# Police suspect arson involved in four fires at unoccupied camps in same Island region

**by Alicia McCutcheon**MANITOULIN—The

Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the Office of the Fire Marshal are investigating four fires in the Rockville and Spring Bay areas that have each been deemed suspicious, but police are hesitant to call them related incidents.

The first fire was reported on the evening of June 6, just after 11 pm, to the Northeast Town Fire Department which responded to find an unoccupied log structure on Rockville Road fully engulfed in flames. While there, firefighters noted what appeared to be another fire visible across Lake Manitou. No calls were reported for this fire, but it was noted to the OPP by the Northeast Town Fire Department.

Because of the time of night, the fact the log building was unoccupied and due to the lack of electricity servicing the building, Northeast Town Fire Chief Duane Deschamps alerted the police to the suspicious nature of the fire.

On June 11, the OPP helicopter was dispatched to survey the area and discovered the scene of the other Rockville fire, on Lucar Point Road, on Lake Manitou. It was a summer home and it had sustained significant damage, reports OPP Community Services Officer Constable Marie Ford.

Then, on June 14, once again

just after 11 pm, the Central Manitoulin Fire Department received a call about two fires on Learmont Road in Spring Bay. Both seasonal residences were close in proximity and both sustained significant damage, explained Constable

Ford. Learmont Road runs between Monument Road and Perivale Road East.

# Canada refutes Michael's Bay sale rumours

# Wiikwemkoong involved in consultations about historic lands

OTTAWA—Rumours have been persisting around the Island that the Michael's Bay townsite property has been sold or transferred to another government agency in preparation of being added to the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territories. Inquiries to both the federal agency currently responsible for the property that was seized by Canada on behalf of the Belgian government as proceeds of crime and Wiikwemkoong have not borne out those rumours

"Public Services and Procurement Canada's (PSPC) Seized Property Management Directorate (SPMD) is committed to managing assets seized or restrained under specific sections of the Criminal Code, the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act and the Proceeds of Crime (Money-Laundering) and Terrorist Financing Act," notes an email reply from Michèle LaRose, spokesperson for the SPMD.

"No, the property has not been sold to the Depart-

# Central will truck garbage to private off-Island landfill

Council agrees to send 60% to private site

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—A long-anticipated pilot project aimed at shipping 40 yards of waste to a commercial landfill outside of the municipality in order to divert it from the fast-filling municipal landfill is now underway in Central Manitoulin.

Council passed a motion authorizing the one-year Garbage Haulage Pilot Project to proceed on the estimated costs of tipping set at \$800 a week and transportation of \$120 a week. The motion was moved by Councillor Alex Baran and Councillor Derek Stephens and passed

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#### Island-born teacher crafts colourful, mythical tale in debut novel

MANITOULIN—'Watermark,' the debut novel by Manitoulin-born Jennifer Farquhar, is a coming of age story 20 years after the fact. It is a loving tribute to growing up in Northern Ontario (on Manitoulin Island) in the 1970s and 80s, and to the unique relationships forged between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples living side-by-side in a magical although occasionally terrifying – landscape.

Marina McInnis is an adult whose growth was stunted at the age of 14, when her life was transformed by a series of tragic incidents that caused her to run away and build herself a new life.

Circumstances force her return to the island 20 years later, towing along her adored but precocious teenage son. Although she initially refuses to face the past, the past comes to her, as it is prone to do. Marina is required to re-examine her role in the tragedies and unravel the truth to events that were put in motion before her time.

Ms. Farquhar's prose lovingly dances over the geography of her own childhood, revisiting the activities of her youth: gathering morels, deer hunting, ice fishing, the smelt run, snowmobiling, boating and the realities of local children mixing with wealthier tourists for that short summer season each year. She lingers over childhood tales that explore sometimes dark Anishinabe lore made darker by a natural childish propensity to embellish

It is the juxtaposition of beauty and childish inno-

cence beside the horrors of events that unfold over several summers on Mickinaak Island, a stand-in for Manitoulin, that makes this novel so compelling. What actually occurs, and the guilt that is placed on the shoulders of a child, ultimately cause Marina to choose running away as the best option throughout

Anyone who has experienced a long separation from home understands that feeling of being torn, of nostalgia for one's roots – of imagining things will stay the same. Hoping that they have while feeling a little frightened that they are. Revisiting the places that once held deep mysteries but now appear benign. How does one find out what really happened in that far off childhood? How real are the memories that haunt us? Yet it is her homecoming that sets in motion the unraveling of the truth and ultimately, Marina's redemption and discovery of a place to call

Those who have made the journey home, who have felt loss and renewal, or who are especially nostalgic for life in the 1970s, and particularly enjoying the beauty and wonder of Manitoulin Island, will enjoy this story from beginning to end. Jennifer Farquhar is a masterful storyteller who will take you on a

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# Former child refugee and art teacher Peter Bering is this year's Lacloche Juried Art Show featured artist

WHITEFISH FALLS—It's a long road from drawing rabbits in the dirt with a stick at a Communist concentration camp in Tito's Yugoslavia to featured artist at one of Northern Ontario's premier juried art exhibits, but for Peter Bering it has been a very rewarding journey.

Mr. Bering was born in Molin, Yugoslavia to a prosperous family of Schwabian farmers and his first memories of drawing were as a precocious four-year-old child drawing pictures on the ground for the other children in the camp.

Soon Mr. Bering would be holding his mother's and grandmother's hand as they made their way across the rough and wild Yugoslav wilderness to slip into Austria as refugees, finally making their way to Canada in 1941.

I remember the art teacher in my school had gotten a watercolour set and when the other children went outside to play baseball he asked if anyone wanted to try their hand at art," recalled Mr. Bering. "When the teacher saw what I had drawn he

asked where I had studied art. He didn't believe me when I told him I never had."

The teacher took Mr. Bering's artwork and, using his own money for the entry fee, put it in a local art competition. "That is how I won my first prize, I had come first in the West Lorne Fair of 1953," he said. He has never looked back.

He went on to become an arts educator himself, teaching for 34 years with the Windsor Board of Education after attending university at Windsor, Wayne State in Michigan and the Ontario College of Art And Design. He has also taught drawing and painting at the Art Gallery of Windsor as well as prospective art teachers at the Windsor faculty and the Ministry of Education. But through it all he has continued to pursue his own love of the canvas and his works hang in private and public galleries across North America and Europe.

"I just completed my 599th work," he said.

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#### Department of Natural Resources court challenge seeks to derail Wisconsin Great Lakes water diversion proposal

MADISON, WI—A legal challenge to Wisconsin's approval of a seven million gallon ply a Foxconn industrial complex moved a step forward this week when Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) notified Midwest Environmental Advocates that its request for a contested case hearing had been granted, according to a press release from the Midwest Environmental Advocates. The contested diversion would send seven million gallons of water each day from Lake Michigan to an industrial site in Racine, Wisconsin and out of the Great Lakes Basin, against the spirit of the Great Lakes Compact.

The DNR will soon be forwarding the case to the Division of Hearings and Appeals where a judge will be assigned to oversee the proceedings.

"The DNR's decision to grant our petiper day Great Lakes water diversion to suptioners' request is welcome news," stated tion, the DNR ignored a key Great Lakes ney, Jodi Habush Sinykin, in the press release, "and it comes at a time of renewed support around the region for a strong Great Lakes Compact, whose core principles are honored in keeping with the letter and spirit of the agreement.'

On May 25, Midwest Environmental Advocates filed a legal action on behalf of petitioners, Milwaukee Riverkeeper, League of Women Voters of Wisconsin, River Alliance of Wisconsin and Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy, to challenge the Wisconsin DNR's approval of the City of Racine's request to divert Lake Michigan water to supply the Foxconn

facility, which will use the proposed facility to make LED screens. According to the peti-Compact (a legally binding in pact among the U.S. states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin to implement the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin Water Agreement which includes the Canadian Provinces Ontario and Quebec) requirement that any water diverted outside the Great Lakes basin must serve a public purpose, defined in the agreement as 'serving a group of largely residential customers." As stated in the petition, the seven million gallons per day of diverted water requested by Racine will be provided to one

private industrial user, Foxconn, rather to than a group of households.

"We determined it vital to challenge Wisnsin's approval of the diversi ed for Foxconn," said Jimmy Parra, staff attorney for Midwest Environmental Advocates, "because Wisconsin DNR's interpretation of public water supply purposes, if not corrected, creates a glaring loophole that opens our region to a potential onslaught of diversions to other private entities, jeopardizing the intent and integrity of the Great Lakes Compact."

"It's not right for one state to redefine the rules for the Great Lakes Compact without ...continued on page 10

On June 14, the Central Manitoulin municipal council passed a motion moved by Councillor Ted Taylor and Councillor Linda Farquhar that the proposed new sidewalk would run from the intersection of Highway 542 and Highway 551 north to the Mindemoya hospital.

"This does line up with the end of the sidewalk where the student crossing is located," said Councillor Derek Stephens. "It seems the most logical place to put the new sidewalk."

"It does seem to be the best option," agreed Councillor Ted Taylor.

#### CM council applies for funding for Union Road Bridge

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Although the main impact of the weight limitations on the Union Road Bridge tend to fall on the residents of a neighbouring municipality, Central Manitoulin council passed a motion instructing staff to apply for funding to replace the bridge. Councillor Derek Stephens moved the motion, seconded by Councillor Alex Baran.

"I hope the government does realize that their new bus route that they put in can't cross that bridge with the weight restriction," said Councillor Stephens. We are asking Burpee Mills to write a letter of support for the project," said CAO Ruth

Frawley. "It does impact the ratepayers in that community the most."

The new Manitoulin bus route put in place by Ontario Northland was required to cancel the Evansville leg of the route due to the 10-ton weight restrictions placed on the Union Road Bridge as their 30-passenger bus weighs in at 15 tons.

# Human trafficking is taking place in our back yard

women into slavery in a bordello of the Casaba has been a staple of international travel since before the age of Victoria, but for Anishnabe-kwe that fate is an all-too-real danger to be encountered in just about any urban centre in Canada.

That such a situation could exist even here on Manitoulin, in nearby Sudbury, in Sault Ste. Marie, and is not restricted to such exotic locales as Thunder Bay or Toronto will no doubt come as a surprise to too many of our readers. But the truth, unpalatable as it may be, is that human trafficking is taking place in all of our communities, right under our noses, and for far too many of the victims and their families, the systemic racism that exists in our society blinds us to

So abhorrent is the concept of human trafficking and the recruitment of young children into the sex trade that we seek to find excuses for our inaction on this file. We look to blame the victim, seeking to wash complicity from our hands through statistics that justify our inaction and wilful ignorance. This past weekend, Dr. Lavell-Harvard sought to tear some of the blinders from our eyes by turning statistics on their head at the first human trafficking conference held in Aundeck Omni Kaning. By a factor of many hundreds of percent the vast majority of the missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls were not engaged in the sex trade, were not engaged in illegal commerce and were not the victims of their own families or partners.

We choose to believe otherwise because, at our core, we buy into the systemic racism that pervades our society. We need to strip the blinders of racism from our eyes and to begin to honestly tackle the damage that has been caused by the sins of our fathers and by through our own wilful ignorance.

Ms. Lavell-Harvard referenced the story of the hummingbird who sought to put out a forest fire by carrying a tiny amount of water in its beak to drop on the conflagration. Asked why she was engaged in such a futile task the hummingbird responded that she was doing the

But put simply, when it comes to the issue of human trafficking and the sex trade, we are not even beginning to approach the meagre efforts of that hummingbird. We are simply turning a blind eye and hoping that it is someone else's problem, someone else's responsibility. It is not. We own it. It is ours and we need to face up to that fact and start doing something about it.

If we are shamed by the spectre of international agencies pointing fingers at us and shining a light on our failures, our response cannot be to claim that those agencies are flawed. The flaw lies within ourselves and the society we have built. It is long past time for Canadians, yes that includes us Manitoulin, to undertake some deeply thought out renovations to our society.

What can we do? How can our little hummingbird beaks make a difference?

We can stop legitimizing the racism by staying silent when a friend makes a racist joke. We can refuse to laugh and pass on the social media memes that dehumanize and reduce human beings to objects. We can start with all those little things in our lives that seem so harmless and "fun" that reflect negative stereotypes.

We can tell our children that they are beautiful and deserve to be treated with respect. That they should be proud of who they are and where they come from—that they are not objects to be bought and sold for sexual gratification. We can start so very much younger than we do now, because as Ms. Lavell-Harvard pointed out, children as young as eight are being victimized. We need to open up these difficult conversations and get past our own discomfort with the subject

We can send an email to our MPP and MP, heck, why stop there? In this day of Internet connectivity, we can send our outrage to all of our political representatives with just a little bit of effort.

We can and must do better—we must each and every one of us strive to do the best that we can.

# Lateral violence has reached epidemic proportions in our societies

Ontario Aboriginal Housing has overstepped its bounds on privacy

To the Expositor:

No matter how it is defined, lateral violence is a crime. It has reached epidemic proportions in our societies and if not addressed, we can expect high statistics in youth suicide, depression, alcoholism, child neglect and rape. These have become evident already as some of the consequences of unresolved violent behaviour.

Lateral violence is a learned destructive behaviour and takes on a number of different toxic characteristics. It is any action that is meant to deliberately demean or harm a person's self-image by ridicule or any other manipulative action usually to induce fear and anxiety and by this tactic, the abuser will gain power over another individual's life. Some lateral violence practices include harassment, threats, bullying and other degrading forms of molestation. In its extreme form, lateral violence can be a conscious, deliberate act of aggression with intent to harm, hurt and debilitate another person's character and self-esteem.

Chief Andrew Agonuie has been very successful in resolving issues of lateral violence on Sheguiandah First Nation. Why has he been so

His success is mainly due to his open door policy, "I leave the door open so anyone can come in and talk to me about anything that is on

'My main job as chief is to listen to the people," he says. The chief understands human nature. He knows that in being heard is being valued as a person. And it works. Lateral violence is not tolerated on Sheguiandah First Nation.

Recently, in my own experience, I received a phone call, on April 20, 2018, from a woman who said she was doing a survey and would like to ask me few questions about Ontario Aboriginal Housing (OAH). She had all my contact information. I asked her how she got this information. "Your name is on my list," she said. I learned the list was compiled by OAH. I had not given OAH permission to put my name on that list.

As a reward in participating in the survey, I was offered a \$30 gift card from Walmart. That was the price OAH put on myself as a person. I was sold for 30 pieces of silver.

I feel that the indiscriminate use of my personal information is a violation of my basic human rights and should not be tolerated by anyone. The experience left me feeling vulnerable and de-valued as a commodity to be bought and sold.

The power in governance becomes dangerous when it becomes uncontrolled and directed at the weakest portion of society, the disenfranchised. OAH has been mandated to protect their tenants and their rights under the Human Rights Code.

It is my opinion, that by requisitioning this survey, OAH is aware of serious problems in the administration of their policies and procedures that have profoundly affected their tenants.

I know I am not the only one who has suffered abuse caused by lateral

# Canada's commitment to the Coast Guard is embarassingly inadequate

The prime minister seems determined to shore up the 71 percent American owned tar sand projects

#### To the Expositor:

Voter pushback continues against the consequences of "global warming." Despite feel good promises, the Canadian government's neo-colonial suppression of First Nations communities marches on. Politicians and the corporate media find this inconsequential to the obsession with sustaining the yearly burden of billions of dollars in obscene corporate welfare and propping up of a doomed global fossil fuel industry.

As a lifelong lover of nature and water sports, years ago I had a profound experience as a volunteer with the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary on the west coast of British Columbia. I continue to be outraged that previous Liberal and Conservative governments have contributed to the ongoing reduction in funding for Canada's Coast Guard. Despite the stalwart efforts of devoted volunteers, there is still a minimal coast guard presence on either the coastal salt water or central Great Lakes fresh water territories. An improved "search and rescue" capacity for both commercial shipping and recreational boating, let alone the monitoring and maintenance of the sovereignty of Canadian water, is more necessary than ever.

The Harper Conservative government did initiate a grand gesture to respond to concern for Canada's lack of presence in the Arctic. This was prompted by the beginning of international commercial shipping in the now thawed "Northwest Passage." However, the start of construction on one base on Baffin Island and the order of a few more "slush breakers" is embarrassingly insufficient. Improving support for the people who actually live in the Canadian Arctic and a reduction in the outrageously

expensive northern transportation costs, should be considered

Due to spending my life by the water in rural parts of the country, I'm unimpressed by the cavalier attitude of provincial and federal governments to the desperate need for greater protection for those who ply the water, let alone the water itself. Major investment is required to build various Coast Guard bases on each of the Great Lakes, let alone throughout the Arctic, the B.C. and Maritime coasts. Manitoulin Island is perfectly situated for a central base and "Coast Guard Training Centre," to spearhead this initiative. (How could we afford this? Note rant on "corporate welfare")

For years, Canadian governments have acquiesced passively to the dominance of our neighbour to the south. The sham re-negotiation of the "NAFTA" free trade deal bogs down in schoolyard antics over mutually self-destructive tariffs. Nothing is mentioned about the continued corporate rape of Canada's natural resources. Despite Trump's uninformed opinion to the contrary, Canada has maintained a consistently balanced trade relationship with the United States for the past thirty years.

Prime Minister Trudeau, despite endless broken campaign promises, is now lionized for "standing up to the bullying isolationist rhetoric of President Trump." Meanwhile, Justin Trudeau pursues the ill-advised decision to squander \$4.5 billion dollars on bailing out the wealthy

American owned Kinder Morgan Inc. pipeline company, despite continued wide spread resistance. The massive environmental damage by the Alberta Tar Sands alone, continues to be a contentious subject of conversation.

Purchasing this pipeline will do nothing to improve rock bottom prices and a hoped for increase in profits of the low grade unrefined bitumen goop from the Tar Sands. pursuing Big Oil's cherished dream of sending more of its least wanted oil products to new Asian markets, already awash with other cheaper, higher value oil options, is delusional.

Another important related issue, hovering below the radar of the mainstream corporate media, is the continued determination of the United States to divert fresh water from the Great Lakes basin.

# A tribute in memorium of an Island pioneer

#### A Manitoulin tale of triumph and tragedy

To the Expositor:

A memorial to George Raymond White

Born 1897, died April 1975

On a wintry morning in February the 9th, in the year 1897 to pioneering parents, in that remote part of the Manitoulin Island, Ten Mile Point, a young man was born destined for life far beyond local imagination. A man of integrity, destiny, ambition and responsibility. Local imagination could not see his future with neighbouring economies, nor his part in world conflict. Nor to a great extent would they!

This young man at a very early age saw the opportunity for homesteading in the farther northern regions of Ontario and there applied himself. For so many acres at a price, if the new homesteader cleared a given amount of land and built a home, he was given a clear title within a given amount of time. The properties at the time were all virgin land. A great amount would be old growth forests. Within a short period of time he with neighbouring homesteader friends developed a sawmill to meet their need. After a period of production, the mill was sold, and I believe the owners all enlisted in the army that was now being formed, one dollar and thirty cents, plus all requirements was a pretty handsome daily reward for the many who had little in 1915.

He enlisted in an infantry regiment and was sent for training. He rapidly became a drill sergeant and was posted back to train recruits on the Manitoulin Island. They were gathered at the time in the old arena where they gained their basic training. That training was up to sixteen weeks and they were then shipped overseas. Further battle ready training was limited and they were sent to the battlefront. As a fighting unit they saw action at Hill 70, Passchendaele and Vimy Ridge with great losses. This young man was seriously wounded at Vimy Ridge and carried off the field. He was sent back to England and hospitalized for recovery. Meanwhile, the message was sent back to his parents that he was in fact killed in action.

The family meanwhile contemplating a possible move to Green Bay from Ten Mile Point, now with the settlement of his Military Estate were able to conclude that transaction. Strangely enough, the soldier lived, but was now confined to hospital caught up in that Spanish Flu epidemic that killed more than all the losses during the war which was now ended. Sometime later he was heard to boast, out of

that huge ward of sickness, only he and one other survived.

Returning home again, he found some radicle changes and a less than welcome. A memorial service had been held when he was reported killed in action, and people were content with that conclusion. The military people were less than gentle about recovering his estate, regardless. of hardship. A returning battle scarred hero was less than welcome in his own home.

After a lengthy, although mostly by overseas mail romance, he married his bride of similar age and local background soon after his return from the hostile part of his life. Collin's Inlet opened a door of opportunity for both and they entered that opportunity as man and wife as they had become. His earlier experience with sawmills in the north gained him favor in this new situation. With the passage of time, nowever, nature takes its course and a move back to Little Current seemed a better move for medical services, as their firstborn was shortly introduced. A position at the Red Mill within the village opened for him, and a new home was purchased. Both the labour at the mill and the family prospered until the mill was totally destroyed by fire leaving the town in shock. Almost immediately he was hired by W.D. Richie and Son of the town to transport needed materials to the saw mill again at Collin's Inlet. He was heard to boast of being the first man to travel by car over the ice to Collin's Inlet. He had also mentioned going through the ice with a team of horses on his travels and coming back up through the same hole.

On April Fool's Day in the year 1930 a new venture was undertaken with the move to their newly purchased farm in Carnarvon Township. The pride and joy of each. The family settled in, and the livestock eventually filled the barn. Everything was labor intensive. The kitchen stove would fill the house with smoke at times of easterly winds. The wolves attacked the sheep. and the rooster attacked the kids. The depression was only surpassed by the dryness of the seasons and nothing seemed to have any value. Frequent unfortunate people arrived at the door and were not sent away hungry. One year the sheep were sheared and the fleeces washed by hand and sent away including some money and other things to a company in Owen Sound to be in exchange for knitting wool and a set of horse blankets so he could work with the horses in the bush in the wintertime. After much inquiry and waiting, the word came back,

the company had gone bankrupt. The prices that were required to pay for anything far exceeded any income available. The years 1936 to 1940 had a slow climb to recovery, but the romance of anticipating effort had faded dramatically. 1939 was a sad year with the war again in Europe. It was heard to say by man and wife as they met midway between house and barn, "do you suppose our son will have to go?" That son, and many others in the neighbourhood, soon became clad in military colours. The attraction for many was the \$1.30 per day and all found. Soon the prisoners of war required guarding and the call went out to the veterans with the same benefits packages. The earlier depression and unemployment provided a ready reserve for the ready need and the comfort of the benefits. On the farm, it was a chance to rise above the continual heavy lifting and low return. So, this man downsized his operation and followed the need like fresh air. He was posted periodically to different stations across Ontario and prospered. However, the situation back home needed care. With his discharge his wife soon became gravely ill and was committed to the sanatorium in Gravenhurst where she soon died on VJ day. The family home soon became a visiting place for members now dispersed. Eventually, the younger family member became the farmer while he bought a house in Providence Bay and retired. He died in

His name was George Raymond White. He was my father. I am

Raymond R. White London, Ontario

EDITOR'S NOTE: George White was a volunteer in the First World War, serving overseas and fighting at Passchendaele and the Somme battles. He survived a mustard gas attack and returned home to Manitoulin. During the Second World War, he again volunteered and served as a guard at the Espanola prisoner of war camp. He farmed at the southwest corner of Monument Road and Highway 542 and when the original cenotaph monument, which had been set in the centre of that intersection, was damaged by a vehicle collusion in the late 1950s, Mr. White donated the adjacent corner of his farm as a safer refuge for the monument, the same spot that now showcases the Manitoulin District Cenotaph.

#### OPP launches commercial vehicle enforcement campaign

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is set to conduct a robust Commercial Motor Vehicle (CMV) enforcement campaign, with their latest traffic data fueling their resolve to reduce the number of transport truck-related deaths on Ontario roads.

As officers gear up for Operation Corridor on all major truck routes in the province, they are reporting 25 fatal collisions that

involved a large transport truck this year, up 25 per cent since this time last year. The OPP has responded to a total of 3,047 transport truck-related crashes so far this year, with investigations pointing to the driver of the transport truck as the at-fault driver in a large number of the collisions.

"Poor driving behaviours and moving violations alone account for a large number of transport truck-related crashes every year," said OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Provincial Commander of Traffic Safety and Operational Support. "When other danger-

ous habits are thrown into the mix such as failure to adhere to vehicle maintenance, inspection and hours of service regulations as well as unsecured loads, it then becomes a question of when, not if more lives will be lost in serious transport truck collisions."

The OPP commends the many transport truck drivers who are committed to safe driving and other motorists who respect their space on the road and help keep Ontario roads safe.

# Tehkummah dismisses clerk Karen Gerrard.

(Editor's note: Only the above portion of the termination letter was provided to The Expositor).

October 2017 is when Ms. Gerrard moved boxes of municipal records marked for storage to a secure offsite location, under the authority of the Municipal 2001 and Act. Records Tehkummah's Retention Bylaw 2016-12. The township responded with a letter stating the removal of municipal records was without authority and requesting their immediate return.

The township letter to Ms. Gerrard noted they would "seek our full rights in law should you fail to return the Township property immediately.'

Ms. Gerrard told The Expositor she felt threatened by this and contacted the Ministry of Labour for guidance. The ministry ordered an investigation into the complaint of workplace harassment on October 30 with Ms. Gerrard as complainant and five members of council and municipal staff as respondents.

"I had inherited a municipal governance and administration that did not know their roles and responsibilities and existed in a culture of toxic chaos, without clear procedures and policies in place to guide their explained Ms. actions," Gerrard. "This was evidenced by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs (and Housing) report which was presented (to council) in April 2018."

"As I questioned how things were done," she continued, "people became intimidated, felt threatened and then became defensive, attacking my credibility and integrity. Many municipal administrators are subjected to workplace harassment by council members yet there is no real mechanism to address and resolve the situation. The Ministry of Municipal Affairs can only make recommendations. They no longer have the oversight powers they once had where, if there were systemic problems, the ministry would abolish council or administration, or both, and appoint per-

"My concern is to have a safe and healthy workplace for all municipal employees," said Ms. Gerrard. "I want to be able to show up to work without fear of intimidation, degradation of character, attacks on my integrity and threats of termination."

appointed DRC Performance Management as third party investigator. A summary investigation report, completed by DRC on February 6, 2018, including finding and remedies, was forwarded to Ms. Gerrard on March 21. "On reading the summary investigation report," wrote Reeve Russell, "you will note and should appreciate the remedies will involve some time to make arrangements for its implementation. Once we have made the necessary arrangements you will be contacted to engage in the stipulated applicable remedies. In the interim, you will remain on suspension with pay such as to avoid your having to operate in a workplace without the Township addressing your concerns, the culture and interpersonal dynamics of the organization through setting the groundwork for the implementation of the remedies set out in the summary investigation report attached. Once we have set the groundwork for change we will contact vou to meet with council to review what has been done, council's expectations and what needs to be done going forward.'

The report recommended

that each party take a refresher course on workplace harassment; that each party take a course on communication and working respectfully in concert with others; that there be an orientation for council members on how to deal with inappropriate comments and behaviour from the public; and that township policies on harassment and workplace violence be posted in the council meeting

The report also stated. with respect to the allegations in (unnamed) Respondents 1 and 2. "We believe it is clear that the parties in question have exceeded their respective jurisdictions in crossing over into the boundaries of the other without a clear directive from council – these roles must be clearly explained; processes defined and communication protocol established by processing clear delineated job descriptions of clerk/treasurer; administrative assistant as well as the role of council, particularly in its relationship with and to staff.

At a May 30, 2018 mediation meeting attended by the Ontario Labour Relations Board mediation officer, Ms. Gerrard, the five respondents and their lawyer, "the respondents were not willing to address the workplace issues but would rather terminate my employment, saying I am the problem," said Ms. Ger-

"I have tried to retain my optimism, fortitude and mental strength throughout this ordeal that has been carrying on for many,

many months," she continued. "Learning that the employer (respondents) did not have any intentions of following through their remedies, nor any intention of even considering a workplace restoration program for all employees nor taking responsibility for ensuring a safe and healthy workplace for all employees but rather that they wanted to terminate my employment was the tipping point for me.'

Ms. Gerrard was put on medical leave effective June 1. The mediator advised her that it was council's intent to pass a motion of termination at the June 5, 2018 council meeting. An in camera session was held at the end of the June 5 meeting following dismissal of attendees.

The termination letter was dated June 5, 2018 and received June 7. Ms. Gerrard has been directed to return municipal property, "yet there is no provision as to how I am to get my personal items," she said. "The council for the Township of Tehkummah has mishandled the complaint into workplace harassment," she alleges.

Ms. Gerrard is currently reviewing her options. Should she decide to pursue wrongful dismissal action there will likely be additional costs to Tehkummah ratepayers. She is willing to return to the position of clerk-treasurer, however. "During the 15 months that I have been the clerk-treasurer, I have developed and implemented 44 measures which have decreased risk, minimized liability and increased accountability and transparency," she added, noting that she would like the opportunity to address deficiencies and to help promote the positive image of the municipality.

"Council still has an opportunity to rescind a motion of termination," said Ms. Gerrard.

Reeve Eric Russell was not able to comment at this time as "everything is not finalized." He has invited The Expositor to visit the municipal office to review all documentation upon conclusion of this matter.

unanimously by council.

"This is something that previous councils have set aside for, so the money is there," said Councillor Stephens. Councillor Stephens referenced a recent letter to the editor in The Expositor that castigated council for not instituting a composting program and noted that "we do have a composting program. We sold composters to the public at cost and are now trying to proceed with another round."

Councillor Taylor noted that the program would divert 40 yards of waste, roughly equivalent to the amount of commercial waste in the community. "I believe that is about 60 percent of the overall waste

going into our landfill. It is a pilot and this should tell us what we need to know.

The pilot program would enable the municipality to evaluate the cost-benefits of the diversion," agreed Councillor Stephens. "It could significantly lengthen the life of the landfill."

New landfill construction is a major cost for any municipality and it is a process that has proven fraught with challenges and controversy for those communities that have undertaken such projects. When the cost of a new landfill runs to the millions, a yearly cost running to less than \$60,000 to ship waste out can appear to be an attractive alternative.

input from all states and provinces comanaging the largest freshwater resource on the planet," stated Kathryn Hoffman, CEO of Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy, in a press release.

It appears that more states agree, as evidenced by letters and recent resolutions by other Great Lakes states and communities, including New York and Illinois, the press release continues. Since the legal challenge's filing in May, citizens and organizations throughout the basin have con-

tacted the petitioner groups, asking how they can help defend the Compact's standards on diversions. The League of Women Voters of the Lake Michigan Region has formally approved active participation in working to protect the Compact from the dangerous loophole created in the Racine diversion approval.

The formal support from the League of Women Voters within the Great Lakes states of Illinois, Indiana and Michigan is an indicator of the broad public concern about future diversions if Wisconsin's Foxconn Loophole is allowed to stand,

observed Louise Petering, director of League of Women Voters, Wisconsin. "Protecting public rights protects public waters," said Ms. Petering in the press release. "President G.W. Bush signed the Compact into law in 2008, codifying standards developed over many years with participation from a large and diverse number of people. The WDNR must be held to the requirements in this historic law that specifically addressed the rights of future generations to water resources and economic opportunities.'

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# **AOK** conference focuses on human trafficking

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—The pain reverberating through the room was palpable as people reacted to a keynote talk provided to the Violence Against Women and Human Trafficking conference by Dr. Dawn Lavell-Harvard and other speakers, that anger and pain was largely directed against the indifference and complicity of white mainstream society toward the denigration of Anishinabe-kwe of which there were numerous anecdotal and statistical references to back up the charge.

The horror of the subject matter is amplified manifold when one looks behind the statistics that indicate the average age of recruitment as 12. That means for every 14 and 16-year-old there is a corresponding child of eight or 10 who is being suborned into the sex trade. The mind should recoil at the horror, but too often the eyes of those who should be protecting these children are blinded by their skin colour and/or home community and too many others are complicit through their own inaction.

The conference began with a drum song by the Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) Hand Drum Group and a prayer by elder Barbara Peltier.

AOK First Nation Chief



Destiny Douglas, Dr. Dawn Lavell-Harvard and Michelle Atkinson were the speakers at the Violence Against Women and Human Trafficking conference held at Aundeck Omni Kaning last weekend. The conference was held jointly between Aundeck Omni Kaning and Sheguaindah First Nations, Noojmowin Teg and the Anishinabek Nation Family Well-being Program.

Patsy Corbiere delivered welcoming remarks, noting that her community is one that prides itself on "looking after our people."

"There is an overwhelming amount of stuff going on with human trafficking," said Chief Corbiere. "We need to educate our youth that human trafficking is going on in our back yard and we don't even know it."

Chief Corbiere congratulated conference organizer JoAnne Thibideau-Audette

for organizing the first ever conference on human trafficking. "This was put together to protect our women and girls and to keep them from being drawn into human trafficking."

Dawn (Memee) Lavell-Harvard has been involved in the cause of Anishinabe-kwe rights for more than 40 years. "You might say even as a babe in arms," she laughed, referencing growing up the daughter of famed Anishinabe-kwe

...continued from page 1 Expositor received a press release late Tuesday, well after this newspaper's press deadline, which stated that Joseph Mark Edwards, age 67, of Wiikwemkoong (the community has been quick to point out that Mr. Edwards is not actually from the community, but rather only a resident of the nursing home) had been charged on June 8 with the following offences: assault and aggravated

The Expositor learned that the charges did not both stem from the 2017 assault on Mr. Still, however. On June 5 of this year, Mr. Edwards, again at the Wikwemikong Nursing Home, assaulted an elderly woman, originally from Providence Bay and a nursing home resident.

Seemingly as a result of this second altercation, Mr. Edwards was then charged with assault for the June 5 incident and "endangering the life of Robert James Still thereby committing an aggravated assault" for the August 25, 2017 beating of Jim Still.

As was reported last week, Mr. Still's long-time friend and partner Ellen Cooper said she could not understand why police took so long to act in laying charges against Mr. Edwards.

The Expositor attempted to reach out to both families of the victims for comment, but did not receive a response as of press time Monday. This newspaper also contacted the Wikwemikong Nursing Home for comment, but was referred to the press release sent out at the time of Mr. Still's death, which read: "On behalf of the staff and residents of Wikwemikong Nursing Home, we extend our deepest sympathies and condolences to the family of Mr. Robert Still. We have always, and will continue to strive to provide the best quality of care to the residents of the nursing home. We are fully cooperating with the authorities

in the investigation of this incident and further conducting our own internal investigation in order to better understand what happened."

This newspaper also contacted the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care to ask about ministry policy and procedure for dealing with violent clients, but the ministry said it could not have a response ready by press time Monday.

Mr. Edwards' next scheduled court appearance is for today, Wednesday, June 20. He remains in custody.

Police and nursing home administration would not whether confirm Edwards remained at the Nursing Wikwemikong Home following the alleged assault on Mr. Still last August or was removed to another facility for a time and then returned to the Wiikwemkoong facility when the second alleged incident took place in early

ment of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs (CIRNA). SMPD continues to be custodian and to manage the disposal process for the Michael's Bay properties on behalf of the Government of Canada," continues the emailed response. "There has been no sale or transfer of ownership of the Michael's Bay properties, with the exception of a small parcel of farm grazing land for which the local Indigenous populations did not express an interest. The vacant property was sold publicly to a local buyer."

The email does confirm that "consultations have identified that the Wiikwemkoong First Nation has an interest in the four remaining properties and negotiations are currently underway, with CIRNA representing Canada. The Crown can only

offer the lands for sale after the consultation process has ended and only if the Wiikwemkoong First Nation does not acquire the land as a result of the process."

"It's all news to me," laughed Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier. "We had some initial conversations but there really hasn't been much to talk about since." Chief Peltier confirmed that if the property had been sold/was about to be sold to Wiikwemkoong he would likely be among the first to know. "There is nothing to report yet," he said.

A recent auction sold off the various chattels that were associated with the property, which included the Royal Michael's Bay Resort restaurant equipment and even an old Northeast Town department tanker truck, but that sale was apparently simply clearing up outstanding matters associated with the property.

She also served as the former president of the Native Women's Association of Canada and battled relentlessly for the federal government to recognize and act on the disparate number of Indigenous women who had either gone missing or had been murdered.

Dr. Lavell-Harvard delivered a powerful and emotional address to the conference that shone a light on the issue of human trafficking and debunked many of the myths too often promulgated by the very law enforcement agencies that should be protecting women and girls.

Perhaps one of the most powerful messages she brought to the floor was accomplished by turning those law enforcement agencies own statistics around with damning effectiveness.

"They said that Indigenous women were twice as likely to earn income from illegal sources," she said. "That would be 18 percent versus nine percent for non-Native women. That means that 82 percent of victims did not. They said that they were twice as likely to work in the sex trade, that is 12 percent. That's 12 percent versus six percent. That means that 88 percent were not involved—so why focus on that? It is an attitude of trying to blame our sisters."

One interesting statistic that does not often come to the fore is that white women are far more likely to be murdered in their homes.

Dr. Lavell-Harvard did not pull punches. "Our sisters are victims because they were aboriginal and they were female in a community that devalues their lives. They talk about a high risk lifestyle, we are born high risk—not because we chose it."

She recalled her daughter's reaction to hearing about the dangers of human trafficking and being Indigenous while they were driving in the car. "My daughter's eyes were big as saucers," recalled Dr. Lavell-Harvard. "Am I in danger?" she asked. I wanted with all my heart to tell her no, that I would protect her." But the truth is that as a young Native girl, she is seen as a choice target for the human traffickers.

Lip service on First Nation women's issues abounds in the political realm, noted Dr. Lavell-Harvard. "They boast of building 44 new shelters, but what they don't say is that there are 600 communities where there is no safe place for women and their children to escape abuse."

The number one reason that women flee their home communities is domestic violence, she said, but when they flee to the big city, those young women quickly discover that it only gets worse. Added to domestic abuse is systemic and pervasive racism.

Behind much of the challenge in children in care comes from a system that does not distinguish between the impacts of poverty and that of abuse. Teachers and other professionals are trained to spot

abuse, but those triggers include things like not coming to school with lunch, not having warm clothes in winter. "I go to Giant Tiger to buy a dozen gloves for my children at the start of the school year to replace the ones I know they will lose," said Ms. Lavell-Harvard. "What about the parent who cannot even afford the first pair?"

One of the lowest common denominators of the missing and murdered, she said, was that of being in the care of the Children's Aid Society.

On a practical note, Dr. Lavell-Harvard said that one of the key recruiting methods that pimps use to identify potential victims is to walk up to a young Anishinabe-kwe and compliment her hair. "If she says 'oh I can't do anything with it' they know they have someone with low self-esteem to work with, but if they say 'oh I know, I really love my hair' they just keep on walking."

She exhorted her listeners to do whatever they can to build strong and confident children who have a positive self-image as a key defence against the traffickers. She also noted that the taxi industry is often complicit in trafficking rings.

"When a young woman gets into a cab, she should get on her cell phone and call someone, tell them 'I am in such-and-such cab number and the driver's name is such-and-such'," suggested Dr. Lavell-Harvard. That simple expedient will act as a strong deterrent to a would be abductor.

Victim advocate Destiny Douglas also spoke to the assembly. Ms. Douglas, whose own story has been featured in the pages of The Expositor, manages a Facebook page 'Life After Inspirational' in support of victims of sexual violence. She was assaulted herself in 2015 and uses her own experience with sexual abuse and domestic violence to help other survivors navigate the legal system and overcome psychological trauma.

Speaker Michelle Atkinson is herself a survivor of human trafficking and a band member with the Couchiching First Nation and was born in Chicago. She spent the first 18 years of her life in foster care and travelled across the continent. She was lured into the sex trade at the age of 12 and was held in its thrall until she was 21. Now a resident of Sheguiandah First Nation. she has earned diplomas in Human Services, Native Mental Health and Business Application. For Ms. Atkinson the tragedy of human trafficking and the missing and murdered has proved generational, as her daughter Cheyenne Santana Fox would eventually be listed among the missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.

Following the conference, attendees took part in a light dinner/social event and had an opportunity to visit with the many vendors that participated in the conference and which offer services to Anishinabekwe and their families.

Throughout the conference a wellness room was available for any attendees that found themselves being triggered by the presentations.



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# Island Singers and the Stratford Concert Choir ask the musical question 'How Can I Keep From Singing?'

MINDEMOYA—Islanders were absolutely delighted June 16 when the Island Singers and the Stratford Concert Choir presented the 'How Can I Keep From Singing?' performance at the Mindemoya Missionary Church.

This was an outstanding recital and featured conductors Ian Sadler of Stratford and Chris Theijsmeijer of Gore Bay along with accompanists Imre Olah, Holly Scott and Linda Wilton.

The conductors spoke with The Expositor before the performance, and Mr. Sadler commented that he had been to the Island in the early '90s to inaugurate a new organ at the St. Francis of Assisi church in Mindemoya. He had also been to Manitoulin with his wife, also a singer, for a workshop with the church for a production of Peter and the Wolf.

Mr. Sadler mentioned that he is also the director of the Cathedral Singers of Ontario, a choir he started in 1999, and that has been invited to sing for a week at the 1,400-year-old magnificent Ely Cathedral in Cambridgeshire, England and also at the Canterbury Cathedral.

Mr. Sadler was particularly pleased that the Trillium Foundation had made it possible for him and 25 Stratford Concert Choir members to travel to Manitoulin and to cover some other expenses. It would now be possible to travel a few times a year to perform with other choirs. "Trillium also made it possible," he said, "for us to purchase new music."

Mr. Sadler is appreciative of the Island experience. "It is a delight to be here, and to make so many wonderful friends," he said. "Members of the Island Singers choir have been wonderful to us."

Mr. Sadler's biography shows that he is a remarkable man. He began his musical training as a chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, England and was a Music Scholar at The King's School in Canterbury, an Organ Scholar at both Bristol University and St. Paul's Cathedral. In 1980, Mr. Sadler played the organ for the movie 'Chariots of Fire.' He moved to Canada following appointments in Toronto as Director of

Mr. Theijsmeijer told The Expositor that he is a science and music graduate from the University of Western Ontario. He is currently the music teacher at Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS). He leads instrumental music classes, extracurricular choir, and band, and has rejuvenated the school's musical program. He explained that he has been with the Island Singers for about 10 years and took over as conductor when Dorothy Anstice

Accompanist Imre Olah was born in Hungary where he studied music with specializations in organ performance, choral music, and choral direction. He moved to Canada in 1989 and has served as music director and organist at many churches, presented organ recitals, and has accompanied choirs and soloists. He has performed organ recitals in Hungary, Germany, Italy and the United States. Mr. Olah

holds the Associateship diploma from the Royal Canadian College of Organists and is the Artistic Director for the St. Elizabeth Scola Cantorum of Toronto. In 2018, the choir received the Rakoczi award from the Rakoczi Foundation for promoting Hungarian choral culture in Canada. He is the music director and organist at Caven Presbyterian Church in Bolton.

Accompanist Holly Scott has taught piano to countless students, participated with the Manitowaning Burn's Wharf Theatre players, and organized local concerts for artists including Tafelmusik, Jon Kimura Parker, Janina Fialkowska, and others. She earned an ARCT as a student of wellknown music professor Dr. Jon Gonder, and a Masters Degree from UCLA. 


The second half of this exceptional evening saw the performance of the

Requiem, OP 48 by the famous French composer, arranger, and pianist, Gabriel Faure. He is probably best known for this orchestral –choral rendition for the Roman Catholic Mass for the Dead in Latin. The warm, rich melodies focus on eternal rest and consolation.

Featured for the seven parts of the Requiem were soloists Catherine Sadler, soprano and Terry Marklevitz, bass. It begins with the Introit and Kyrie – Grant them rest eternal; Lord have mercy upon us, followed by the Offertory – O Lord God, save them from lasting darkness: let them pass from death to life eternal and then the Sanctus – Holy, Holy, Holy, glory to thee; Hosanna in the Highest. There then follows the Pie Jesu – Blessed Jesus, grant them eternal rest, the Agnus Dei, Lamb of God, that takes away the sins of the world, let light eternal shine upon them and the Libera Me – Deliver me, Lord, from death eternal upon the day of judgement; Trembling, I stand before Thee. The final part is the In Paradisum – In paradise be thou received by angel hosts, attended by blessed martyrs and guided into the Holy City of Jerusalem. Be thine eternal rest.

Of this work, Faure said, "My Requiem is dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest."

# Lake Huron's June levels still remain well above average

LAKE HURON—Boaters rejoice! Lake Huron levels are, once again, well above average this June.

Since the beginning of January, Lake Huron has posted above average levels. At the beginning of January, levels were 43 centimetres above average and by the beginning of June, 46 centimetres above average.

"That's as high as it's been since 1997," explained Derrick Beach, boundary waters issues unit, Environment and Climate Change Canada. "That's because of above average precipitation and the inflow from Lake Superior has been high."

As of June 14, the levels have fluctuated since the beginning of the month, but are back to 46 centimetres above average to a total of 176.97 metres.

Mr. Beach noted that levels in June tend to rise throughout the month, so considering the stay in numbers by mid-June, the lake has been lacking in precipitation this month. Typically, water levels will rise until July and begin the seasonal decline in August. By comparison, last June's monthly average was 34 centimetres above average.

"Since January, the levels have held their own," Mr. Beach said.

Mr. Beach predicted that, even with very dry conditions, water levels will be well above average in September and even with very wet conditions, Lake Huron will still be well below the record highs of the late 1980s.

Wiikwemkoong Justice staff chose speakers "who were well informed on the topics which cover the areas of work that we (Justice. other Wiikwemkoong agencies and front line staff) are involved with when working with persons who require the support of some form of remedial help either through services, agencies or collaborative programming," said Frances Mandamin, a vicsaid tim wellness support worker with the Wiikwemkoong Justice Program who assisted with event coordination. "From elder vulnerability to support for those persons which require assistance from a program agency to possible further referrals or development of a workshop that pertains to wellness and support of our commu-

Following an opening smudge and prayer and welcome remarks by Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier, speaker Graham Webb presented on the Advocacy Centre for the Elderly. After lunch, Michael Charlene Shain and Tehkummah provided an overview of the Manitoulin Legal Clinic located in Aundeck Omni Kaning and shared their work experiences in working with victims from WSIB cases, and the cultural trauma of persons moving from a First Nation into an urban centre; how through the help of free legal clinics they were able to assist the clients in op the resolution to the matter on hand. Scott Clark and Chantal Maru spoke about their research on community based models of victim services throughout the country and how Wiikwemkoong has maintained a model of using Justice as healing through the diversion program and working in unison with staff, Wiikwemkoong programs and the Elders' Justice Panel members who are integral to the support of persons who utilize the support of the Justice Circle.

Day two began with Wiikwemkoong cultural teachings. "The importance of cultural teachings and ceremonies spoke to the history

and lifestyle of the community and how words of the Seven Grandfather teachings were practiced by action and taught to the young," explained Ms. Mandamin. "The residential school era really impacted our families; however, our grandparents and elders thrived on continuing these teachings and ceremonies that were handed down and are very much respected to this day. The ceremonies play an important role to the traditional teachings which were handed down from our ancestors to our current day traditional people. These teachings are important to our Justice program and circles."

Tim Ominika of Northwood Recovery presented the role of clinics and how land-based activities and after care are significant to participants who require recovery from opioids. Mr. Ominika explained the Northwood program and shared how this program has assisted a specific person (through his testimonial on the road to his recovproviding inspirational testimony of success and resiliency. 

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



that in Ontario there are over 10,000 files open relating to 18,000 children. That breaks down into approximately 23 percent custody and access disputes, 47 percent child welfare, eight percent for minor's funds and the remaining 22 percent split between civil litigation and estates. "I wish my office didn't have to exist," she said.

Ms. Jacko highlighted three new programs: Voice of the Child, 16/17-year-old program and a human trafficking pilot project. Voice of the Child provides a short report by a clinician that contains only the child's preferences, generally for custody and access or protection cases. This report is helpful to judges for decision-making but does not make recommendations.

As of January 2018, 16 and 17-year-old youth can enter into a voluntary youth service agreement (VSA) in order to receive services and assistance from Children's Aid Services if they are determined to be in need of protection. Lawyers will guide the youth through the process and provide them with information and advice.

Previously, 16 and 17-year-olds had to access adult services and sometimes ended up homeless. When youth enter into a VSA before they are 18 they have access to services until their 20s. Since January 1 nearly 300 VSAs have been entered into with youth in varying situations. "They may be transgender, have mental health or addictions issues or



The school year may be winding down, but there are lots of activities still going on for the Mustangs.

SHARE/Go Green ran their e-waste drive on Saturday, June 16. The project was to make sure that old electronics get recycled and don't end up in landfills. As well as collecting electronics, there was a clothing collection as well to raise money for the Cerebral Palsy foundation.

There is a new campaign that SHARE/Go Green has signed up for, called Givalry.ca. This website sells organic, zero waste, non toxic, and vegan products. The organization is female founded, and donates 25 percent of each purchase to the SHARE group. In order to support our school, just type in Manitoulin Secondary School when you first open the site. The money raised from this campaign will go towards making MSS more eco-friendly: buying trees, more gardens, plants for the courtyard, and other tools.

SHARE is having their end of year potluck on Wednesday, June 20. This year, the group has raised thousands of dollars through their fundraising, building a school in Nicaragua and beginning to raise money for a school in Tanzania via the Brick by Brick campaign.

The four candidates for the Valedictorian speeches presented to their classmates on Monday, June 11: Jacob Maxwell, Kendra Jordison, Alicia Williamson and James Scott. The candidates spoke about why they should be voted the Valedictorian, who gets to speak at the graduation ceremony. After four well-presented speeches, the Grade 12s voted and waited for the results. Ms. Ferguson announced right before lunch that James Scott won the Valedictorian vote and he was congratulated by the grad-

The current Students' Council is preparing to pass on their responsibilities onto the next generation. The speeches for the 2018-2019 Students' Council Election are on Wednesday, June 20. There are many students running for the various positions: Co-Prime Ministers, Secretary, Treasurer, Special Events Coordinator, Spirit Rep., Junior Rep., Public Relations, AV Technician, and Fundraising Rep.

have parents who do. They have limited or no options," explained Ms. Jacko.

The human trafficking pilot project came out of 'Walking Together: Ontario's Long-term Strategy to End Violence Against Indigenous Women.' One initiative under this project is a new type of restraining order specific to human trafficking; application can be made by the victim, families of the victim, guardians or other persons. Free legal representation will be provided to survivors through this project, which is a partnership between Victim Services and the Children's Lawyer's office.

"Human trafficking is vastly underreported," said Ms. Jacko, "and Ontario is a major centre for human trafficking in Canada, with two-thirds of the reported cases. In Ontario, Indigenous women and girls are one of the most targeted and overrepresented groups. The average age targeted is 13-years-old but is often within the 8 to 16-year-old

There are misconceptions about the victims, she said. "Not all are addicted. Most are just trying to survive." Not all human trafficking victims are sex workers. They are also forced into labour and can be found as domestic servants, hair and nail salon workers, janitorial workers, hotel service workers and more.

Signs to watch for include new boyfriends or friends, older friends, unexplained money, a change in appearance, secretive or aloof behaviours, withdrawal, skipping school, unexplained injuries, substance abuse, new phones or technologies or tattoos. "Often victims are branded with a tattoo, identifying them as belonging to a particular 'stable' of victims," said Ms. Jacko.

"One thing I've learned," she concluded, "is not to judge. The best thing we can do is to surround the survivors with love and caring."

The conference wrapped up with Bea Shawanda, gamely assisted by Dorothy Fox, leading group activities that promote laughter and humour, leaving everyone with good vibes and smiles. "Stress is destructive," she said. "Laughter builds self-confidence and builds relationships with other people. It will decrease your own stress levels and teaches you to take (good) risks." Ms. Shawanda uses humour as a tool to say what needs to be said, warning participants, "Don't take yourself too seriously."

# Signs tell the original story of the Cup and Saucer

Nanabush's spear points came to rest at Michigiwadinong, the "bluff in the shape of a spearhead"

HONORA BAY—It has become famous around the globe as Manitoulin's Cup and Saucer Trail, the highest vantage point to be found on the Island, but the Ojibwe have spoken of "Michigiwadinong" the place where Nanabush lay down his spearpoints while fleeing Iroquois warriors he had been tormenting for countless generations. This weekend, family members of Johnny Debassige, a M'Chigeeng band member and resident, his granddaughters and great-grandchildren, came to help out help unveil the new signs that relay the name and its story.
"Nwii-miigwechwi'aag Mari-

"Nwii-miigwechwi'aag Mariana Lafrance, miinwaa Dr. Roy Jeffrey, maanda gii-gchi-nokiitaanaawaa," said Anishinaabe historian and language teacher Alan Corbiere, whose dream of putting the record straight came to fruition thanks to the deter-

can advocate in places and spaces where we are not."

Mr. Corbiere explained that Michigiwadinong means "Bluff in the shape of spearhead" and he told a sizable gathering at the trailhead for the official unveiling the story of how he came to record the story of Nanabush and his spear points—but cautioning that the telling of Nanabush stories when the snow is not on the ground comes at some risk of attracting the attention of the one known as "The Trickster."

The family members who came to take part in the official unveiling, Aspen Debassige, Dianne Debassige, RJ Panton, Kim Aelick, Keisha and Sheila Panton, remained undaunted by Anishinaabe warrior hero spirits or an early morning rain.


The ceremony began with an invocation by M'Chigeeng elder Alma Jean Migwans, who refer-

Mantha went on to deliver a short prayer in Anishinabemown.

Northeast Town Mayor Al Mac-Nevin then spoke of the challenges that had faced the town in securing a new entranceway to the trail when the old entrance became unavailable. "It is nice to see it finally in place," he said. "We are very happy it all finally came together." Mayor MacNevin said it was gratifying to see the original history of the site being commemorated and placed where visitors can learn about it.

Niagara Escarpment Biosphere representative Linda Willson noted that Nature Conservancy of Canada's Bob Barnett "immediately recognized the importance of the bluffs here as some of the highest in the Niagara escarpment."

Ms. Willson went on to reference the fundraising campaign to protect another signature site in

Ms. Lafrance became involved in the project when, as an Ojibwe student of Mr. Corbiere, they had discussed the original name and how Mr. Corbiere desired to see the original name and story of the bluffs now known as the Cup and Saucer become better known and referenced at the site. She thought that was an excellent idea and began making inquiries. The idea fell on fertile ground with Dr. Jeffrey et al and things soon began to come together.

Mr. Corbiere explained how he had been recording as many of the old stories as he was able to,

Mr. Corbiere related how he was disturbed when he first heard the spear point referred to as a harpoon. "We never hunted seals or walruses," he laughed. But once he learned that was the tech-

once he learned that was the technical term for a spear with a detachable head he was not as concerned.

The barbs behind the head of the spear point denote the type of prey that the spear was destined to hunt. "Those sharp ridges that

spearhead on the 'saucer,' those are the spines on the spear."

"This is a very special place," said Ms. Migwans, "many great chiefs were buried here for many generations."

Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha was fresh from travelling the Red Trail and was about to set out on the Blue Trail (not to mention the election trail from the recent provincial election where he retained his seat by a commanding margin) when he tongue-in-cheek queried the lack of an orange trail.

"I encourage you to stop on your way up and look at the beautiful scenery that surrounds you," he admonished. "Don't just wait until you get to the lookouts." Mr.



You can call the Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 for any non-emergency nuisance bears. 'The Sixth Day' by Catherine Coulter -When several major political figures die mysteriously, officials declare the deaths are from natural causes. However, when the German vice chancellor suddenly dies, a drone is spotted hovering over the scene. This raises questions about all the highprofile deaths. The Covert Eyes Team is

tasked to investigate. A good read. 'Shoot First' by Stuart Woods – A Stone Barrington Novel - Stone is enjoying a round of golf in Key West when the game is violently interrupted - and it seems as if the target of the disturbance may have been one of his fellow players, the brilliant businesswoman behind a software startup on the cutting edge of technology. Spotted in downtown Tehkummah Annette and Rose, a couple of our Sandfield area summer ladies call from friend Jesse in Hamilton too.



It was so exciting to see the rain on Sunday, especially for the gardens. All my plants and new seedlings were doing the "happy dance." My mother, who lives close to London, was bragging about eating strawberries from her garden. I have a few strawberry plants and they are definitely not ripe, but I am picking and eating Haskaps.

Haskap is the Japanese name for Lonicera caerulea. It has been known as 'Blue Honeysuckle.' It has a fresh raspberry/blueberry flavour with a special zing. The plant has few pests and is the first fruit crop to ripen each season, even before strawberries. The plant is well behaved: it doesn't sucker, has no thorns, needs little pruning in early years and tends to fruit when very young. The plants are very hardy and have survived in a winter as cold as -47°C.

I planted some Haskaps about three years ago and each year I keep planting a few more. I love the flavour of the fruit, they are heavy producers and so easy to look after. Easier than blueberries and raspberries!!!! Plant some in your garden or amongst your flowers and you will be eating the berries after two years.

#### Haskap-Garlic Scape Salad Dressing

My garlic scapes are not quite ready so I used two fresh green garlic (they look like green onions), the whole plant. I didn't have any haskap jam so instead I used 1/2 cup fresh haskaps and maple syrup.

- 2 fresh garlic scapes, chopped
- 2 Tbsp maple syrup
- 2 tsp Dijon mustard
- 4 Tbsp haskap jam or 1/2 cup fresh or frozen haskaps
- 4 Tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 cup olive or sunflower seed oil
- Salt and pepper to taste

Put everything in the blender and puree. Add salt and pepper to taste.

#### **Slow Cooker Pork Roast**

If you don't have pork use chicken. If you cook the pork longer you can use it as pulled pork for sandwiches. Either way it is excellent.

3 pound pork shoulder roast

2 cups fresh or frozen Haskap berries (blueberries will

1/2 cup unsweetened cranberry juice (I used frozen cranberries)

1/2 cup maple syrup

1/2 tsp dried sage or 1 Tbsp fresh sage

1 cup fresh garlic scapes, chopped Salt and pepper to taste

6 strips of bacon (optional)

Put pork roast in slow cooker.

Add all the rest of the ingredients to the slow cooker except the bacon—around the roast.

Top with the strips of bacon. Cook on low for 8 hours.

Remove the roast and puree the sauce. You can use slice the roast and serve it with the gravy or pull the pork apart and mix it with the sauce for pulled pork.
