# **June 30** deadline for Northerners' addictions strategies

by Robin Burridge

ONTARIO—The North East Local Heath Integration Network (NE LHIN) is seeking individuals for the new North East Mental Health and Addictions Collaborative.

Reporting to the North East LHIN CEO, the collaborative will develop a plan to implement the recommendations from Dr. Rush's Addictions Review (released earlier this month), along with those outlined in a mental health Blueprint undertaken by Health Sciences North and North Bay Regional Health Centre earlier this year.

Shana Calixte, mental health, addiction and housing officer with the NE LHIN, explained that they are looking for a "mix of peo-ple" with a variety of experience such as people with personal 'lived experience' as well as their family/caregivers, senior leaders working in both hospital and community mental health and addiction settings, First Nations/abopeoples, riginal/Metis francophones, primary care providers and addiction medicine

"We want to select people that represent a vast diversity of the communities in Northeastern Ontario," said Ms. Calixte.

In addition to developing a plan, the collaborative "will be a space for people to come together and discuss addiction and mental heath across the region," said Ms.

"We hope that the collaborative will review the documents (such as the North East LHIN Addiction Services Review) over the summer and then come together in the fall and put together a plan, followed by an implementation team and get tasks moving forward,' Ms. Calixte said.

The North East LHIN Addiction Services Review was presented by Dr. Brian Rush at the North East LHIN board of directors at their meeting earlier this month.

"Engaged by the North East LHIN, Dr. Rush undertook this

# Wiky Nursing Home staff now trained to aid in dialysis

WIKWEMIKONG—The wemikong Nursing Home has become the first band organization to train its staff in the use of peritoneal dialysis, opening doors for people who would normally have to travel or move to Sudbury or another larger urban centre if they become too incapacitated to continue to operate the equip-

"Some people, for health reasons, can't continue to do it at home," noted Kim Genereux, Noojmowin Teg Aging at Home navigator. "In the past, people would have to leave their community. This is really a big step forward and will help pave the way for other health organizations.

"We have trained half our nursing staff today," said Sarah Loven-Lacasse, director of care at the Wikwemikong Nursing Home. "We will be training two more and then we will have the ability."

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# Snowmobile club, **OFSC** set record straight concerning voluntary trail use without easements

MINDEMOYA—The Manitoulin Snowdusters Snowmobile Club hosted a successful meeting at the Mindemoya Community Centre last week, hoping to allay fears for its Manitoulin landowners that Bill 100, Supporting Ontario's Trails Act, 2016, is not the big, scary beast it was made out to be by some provincial organizations.

Murray Baker, president of District 12 of the Ontario Federations of Snowmobile Clubs (OFSC), of which Manitoulin Island is a part, began the evening's presentations. He told the over 70 people in attendance that the Snowdusters have been operating Island trails for 25 years and that the Island club is just one of 200 across the province that brings together over 250 communities.

"We (the OFSC) have a network of 32,000 kilometres of trailsthat's double the amount of roads that the Ministry of Transportation looks after," Mr. Baker

He explained that 45 percent of all land-based trails in Ontario are snowmobile trails and spoke of the economic importance of snowmobiling, especially for small, rural communities like those on Manitoulin, listing the many things a rider needs before they even hit the trail, not to men-

tion the many stops while riding. A 2014/15 economic impact study shows that snowmobiling brings 1.7 billion dollars to the economy each year and \$144 million in provincial taxes.

"Organized snowmobiling is a substantial asset for Ontario, and for Manitoulin," Mr. Baker said.

The District 12 president said the OFSC has faced many challenges over the years, but they always face them head on. Since the 2000s, the OFSC has been faced with increased insurance but, he explained, by improving



# Manitoulin trustee fights for closed note taking rights

SUDBURY—Manitoulin Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) trustee Larry Killens is concerned that a motion before the board to disallow the taking of notes during closed meetings has pitted Mr. Killens against the board chair.

The bylaw in question is Bylaw 10.2: "With the exception of the executive secretary or designate, any and all recording and/or note taking of in-camera meetings

is expressly prohibited."
Mr. Killens' position is that he needs to be able to take notes in order to be able to keep track of details in complex discussions during in camera meetings, but Ms. Dewar maintains that Mr. Killens had earlier indicated that he wanted to have his notes "for

"No, we can't use them afterwards," said Ms. Dewar. "Closed meetings are kept confidential that is why they are closed."

dential, that is why they are closed."

In an email outlining his position, Mr. Killens listed a long list of items that are subject to closed meetings, including disciplinary matters, expulsions, and litigation to name a few, adding the note that "one should take note that any or all such meetings and topics above could last in excess of an hour or more to complete. I say the above statement, as at the end of all meeting decisions must be made and an hour's worth of discussion without referencing material, ie pros and cons for a decision, I suggest, is

not good business practice."

Should trustees be called upon to justify their decision after the fact, recalling the details of the factors leading to the decision would be difficult, if not impossible, to recall.

Ms. Dewar suggested that the incidents of long and involved meetings of such nature are actually quite rare and do not overbear the need for maintaining strict confidentiality.

Mr. Killens also objected to a recent meeting in which little notice was provided of the agenda prior to the business being discussed. One of the items was the notice of motion of bylaw expressly outlawing the taking of notes during in camera meetings.

"The posting of the agenda items usually takes place several days before the meeting," agreed Ms. Dewar, but in this instance the employee responsible had overlooked it. "It is a practice, not a policy," she pointed out of the posting of agenda items on the board website. "The employee was quite upset and apologized repeatedly," she added. "That employee does very good work," maintained the chair, adding that she did not think pillaring the employee in public was an appropriate course of action.

Mr. Killens had asked that the items under discussion, which included a number of tenders for Rainbow schools as well as the notice of motion regarding note tak-

# Unique Northern visions make all our lives a little easier

Health Sciences North in Sudbury is important to all of Northeast-ern Ontario as our regional go-to health facility for serious health concerns and traumas. The current drive to raise the last \$2 million towards the purchase of a PET scanner to increase the level of diagnostic services is certainly something we should all support.

But there are other, less high profile agencies and resources in the North's largest city that are, in their way, equally important to people from small communities such as ours on Manitoulin Island

One of these, the Glenn Crombie Centre, at Cambrian College's main campus is a facility unique among Ontario's community colleges as its sole purpose is to assist people with any kind of disability in their goal of achieving a post-secondary education.

This includes people who have lifetime physical or intellectual challenges as well as those who may have suffered an injury that makes their previous work impossible for them to do.

The late Glenn Crombie, after whom this unique facility was named, served as Cambrian College's president for many years, retiring in the mid-1990s.

The notion of accessibility to the school over which he presided was very important to Mr. Crombie who was acknowledged earlier in his career in Sudbury for making Cambrian College the first in the provincial college system to remove or adapt physical barriers for

He went on to envision a place of regional significance where there would be no barriers, physical or otherwise, for people facing any number of challenges but who wanted to go to college.

Once again, this concept was ahead of its time and when it was operating and Mr. Crombie had retired, the college board at the time decided to name it in his honour.

Similarly, and at about the same time, Sudbury community leader Chris Sheridan had a flash of inspiration that led to the House of Kin. a repurposed hotel at the Four Corners, where out of town families or individuals facing treatment at Health Sciences North can find comfortable, affordable accommodation.

The House of Kin gets its name from the Sudbury Kinsman's Club, the service club that took on Mr. Sheridan's idea and made it a reality. (The Kinsman's Club is also Canada's largest all-Canadian service

The Glenn Crombie Centre has served a number of Manitoulin cit-

izens over the 20 years since its opening and will be there to serve those who need it in the years to come.

Similarly, the House of Kin has been vitally important to Manitoulin people who have needed to be near a family member who was receiving treatment at Health Sciences North or any other of Sudbury's medical facilities. It has meant that they have been to stay in the city in very affordable accommodations thanks to the Kinsman's Club's efforts and Mr. Sheridan's vision.

We take resources like the Glenn Crombie Centre an the House of Kin for granted but they exist as unique regional facilities that make the lives of Northern Ontario people just a little bit easier.

What is remarkable is that these resources began as "good ideas" in the minds of, respectively, Glenn Crombie and Chris Sheridan.

The same is true of the current fundraising campaign for the PET scanner diagnostic equipment.

It was initiated by the late Sam Bruno who, when he was being treated for the illness that ultimately claimed his life, was forced to travel to Toronto to access PET scanning diagnostics.

From this first-hand experience, Mr. Bruno set out to convince the Ontario Ministry of Health that the North needed its own PET scanner to avoid this additional travel. Sudbury and Health Sciences North have been approved for the device and the fundraising for its purchase is now more than half complete.

Once again, this is someone's visionary project that, when it is in place, will be one more regional resource that people from Manitoulin Island as well as the rest of Northeastern Ontario will have ready access to.

There is also the NEO (Northeastern Ontario) Children's Treatment Centre that is presently being planned and for which funds are also being raised throughout the North, another project aimed at easing the lot of Northerners.

We are fortunate that people not only conceive of these projects as good ideas but then also go on to act on them to bring them into reali-

Manitoulin Island is geographically fortunate to be located as close as we are to Sudbury and the resources we've recounted but, even for people from Kapuskasing, White River or Fort Albany, a trip to Sudbury is easier on the nerves then a trip to downtown Toronto would be to access similar services.

# Northeast Town council short sighted on cruise ship membership

Abandoning Great Lakes Cruising Coalition membership without backup plan poor planning

To the Expositor:

I recently read (with a profound feeling of dumbfoundedness (is that a word?)) that the NEMI council had declined to renew or support its share of the Great Lakes Cruising Coalition (GLCC) membership. Or should I say "failed to invest in the future of the community" by failing to see the benefit of the GLCC membership.

Honestly, I thought this was a no brainer. A \$2,000 annual investment which is ultimately advertising the harbour and surrounding community. And you pretty much have a guaranteed return?

So, please correct me if I am in error. There were 22 cruise ship visits to the dock in Little Current. That's 22 dockage fees. That's probably a minimum of 2.500 visitors plus family and friends who came to meet them and spend some time with them. That's also 2,500 potential buyers or seasonal residents. People like a place, they have been known to invest in it. It's called exposure, which is something Little Current is desperately in need of.

How much money does NEMI invest annually in the area? I don't mean BIA funds or Circle funds or FedNor, I mean its own. From the outside looking in it strikes me that NEMI relies on independent businesses such as the award winning Manitoulin Expositor and Country 103 to promote the area. Who funds the Christmas decorations in the

winter and the flower baskets in the summer?

So let's do the numbers. Your businesses pay taxes and employ staff. Staff live in community and support community, oh and all pay taxes. And they all add up. Businesses do benefit from these visits but ultimately no business, no taxes, no employment.

Should I also ask the question, "How many visitors are attracted just to see the cruise ships?" This area is so rich in marine heritage and it's a history you should be proud of and promote. Visits from cruise ships were historically treated with a great deal of fanfare, it was community event, yet now NEMI sends the message of "go away."

Little Current now has a world class harbour facility with a long boardwalk and finger docking. It also has invested in parklands and other amenities to encourage boaters to visit and ultimately return yet its thinking is too narrow minded to look to the future. Stop patting yourselves on the backs for past deeds.

And really, abandoning this membership plan without a backup plan is poor planning.

"On June 9 I lost my best friend, someone I have known for 61 years, he just didn't know it"

To the Expositor:

On June 9 we celebrated the life of the best, meanest, toughest SOB that ever played the game of hockey. He was the original power forward before they had power forwards. Even though my Dad had an uncle who was on two Stanley Cup winning teams with the Canadiens he was always a Detroit (Howe) fan in his teenage years, so it was natural that I would follow him also. For as long as I can remember he was my idol, but back in the early '60s we might only see him once every couple of months, since there was only one game on TV a week. I remember sitting on the floor in front of the couch waiting for the game to come on TV. We always missed most of the first period as the game didn't come on TV until 8:30. My parents would make fun of me because of my many trips to the bathroom before the game started because I didn't want any interruptions during the game.

It took me many years to get three signatures on my 1969/70 Detroit Red Wing media guide. On it is a picture of Gordie with linemates

Frank Mahovlich and Alex Delvecchio. I got Howe's signature last and when he saw who else signed it he smiled and spent a minute or two telling me of his fond memories with them. To me it was the equivalent to meeting Babe Ruth, John Lennon or Muhammad Ali. It's safe to say there will never be another like him. I was fortunate enough to meet him three times. In Grade 1 I had my first fight at St. John's School in Newmarket when some kid tried to reach into my secret zippered pocket for my Sheriff-Jello Gordie Howe coin. He didn't come close to getting

Watching the service I thought I could make it through his son Murray's eulogy without tearing up. I didn't get half way before I reached for the Kleenex. On June 9 I lost my best friend, someone I have known for 61 years, but he just didn't know it.

Thanks for the memories. Gordie.

# A hockey fan's reminiscence of a Canadian hockey icon: Gordie Howe

EDITOR'S NOTE: Manitoulin hockey enthusiast Larry Leblanc agreed to pen his view of the late Gordie Howe's legacy to hockey. Mr. Leblanc observed that what Maurice (Rocket) Richard was to French Canada Gordie Howe was to English Canada. "Mr. Hockey" passed away on Friday, June 10. He was 88.

e was an "Aw Shucks" kind of guy off the ice. But on the ice he was Mr. Business who would give you the elbows or feed you a piece of lumber (real lumber in those days)! The man with many nicknames, Mr. Hockey was a remarkable man as well as an athlete. All fans knew about his hockey skills but few knew his life off the ice.

"Mr. Elbows" left us last week at the grand old age of eighty-eight after a courageous overtime game against Alzheimer's disease. He handled this fight like he handled any other on the ice, with determination, courage and above all, action. He did not sit still for the approaching threat, he went after it with all he had in him. As a final resort, he finally flew to another country, Mexico, to have a new stem-cell treatment to combat the disease. This strategy took him into overtime. He was not supposed to be there. He was expected to have already succumbed. But his condition improved! In the end, he got to play a year and a half of "extra-time." In hockey, Gordie was an "overtime guy." He mastered 33 years of professional hockey, an eternity in the fast-paced rough and tumble world of the world's fastest game.

Sports writer Dick Beddoes commented: "He was always there with the Detroit Red Wings, or Houston Aeros or Hartford Whalers or Team Canada '74, skating with powerful ease, scoring goals from either side (he was ambidextrous), backhand or forehand, mean when he had to be."

Mr. Howe appeared on the NHL scene in the 1946-47 season. Owner Jim Norris of the Detroit Red Wings negotiated with the young man from Floral, Saskatchewan by offering him as a signing bonus a Red Wings team jacket. In those times it was enough to convince the bright-eyed lad to sign on the dotted line. Oh how things have changed!

Norris knew what he was getting. Having seen young Howe stripped down in the dressing room, he commented, "young man, with your size, I could make you heavy weight champion of the world in 10 months." The shy, retiring lad, muscles upon muscles, kindly declined. But he did go on to be the heavyweight champion in the NHL.

Just ask Leaping Lou Fontenato of the New York Rangers! Purported to be the toughest man in the League in the 1950s Lou was the Rangers' "enforcer". He was big, belligerent, tough and nasty. Many a tough guy hit the ice because of Mr. Fontenato. But one night in 1959, Lou made the wrong choice.


After a scrum between the Wings and the Rangers, Fontenato took exception to Howe's tough play. He had fought and downed every tough guy in the NHL and now he wanted the "champion." Referee Frank Udvari attempted to restrain him yelling "leave Howe alone! Use your head!" But Leaping Lou was not to be denied. "I want him!" Fontenato insisted. Udvari let him go. "Be my guest," he said.

It didn't take long. Beddoes described the result this way; "Fontenato's nose took an abrupt detour. His cheekbone was fractured. He spit out several teeth like chiclets. Plastic surgeons had to re-arrange his face. Life magazine used six pages of pictures to show Howe's cruel dominance of Fontenato"

Few ever challenged Mr. Hockey again. Even in his last year at 52 years of age.

Virtually every fan is aware of the awesome physical powers of "The Greatest" but few know what a "softie" he was in everyday life. That may actually be his greatest legacy. Bob Duff, writing in the Windsor Star, quoted a fan as summing up Mr. Howe this way: "He was just the most common soul...loving, gracious, class." He was shy to a fault but when he met new people he would put them at immediate ease with his quiet humble manner. Duff himself described him as "class and kindness."

Andy Prest in Vancouver's Northshore News described it as a kind of "mischievous

kindness." Gordie was a laid-back jokester who would surprise you with his subtle humour.

He was especially good with children. He seemed to graduate towards them and they towards him. He spent many hours visiting children with health issues. He was always able to make them laugh and when they did, Mr. Howe would display the biggest, greatest smile that would light up the hospital room. To him, this was fun and he himself once commented; "That's one of my theories of life...you can get a lot of good things done having a lot of fun."

Someone all fans know well, Ron MacLean, in a recent interview summed Mr. Hockey up this way: He will always be known for "his way with people," "never ceased to amaze with his grace," he was a "sensitive tender man."

I listened to his son Murray (who eschewed hockey to become a doctor despite being a top prospect) who gave the eulogy at Gordie's funeral which was widely televised. Part of Murray's passionate speech were these snippets; "Kind, love of kids; helpful to neighbours without being asked; endless autographs; protected his kids; never raised his voice; loyal; a king of comebacks; listener; humble; his purpose was to serve people." And who would know Gordie better than his youngest son? At one point he commented that although Gordie "didn't lead the league in church attendance" he believed in Jesus and especially the statement, "let the little children come to me." That was the philosophy of "Number 9," that tough, hard, mean-on-ice hero. But he just might have been a larger person off the

I have suggested that perhaps Murray knew Gordie best. In retrospect, I take that statement back. Although much negative publicity surrounded Howe's late wife Colleen, perhaps some of her brashness came from knowing that her husband was essentially a "pushover" off the ice. From day one with the Wings, he was badgered by owner Jim Norris (and to some extent by Jack Adams later on).

I believe Colleen knew Gordie could be too kind, too easy in real life. She consequently seemed to take charge in minute detail of every aspect of Gordie's off-ice life.

She was his "manager." She was his protector and sometimes she seemed harsh and unyielding. She was in many a "fight" off the ice to shield her husband from people who would attempt to take advantage of his kind, easy, "aw shucks" personality. I believe she was willing to put up with the

negativity of the media, the hockey bigwigs and detractors of all kinds because she felt it was her duty. I think Gordie knew this. When asked about Colleen, he simply said "I thank God for sending me this blonde," yes, Gordie meant it to be humourous...or did he?

I have left Mr. Hockey's on-ice heroics to the very last as most fans are aware of most of his achievements. But did you know this? In 1979 Gordie played (ANOTHER FIRST!) with sons Marty and Mark. They were with the New England (Hartford) Whalers. That particular day Mark's wife had given birth to one of Gordie's grandchildren. On their first shift of the night, Howe scored a goal assisted by son and new daddy Mark. Mr. Hockey made a remark that was all "Gordie"...something to the effect, "Well, heck, that's a record for the fastest goal by a grandfather in professional hockey." Yep that was the mischievous, kind, humourous Mr. Elbows.

Local former professional and present day Little Current businessman Don McCulloch played against Mr. Howe when Gordie (then with the Houston Aeros) was well into his forties. Mr. McCulloch marveled at the strength, speed and tenacity of a man in his forties playing pro hockey. Don chuckled that he wouldn't have wanted to encounter him in his 30s. As it was, when McCulloch was playing for Vancouver Blazers in the WHA he said that he tasted some of Gordie's nasty elbows! You weren't alone, Donnie!

Wilbur 'Peewee' Oliver lives in retirement from the contracting industry in Little Current. As a young man playing for hometown Soo Greyhounds, Mr. Oliver was invited to a Detroit Red Wings training camp. He says that he would have been 18 then and Gordie Howe, also at the camp, 19. He has a fond memory of the day at that post-war hockey camp when he and the man who would go on to be known as Mr. Hockey sat together at a Detroit diner eating hamburgers and chatting amiably.

And now the easy part of this article! Easy because most fans are quite aware of Mr. Hockey's on-ice accomplishments except maybe for that grandfather record! (LOL). But here are some statistical reminders:

Games, 2,186. Goals, 975. Assists, 1,383. Games with playoffs included, 2,421. Total goals, 1,071. Total assists, 1,518. 20-plus goal seasons, 27. 30-plus goal seasons, 18. First all-star, 12 in the NHL and two in the WHA. Second all-star, 9 in the WHA. Top scorer, 6 times in his NHL career. Hall of fame, June

1972. Order of Canada, 1972. Stanley Cups,

Other interesting tidbits include the fact that: (i) He was a goalie until the age of 11 and 4 years later was at the Galt Red Wings Junior camp as a forward; (ii) In 1944-45, he worked as a munitions maker in a manufacturing plant in Galt. (iii) The following year, he played in the semi-pro USHL with the Omaha Knights; (iv) In his first NHL year he scored but 7 goals in 58 games. (v) Six years later he fired his highest total of 49 barely missing the then Richard record of 50; (vi) Despite their rivalry Gordie admired Richard and even named his dog "Robert"; (vii) Gordie had a brother (Vic) who played in the N.H.L. for the Rangers. (viii) Gordie played all those years with a steel plate in his head, from an altercation with the Leafs' Ted Kennedy early in his career. They thought he would never play again. Oh how he fooled them, The "King of Comebacks"

Needless to say, we could go on ad infinitum with interesting facts and accomplishment carved into history by Mr. Howe. But that would be exhausting!

Howe's prowess could be deceiving. If you went to see him once or twice, you might not see anything spectacular. He did not have the Gallic flair of Rocket Richard or the dipsy-doodle stick handling of that will-of-the-wisp Max Bentley. His forte was that he could do all things surprisingly well. He was not spectacular like a Bobby Hull or Guy Lafleur. But the sum of all the parts was overwhelming. He had a knack for simplifying the game with a subtle pass, a hard backcheck, a little slash to the ankle and magnificent hands around the net.

Howe, born in 1928, came into the world during the Great Depression. He knew hardship and want. It seemed he developed the demeanour of just simply "getting the job done." He carried this over into his hockey. He was dependable, consistent, persistent, skilled and all of these attributes were bolstered by a tremendous work ethic. The total Howe was not only a total hockey player and Dad but also a total good human being.

The Windsor Star's Bob Duff recently summed up Mr. Hockey as a person: "He set the standards for professional athletes everywhere. He was a class act."

Surviving children Marty, Mark, Cathy and Murray can be forever proud of their father

# Charles C. McLean wins Island elementary track and field championship

treading.

Mr. Shawanda related his experience on the evening when he learned he was to be inducted into The Great Northern Opry. "I was invited to dinner at Green Acres," he recalled. "They told me some of the people who were going to be there and I thought it was just a regular dinner thing they did every year. I said 'thanks for inviting me this year'."

Informed that the committee had selected him for induction, Mr. Shawana's reaction was typical of inductees, noted Mr. McDougall. "He thought he was just there to play music with us. He asked us 'why me?'," he said. "When we told him, his jaw bounced off the table about three times."

"I was tongue-tied," admitted Mr. Shawanda. "I just kept saying 'oh, wow'."

Mr. Shawanda, like other inductees in The Great Northern Opry, has been playing in front of audiences for many years and providing not just music, but a full entertainment package that engages the audience and pulls them into the story being relayed in song.

"This isn't me, it isn't on my shoulders," cautions Mr. McDougall. "Every member of the Opry has a say in who is going to be selected next."

The criteria aren't based on fame, fortune or commercial success, quite the contrary. "The people that are selected are not doing this professionally," pointed out Mr. McDougall. "They all have other lives. There's the other 22 hours before you get on stage that have to be taken care of, family obligations and such. These are people who play for the love of playing."

Mr. Shawanda epitomizes that kind of person, said Mr. McDougall. "He does so much for local organizations, the Special Olympics, his church, he does so much for free that people don't realize."

In fact, Mr. Shawanda had played for two church functions in his community on Sunday morning before

coming out to join his fellow inductees to play at the Tehkummah Hall.

"I first started out singing in the school choir at Pontiac," he said. "It wasn't until later in my 20s that I took up the guitar. I was out firefighting and I came home one time and found a guitar on my bed."

While living in Sudbury, Mr. Shawanda became enamoured of the karaoke scene. "I was karaoke crazy," he laughed. "I must have been out every week, sometimes twice a week, wherever it was going on."

But when it came to stepping out on stage, Mr. Shawanda took several pages out of the books of his Wikwemikong precursors, folks like Mr. Manitowabi and Mr. Peltier. "It's like those guys and the folks from Down Yonder, Glen, Doug and Jeff, they all have a presence on stage," he said. "It's not that you just get up and play your music and sing your songs, you bring the audience along with you."

...continued from page 1 trail standards and managing claims, they have seen insurance premiums lowered by 50 percent.

He told the audience that Bill 100 came out last summer and that the OFSC saw positives, but also saw that more had to be done and so told the committee what its members' concerns were, and the committee listened.

Trespass to property fines have been increased from \$2,000 to \$10,000 under the new bill and court-ordered awards for damages have gone from a maximum of \$1,000 to no limit.

"Duty of care changes are a major step for landowners," he continued.

"We saw it as unfortunate that we became the target of the bill," Mr. Baker said.

He called the relationship between the Snowdusters and the landowner as the most important one. Sixty percent of 32,000 kilometres of trails is on private land, thanks to 200,000 cooperative landowners, he added.

"Over 50 years we have developed land use permission agreements in which you dictate the provisions,' he continued. "The agreements are just that—it's your property, you decide what the conditions are when you're talking to members. There are clearly concerns from landowners on the bill. We've lost nearly 300 segments of trails thanks to this and 500 kilometres of trails are affected, predominantly in central and southern Ontario, but 20 percent of the affected trails are in District 12."

The backlash over Bill 100 has caused countless hours of time for OFSC volunteers, not to mention a lot of stress, Mr. Baker said.

We thought the bill was fixable with changes," he continued. "The majority of landowners said it was a 'wait and see' approach. We're realistic yet optimistic that if concerns are addressed and uncertainties are relieved that we can rebuild the relationship and trust between now and the fall," noting that land use agreement forms were available that evening and thanking the landowners for working with the Snow-

Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Michael Mantha, a member of the all-party Bill 100 reviewing committee, also spoke at the information night.

He began by speaking of Manitoulin's economic sensitivity, specifically during the winter months.

"Sledding is something we do, it's part of our DNA," Mr. Mantha said. "There's no Disneyworld here; that's our forests and trails. I firmly believe that the relationship is still there, we just need to clear the air on the bad information out there."

The MPP explained that the committee clarified two items: what voluntary is and the term 'easement.' Voluntary means that the historic relationship between the Snowdusters and landowners will not change, he explained. "Nothing should hurt it or change it."

"The red flag is if you choose to have an easement," Mr. Mantha continued. He gave the example of areas with significant water crossings or major infrastructure to be undertaken by the OFSC costing in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. "You want to make sure you still get to use that property in the years to come."

"I wouldn't encourage you to get into an easement but if you do, get a lawyer and make it ironclad," he encouraged.

"Nothing has changed," the MPP reiterated. "The relationship that was historically there is still here...We need to get on the same page now."

"You don't want to be responsible for shutting down the trail," he said to the landowners present. "We have to trust each other on that one. If we don't work on that, our communities are going to hurt. It's fun on the Island in the summer, but tough as hell in winter."

Randy Walker, executive member for District 9, president of his local snowmobile club and a Manitoulin landowner, also addressed the crowd. He noted that when he first heard of Bill 100 he was irate, but when he calmed down and read the whole thing, he found that the bill didn't actually pose a problem besides the word 'may' when discussing easements.

In conversations with representatives of the Ontario Landowners' Association, Mr. Walker said he was told that the OFSC needed to take a side on the issue, which he disagreed with.

He gave kudos to the Snowdusters for meeting the problem head on and encouraged landowners to take the time and read the legislation through.

"This club has done a pile of relationship-building," Mr. Walker said. In his own community, "I lost a lot of sleep and did what I could to make people happy. I'm not just going to do something to risk my friendship with my landowners and know this club is the same way."

Mr. Walker also noted, with confirmation from Mr. Mantha, that the bill passed with support from all three parties and only three dissenting votes out of 107.

Brad Middleton, a member of the Snowdusters' executive, then walked the group through the OFSC's insurance policy as it pertains to personal injury and property damage.

If a rider breaks a leg or hits a tree, the policy kicks in, he explained, but noted that it was limited to snowmobilers and the "normal activities pertaining to the operation of the snowmobile trail."

"If a hiker or horseback rider hurt themselves in the summer on the trail, it's their problem," he stated. "If some guy takes his snowmobile out in July and hurts himself, there's no coverage."

The coverage is all year if the landowner doesn't withdraw their slip during the off-season, Mr. Middleton further explained.

If a person hurts themselves with a chainsaw while bettering the trail, they are covered.

What if a snowmobiler gets hurt off the trail? They are covered. "You are insured anywhere on your land, even if it's a delinquent rider."

What if the rider doesn't have a trial permit? The landowner is still covered.

Is there a deductible? Not for the landowner, the club pays it.

Mr. Middleton explained that until 1979, the law was a "hodge podge" of when the landowner was liable. 'The biggest was in southern Ontario between riders and farmers," he said, noting the cases involving snowmobilers hurting themselves, sometimes when running fatally. across farm properties that used wire fencing after dark.

In 1979, the Occupiers Liability Act was passed. "This divided people who came onto your property into two categories: invited and uninvited guests." If they're uninvited, they weren't the landowner's problem, but once a property owner signed a land use agreement with the club, the snowmobiler became an invited guest.

"If you've got an insurance policy to back you up, that's just as good as being an uninvited guest," Mr. Middleton explained. "The good thing about Bill 100 is that it amended three acts and took less liability off the landowner. Now the burden of proof means you have to prove the landowner really screwed up and that's hard to nail."

He further added that if a landowner thinks they should have more insurance, then they should get it

Jack Wood asked if he would be covered if he was hit by a snowmobiler on his own property. Mr. Middleton explained that yes, he would be covered.

Kelly Timmermans of Little Current asked how much the coverage was for. The answer is \$15 million.

She also asked about her own Country Fest property, which is used by snowmobilers accessing ice trails. Ms. Timmermans had con-

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

...continued from page 10 veys, and there is no way Snowdusters could afford to have surveys done.

Bruce Wood of Green Bay was the last to speak, telling the Snowdusters how "extremely disappointed" he was in the Snowdusters and saying he felt the club was against him and taking him on. "The trail is closed; it'll never be open again." Mr. Wood's property contains a major portion of the trail between Honora Bay and Sheguian-

Mr. McVey said he appreciated that Mr. Wood decided to re-open his trail near the end of the season and that it was his right to close

Mr. Wood said he had concerns with the portion of Bill 100 that talked of the minister decreeing a 'trail of distinction.' Mr. Mantha explained that it would be the landowner that would approach the minister to have him declare a special trail as one of distinction and not the other way around.

Mr. Mantha suggested having a cup of coffee with Mr. Wood and members of the Snowdusters to bring the relationship back to where it was.

"In my mind, they went against me," Mr. Wood said. "You never called me," he added, to which Mr. McVey said that he did.

"Goodwill and a handshake ain't going to cut it,' Mr. Wood replied.

Mr. McVey explained that each year the Snowdusters conducts a draw for numerous gas cards which they gift to their landowners. This tradition was carried on following the meeting. Also this year, he said, the Snowdusters took out ads in both Island newspapers thanking the landowners for the use of their land.

Bud Wilkin of Little Current publicly thanked Mr. Wood for bringing Bill 100 to light through the local media. "I hope he rethinks his position," Mr. Wilkin added. "I'd like to go through his trail, I just bought a new skidoo," he said to much laughter from the audience.

Jack Wood noted that everyone gets something but the farmers."

Ms. Timmermans countered that no, all of Manitoulin benefits from the snowmobile trails.

Mr. McVev told The Expositor following the meeting that he thought the meeting went well and that the club was going to try and reach out to Bruce Wood to see if he will rethink the closure of his trail, but said he respects his right to do so.

"There are three places on Manitoulin that are in the same situation," he added, but said he was happy that many landowners signed forms following the meeting.



comprehensive analysis of strengths, gaps, and challenges faced by Northerners accessing addiction services," said a release from the North East LHIN. "Access. coordination and system sustainability are three themes of the report's findings which are in keeping with the NE LHIN's current priorities for enhanced patient care across Northeastern Ontario.

The recommendations in the review include: planning—strengthen regional planning, ensure First Nations representation and bring hospital and community providers together to build a common vision that focuses on client needs; hospital/community—focus on collaborative care for the percentage of clients who require medical intervention, and support people primarily in their community and

ensure that the transitions between hospital and community care are seamless; residential treatment—it is important that clients are carefully matched to the most appropriate care and ensure transition care plans are in place when clients return home; withdrawal management—enhance 'in-house' medical supports; addiction medicine—ensure that people accessing opioid medication assisted treatment have appropriate access to counselling services; and community treatment-invest in outreach, day/evening treatment programs and transportation

...continued from page 1 nursing home gaining the training. Personal support workers can also receive the training.

Before dialysis, total kidney failure that can result from diabetes was an eventual death sentence. Dialysis is a way of cleaning the blood in your body when your kidneys are no longer up to the job. Dialysis gets rid of the body's wastes, extra salt and water, and helps to control blood pressure. The other option is a kidney transplant, often not an option for older diabetics.

There are two kinds of dialysis. In hemodialysis, blood is pumped out of your body to an artificial kidney machine, returned to your body by tubes that connect you to the machine. Health Science North conducts that type of dialysis at the Manitoulin Health Centre.

In peritoneal dialysis, the inside lining of your own belly acts as a natural filter. Wastes are removed by means of a cleansing fluid called dialysate, which is washed in and out of the belly in cycles.

In peritoneal dialysis, a soft plastic tube (catheter) is placed in the belly by surgery, then a sterile cleansing fluid is put into the belly through this catheter. After the filtering process is finished, the fluid leaves your body through the catheter.

There are two types of peritoneal dialysis, continuous ambulatory dialysis (CAPD) where the fluid is machine free, where two

litres of cleansing fluid is pumped into the belly and later drained, and automated peritoneal dialysis (APD) which utilizes a machine.

In APD a machine called a cycler delivers and then drains the cleansing fluid. The treatment usually is done at night while the patient sleeps.

has worked tirelessly to help make this project hap-

ing, but the agenda went forward as presented

"The agenda item on the in camera note taking was only a notice of motion, with no discussion," noted Ms. Dewar. "That motion will be presented at the July 5 meeting, so there is plenty of time as it goes out to the public for another month and a half." As to the other items on the agenda, Ms. Dewar went on to assert that there was no real issue with the other items being of enough significant interest to the public to delay moving forward with the agenda.

"Bylaws are your 'rules of the road'," quoted Mr. Killens from a recent presentation on board regulations. "(They are) a public document describing the process by which you make what are binding decisions for your organization. The law says you must have them, common sense says you should know how to use them, and good practice says your stakeholders should be able to understand how you are applying them."

He goes on to point out that "for your board's decisions to have legitimacy, the process by which you arrived at those decisions must be able to withstand the scrutiny of trustees who may disagree with the outcome, of staff who have to implement what you've decided and of the public."

Mr. Killens said that "this begs the question, if you are asked by a judicial process, for instance a freedom of information request or a civil court of justice, to justify how you arrived at your decision after an hour or more expulsion hearing, a termination of a staff member, a million-dollar expenditure, a school closure and so on, just how does one do that without making notes to reference an event from possibly months, years previous an event that somehow finds its way into the courts?"

Mr. Killens goes on to note that he, as a trustee, has been accused of Code

of Conduct violations, "and I certainly hope that the trustees hearing the matter kept notes as to what they based their decision on. Decisions made by the current board are now up for appeal with the Ombudsman's office and will need to be explained to them."

"It has been suggested by one colleague, the name of that colleague does not matter, that considering my past vocation as a police officer, I should know that anyone including the police, the F.O.I. Commission can access any notes from an in camera meeting and find what discussions were done," said Mr. Killens. "That comment/suggestion scares me, as it suggests that we have something to hide of an unlawful or inappropriate means. One must consider, while true, that the notes are not protected from disclosure, they are heavily protected. If access is requested through the Municipal Freedom of Information a requestor must prove, a) they have the right to access b) a reason why the information should be shared c) and that the requestor personally has an interest in the topic.'

"Once permission, if granted, is given to the requestor(s) the institution, in our case, Rainbow Board wishes, they can "black out" or refuse to dis-close any part of the documents requested, they choose," he continued. "If the police wish to access in camera notes they must go through a very involved judicial process and satisfy a court of justice official, the information being sought is on reasonable and probable grounds, to believe the documents form a criminal offence that has occurred or the information in said documents constitute evidence. I was a police officer for 30 years and can say with authority, I never have been aware of such circumstance.'

In contrast I can say that in one case the Rainbow District School Board served up documents to the police on their own, without being requested by anyone involving a criminal offence," Mr. Killens said. "That action by the board placed the police service in sharp criticism by the courts for not obtaining the documents by warrant. The evidence involved was not allowed/admitted to be part of the evidence to convict the offender."

"As well and in addition," continued Mr. Killens, "a trustee taking office having been elected to that office takes an oath, before a judge to swear to confidentiality of matters in confidence."

Mr. Killens noted that the added provisions of the oath and regulatory obligations of elected officials also provide strong protections.

"In an earlier meeting of the board where this motion was discussed," recalled Mr. Killens, "I suggested the proposed wording require that any notes taken by a trustee be kept in the care, control, and custody of the board on file pending any legal requirement that they be disclosed. I suggested this would possibly satisfy the movers' concern of some rogue trustee releasing information."

In that meeting, Mr. Killens said he "urged that good note taking would serve to accurate accounting and having the back of colleagues who are challenged on what they did or did not say. A time span before destruction/purging of personal notes could be arrived at."

In Mr. Killens' view, to "prohibit note taking and even more so using the explanation/concern that they could be accessed legally, the reasoning being that, if there were no notes, the information could not be accessed at all, is, in my personal opinion, breaching ethics and good business practice at a very high level. I consider note taking as insurance to establishing credibility."

The motion is due to be debated at the July 5 meeting of the RDSB.

"A Makerspace is a student driven. hands on and interactive place for learnexplained LCPS Grade 8 teacher April Aelick. "It includes everything from robotics to moving making, wood work, 3D printing and crafts."

The LCPS Makerspace is headed up by a group of teachers including Robyn Charbonneau, Grade 1/2 teacher Melissa Volpini, vice principal Heather Pennie and Ms.

The team is currently working on transitioning the library into a shared space with both the library, computer lab and Maker-

"In December we submitted a proposal for \$39,000 to the (Rainbow District School) board, who chose to send our proposal on to the Teacher Learning and Leadership Program," said Ms. Aelick. "Ours was one of two selected, with the other being from Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS), which is pretty neat.'

Both LCPS and MSS were successful in their proposals and received funding for

Ms. Volpini told The Expositor that a major component of the program is sharing the development and learning journey with other teachers in the school, RDSB and beyond.

As their prime sharing tool, the teachers have developed a blog chronicling the process of developing the Makerspace, LCPSmakers.blogspot.ca and a twitter account @LCPSTLLP.

"We had a maker day in our classrooms recently to build the excitement for the new space (which will be launched this fall)," said Ms. Aelick. "The students really enjoyed it."

"I've never seen my students so engaged," added Ms. Charbonneau.

Some of the plans for the new Makerspace include a green screen for moving

making, a 3D printer, an epic 'Lego wall,' Lego minestorm, and Dot and Dash (primary robots that can be coded).

Dash is a robot that responds to voice, navigating object, dancing and singing. Students can program Dash to create new behaviours.

The LCPS group purchased a DREMEL 3D Idea Builder, which will foster student creativity and allow their imaginations to come alive.

"We also want to introduce leather crafting and beadwork," said Ms. Pennie, "and we hope to get people in from the surrounding communities to share their knowledge of these crafts. We also want to incorporate knitting, sewing and cooking.'

The space will continue to be developed throughout the summer, with professional development for teachers early next fall to explore the space and learn about combining the curriculum with the activities in

They explained that the Makerspace will be student centered, with learning driven from what they are interested in.

'We want to teach students to make mistakes—that's where the learning happens," said Ms. Charbonneau.

"The TLLP is an annual project-based professional learning opportunity for experienced classroom teachers," explains a release from the MOE. "The program funds proposals from classroom teachers seeking peer leadership roles in curriculum, instructional practice or supporting other teachers. The program has three goals: create and support opportunities for teacher professional learning, foster teacher leadership and facilitate the sharing of exemplary practices with others for the broader benefit of Ontario's students.'



TORONTO—Winners from the recent Kenjgewin Teg Regional Heritage Fair, representing two Manitoulin area schools, travelled to the University of Toronto recently to share their projects at the provincial level.

On June 11, three students, Shade Kaiser, age 7, of Lakeview School, Eli Paibomsai, age 6, and Avery Sutherland, also age 6, both of Shawanosowe School, showcased their winning heritage fair projects at the Ontario Provincial Heritage Fair at the William Doo Auditorium along with almost 70 other students from across the province.

Shade's project was on the grass dance.

"I am of Anishinabe, Haudenosaunee and German descent,' Shade told the judges. "My presentation is on the grass dance. It is one of our oldest forms of dance. I have been a grass dancer since I could walk. Included in my presentation is the origin and meaning of the grass dance,

specialty dances, the regalia pieces and information on powwows. Also included are beautiful pictures at various powwows of myself with family and friends. I am proud of my culture and love to share my teachings. I will be adorned in my grass dance regalia and will be willing to teach you a few dance moves.'

Eli Paibomsai's Heritage Fair presentation was on the sucker fish.

"This project examines the importance of the sucker fish on Anishinabe life," he said. "While considered a 'garbage' fish by many anglers, this project looks at traditional harvesting and preparation methods of suckers. The project further examines the sucker species of Ontario and their range."

Avery Sutherland gave a historical presentation on 'Birch Island: Then

"My project is about Birch Island: Then and Now and investigates my

community's history," she explained to the judges. "In this project, I talk about the schools, transportation, homes and buildings, then I compare them to the buildings today. I also talked about what stayed the same through the years.'

"The Ontario Heritage Fairs program is a volunteer initiative based on the belief that engaging children in the history of their communities helps them develop into responsible, well-informed citizens," states a press release from Canada's Heritage Fairs. "Aimed at students aged 9 to 15, the Fairs inspire young people to explore personal and collective Canadian experiences in any number of media—displays, painting, sculpture, prose, music or computer-based projects. The delegates at the Provincial Fair represent the more than 20,000 Ontario students who participated in the 2016 Fairs program."



### First Nations leaders meet in Thunder Bay over climate change

THUNDER BAY—First Nations communities, their cultures and traditions, have always been tied closely with the land and, as such, those communities are on the front line for the impact of climate change.

Over 30 representatives from 15 First Nation communities from across Ontario gathered in Thunder Bay for a two-day meeting last week to discuss climate change policy and crucial next steps. First Nation leadership, members of the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change as well as Ministry of Energy were in attendance

"For indigenous peoples, climate change is a matter of life and death," said Ontario Regional Chief Isadore Day. "First Nations have contributed the least to greenhouse gas emissions yet our communities are already feeling the effects of climate change, especially remote Northern communities. We are the first ones to feel the adverse effects which impact on every single aspect of our daily life, from lack of winter roads to warmer seasons that disrupt access to fish and wildlife Seasonal changes, extreme weather and natural disasters are affecting our community's ability to access basic services which leaves us two steps behind the average Canadian."

The regional meeting provided an opportunity for First Nations to learn from the work of other communities in adaptation and mitigation measures aimed at dealing with climate change. The meeting provided high level recaps from the provincial territorial organizations and First Nation representatives had the opportunity to ask questions of the provincial government during a panel session with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change.

"I believe that the Statement of Reconciliation, along with the 2015 Politi-Accord between Ontario and the Chiefs of Ontario, will enable us to finally address this terrible chapter in our current relationship," added Regional Chief Day. "As the newly appointed chair of the national Assembly First Nations Committee on the Environment, I will ensure that our voice is heard and we are equal partner at any climate change table. Climate change laws and policies in Ontario must recognize that energy policy and investments must be integrated as much as possible in climate change policy."

At the June 8 release of the Climate Change Action Plan, Premier Wynne said that there will be an enormous cost imposed on future generations if nothing is done now to combat climate change. First Nations agree, notes a release from the Assembly of First Nations, but they also expressed frustration that the provincial government has not adequately included them in the cli-

mate change policy making process, specifically with the passing of Bill 172 legislating a cap and trade program as well as the Climate Change Action Plan.

"Today's ambitious announcement by the provincial government is a significant step in the right direction towards combating climate change and preserving this land for future generations. However, the next step will now be to walk together and work in full partnership with First Nations," said Regional Chief Isadore Day following the release of the plan. "First Nations live exclusively on the most vulnerable, and the most valuable lands in treaty and traditional lands—in rural and Northern regions; while 90 percent of the Ontario populations live on just 13 percent of the land in the south and in concentrated urban communities.

"Our peoples, from the north to the south, have been suffering from the affects of global warming and pollution for many years," noted Chief Day. "Our communities have been most affected by floods, fires, contaminated water and a loss of traditional foods. First Nations signed the Treaties to equally share the lands and resources. Now we want to work in partnership, based on the principles of Free, Prior and Informed Consent (FPIC), to ensure the lands and resources are shared for future generations."

"I am conditionally optimistic that today's announcement emphasizes that First Nation Traditional Ecological Knowledge

will guide the provincial action plan," continued Chief Day. "In addition, the province has pledged to include our peoples in the new carbon economy, as well as provide funding to replace dirty diesel generation with green energy micro-grids. Our First Nations must also continue to work with the province on major green energy projects that will supply power to all Ontarians. Climate change laws and policies in Ontario must recognize that energy policy and investments must be integrated as much as possible in climate change policy."

#### Motorcyclist hurt in Highway 6 collision

At approximately 3:35 pm on Monday, June 13, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a sinvehicle collision involving a motorcycle on Highway Tehkummah Township. As a result, a 68-year-old man of Orangeville was transported to hospital with life threatening injuries.

The highway was closed for approximately five hours while OPP Technical Collison Investigators (TCI) completed their scene investigation and determined driver error was a contributing factor in the collision.

#### **OPP** catches impaired driver

On the morning of June 5, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Communications Centre in North Bay received a phone call from concerned citizen reporting an impaired driver operating a pickup truck in Spring Bay. Manitoulin OPP officers located the vehicle and driver in Spring Bay. The driver was arrested for impaired driving.

As a result of this investigation, a 49-year-old male of Campbell Township has been charged with impaired care or control of a motor vehicle, and exceeding the legal limit of alcohol in his blood, contrary to section 253(1) (a) and 253(1) (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada.

The accused was held in custody pending a bail hearing at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on June 8, 2016.

The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving. Anyone who suspects a driver is driving while impaired is urged to call police by dialing 9-1-1 immediately.



# Manitoulin Sea Cadets hold 12th annual review

LITTLE CURRENT—The 348 Manitoulin Royal Canadian Sea Cadets held their 12th annual ceremonial review this past Sunday, demonstrating the disciplined work the cadets put into their training this past year.

The ceremony started with colours and the ship's company falling in prior to O Canada. Following the national anthem, there was a minute of silence for members of the Canadian Forces veterans, past and present.

Lieutenant (Navy) Denis Blake was the master of ceremonies for the afternoon and welcomed parents, community members and distinguished guests to the event.

The reviewing party was led by Jeff Marshall. "Mr. Marshall was born and raised in Little Current," said Lieutenant Blake. "After he completed school, he joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1952. He served on a number of ships including the HMCS Lauzon, a frigate, HMCS Restigouche, a destroyer, and the cruiser HMCS Quebec (previously named the HMS Uganda).'

'Mr. Marshall's long time friend, (the late) Ed Kift, served on the Uganda during World War II,' continued Lieutenant Blake, noting that Mr. Marshall returned home to Manitoulin in 1978 after working in Brampton in the manufacturing industry. "Mr. Marshall was one of two individuals responsible for the formation of 348 Manitoulin Sea Cadets.

The audience was asked to stand as the reviewing party entered and began their review. The party was comprised of Mr. Marshall, Commanding Officer of 348 Manitoulin Lieutenant (Navy) Maggie King-Roi, Manitoulin Navy League President Bob Jewell and North Bay Cadet Detachment representative Petty Officer First Class John Green.

"Fourteen years ago, a group of Navy veterans led by the late Ed Kift and Jeff Marshall of Little Current had an idea to form a Sea Cadets Corps on Manitoulin,' explained Lieutenant Blake of the history of the Corps. "Between 2002 and 2004, the Manitoulin cadets were a division of 134 Admiral Mountbatten Sea Cadet Corps at Sudbury. These veterans drove a group of cadets weekly for training to Sudbury."

"In 2004, 348 Manitoulin Roval Canadian Sea Cadets Corps, obtained their charter and became a standalone corps," Lieutenant Blake added. "Under the leadership of them and Lieutenant Carmen Laidley, the corps grew and matured. In 2007, the corps was led by Lieutenant (Navy) Deb Goode, then by Lieutenant (Navy) Denis Blake in 2009. In 2012, Lieutenant (Navy) Maggie King-Roi took over as Commanding Officer and remains in that position today."

Lieutenant Blake noted that many former Manitoulin Sea Cadets have distinguished themselves and have become leaders in their community, business, civil service and the Canadian Armed Forces. "The Corps receives many compliments on the behaviour and professionalism of their cadets on parade and in the community," he said. "The Corps has done very well in many competitions throughout the year which have included seamanship, orienteering and marksmanship competitions.

Lieutenant Blake acknowledged the cadet marksmanship team (team captain PO1 Nick Harper, CPO1 Brad Sayyae, PO2 Miranda Mackay, MS Abby Harper, AB Ryan Jones), which came in second this year at the zone shoot in competition with eight other cadet corps in the Sudbury.

He credited the Cadet Regional

Detachment and the Navy League of Canada, specifically the Navy League Branch of Manitoulin, supporting the Corps and the hard work of the cadets, officers and civilinstructors that come together to make the program a success.

He also noted that Officer Tara Pascoe achieved the rank of Acting Lieutenant that Tina Cadet this year.

Next on the agenda, the cadets conducted a drill

without arms routine led by Chief Petty Officer Second Class Rebecca MacDonald.

The newly formed 348 Manitoulin cadet band performed next, demonstrating their skills led by Petty Officer First Class Alexis French.

The lettuce and spinach that I planted, way back in the cold snap of our early spring, is growing gang busters. I love it. So how many of you people planted either some lettuce seeds or lettuce plants in a little corner, or amongst your flowers or vegetable garden. Everybody should be saying "I did."

#### Baby Spinach and Bacon with Pickled Onions and Feta

I mixed the spinach with leaf lettuce and added some chickpeas instead of bacon. When I use bacon I will take the extra effort and go to Burt Farms and pick up the picnic bacon that they make there. Excellent flavour and very little fat. The pickled onions will keep in the fridge easily for a month or two, ready to be used to top of a variety of salads: tuna, avocado, tomato, chickpea.

FOR THE PICKLED RED ONIONS

- 1 cup of sugar
- 1 cup of red wine vinegar
- 1 tsp of your favourite hot sauce
- A sprinkle of salt and pepper
- 1 large red onion, sliced into thin rounds

#### FOR THE SALAD

- 8 slices of bacon, diced (add 1/2 or 1 cup chickpeas instead)
  - 4 Tbsp of red wine vinegar
- 2 Tbsp of brown sugar
- 2 Tbsp sunflower seed or grape seed oil
- 2 tsp of your favourite mustard
- 10 ounces of baby spinach (I add leaf lettuce)
- 8 ounces of feta or goat or your favourite cheese
- 1. Make the pickled red onions first. Put the sugar, vinegar, hot sauce, salt, and pepper into a small pot and bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Add the onion and heat just long enough to return the mixture to a simmer, 2 or 3 minutes. Cool to room temperature. For best results, let the mixture sit overnight in the fridge.
- 2. When it is salad time, brown the bacon pieces until they're crispy. Remove from the pan with a slotted spoon and let the bacon drain on a piece of paper towel.
- 3. In a small bowl, whisk together the vinegar, sugar, oil, and mustard until smooth.
- 4. Just before serving, toss the dressing with spinach and lettuce leaves and top with the feta, bacon, and pickled red onions. Serve.
- \*\*\*When you are picking your lettuce from the garden pick early morning or late evening (do not pick when the sun is on the lettuce) wash right away and then place in a bowl in the fridge. This will make the lettuce crisp up nice-

\*\*the mustard acts as an emulsifier, helping the oil and vinegar combine into a smooth dressing. I usually replace sugar in any salad dressing with either honey or maple

# Church Mouse Café offers homecooked food, sweet treats and a good cuppa

been a dream years in the making, a slow and steady labour of love, but come Saturday, June 25, when the Church Mouse Café opens its doors in Whitefish Falls, for cousins Nicole Bond and Suzie Jewell it will have been well worth the wait.

The Church Mouse Café is situated in the former St. Julia's Catholic Church, a Jesuit church circa 1912, nestled beside the former Wheeler's Store (the historic Les Williamson Store) on Whitefish Falls' 'main

Catholic After the Church diocese sold the church property in the 1970s, the church changed hands a couple of times before once again ending up on the market and becoming the property of Ms. Bond, who says that while she hoped for waterfront property in her hometown to start a café, she's happy with the way things worked

The cousins spoke of the monumental cleanup that took place in the rundown little church. After gowning up in hazmat suits and masks to ensure their safety against guano and mouse leftovers, the pair got down to business before the real work began—renovations to every aspect of the former St. Julia's.

"I am in awe of both Suzie and Nicole—they did the work and construction on things that they thought they would never do in their lives," said Ms. Bond's brother Andre 'Skipper'

Bussieres. "The two learned everything from how to use electric drills, to cutting baseboards on band saws, to the laying of floor throughout the entire building. Putting up siding, working at heights, painting, you name it, if they didn't have the skillset before this project, they sure know it now. We are all very proud of the outcome of the project."

And there is much to be proud about.

The narrow little church has been truly made over but Ms. Bond and Ms. Jewell have managed to return all of its original charms, and many of its fixtures too. The church's actual confessional waits for patrons upstairs in the balcony seating area in case one is moved to make a confession, perhaps after a sinfully good treat from Ms. Jewell's famed baking.

While the original bell from the church's bell tower was looted many years ago, Ms. Bond was able to reclaim a beautiful piece of stained glass that had originally graced the community's Anglican Church, since torn down, that the cousins have transformed into a stunning light fixture.

Even the pine boards used to detail the church wall were taken down, sanded and used for baseboards, window trim and

the unique red tables that will be used in the café, and customers will delight in the candy table from the former Stump and Spry General Store (currently the Riverside Café) that acts as the café's till. The pair is happy to boast that 90 percent of the wood from the church was reclaimed back into the building.

The Church Mouse Café, under the direction of Ms. Jewell, will be serving homemade soups and sandwiches, all on an array of homemade breads. Sweet treats (as anyone who has been on Ms. Jewell's Christmas list can attest) are sure to be a big hit with the cus-

tomers. Coffee, teas and cold beverages will round out the list of goods on offer.

The cousins say that each day will be a surprise for customers as there will not be a set menu, but that speciality items such as cakes, tarts or squares can be ordered in advance, as can loaves of bread.

"If you just want to come for a coffee, you can," Ms. Jewell enthuses. Muskoka chairs can be found on the property outside so customers can enjoy their goodies in nature too.

Everything is homemade—nothing will come from a box or a can," she


