoulin Nature Club weighs in on Wagg's Wood sale

Let's not tear down precious environments

To the Expositor:

The Manitoulin Nature Club (MNC) would like to express its concerns regarding the recent sale and razing of a parcel of Wagg's Woods for commercial interests. While we understand the need for economic development, we would like to remind council members that a community's well-being is not measured solely in economic terms and that Manitoulin's environmental riches are also an important resource for the well-being of its inhabitants and the enjoyment of its visitors. It is our belief, however, that Wagg's Park does provide financial benefits to the municipality by being an important attraction for people who enjoy hiking and other nature activities. It has been noted in This is Manitoulin and the LaCloche Region as well as Discover Us. It is also included in the booklet "Manitoulin Trails" which is available at local tourist information offices. In view of the growing popularity of this sector of tourism, the decision to destroy a critical portion of this park seems very short-sighted.

Wagg's Woods is an irreplaceable resource that should be valued as one of Central Manitoulin's most important assets. As well as escarpment terrain, it includes a seasonal stream and flood plain that winds through a mature hardwood forest. A recent survey by the MNC conducted as part of the Notable Trees Project identified more than 20 species of trees along the Wagg's Woods trail. One venerable Yellow Birch has been designated as a Notable Tree of Manitoulin.

This type of forest has become increasingly rare on Manitoulin Island; nowhere but in Mindemoya is such a superb example of one

freely accessible from the main street of town. It supports a diverse animal and plant population that attracts birdwatchers, wild flower and fern experts, geologists and other nature lovers, as well as frequent school groups. The dry stream-bed is literally paved with fossils. Several plant species found here, such as bloodroot, blue cohosh, squirrel corn, Dutchman's breeches, lopseed, Jack-in-the-pulpit and nodding trillium are rare elsewhere on Manitoulin Island; Wagg's Woods is also the only location where the Moonseed vine grows on the Island. These are all shade-loving plants, and the opening up of a section of forest right up to the edge of the stream bed will seriously alter the environment and have a significant impact on these populations.

Tearing down precious environments such as these is much easier than recovering them. The Manitoulin Nature Club sincerely hopes that this recent action by the Central Manitoulin Council is not a precedent that will see a further whittling away of our natural heritage. We would be pleased to meet with council to help develop a plan that would allow us to work together to better manage our natural areas. Several of our members have already expressed a willingness to volunteer in improving and maintaining trails. We are confident that we can find a way to work together for the benefit of all Manitoulin residents and visitors.

There are plants there that are not common in other parts of Ontario and quite lovely. The cut-leaved toothwort and the nodding trillium are

unique. I last visited in mid-May of this year and identified 21 species of plants. The leatherwood was just leafing out and formed a beautiful green understory.

I hope that the township council is able to understand that protecting such valuable land is essential. Commercial spaces can come and go but such a remarkable piece of undisturbed land is not replaceable.

## Brexit: Losers in globalization flex their muscles to the chagrin of the elite classes

he decision by the UK electorate to leave the European Union, the socalled Brexit, has been one of the most significant geopolitical events of our time. It continues to be interpreted in many ways but one significant fact needs to be underscored in all of the post-referendum analysis: too many people have been left behind by the processes of globalization and these same people have expressed their discontent at the ballot box. Brexit has acted like a hurricane—tearing through the political landscape of Europe before moving to other destinations. So far. Britain has been at the epicenter. The key political figures in the debate have departed. First, the prime minister who unwisely decided to call for a referendum in order to place Euroscepticism within his party ranks resigned. David Cameron's decision to step down in October was followed by the decision of his chief rival, Boris Johnson, not to run for the leadership. Then the leader of the UK Independence Party, Nigel Farage, decided to call it a day.

This same concern with globalization underscored President Obama's address to Canada's parliament. Obama spoke against those who would preach protectionism and xenophobia. He acknowledged that in the new, knowledge-driven economy, there would be winners and losers but as he put it, ordinary working families should have the means to allow their sons and daughters to have a good shot at a decent life. As he said, "If our democracies seem incapable of assuring broad-based growth and opportunity for everyone, then people will push back out of anger or out of fear". And 'politicians—some sincere and some entirely cynical—will tap that anger and fear, hearkening back to bygone days of order and predictability and national glory. arguing that we must rebuild walls and disengage from a chaotic world, or rid ourselves of the supposed ills brought on by immigrants, all in order to regain control of our lives.

Others have been even more forthright about what governments can do to give a fighting chance to those parts of their population who are on the wrong side of globalization. Writing in the New York Times on June 29, 2016, Thomas Friedman opined that this decision to quit the EU as the European Union is known, "is not the end of the world—but it does show us how we can get there." For Mr. Friedman, this is the

big story of our time, one in which the pace of change in technology, in globalization and in planetary climate cycles has outrun the ability of our political systems to build the community-based workplace and educational innovations to allow each and every one of our citizens to keep up. As he noted, we "have globalized trade and manufacturing, and we have introduced robots and artificial intelligence systems, far faster than we have designed the social safety nets, trade surge protectors and educational advancement options that would allow people caught in this transition to have the time, space and tools to thrive." At the same time, we have opened borders. Therefore, we have "experienced the influx of illegal migration from failing states at an unprecedented scale." This too has left people feeling "that they are losing their 'home' in the deepest sense of the word." Mr. Friedman observed that this is happening first of all in Europe but it may soon spread to places like the United States. But underneath it all, the real issue might not be immigration at all: it is integration. How do you create the social, cultural, political and economic conditions that allow people of diverse backgrounds to accept each oth-

This is the question that peoples in nation-states across the globe have to ask. The undisputed fact here is that nationalism is on the rise—a point made clear by the way the vote on Brexit broke across the UK: Scotland voted 62 percent to 38 percent to stay in the European Union, while in Northern Ireland the vote went 55.8 percent to 44.2 percent. At first blush, the Scottish result would seem to advantage Nicola Sturgeon, Scotland's first minister. Ms. Sturgeon reacted swiftly to the vote, tasking a panel of non-partisan experts to advise her on how to remain inside the UK. The panel will set out the options in a stark form giving her the advice that she has already massaged them to give her: that Scotland will need to become independent from the UK in order to keep its present place in the European Union. But this will not be easy. Spain will try to trip things up because they do not want to encourage Catalans from declaring their own independence in their country. And then there are political considerations within Scotland. Joining a currency like the Euro will not be an easy sell. And having borderless travel to Scotland from other parts of Europe might not be an easy sell either. Scotland's timing on these matters will have to coincide with the decision by authorities in Westminster to invoke Article 50 of the Treaty of Lisbon. This treaty sets a formal two-year period on the negotiations for the UK to secede from Europe. British authorities want breathing room before this is invoked and are waiting until the Tory party chooses a new leader in the fall. Bookmakers have Theresa May as the odds-on favourite to win but in these anarchic circumstances, nothing can be taken for granted. Ms. May is seen as colorless and lacking in vision but in truth, the problem runs deeper and has to do with the fact that the regular, mainstream political parties in North America and in Europe do not seem to embody an underlying philosophy that fits the requirements of a twenty-first century world. Political events are being shaped by deeper economic forces.

Capitalism, or the way that we organize economic relations in our society is changing. Using a satirical approach, the website True Activist put the problem with our present system in these terms: "With traditional capitalism you have two cows. You sell one and buy a bull. Your herd multiplies and the economy grows. You sell them and retire on the income." Easy peasy. But now something else has happened. "With today's capitalism we still have two cows. You sell three of them to your publicly listed company using letters of credit arranged by your brother-in-law at the bank. You then execute a debt-equity swap with an associated general offer. You get all four cows back, with a tax exemption for five cows. The annual report says the company owns six cows, with an option to buy one more. No balance sheet is provided with the press release. The public buys the bull.'

One of the most astute commentators on this was the Austrian political economist, Joseph Schumpeter. Schumpeter described the churn that takes place when a new technology displaces and older way of doing things, as when the horse and buggy was displaced by the automobile. He popularized the term "creative destruction" to describe the arrival of a new and disruptive technology. Today we are in the period of what some call Peak Schumpeter, with huge parts of the economy transformed by disruptive innovations. Think Uber. Or Netflix. Landline telephones have become a thing of the past in the era of mobile technology. Jobs for life have disappeared. As a

consequence a younger generation of workers has been forced to migrate into what is called the gig economy. Millennials live vicariously, from gig to gig, contract to contract. You do not own a car—you lease or rent it out with others. You rent out parts of your house to strangers. Think Airbnb. This is a future based in Silicon Valley—and defined by the competition between industry leaders like Google, Apple and Facebook.

Brexit represents disruptive change but it is not the change that the networked elite in London and in university towns across England anticipated. Places like Oxford and Cambridge voted overwhelming in favor of staying in Europe, while nearby towns like Peterborough did not. In other words, the cultural and technocratic elite who are part of the knowledge society voted one way while those who bear the costs of globalization voted a different way: this much is plain from the results of the referendum. There is fear that authoritarian groups across Europe will demand their own form of Brexit. Marine LePen, leader of the Front National in France and a strong candidate to be the next President of France, hailed the UK referendum as a "key moment in European history" and promised a similar exercise for her own country. Italy's anti-immigrant Northern League and the Five Star Movement called for a referendum in their country and Geert Wilders, head of the anti-Muslim Freedom Party in the Netherlands promised that should he be elected, the Netherlands would hold their own "Nexit" referendum. Kristian Thulesen Dahls, leader of the Danish People's Party said much the same while anti-immigrant leaders like Poland's Jaroslaw Kaczynski and Hungary's Victor Orban ramped up their attacks on the European Union.

For their part, authorities in the European Union have made it clear to countries like Switzerland as well as to the UK that if they want to continue to trade with Europe, they can only go so far in closing their borders to the free movement of peoples. The real divide that is emerging is between open societies and closed societies, or between those who want to build walls and those who want to tear them down. Former European colonies in Asia and Africa that forced together competing ethnic groups are pushing for their own independence. Kurds in the Middle East are turning the

## Britain gets second female PM as inequality racks UK, USA and our own nation

Britain got its second female prime minister today amid political turmoil driven by the inequality of wealth that is fuelling furious dissent in the United States and other western democracies.

Canadian politics will not be immune.

The new British PM, Theresa May, has been a highly competent senior minister in the UK's ruling Conservative

She was called "a bloody difficult woman" last week by an MP who was actually supporting her. He had served in the cabinet of another such woman, Margaret Thatcher, known as the Iron Lady.

Mrs. May, steely and straight-talking, is a clergyman's daughter and Oxford graduate. She beat out the runner-up for the Tory leadership, Andrea Leadsom, whose looks, accent and financial success were the epitome of upper class entitlement at the expense of the blue collar class that is increasingly not working.

With speculation that Mrs. May will call a snap election, she promises to serve workers in her bid to evince Tory affinity with both high and low income voters in a Conservative formula established in the nineteenth century by Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli.

Mrs. May would almost certainly beat a bitterly divided Labour party in disarray under its embattled leader Jeremy Corbyn. A few hours after it was clear that Mrs. May would automatically succeed David Cameron in Number 10 Downing Street, Mr. Corbyn called for just such a snap election

Mr. Corbyn has every reason to want a quick election. He faces a contest to remove him from his leadership, following rebellion by three-quarters of his caucus in Parliament.

Most of his MPs are convinced that Mr. Corbyn, of weedy beard and far left dogma, can't win an election to form a Labour government.

The leading Labour rebel, Angela Eagle, has working class roots, an Oxford eduction, and experience in an industry association. She aspires to be the first female Labour leader. If she won a general election she would be the third female prime minister, and the first lesbian one.

Mr. Corbyn's leadership was defied on the basis that he campaigned so feebly to remain in the EU that half the supporters of his Labour party didn't even know that the party was in favour of the EU. Many of them voted to leave.

The underlying force in the turmoil is anger that the rich get richer and the poor get poorer—to a degree unknown since the nineteenth century.

The disparity may be a natural consequence of unfettered capitalism as identified two years ago in a stunning study by French economist Thomas Piketty. His reams of statistics showed that middle class prosperity in the West, peaking about 1970, was an historical aberration.

Only government intervention can curb the excesses of capitalism. Mr. Piketty's proposed cure—a huge tax on wealth—is politically impractical and perfectly unrealistic, because wealth can be moved across borders to avoid tax.

The democratic cure for inequality of wealth is election of governments that will do something about it. That is what is proposed by the Democratic Party in the US (and opposed by self serving Republicans).

The other cure is revolution. Whatever that signifies, Bernie Sanders, the runner-up for the Democratic nomination, means it when he says he wants one.

Jeremy Corbyn has much same outlook. Commentary in this week's Economist suggests that Mr. Corbyn's efforts to win public favour are feeble because he doesn't care about winning elections. He may really prefer a South Americanstyle revolution such as the one he admired as a young man visiting Chile.

So what is going to happen in Britain?

I was studying in London and Oxford when Britain was a new member of the European Common Market, and was impressed with the quality of the televised debates leading into a national referendum that voted to stick with Europe. The recent debate on the matter was appalling.

Serious warnings about the disadvantages of leaving

were dismissed and smeared as fear tactics.

Many of the leading exhortations to leave were mendacious, reprehensibly irresponsible and tinged with racism about dark-skinned immigrants. Even the racism was phony: the bulk of European immigration to the UK has come

overwhelmingly from Poland and, to a lesser degree, from other fair-faced parts of Europe.

It is my guess that despite her current stance, Mrs. May will steer Britain to an associate status with the EU rather like Norway's. That means making payments to the EU budget and probably getting back EU subsidies for farmers and small businesses. Norway has also had to accept free immigration from the EU. Mrs. May says she won't. A standoff. But public hostility to immigration may fade if it turns out that few people want to come to a staggering British economy convoluted by the recent vote to leave the

How will Canada respond to income inequality?

Although the US has the worst income inequality among developed countries, Canada is among the next worst, following only Britain, Italy, Australia and Japan.

The Trudeau government has promised to help aboriginals and has notably helped all poor families with massive spending on a child benefit.

The NDP is sympathetic to low income earners. Calls by its idealistic left wing are akin to the Sanders and Corbyn cries for some kind of revolution. Will the NDP left wing gather force?

It is too soon to tell how—or whether—the Conservatives will respond.

Political battles, here and abroad, are joined on the issue of free trade pacts. Passions are inflamed by resentment of inequality far beyond whatever difference is actually made by free trade agreements.

The real question of our time is whether the world can reverse the concentration of wealth in the vaults of the very few.

It will matter.

It is not necessary to contact the OPP to report that you have received one of these calls unless you are a victim of fraud that can be attributed to this scam.

This website will provide an online means of reporting and offers great tips so that you do not become a victim of this or any other fraud.

Some OPP communications centres are receiving upwards to 100 or more calls per day from people wanting to advise that they received one of these scam related calls and although your intentions are appreciated, it is these calls which are at times restricting the OPP's ability to take calls for service from the public that require a police response.



war in Syria to their own advantage in pushing for their own nation-state. Kashmiris in both India and in Pakistan are demanding a separate state. as are the Nagas in northeast India and separatists in Pakistan's Balochistan province. China and Russia have separatist groups within their own jurisdictions too who will be emboldened by the break up of other states.

What all this means is that the pace forces of nationalism. of political change is accelerating from place to place. If Brexit shows anything it shows that the people at the top could not control change. It also shows that the European Union needs to reform way it does things and become more democratic and open. As Henry Kissinger put it, this is a "cathartic" moment for Europe. It has to change and accommodate the new

## Manitoulin Sporting Life | Manitoulin Physio Centre provides innovative support to Island athletes

MANITOULIN—A Manitoulin business has taken an innovative path in leveraging their expertise to assist local athletes seeking sponsorship.

"We have supported many Man-itoulin-based athletes over the years and this year at Manitoulin Physio Centre we are looking to broaden the benefits of clinical resources offered through our clinic by launching TEAM MPC," said clinic operator Derek Debassige. "The focus of this initiative is to assist in the development of young athletes on Mani-

Mr. Debassige noted that young athletes are often role models for their peers and "provide inspiration for us all."

This year, TEAM MPC is sponsoring four athletes who have "shown commitment and achievement in their chosen sport." This year those student athletes are Mackenzie Turner, a 17-year-old biathlon competitor from Gore Bay who is currently training for two weeks with the national team in Prince Edward Island; Hunter Cranston, a Grade 9 student from Spring Bay who is involved in motocross; Samuel Assinewai, an

11-year-old student from Aundeck Omni Kaning who is taking the hockey world by storm; and 11year-old Aysia Francis-Debassige of Sheguiandah, who is also enhancing her impressive performance in hockey.

"By offering support and guidance to these athletes we hope to enhance their achievements and motivate the communities around them in the process," said Mr. Debassige.

Through TEAM MPC, local athletes receive functional movement screening (FMS), ImPact testing, training and injury prevention guidance, as well as a monetary sponsorship.

Mr. Debassige explained that FMS "involves testing the mobility and stability" of an athlete that helps "identify weaknesses in the body and inform our clinicians on the areas that require improvement in order to avoid injury and perform to their highest potential."

ImPact testing (Immediate Post Concussion Assessment and Cognitive Testing) "allows the physiotherapist to gather a baseline level of brain functioning in areas such as reaction time, memory and decision making," explains Mr. Debassige. "If the athlete sustains a concussion in future play. they can perform the test once again in order to compare the results to the athlete's baseline score and gauge their level of impairment. This allows a safe return to play preparation plan to be constructed for the athlete.'

That pre-concussion testing proved useful very quickly for

Aysia, noted her mother Melanie Francis. "That's what really helps," she said. "Aysia did suffer a pretty bad concussion this season. It allowed her to heal properly." MPC took on the challenge very quickly. "Normally, you would have to wait a long time to be seen. Timely intervention was key. If it was ignored it could have caused a lot of problems later in life. When she got hurt at the Sudbury arena, Derek saw her the next day. She is okay now."

Any parent with a child in hockey knows how expensive it can be, but when your child expresses a dream of playing for a high tier team like the Lady Wolves, the cost rises exponentially. "I really didn't know how I was going to be able to afford it," said Ms. Francis. "They (MPC) helped pay a portion of the registration.'

Perhaps even more important than the funding, the staff at MPC have provided advice and support throughout her daughter's budding career. "They have been absolutely fantastic," said Ms. Francis, whose son Nathan has also been sponsored by MPC.

"It really makes me feel good to have that extra support," noted Mackenzie Turner, who has found the MPC services handy as she is currently nursing a shoulder injury. "It is really important, especially when you are training six days a week."

Training and competing at the upper levels of any sport can lead to injury, but athletes also benefit greatly from advice informed by body science and technology to reach their greatest potential, and the athletes sponsored by MPC are benefiting in way that is usually out of reach of all but the wealthiest and best connected of rural competitors.





## Lake Huron continues to post above average water levels despite poor rain

LAKE HURON—Despite the dry conditions Manitoulin Island has experienced so far this summer, Lake Huron is holding its own in the water levels department, posting above-average levels for July.

"There are interesting things going on with Lakes Huron and Michigan," said Derrick Beach, editor of Environment Canada's LEVELNews.

Mr. Beach explained that in November and December, the period that would normally see a seasonal decline, Lake Huron saw a small rise—a first in a century of record-keeping. Mr. Beach said there are two reasons for this: warmer temperatures that saw precipitation falling as rain directly into the lake, rather than snow or ice, and the fact that there were no major temperature spikes, the kind that cause evaporation.

#### Third annual Mackenzie's Walk takes place this Saturday

LITTLE CURRENT—This Saturday, July 16 will mark the third annual Mackenzie's Run and Walk for the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario (CHEO).

Jillian Peltier began organizing the walk two years ago in honour of her son Mackenzie who passed away on September 3, 2011 at the age of two after an unexpected cardiac arrest. Mackenzie was being treated for ulcerative colitis at the CHEO and Ms. Peltier wanted to organize the

fundraiser as a way to support the hospital and ensure that other kids continue to get the same level of care.

"Mackenzie's Run and Walk event has raised over \$8,000," said Ms. Peltier. "Recently we learned that CHEO's 'Project Stitch,' a project to fund the building of two new minor procedure rooms, including one specifically for the inflammatory bowel disease as well as state-of-the-art MRI and surgical equipment, is now just \$350,000 short of their \$5 million goal."

As of Monday, July 11, Ms. Peltier

said she had 50 individuals signed up to either participate or donate.

Registration will start at 8 am at Low Island Park on Saturday, July 16, with the run and walk starting at 9 am. The event includes a 5 km fun run, a 2 km walk and 1 km event for kids. The route will go from Low Island Park to the TD Bank, up Robinson Street and out to Red Mill Road.

March added to the mix of conditions that lent itself to keeping the levels high, as Lake Huron saw double the average levels of precipitation fall that month which made up for the lack of spring runoff.

"This set us up for April to June," Mr. Beach continued. These three months saw well below the average precipitation numbers, but the beginning of July levels are still above average, by 28 centimetres, and 12 centimetres above last year's levels for the same time—the highest levels since 1998.

"So we're doing well," he said. "It's the sum of all the different parts."

Lake Superior, however, has seen record breaking precipitation recently, which has also helped keep Lake Huron's numbers high; that and the fact that the beginning of July precipitation figures for Lakes Huron and Michigan are actually higher than average for the watershed, this thanks to rains in Michigan.

Mr. Beach said that ,should Lake Huron see extremely dry conditions for the rest of the summer, the Great Lake will still see above average levels until November. "There's enough water in the system to provide a buffer," he added. "We're predicting that we'll stay well above average."

## Women's shelter recieves \$52,000 Rural Realities grant for transportation by Michael Erskine violence in their homes in nities who have experitively need regardless of

by Michael Erskine MINDEMOYA—Manitoulin Family Resources (MFR) is receiving \$52,000 over two years through the province's \$1 million Rural Realities Fund, which seeks to support violence against women agencies and shelters in rural, remote and Northern communities.

"We are very pleased to receive this funding," said MFR Executive Director Marnie Hall-Brown. "We will be working with other community partners towards sustainability for this program."

"These projects will help to ensure that women and their children experiencing violence in their homes in rural, remote and Northern communities have access to the help and support they need," said Dr. Helena Jaczek, Minister of Community and Social Services. "I am confident that the projects we have selected will lead to innovative local solutions that address some of the unique challenges agencies face in serving women."

There were 16 projects funded through the Rural Realities Fund.

"Every woman deserves to live free from the fear of violence in her home and community. Women in rural and isolated communities who have experienced violence will now have better access to the supports they need to help them live safely and rebuild their lives," said Tracy MacCharles, minister responsible for Women's

"The safety and wellbeing of women and children living in rural communities is important to this government," said Jeff Leal, minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. "Through initiatives like the Rural Realities Fund we are helping to ensure that victims of domestic violence have access to safe shelters and to the services

they need regardless of where they live. We are listening and working together with rural residents to make rural Ontario a desirable place to live, work and raise a family."

Although the funding will be in place for the next two years, the needs that are being met through MFR's Community Connection project have been ongoing and are not likely to be solved any time soon.

MFR developed the Community Connection project after identifying that a significant barrier to women going to shelters is a lack of transportation on Manitoulin Island. "This is a barrier to women and their children maintaining relationships with their home communities, including healthcare providers or schools," said Ms. Hall-Brown. "This project will connect social service and community agency partners and volunteers to help these families maintain access in their communi-

Ms. Hall-Brown pointed out that when women and their children seek shelter. they are often uprooted from their community, with the loss of programs, including language and culture, often being the result. "We are trying to reduce the obstacles for women accessing shelter programs," she "Women will often try to outwait that need so that their children do not lose services and programs."

The impact can be serious, with high school students especially as they could lose their semester.

Through the Community Connection program transportation can be provided for a wide range of needs, including specialist appointments and other non-emergency necessities.

MFR is looking for more volunteer drivers to assist with the delivery of the program, noted Ms. Hall-Brown. Those interested in discovering more about the volunteer driver opportunities can contact MFR at (705) 377-4863.

Ontario funds more than 2,000 shelter beds for women who experience abuse and their children and approximately 10,390 women and 7,330 children were served at violence against women shelters in 2014-15.



WHITEFISH FALLS—Tripods are blooming along the banks of the Whitefish River, as students of the 31st edition of the La Cloche Art School are working under the tutelage of renown Manitoulin artist Richard Edwards—and this year the group is including two Manitoulin Secondary School students.

Instructor Richard Edwards, whose Edwards Studio has been a mainstay fixture above the Billings municipal offices in Kagawong for more than 20 years, is taking the students of the La Cloche Art School through their paces at the Bay Villa Lodge in Whitefish Falls.

Mr. Edwards has been painting professionally since 1970 and his paintings grace public and private collections in Canada, the United States and Europe.

It was Diane Tremblay of Espanola who came up with the original idea for the art school 30 years ago, and along with Donna McDonald and other members of the Espanola Art Club, the project was driven forward into reality. The founders universally cred-

land being owned by the municipality and not subject to the provisions of the Municipal Act governing the disposition of public lands. According to municipal officials, the town's own bylaws permit the transfer.

"We discussed it at committee and decided that it was a good business decision for our community," said Mayor Stephens. "It was a good opportunity for development of our business community and a good use of

"It involved about two-and-a-half acres and doesn't impact on the use of Wagg's Park," said Mayor Stephens. "There is still another 42 acres there.'

But the Manitoulin Nature Club (MNC) say they are concerned about the impact the removal of trees will have on a seasonal stream bed that runs through the prop-

"We felt that we needed to express our concern," said MNC vice-president Marcel Beneteau. "We felt it was kind of shock-

The club wrestled with a wide range of rumours and whether the land in question had been donated as a park, but in the end they based their concerns on what they knew—the impact the changes to the property in question would have.

"There is a stream that runs through that property that is quite active in the springtime, but which is almost non-existent by this time of year." The heavy forest through which the streambed runs shel-

ters a number of plants that do not thrive in direct sunlight, he pointed out.

We also realize that two acres out of 44 might not seem like much in itself, but we are concerned about the precedent and the whittling away of the property," said Mr. Beneteau. "What's done is done," he continued of the current state of the property.

In another development, the law offices of Patricia L. Meehan have been retained to deal with concerns about the property and her office placed a legal notice in The Expositor warning "persons and entities who purchase from the Municipality of Central Manitoulin any of the above noted lands do so at his/her/their own risk and subject to the potential title issues and claim.'

Ms. Meehan alleges that the municipality did not follow proper procedure in disposing of the property, in spite of assurances from the municipal office.

"They can say whatever they want," she said. "There are laws governing the disposition of public lands." Those regulations, she maintains, dictate that the property being contemplated for sale must be advertised prior to the bylaw and then must be placed on public offer. "There was no notice," she said, "the Municipal Act was not followed.

Ms. Meehan maintained that municipal business must be conducted with transparency and that accountability through process is paramount when it comes to dealing with public assets.

writer Michael Staff Erskine wrote of the damage sustained in rural Northeast Town and the swath of damage from Wilson Street to Harbour View Road and on to Harbor Vue Marina.

Denis Riche and his family were in their camper at Green Acres when the full fury of the storm hit the area, toppling trees and sending one hurtling into the side of their camper.

"I grabbed the kids and went down to the water," he told The Expositor that night. "It was the only place

I could think of where we might be safe. There was stuff flying all around us."

Full grown mature trees lay strewn about the park and numerous camper trailers were crushed. "I couldn't get out," said one man. "The trees had totaled my car on the one side of the trailer and another had crushed my boat.'

"Harbor Vue Marina owner Stan Ferguson and his crews were busily tying down docks and securing the area, but the devastation at his marina had him visibly shaken," Expositor reported 10 years ago. "Huge boats were toppled from their moorings in the shipyard and damage

could not even begun to be tallied."

## Northeast Town opposes new Manitoulin Official Plan

MANITOULIN—The Northeast Town has officially opposed the Manitoulin Planning Board's (MPB) draft Official Plan (OP) stating that their and the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising's (UCCMM) concerns have not been addressed.

During a board vote to forward a certified copy of the OP to Island municipalities with a request for it to be adopted by bylaw. Northeast Town MPB representative Melissa Peters advised the planning board that the Northeast Town was opposing the MPB draft OP because: "The United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) letter of concerns has not been addressed with regard to the MPB draft OP; very few concerns of the Northeast Town were addressed by the planners/MPB; and the plan exceeds the role of the MPB into municipality governance—it is more regulatory rather than positive planning," state the minutes from the June 28 board meet-

"NEMI is not going to be voting in favour of the new Official Plan," stated Melissa Peters, NEMI representative. She noted the MPB has received a letter of concerns relayed by the United Chiefs and Councils of M'Nidoo M'Nissing. "It is one of the problems I have with accepting the plan. NEMI had identified a number of concerns which have not been addressed by the board and the UCCMM letter and concerns have not been addressed by the board as well. The plan goes into every aspect of municipality."

"That is not correct," stated Ms. Carter, who noted the board has responded to every concern raised by NEMI, both in meetings and in correspondence. "As for the UCCMM concerns, they are not within the mandate of the Official Plan and will need to be addressed by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH)."

Ms. Peters requested a recorded vote for the motion. Ms. Peters, on behalf of the Northeast Town, voted against the motion, while MPB members Ian Anderson, Lee Hayden, Dan Osborne, Paul Moffatt, Eric Russell, Austin Hunt and Ken Noland voted in favour of the motion.

In regards to the UCCMM letter Ms. Carter said, "we had received a similar letter from the UCCMM in 2013 and we had advised that the concerns were not within the mandate of the OP and the letter

would be forwarded to the MMAH. We attended meetings with the UCCMM on concerns raised in their letter," said Ms. Carter. "In my discussion today with Matt Alexander of the MMAH I indicated I would be forwarding the UCCMM letter to him for response. He agreed the concerns raised are not within the OP mandate." However, she also noted, "we (MPB) are prepared to review any recommendations made by the ministry and consider any modifications that are recommended from the MMAH to us."

A motion was moved that, "the MPB, in consideration that many of the issues raised are not within the scope of the OP, forward the letter received from the UCCMM to the MMAH for response."

During the June 28 MPB meeting, the board also received an update from the status of the Northeast Town's own proposed OP. Ms. Carter stated that the Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) was in the process of finalizing the proposed modifications, which would be followed by meetings with the Northeast Town staff and/or council.

The Northeast Town has expressed ongoing disagreements with the MPB and has been seeking permission from the MMAH to leave the planning board and become its own planning authority. The municipality is also in the process of developing its own OP.

students this fall. Six of those are expected on Manitoulin. Enrolment is predicted to drop to 13,191 students. A total of 77 percent of the budget, or \$143 million, has been allocated to salaries and benefits.

The Ministry of Education has provided additional funding for electricity costs and capital renewal.

Rainbow District School Board operates

35 elementary school buildings and nine secondary school buildings in Sudbury, Espanola, Manitoulin and Shining Tree.

The board also offers educational programs at Barrydowne College (a re-engagement school at Cambrian College), the N'Swakamok Native Friendship Centre, the Shkagamik-Kwe Health Centre, the Children's Treatment Centre, the Ruth MacMillan Centre, Frank Flowers School and Cecil Facer Secondary School.

...continued from page 11 of a microburst and measuring 1 on the Fujita scale).

Blake and Janice Burnett's century-old farm at Burnett's Sideroad and Townline Road in Sheguiandah was the site of a work bee the next weekend that saw some 60 individuals pitching in to clean up the mess where their barns, two of them, used to be, including the help of 50 women who fed the hungry masses.

"I knew something was brewing but I didn't know it was going to be that bad," he told then-editor Jim Moodie.

"As the storm gathered force, coming from the southwest, Mr. Burnett hopped off of his tractor and hunkered beside it," Mr. Moodie wrote. "I wasn't in the direct path of it," Mr. Burnett said. "It went by on one side of me, 30 to 40 feet away."

Fire departments across the Island were also kept busy dealing with pole fires and small brush fires as a result, as were Hvdro One crews who had most of the power restored to Manitoulin inhabitants by Friday, four days later, but with small pockets still going without hydro until Sunday, July 23. To get Manitoulin Island up and running, it took the support of 62 linemen, 19 foresters and 12 field support workers replaced 738 poles, 1,300 kilometres of line and 1.000 cross-arms.

At sea, Canadian Yacht Charters proprietor Ken Blodgett reported that one of his fleet, a 42-foot trawler, was in the Clapperton Channel near Harbour Island when it was flipped over by the wind.

"There were two adults and three kids, from Michigan," Mr. Blodgett told The Expositor. "They got caught by the unexpected wind, which blew the boat on its side. Then it started to fill with water."

The family put out a Mayday call and abandoned ship, while the trawler began to sink. The family was picked up, unharmed, by the OPP marine unit from Blind River. The retrieval effort for the vessel came in at approximately \$30,000 and the boat was deemed "a total write-off."

In Sheguiandah, Manitoulin's hardest hit village, Ed Heis was working at the Little Current recreation centre when the storm hit. Worrying about his 95-year-old mother, the late Idena Heis, he left work in the midst of the storm and

drove home. His sixth sense was correct, as when he pulled into his home, he found that a large tree had crashed through the roof of his house, just as his mother was on her way to the second floor. Ms. Heis shaken, but unharmed. The mother and son had to temporarily vacate their home, but received a whole new second storey, thanks to insurance coverage.

Just a few short steps away, at Whitehaven Cottages, Bill Strain told this newspaper of the truck that was flattened by felled trees and a cabin that was completely removed from its footings.

The 2006 July paper is filled with such stories from across the Island—a storm that will not soon be forgotten.

## Canadian Roots youth exchange builds reconciliation

SHEGUIANDAH—Sitting in a circle within the tipi they had constructed on the grounds of the Sheguiandah First Nation powwow grounds, the young women participating in the Canadian Roots Exchange program joined M'Chigeeng O'gimmaa-kwe Linda Debassige in a discussion to learn about what the reconciliation process looks like to the Anishinaabe.

"This group is all girls," said local Canadian Roots Exchange rep Lynzii Taibossigai. The groups, she explained, are normally co-ed. "I had thought about doing an all women group for some time, but this time it just all fell into place." Only one male had applied to the program this year, and that individual backed out.

The all-women group added a different dynamic to the program, which the organizers were emphatic was not a "tourism" group. "This is not about tourism," said Canadian Roots Executive Director Vibhor Garg. "I am sure the government would like to classify this as tourism, but that really does not encompass what we are all about."

"Canadian Roots Exchange is all about bringing Natives and non-Native youth together and living together in a First Nations community to learn about education, history and culture," explained Ms. Taibossigai. The importance of bringing divergent groups from across the Canadian experience together to learn about First Nations and indigenous people's stories on a personto-person basis is hard to overstate, she noted.

The mission of Canadian Roots Exchange is to "build bridges between indigenous and non-indigenous youth in Canada by facilitating dialogue and strengthening relationships through leadership programs," and their vision is "we believe in a Canada where youth stand in solidarity to promote respect, understanding and reconciliation between indigenous and non-indigenous peoples."

Marla Corbiere, a Sudbury student, said that she had joined the program to "learn more about the culture here on the Island and to interact with other people of like mind"

and she said that she has been working with the CRE for some time and that it was a "great way to learn everything about the culture and life in the First Nations communities."

Dalal Badawi is also from the Toronto area and she said that her interest in the program was "similar to Marla, to interact with likeminded people open to new experiences."

Sara Patino is a community worker in Toronto and said that she wanted to connect to the land and how life is lived here on Manitoulin. "I don't like living in the city, so I am looking at different ways of life in Ontario," she said.

Emily Diemara is from the Halton-Waterloo region and works at Sir Wilfred Laurier University in the Anishinaabe department. "I am officially here for work," she said. "Unofficially I want to connect to the land where I grew up. I also want to connect with likeminded people, strong women."

Jacqueline Neshkawa is also a staff member with CRE and she is half Ojibwe. "I didn't learn much about the language, land and culture growing up," she said.

Kennes Lin, a youth worker, said that she has read a lot on the

Internet, but to understand spirituality in life requires a more hands-on experience.

Rachelle Hawthorne is from Ottawa and she was seeking to learn more about First Nations and what reconciliation meant to aboriginal people.

Nimra Bandukwala is originally from Pakistan and has been in Canada for two years, she was seeking to learn more about what the importance the land has to aboriginal peoples and to understand more about the country she now calls home. "And to share experiences," she said.

Ping Chen is originally from China, now living in Markham and working as a social worker. "My job is counselling," she said. "I am interested in hearing the stories, you learn a lot about people from them."

Sage Petahtegoose's ancestors come from the Island and she was seeking to learn more from the traditional knowledge keepers that they got to visit. She found the group's visit to Dreamer's Rock to be one of the most moving and informative activities, as much from opportunity to share with the other members of the group in a more reflective and

unstructured period.

within buildings and close spaces.

Among the most moving experiences for the group was a visit to the Spanish residential school and to hear from former students.

What came as a very big surprise was that not all of the stories were negative, unlike what comes across in the media. But there were harrowing tales and the juxtaposition of pain and joy were also very enlightening.

"When they told me they would start each morning at the school by sliding down the fire pole, I don't know what I thought," said one participant, "but then when the elder pointed out the pole to me at the ruins, I did not realize just how high up it was."

The program schedule was deliberately designed to have one day of fairly intense interactions and then one day with a less harrowing schedule or program within which to heal.

As they sat within the walls of the tipi they had helped erect, the team members were briefed on Chief Debassige's interpretation of what reconciliation means to her community and the people around her.

The gist of her comments was that the process of discovering what that means, beyond nice words, is a journey just begun.

"Reconciliation started with the apology by then Prime Minister Stephen Harper," said Chief Debassige. "It really signalled a shift in Canada." But going forward, she notes, it is still not clear what actions lie behind those words. "There are still folks feeling the impact of the residential school system, it is intergenerational."

Chief Debassige took the group through a short history of the patrimonial approach that Canada has taken with the First Nations and indigenous people. That approach has not changed all that much up until the present day. "Since the inception of the Indian Act successive governments have made changes and they did so without consulting us," she said. "They are still doing that up to the present day. They continue to label us."

But she did describe the adoption by Canada of the United Nations Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples as "a pivotal moment for Canada."

Because of the damage done by the systems of colonization, beyond simply the residential school system, there is much reconciliation that must take place within First Nations communities themselves, before they can even really begin to look at what reconciliation means in relation to Canada itself. "The process of reconciliation is off to a slow start," she said. "There is a lot of hurt." Chief Debassige noted that "there is a lot of trauma in myself."

As to what reconciliation means to aboriginal peoples, "there is no collective agreement as to what that means."

The group spent two days in M'Chigeeng, another in Aundeck Omni Kaning and overnight in the tipi, the setting up of which involved the group getting a close personal introduction to the ubiquitous Northern Ontario mosquito, but the pesky creatures had abated by the time they bunked down.

## Noojmowin Teg-Mnaamodzawin Health Centre building expansion completed

MANITOULIN—The Noojmowin Teg-Mnaamodzawin Health Centre in Aundeck Omni Kaning has recently expanded to meet the growing needs of the organizations and the individuals they serve.

Noojmowin Teg-Mnaamodzawin Executive Director Pamela Williamson took The Expositor on a tour of the new \$2.36 million 4,400 square foot expansion, explaining the roles of the two organizations and the services they provide.



The entrance on the right is the 4,400 square foot expansion, while the far left provides the entrance for the original building.

"We have been working on this expansion since 2005 and in 2010 we were transferred to the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC) and became eligible for funding," said Ms. Williamson.

She explained that Mnaamodzawin and Noojmowin Teg are separate organizations, but are housed together and

agreed to expand together if one of them were able to obtain funding.

As both organizations are housed together and share common spaces, there is often confusion over what each organization's role is.

Ms. Williamson said one of the main differences between the two organizations is that Noojmowin Teg is funded provincially, while Mnaamodzawin is funded federally

Noojmowin Teg serves all the First Nations, working with three main health authorities: the Nahndahweh Tchigehgaming Wikwemikong Health Centre, M'Chigeeng Health Services and Mnaamodzawin.

Mnaamodzawin provides health services for the five area First Nations that don't have their own health authorities including Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK), Sheguiandah, Zhiibaahahasing, Sheshegwaning and Whitefish River

Noojmowin Teg is made up of several departments, which include: primary care (physicians and nurses), allied health, the diabetes wellness team, aging at home, community dietitians, traditional medicine, mental health and addictions and health promotion.

"The new building (addition) includes a multi-purpose room which we can use for workshops or meetings," said Ms. Williamson. "Previously we had to use the AOK Community Centre for meetings. We had staff offices and clinic rooms mixed, but now they are in separate areas."

Noojmowin Teg has grown so rapidly, from 12 employees in 1999 to 35 this year, that some had offices in cubicles behind the building, but the new addition is able to house 15 providers.

Within the new addition there is a primary care wing, clinic area (including medical examination room), mental health and counselling area (which also includes equipment to access the Ontario Telemedical Network) and traditional medicine area (including a healing lodge).

"We had the bathroom built (in the clinic area) to meet requirements to serve sexual assault or physical violence patients in the future or methadone clients if the need arises in the future," Ms. Williamson said. "Currently anyone (non-aboriginal individuals as well) who requires a rape kit must travel to Sudbury to Health Sciences North. We are looking for funding to help bridge that gap and hopefully to be able to provide that service in the future."

The healing lodge is available for meditation and is also used to give teachings, while the cedar room is a traditional healing clinic including services such as energy work and cedar baths. A garden outside the cedar room will be the future home of a traditional medicine garden, Ms.



The large healing lodge was designed taking in elements from several other healing lodges throughout the area and is used for meditation, traditional medicine and teachings.

Williamson noted.

Ms. Williamson stressed the importance of ensuring that staff are healthy at the Noojmowin Teg-Mnaamodzawin Health Centre and that smudges are done on the building when there is a need and that the healing lodge and teachings are available to them.

"It is important that the people providing health services to our community members are healthy," the ED reiterated

Moving forward Ms. Williamson sees further growth for Noojmowin Teg, finding gaps and continuing to create a circle of care for patients through working with Island partners





#### **Bay Street bylaw**

Council held a public comments section at its July 5 meeting regarding Bylaw 16-08 to restrict common law access and the passage of the public over a portion of Bay Street in Manitowaning.

The bylaw states that the portion of road shall be controlled by way of a gate "and access will be granted only to those whose property abuts the said portion of road.

Anna Maria Peca, a seasonal resident with a cottage on Bay Street, whose property is one that abuts the road, shared her concerns with council.

Ms. Peca told council she requires the road to be open, otherwise she has no access to property. She noted her annoyance at the lack of communication between her and the municipality.

"I need to know what your plans are," she addressed council.

Alton Hobbs, Assiginack CAO, stated that staff's recommendation is to put a gate across Bay Street for the next few weeks, at least while swimming lessons are taking place. Ms. Peca would get a key for the gate. The other two recommendations on offer were: leave the situation as is or close Bay Street and provide access off of Lecourt Street to Ms. Peca's summer residence.

Ms. Peca said that by staff changing the layout of the road in recent years, they have in turn made it more accessible to residents who are using it in greater numbers. "There's also now erosion," she said, citing environmental concerns.

Councillor Leslie Fields said her biggest concern is that people come and park behind the beach area where kids can run out into traffic, saying she finds it a "risky situation" when there are kids at play involved.

'You can't put me into a position where I can't access my property," Ms. Peca declared.

"You're a good public citizen and we don't want to deny you access," Councillor Fields said.

Ms. Peca questioned the liabilities involved with having a gated access and emergency vehicles trying to enter through when a key is needed.

Later in the meeting, council passed the bylaw to see the road limited by gate access. Councillor Moggy opposed the motion.

#### Parents' Council requests funding

The cost of the purchase is \$4,500 with installation provided at no charge by the Rainbow District School Board. Mr. Gibeault asked that council consider chipping in with half the amount at \$2,500.

It is their hope to have it installed by September.

Mayor Moffatt said it was unfortunate that they did not

come to council before the budget was passed.

Mr. Hobbs suggested that council defer making a decision until the first meeting in August as they will know their financial situation after the awarding of contracts for municipal projects.

Councillor Moggy suggested that council might be able to find the funds.

"We're a small community, and a third of our people can't afford their water bills—it's going to bankrupt us," Mayor Moffatt told the MPP.

He told council he was going to suggest a private member's bill that would see a province-wide average set that was fair. Small townships would then see the rest of the amount needed to cover their bills bolstered by the province. Mayor Moffatt noted the number of residents in arrears and the obsolete equipment housed within their treatment plants.



# 'Caring for the older adult with diabetes' workshops on offer

MANITOULIN—According to the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Studies, Manitoulin Island is number one for diabetes prevalence in the province of Ontario. Most people are aware that uncontrolled diabetes can lead to serious health complications. What many people may not realize is that older adults have special considerations for diabetes care and management.

In 2013, the Canadian Diabetes Association updated their clinical practice guidelines to reflect specific messages targeted at care for the older adult. A workshop was recently held with staff and residents at the Manitoulin Lodge nursing home to discuss these recommendations. This article represents some of the information that was shared with staff, residents and community members interesting in learning about caring for the older adult with diabetes.

Diabetes is associated with the aging process and rates generally increase with age. This is extremely relevant for healthcare provision on Manitoulin as seniors comprise a significant proportion of the current demographic. According to projections by the Ministry Ontario Finance, the number of people aged 65 years and older living on Manitoulin will increase by approximately 790 individuals by the year 2020. This is expected to translate to even higher rates of diabetes on Manitoulin Island.

Individuals with diabetes should have their health closely monitored to prehealth problems caused by uncontrolled blood sugar levels. All individuals who have diabetes should be seen by a healthcare provider every three months or so. However, diabetes in the elderly is metabolically distinct from diabetes in younger people and the approach to therapy should be different. For example, older adults are at higher risk for having severe hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) which can pose serious health conse-

quences. Also, many older adults do not physiologically recognize the symptoms of low blood sugar which places them at additional risks. For these reasons, the Canadian Diabetes Association advises that it is acceptable for older adults to have higher blood sugar targets than vounger adults with diabetes, depending on their level of frailty. Patients are encouraged to discuss what targets they should be aiming for with their health care provider or diabetes education team. Furthermore, another consideration in caring for the older adult with diabetes is the type of medication being used to lower blood sugar. Due to the increased risks of low blood sugars observed in seniors, older adults are advised to avoid certain older versions of blood sugar lowering pills and insulins associated with higher rates of low blood sugars. Extended release versions of medications, classes of medications that don't cause low blood sugars and analogue insulins are the current preferred methods of treatment.

Most people are aware that diet is another extremely important consideration for diabetes management. Another update to the practice guidelines is the general liberalization of diet recommendations for older adults, especially those living in nursing homes. studies Recent have demonstrated no superior benefit to serving patients a "diabetic diet" over a regular diet. Regular, balanced meals appear to offer a universal benefit without the need for additional restrictions or special foods typically recommended in the past. Examples of these principles were reviewed with participants of the workshop.

A common concern for individuals with diabetes is how to adjust care during periods of illness. Many people are not sure what medications they should take or hold if feeling unwell and unable to eat or drink. One concern during periods of acute illness is dehydration, which can pose serious health consequences in the older

Designated Early Childhood Educators are represented by the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario Rainbow Local. They engage students in learning activities in Kindergarten classrooms in partnership with teachers.

The new deal, once ratified, will be in effect from September 1, 2014 to August 31, 2017, aligning with the provincial settlements at the central bargaining table.

"Our Designated Early Childhood Educators play a valued role in the delivery of Kindergarten programs in Rainbow Schools," said Rainbow District School Board Chair Doreen Dewar. "We commend the bargaining teams from the Board and the Union for working together to achieve this tentative agreement. Once ratified, we will have concluded local agreements with all of our unions."

adult. Generally speaking, individuals with diabetes are recommended to continue to take insulin doses as prescribed during illness but to increase frequency of self-monitoring of blood sugars. Certain types of medications should be held if fluids are not being tolerated. Contacting a health care provider is recommended under the following conditions: intolerance of fluids, unable to bring blood sugar down with insulin/fluids, unable to bring blood sugar up to 4.0 mmol/L, rapid respiration or persistent fever. Individuals with diabetes are recommended to meet with their health care provider or diabetes education team to come up with an individ-

ualized "sick day" management plan.

The workshop was well received and a repeat session is planned in future. Individuals, organizations or groups are encouraged to contact the MHC Diabetes Training and Care Centre for information from a registered nurse or registered dietitian trained to provide specialized care in diabetes management.

# Wireless writing program networks across the grades

WIKWEMIKONG—Take a class of Grade 6 students, mix liberally with a group of Grade 2 mentors, add a dash of technology and what do you get? A group of intensely engaged youth learning from each other as they create a series of non-fiction books targeted at the interests of the seven-year-old set.

"Engaged" is the key byword here. Stepping into Pontiac School teacher Natalie Eshkawkogan's Grade 6 class during a group session with Wasse Abin Junior School teacher Nicole Peltier's Grade 2 class taking part in the innovative Wireless Writing Program you are immediately struck with the focussed attention of the participants.

The Wireless Writing Program is a project that saw students from the Pontiac Grade 5 and 6 classes paired with Grade 1 and 2 students from Wasse Abin Junior School to create non-fiction books focussed on subjects that captured the imaginations of the younger students.

Pontiac Principal Mackenzie Sayers noted that the project is utilizing the Microsoft Office 365 Suite that the Wikwemikong School Board of Education (WBE) has standardized on, with most of the students creating their non-fiction books in Power-Point.

"This program really

does have the students engaged," said Alison Biedermann, a primary learning teacher with the WBE who, along with Cathy Harley, have been working through the First Nation Student Success Program. The First Nation Student Success Program (FNSSP) is designed to support First educators on Nation reserve (Kindergarten to Grade 12) in their ongoing efforts to meet students' needs and improve student and school results and is funded through the federal ministry of Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada.

"The goal of the project was to have our students continue to grow as critical thinkers and create non-fiction books for a real audience," noted Pontiac Principal Mackenzie Sayers. "Each Grade 4/5/6 classes (six in total, two at each grade level) paired up with a class at the Junior school (Grades 1, 2 and 3, two classes of each) and met with their audience during the writing process. The teachers who had their students participate as audience members included: Stephen Fox (Grade 1), Laura Hagman (Grade 1), Nicole Peltier (Grade 2), Lisa Bondy (Grade 2), Tracy Cooper (Grade 3) and Maureen Peltier (Grade 3). Our classes visited through trips to the school and also through Skype sessions."

The pride of creation among the young students taking part in the program is impossible to miss, as Grade 6 student Isaiah Bell takes his Grade 2 colleagues Eldon Pitawanakwat and Johnathan Osawamick-

Trudeau through his nonfiction book entitled 'Savannah Cats.' "It's good," pronounces Johnathan with typical Grade 2 critical brevity before turning back to the action unfolding onscreen.

Meanwhile, Brandy Jawana is going over her creation, 'Fennec Fox.' Brandy explains that it took her about a week to research the information and illustrations in her book from the Internet. The first phase goes back months, however, as the student authors engaged with their Grade 2 counterparts over the Internet through Skype last February to learn what subjects might interest them (the two schools are less than a half-kilometre apart physically, but the opportunity to learn about another Internet tool and the communications skills involved in finding out what interests a six- seven-year-old added different skillsets to the program). The list of subject matters contained in the works of non-fiction created by the students is as eclectic as might be expected. Arianna Recollect's work 'Bunnies' contains an impressive table of contents, timelines (prominently featuring that famous cartoon icon of the genre Bugs), and boasts categories such as healthy food, toys and houses.

"Did you know that we have bunnies here that live

in a hole?" asks Arianna as she explores the book with Johnathan. Maps of the globe show graphically where various bunny species can be found. With a subject matter that can be found farther afield, Autumn Peltier's work explores the wonders of 'Sun Bears.'

By focusing on the interests of the students and leveraging technology for its implementation, the Wireless Writing Program skillfully bounds over any elementary level barriers, creating not only technological and communication skills, but also building social connections between the age groups

the age groups. "Our June 15 festivities allowed for the authors of our non-fiction books to share their digital books with their audience and we had the students provide feedback through a form," said Principal Sayers. "With this information each student will make revisions to their book before they go to print. We are also hoping to share our books through an internal website so that all books can be read by other classes other than the ones within the project."

The seeds of Canada's next great non-fiction writer could very likely be nurtured through innovative projects like the Wireless Writing Program, especially if the level of engagement is any indica-

teachers, hope our participants become life long learners after being welcomed, and experiencing the services of our local library."



# Artist Kathy Dolan reveals the secrets to pastels at La Cloche show workshop

WHITEFISH FALLS—You could literally hear the pastels scrape across the paper set on the easel in the Whitefish Falls Fire Hall as this year's La Cloche Art Show Distinguished Artist Kathy Dolan delivered a workshop on how she creates her award winning landscapes.

"I prefer landscapes to doing portraits (trees don't argue)," she joked to the packed house leaning forward in their chairs to hang on her every word.

Ms. Dolan loved to draw as a child and enjoyed art classes she took throughout high school, but today she found herself in the accustomed role of teacher (she teaches art classes during the winter in Florida).

"I find that you learn so much from teaching," she said.

Although marriage, work and the rigours of raising a family forced her to set aside her art aspirations for a while, by the late '90s she rekindled her passion for art when she took a watercolour course at a local college. It was at the 22nd LaCloche Art Show that she entered her first juried show. That piece not only gained a treasured spot on the hallowed walls of the show, it also quickly garnered a red dot (sold).

Ms. Dolan has gone on to master many mediums through countless workshops and classes, developing an innate sense of life and light in her works. She holds a Master Pastellist designation with the Pastel Artists of Canada and is a signature member of the Society of Canadian Artists, is a member of the Northern Ontario Art Association, the Pencil Art Society, the Sudbury Art Club and Sudbury Art Council.

Ms. Dolan noted that she uses sanded paper from Uart as a base for her works. "I find it holds a lot of layers," she said. "You can put multiple layers if you apply the pastel light enough. If I only use one type of paper, I would use that."

As to pastels, Ms. Dolan tends to the midrange weight, stepping down to

softer weight for the later stages. "The softer pastels have less binder, but they are more expensive," she said. Quality art calls for quality materials, the Diane Townsend pastels can cost upwards of \$20 a stick. "There are also NuPastel that are very good, but not so expensive."

Ms. Dolan explained the use of underpaintings, placing a preliminary painting on the paper (in pastel or even watercolour or acrylic) that can add depth and warmth of colour to the created image if the layers of pastel are applied with the right weight.

By spraying water (or alcohol) on the image, the pastels can be placed in discrete layers without them blending, even after the coating dries. Ms. Dolan eschews the use of fixative coatings on her works. "I find they change the colour registers," she said. "I have tried many different kinds and ways of doing it. It has never worked out for me."

Ms. Dolan places a sheet of translucent tissue paper over the works for transport and when matting the work, she creates an innovative gap between the face of the work and the matt. "That way any dust falls between the crack and not on the edge of the matt."

Following her workshop presentation, Ms. Dolan spoke with the artists one on one, while attendees poured over the materials and works that she had on display.

A number of Ms. Dolan's works can be seen hanging in the current La Cloche Art Show that runs to Sunday, July 10 and raffle tickets can be pur-
