LaSalle's Griffon remains missing but **Discovery Channel** finds new shipwrecks near Meldrum Bay

Two ships lost in Mississagi Strait in 1890

MISSISSAGI STRAIT—The whereabouts of the wreck of famed explorer Lasalle's ship Le Griffon remains a mystery, despite the best efforts of maritime historians, archaeologists and Josh Gates, host of 'Expedition Unknown' on Discovery Channel.

Le Griffon, dubbed the "Holy Grail of undiscovered Great Lakes shipwrecks," disappeared on its maiden round-trip voyage in the year 1679. Many consider it to be the first ship on the Great Lakes. A search for its wreck was the subject of last Wednesday's episode of 'Expedition Unknown,' part of which took place in the waters surrounding Western Manitoulin Island.

"Although we didn't find the Griffon, it still advanced the search and went in one or two different directions that I didn't consider in the past. I think it was very well worthwhile," said maritime historian and author Cris Kohl, who was featured in the episode as an expert and a member of the dive team. His wife and

also made an appearance, as the first expert interview which was conducted at Niagara Falls.

Le Griffon set sail from the Niagara River for points west, arriving near modern-day Green Bay, Wisconsin, on Lake Michigan. Lasalle left the ship at this point and sent the ship home with six crewmembers and thousands of dollars in furs. It was never

Former security guard appealing sexual assault conviction after Island verdict

TORONTO—A hearing has been set for June 18 at the Ontario Court of Appeal in Toronto for Roy Preston who was sentenced in April of last year in the sexual assault of Destiny Douglas, who waived her rights to a publication ban to have her story known.

As has been reported previously by this newspaper, Roy Preston was sentenced to three years in jail last April for the 2015 sexual assault of his junior colleague, Ms. Douglas, while they were employed by a local security company. Mr. Preston was 46 at the time and Ms. Douglas was 19.

The assault took place on the Manitoulin Country Fest grounds on August 1, 2015 while the security detail was hired for the Little Current Lions Club's Haweater Weekend festivities. The security company was using the grounds as a camping spot while working in the community.

The court heard that it was during a staff party following their

MANITOULIN—As the sweet scent of sage and sweetgrass drifted across the bay at M'Chigeeng, two young women gently poured waters collected from two sides of Manitoulin Island to mingle in the middle. An offering of tobacco laid down by Wiikwemkoong elder Patricia Manitowabi floated on the water's surface nearby. The pouring of the waters was the culmination of a daylong odyssey conducted by two determined groups of Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) students, staff and well-wishers.

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Low Island splash pad construction to begin in early July

LOW ISLAND—Little Current's Low Island Park may soon be home to a splash pad—a jungle gym of watery adventure, for the uninformed.

As reported previously in this newspaper, Northeast Town council received word from the province that it was approved for a grant of \$150,000 for the development of a splash pad, which was cited by the town as a sought-after item by the residents of the municipality.

The Little Current Lions Club had also agreed to chip in \$10,000 from its Catch the Ace funds should a grant be

The splash pad went out to tender, with four companies responding: Diamond Head Sprinklers, \$179,800 with enhanced features and \$159,800 base price; CRCS Recreation, \$170,000; ABC Recreation, \$179,269.85 with enhanced features and \$159,303.70 base price; and New World Park Solutions, \$175,000 with enhanced features and \$158,000 without. Staff recommended that council accept the \$158,000 tender of New World Park Solutions.

CAO Dave Williamson explained that this particular unit would consume approximately nine cubic metres each day through its operation of June to September, eight hours a day. The Little Current water treatment plant's approved maximum daily volume is 3,400 cubic metres, of which the average daily use is 3,327 cubic metres, leaving 73 cubic metres to work with.

It was explained that the municipality would only be in charge of prepping the land—the rest is up to the company.

Mr. Williamson told council that should water consumption become an issue, the splash pad would simply be turned off. Staff will also be speaking with the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks to see if the municipality could obtain a permit to run a line from the splash pad to the adjacent beach to draw directly from the lake by way of backup. (The splash pad is set to be located between the grassy area between the pavilion and the beach.)

Councillor Barb Baker asked what the water consumption would cost should the secondary line not be permitted. Mr. Williamson explained that it would cost the municipality \$1,000 per month.

Councillor Baker also asked about the risk of vandalism. Mr. Williamson replied that the splash pad structures are not conducive to being vandalized, as they are mostly tall poles, but that the park could be subjected to paint vandals, which is the type of vandalism most often seen by the

"The water leaving (the splash pad) is untreated and goes back to the lake?" Councillor Jim Ferguson asked, querying if that poses issues. Mr. Williamson replied that it did not.

Councillor Ferguson suggested signage reminding users ...continued on page 10

SUDBURY—Northeast Town mayor Al MacNevin has been appointed by his peers on the Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) to be Manitoulin's

representative at the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities' (FONOM) table, replacing FONOM's longest serving representative, former Billings mayor Austin Hunt.

Mayor MacNevin said his appointment happened at an April

meeting of the MMA when they realized that Mr. Hunt, the District of Manitoulin's FONOM rep, needed to be replaced. When no one volunteered to put their name forward, Mayor MacNevin offered to fill the spot.

Mayor MacNevin attended his first FONOM meeting during last week's session in Sudbury.

There are 11 directors at the

FONOM table. They each represent one of the seven districts and one of the four cities in Northeastern Ontario.

Mayor MacNevin said much of last week's discussion focused on

the impending downloads to municipalities. "Everyone knows there will be impacts, but we don't have numbers," he said.

> "The message we received (from the ministers present) was basically, 'you got your efficiency funding this year, so use it

to your advantage'," Mayor Mac-Nevin said.

ONTARIO—Recently, Rod Phillips, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and Grand Council Chief Glen Hare co-chaired the Great Lakes Guardian Council, which includes leaders from across Ontario including municipalities, First Nations and Métis communities, environmental organizations, and the science community, to discuss challenges and opportunities around the Great

The council meeting updated participants on issues such as excess road salt,

plastic pollution, harmful algae and sewer overflows in waterways. They also discussed the government's efforts to update Ontario's Great Lakes Strategy and negotiation of a new Canada-Ontario Great Lakes Agreement with the federal govern-

"This was my first meeting with the Great Lakes Guardians' Council and the exchange of ideas from partners around the table and dialogue about how to tackle the pressures on our water resources and protect our Great Lakes was extremely

valuable," said Minister Phillips. "We will take what we learned from today's Council meeting along with future consultations to inform the actions we will take together to protect our Great Lakes and keep our water clean."

The meeting also honoured the legacy of the late Josephine Mandamin, an Anishinaabe grandmother, elder, water protector and activist. In 2003, she cofounded Mother Earth Water Walk, circumnavigating the shores of all five Great Lakes to raise awareness about the condition of these waterways. Josephine's total kilometres walked for the water has been tallied at over 25,000 kilometres. In the role of Chief Commissioner of the Anishinabek Nation Women's Water Commission, Ms. Mandamin was a predominant contributor and respected leader at the Great Lakes Guardians' Council.

'Through all of the years Josephine's determination and dedication to raise awareness through her legendary Great Lakes Water Walks, it is my hope

Motion in response to church settlement with atheist minister

LITTLE CURRENT—At the second-ever cluster meeting of United Churches in the Manitoulin, Espanola and North Shore regions, the host Little Current Pastoral Charge (LCPC) presented a resolution regarding the ministerial appointment of an atheistic minister in a Toronto united church.

'What I'm looking for is your concurrence, your support, your endorsement, something like that so we can build the momentum and keep pushing this forward to the regional council, and ultimately, I'd like to see this get to the national church," said Scott Mosher, chair of the church council in the LCPC. He was requesting those gathered to write letters in agreement to further the chances of getting the

The group's action on this front dates back to January, when the church council sent a letter to the United Church of Canada in protest of its decision to allow Rev. Gretta Vosper remain as the minister of West Hill United Church in Toronto, despite her public stance as an atheist.

In early February, Mr. Mosher received a response from the church from Rev. Alan W. Hall, executive officer of ministry and employment and human resources at the United Church of Canada. He stated the settlement process changed the role of the national organization.

'With the parties arriving at a settlement acceptable to them, the general council no longer had any authority to continue with the formal hearing. While

Council asks province to restore library funds

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Central Manitoulin the information when this came up at committee," council entertained a recommendation by the Water, Waste and Education Committee to pass a motion recommending the province restore funding to Ontario Library Service North and provide sustainable long-term funding for Ontario's public libraries and that the motion be forwarded to the premier, the minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport, Municipal Affairs, Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and the Federation of Ontario Public Libraries.

More than a few questions about the revived Norisle agreement

Answers are needed

To the Expositor:

It would appear that the Norisle Society has received from Assiginack precisely what it wanted, even though the legal issue was previously settled. If the township is going to enter an agreement as reported in the May 8, 2019 Expositor, then as a taxpayer I am entitled to questions being answered.

It was reported when the lawsuit against the township was in initiated that had it not been for the actions of the township, the Norisle would at that time already been in dry dock undergoing the refit. I ask, why then is a three-year agreement necessary to keep the vessel in Manitowaning? Why can't the refit be undertaken immediately? Why must the taxpayer subsidize the Norisle Society if it has reportedly already raised and spent \$2 million? Surely this going concern could raise the funds for its own insurance, docking and utilities. Why is the township being expected to issue charitable tax receipts? Why is the Norisle Society not registered as a charity itself? There must be qualified professionals on the Island who can assist with the necessary accounting and public disclosures.

There were previous reports of the hull being in excellent condition having being manufactured from high quality steel, now there are issues with deterioration. Has the vessel been surveyed by a qualified engineer? There was a consultants report but that apparently did not bring up the asbestos issue. How many more unknowns are there? What is the true condition of the boilers and mechanical systems of the

Norisle? Is the vessel ready to move under its own power? Exactly what has been accomplished thus far in achieving the goal of repurposing the vessel?

Has all of the necessary engineering been done, does the Norisle Society have complete specifications to put the work out to tender? Is it known exactly what needs to be done in order to insure and licence the vessel for its new purpose? I remember a large, bound publication of that nature on display in the kiosk aboard the Chi-Cheemaun. We should all be able to exactly know what it will look like when finished if this has been completed.

It was also reported that the Norisle Society has not met in almost five years. I am most curious to know how a lawsuit could be initiated and settled or am I missing something?

Answers are needed. I think the taxpayers of Assiginack Township are entitled to all of the facts, plans and full disclosure. Stewardship of the land and people is central to good government

Elimination of the deficit could be accomplished with a little sensible policy

To the Expositor:

Indigenous cultures traditionally believed that everything in nature is alive. They organized communities around something they considered sacred: the stewardship of the land and the people.

Governments have now become a mundane market place, concerned only with the plunder of natural resources to sustain endless corporate profit. This corporate "legal fiction" has now become more important than the reality of nature.

Thanks to corruption by corporate lobbyists, our mainstream political parties have also become a legal fiction. Doug Ford and his Conservative Party Ontario government minions (please don't call them "Progressive"), seem to have been empowered by the political swamp south of the border, to completely disregard the concerns of the citizens. However, Justin Trudeau's Liberal Party federal government also learned a thing or two from Donald Trump about running for election on progressive promises that are quickly forgotten once elected. To quote Linda McQuaig from her recent article 'Ford fakes deficit concerns to justify brutal spending cuts' in the May 9 issue of rabble.ca.

The Ford government wants us to believe that Ontario's deficit is caused by too much spending. After years of stagnant social spending in Ontario, that's a hard case to make. As Ontario's non-partisan Financial Accountability Office (FAO) notes, Ontario already has the lowest program spending among Canada's 10 provinces—before Ford's spending cuts click in.

So, pointing to Ontario's ultra-low social spending as the cause of Ontario's deficit is about as credible as Donald Trump's claim that his

inaugural crowd was bigger than Obama's.

The FAO provides some revealing clues, noting that Ontario also has the lowest revenue of any of the provinces. While the provincial average for revenue is \$12,373, Ontario only collects \$10,415 (per capita)—a significantly smaller amount. Therein lies the dirty secret of Ontario's deficit—too little revenue. Ford is making the problem worse by cutting taxes a further \$3.6 billion a year, notes Sheila Block, senior economist with the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA). Even Moody's, the Wall Street credit rating agency, pointed to Ontario's low revenue—and Ford's tax cuts driving it lower—as the main deficit culprit when it downgraded the province's credit rating last December.

All this suggests Ford is faking his concern about the deficit. He harps on it to justify his spending cuts, but actually makes it worse by collecting less tax revenue. (Sadly, the media rarely focus on the province's revenue shortfall, helping Ford perpetuate the myth that deficits are always a spending problem.) Ford's measures, despite his claim to be acting for the people, redirect resources from ordinary people to corporations and the rich.

The CCPA shows how this could be done—by cancelling Ford's tax cuts, adding a very small increase in corporate and personal taxes (excluding those with taxable incomes below \$50,000). The result would be a declining deficit, and the restoration—even expansion—of our social programs. It could be called a budget 'for the people,' but in this case, it would actually be true.

Cycling advocates hold engergized, productive and proactive annual general meeting

MINDEMOYA—The annual general meeting (AGM) of the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) shows an organization that is energized, productive and proactive. The MICA meeting was held May 6 at the Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS) and board member Gordon Saplet of Mindemoya was spot on when he said, "we have a lot of successes" as he welcomed members.

This organization, an incorporated, not-for-profit group that is run entirely by volunteers, started in 2010 when Island residents Maja Mielonen and Guy Nielen advocated for paved shoulders on Manitoulin roads. And paved shoulders they received, with Highway 6 in 2010, Highway 551 in 2015, Highway 540 in 2017, and Highway 6 between Ten Mile Point and Little Current in 2018. As well, construction has already started on the extension of Highway 540 from Honora Bay to Kagawong with the sought-after paved shoulders which provides immense safety for cyclists while also extending the life of the sides of paved roads.

The focus of this MICA meeting was making your business benefit from cycling tourism and the first guest speaker was artist, actor, and CEO, owner/curator of Perivale Gallery, Shannon McMullan.

Ms. McMullan began by saying that bikes have always been important in her family. She noted how the children had to ensure their bikes were polished and sparkling each year "and then," she said with a laugh, "it was off to the Island to ride the muddy roads." She went on to say that cycling tourism was very important and she remembered when her mother was the owner of the gallery that a couple had arrived, by bike, from Elliot Lake. This was in the late '70s and the pair were seeing all of Manitoulin.

"What can cycling do for us?" Ms. McMullan asked, and went on to say that Perivale has always been a beacon for cyclists. "We are in the very centre of Manitoulin," she noted, "and we have enjoyed Guy arriving with his tours. Cyclists often linger and we encourage picnics. We provide water and washrooms and gardens. We have signs in the windows that say, 'we welcome cyclists,' and we take photos of families with their bikes in front of the gallery."

Ms. McMullan spoke of one cyclist who then ordered a \$5,000 painting, resulting in a huge payoff for the business.

If there is one concern regarding cyclists that Ms. McMullan has, it is those bikers who do not wear helmets. "I lost a brother to a cycling accident," she said. "When I was teaching, if a kid was not wearing a helmet, I confiscated the bike." Indeed, this is such a concern for this businesswoman that she hands out donor donation cards to anyone she sees who is foolish enough not to wear a helmet while biking.

The second guest speaker was Heidi Krieger who owns, along with her husband Serge, the Auberge Inn in Providence Bay. Ms. Krieger told the members that she had been biking for 15 years while the family lived in the Netherlands and thought that joining the MICA board would be a good thing. "Anyone who cycles," she said, "kudos. They are buying everything on the Island. They are good guests. The cyclists are not leaving their carbon footprint." Ms. Krieger went on to say that it is "amazing what MICA has done to make things safe, and we get benefits from MICA including representing us in Toronto and on advertising." Ms. Krieger also noted that the couple learned from Bikes Ontario what they had to do to make things great for cyclists and that they had studied the MICA maps when she had first joined. "The over 50s pour over the maps," she remarked when speaking of the hostel's guests. "The younger ones take out their phones."

MICA President Ms. Mielonen then presented her report on the history of the organization, saying first, "Together we can facilitate positive and safe experiences for all local and visiting road users alike."

She spoke of the connection that took place in 2018 when the Georgian Bay cycling route was signed from Parry

"As part of the Great Lakes Waterfront Trail," Ms. Mielonen said, "we work closely with Share the Road Coalition (SRC), Destination Northern Ontario (DNO), Northeastern Ontario Tourism (NOT), Ontario By Bike (OBB) and Destination Ontario (DO)." In partnership with Destination Ontario and FedNor, MICA installed eight trailheads in the spring of 2018 that have assisted thousands of visitors last year and will for many years to come.

The spring of 2018 also saw the printing of the 4th edition of MICA's map that offers over 800 kilometres of cycling routes that are now identified with some cycle route signs.

"MICA's maps," Ms. Mielonen told her audience, "are sold all over the world, through our website, on the Chi-Cheemaun and at many Manitoulin locations. Thus far, over 11,000 copies have been sold."

This organization also successfully launched Alvar Treasure Rides, an all-inclusive cycling adventure package in 2017. These guided tours feature five days of cycling with four nights stay at lakeside lodges and cottages. Ms. Mielonen advised that the four packages offered in 2019 are filling up fast and noted that these rides are bringing welcome business to Manitoulin and MICA in the shoulder season.

Cycle tourism on Manitoulin has increased considerably since 2012 as Ms. Mielonen that showed with close to 5,500 cycles in all of the past four years crossing on the ferry, only 1,200 counted in 2012. A passage ride survey showed that 240 participants in the 2017 event spent over \$96,000 and accommodation providers report that 13 to 20 percent of their annual income is due to cycle tourism. A large part of this increase is in part due to MICA's annual visit to the Toronto International Bicycling Show (TIBS) for the past five years. Volunteers hand out over 1,500 This is Manitoulin magazines annually as well as Island brochures. MICA invests well over \$10,000 annually in advertisement, trade shows, promotional material, best practice missions, Tourism Summit attendance and represents the Island in Quebec, Toronto and New York trade shows and in

Ontario's information centres personally and/or with promotional material.

MICA has also contributed \$10,000 towards the green cycle signs on Manitoulin highways.

MICA helps out locally and works with an OPP positive enforcement program on Manitoulin and the North Shore. The organization bought 1,000 cycle lights in 2017 and 2018 as well as 500 cycle bells for the initiative. This year, MICA gave reflective leg and arm bands for distribution to cyclists.

Ms. Mielonen also emphasized the advantages businesses can have by presenting as cycle friendly. Ontario currently has over 1,531 welcome cycling friendly businesses and DNO has made it possible for businesses to advertise as such for free on the Ontario By Bike (OBB) website once a criterion with very few and inexpensive items are fulfilled. DNO also offers many free self-evaluation tools for businesses and Tourism Excellent North (TEN) offers many benefits for tourism operators.

MICA also encourages all municipalities to include mobility plans into their strategic planning as are needed with the tourism and growing population, by including all road users' requirements for safe, efficient and attractive movement in our communities. "Such mobility," Ms. Mielonen noted, "will make moving about on our Island safer for people from ages eight to 80. It will create walkable hamlets, connected trails, safe roads and increased green spaces and parks."

This year, MICA received the 2019 Welcome Cycling Friendly Business award and, at the Share the Road Summit in Toronto, was presented with the Wheels of Change Organization of the Year award.

Elections were held at the AGM with Ms. Mielonen remaining as the organization's president with board members Peter Ford of Manitowaning, Sandy Cook of Kagawong and Mr. Saplet of Mindemoya serving for this term.

Combating greenhouse gases is crucial to the planet's survival

Some people would rather listen to the deniers than to climatologists—wake up, the house is on fire!

To the Expositor:

In the letter 'The rebate "undoubtedly" will not cover all the costs' (May 1), Mr. Finlay repeats Premier Ford's argument that reducing greenhouse gases through carbon tax and rebate (Carbon T and R) is costly. Before getting into that, here's the United Nations' concise explanation of the urgency of reducing greenhouse gases:

"Why is it necessary and even vital to maintain the global temperature increase below 1.5°C versus higher levels? Adaptation will be less difficult. Our world will suffer fewer negative impacts of intensity and frequency of extreme events, on resources, ecosystems, biodiversity, food security, cities, tourism and carbon removal."

When the planet heats up, weather patterns change, which has already resulted in record amounts of flooding, fires, drought and other impacts costing billions. You see it on the news every day and It's not a blip. Climatologists predicted this, decades ago. It will get much worse if we don't reduce emissions by 45 percent by 2030. It costs individuals in work lost, disruptions, clean-ups, repairs, rebuilding, and in insurance premiums if they can even get insurance, not to mention the taxes that go into government relief in disaster zones.

Weigh that against the Carbon T and R. Mr. Finlay in his letter said the rebate won't cover all the costs. All the costs for whom? The rebate is a flat amount per taxpayer, based on 90 percent of total expected revenue, with an extra \$17 for rural areas (an extra 10 percent). So let's look at the "winners and losers." If everyone used the same amount of fossil fuels (heating oil, gasoline, etc.) everyone in rural areas like Manitoulin would get back the full amount. Of course, some Ontarians use more fossil fuels than the average, so who are those people? My bet is that they are mostly suburban dwellers with huge homes and maybe a summer home, who commute 100 kilometres every day to and from work, and who fly on vacations. They will pay more, and frankly, they can afford it. Hopefully you claimed your rebate when you filed your income tax this year! If you live on Manitoulin and are an average consumer of fossil fuels, your rebate will cover your cost.

But that's not the point of the Carbon T and R program. The point is to save the planet from disastrous global warming by providing an incentive to reduce consumption of fossil fuels.

Of course, Premier Ford has launched a pro-pollution propaganda campaign, for example, forcing gas stations to post misleading stickers. And he's launched a battle in court to make greenhouse gas pollution free again in Ontario. In Saskatchewan, a court already decided that the federal government has the right to tax greenhouse gases, but maybe Ford doesn't care. Maybe he's just pursuing the court case for propaganda reasons. Who knows?

Mr. Finlay accused me of simplifying things too much in a previous letter. As he said, there are different tax rates for different fuels. Yes, because some fuels produce more greenhouse gases per litre than others. So here's the "More than you ever wanted to know" part. One litre of gasoline produces 2.3 kilograms of carbon dioxide, while a litre of diesel or home heating fuel oil produces 2.7 kilograms. It's actually worse—these numbers do not include nitrous oxides or greenhouse gases produced in getting the fuel to your home or vehicle, which varies.

For example, the greenhouse gas emissions from a litre of gasoline refined in Sarnia or Nanticoke is really about 2.9 kg if you include all that. Knowing that, it's easy to figure out the greenhouse gases from the gasoline that's likely in your tank. A full tank of say, 50 litres will create 145 kilograms of greenhouse gases. How far you can go on that depends on your vehicle. My hybrid can travel 1,100 kilometres on 50 litres, but it's still producing 145 kg because that's what 50 litres produces when burned.

When we use fossil fuels, we produce the greenhouse gas pollutants. Teenage activist Greta Thunberg said, "We cannot solve a crisis by not treating it as a crisis." We know there is a crisis, but we're not treating it as a crisis because Conservatives like Ford, Kenny and Sheer, backed by Big Oil, are telling the fire department to go away while the house burns.

Some people would rather listen to the deniers than to climatologists. Others respond by saying it's too confusing. Still others respond non-confrontationally, just taking personal responsibility, like driving and flying less or buying more efficient vehicles. I choose to speak up, because the house is on fire.

Some Island funding requests forwarded for federal approval

ALGOMA-MANITOULIN-The province of Ontario has approved a number of infrastructure projects in Algoma-Manitoulin have been proposed by a number of municipalities, with the projects now moving on to the federal approval stage.

In the Manitoulin area, the Township of Cockburn Island is receiving \$755,065 to improve the safety of the intersection of the 12th Concession and the 15th Sideroad. The Municipality of Central Manitoulin is receiving \$1,236,000 to replace the bridge on Union Road. The Municipality of Killarney is slated to receive \$1,923,126.80 to rehabilitate Hartley Bay Road and complete a realignment.

Township The Tehkummah is the biggest winner in the provincial riding, receiving \$2,358,564 to rehabilitate the 10th Sideroad and Concession 6.

When asked about the funding announcement for the replacement of the Union Road Bridge (within Central Manitoulin's portion of that roadway), Cen-Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens expressed surprise. "We haven't heard back officialyet," said Mayor Stephens, when contacted by The Expositor Monday about the funding.

The funding announcement from the province was released on Friday, May 10 and indicates that the project will now go ahead for approval by the federal government. "I guess we will have to wait for the feds to decide before we make any kind of comment," said Mayor Stephens.

As for whether the project itself is important to the Mayor community, Stephens didn't skip a beat. "Absolutely," he said. "We have had this on our list for quite a number of years now. It was always a project that was too big a bite for our municipality to chew on our own. If it is true, and the funding comes through, it will be very good news for our community.'

Tehkummah's clerkadministrator Roy Hardy said this was an important announcement.

"It's good for the township. There's some issues obviously that we have to deal with as a result of some wetter summers and springs," said Mr. Hardy. "That's going to help with some issues on the 10th (Sideroad) and provide some relief for the spring flooding over the past couple of years."

The desire to rehabilitate the 10th Sideroad has been ongoing for a considerable amount of time.

Increased traffic pressure last summer due to the 10th Sideroad being used as a detour during construction on Highway 542 further deteriorated the road's condition.

Tehkummah council has previously completed some initial engineering work and must now finalize the design to ensure the road will meet the township's needs in the long-term.

burn Island was unable to provide comment to The Expositor by press time. Including the figure for Killarney, these four Manitoulin-area municipalities will receive just over 65 percent of the \$9.6 million allocated for the provincial riding of Algoma-Manitoulin.

'Ontario's government, saddled with the largest subnational debt in the world, is protecting what matters most by investing in critical infrastructure projects like the ones in Algoma-Manitoulin," states a press release from Ontario Minister of Infrastructure Monte McNaughton. Although the claim of the largest subnational debt is rooted in fact, it may be misleading

national and sub-national funding models in the US and Canada.

The release states that McNaughton Minister launched the intake process for the \$30 billion integrated bilateral Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program this spring. These projects are part of the \$500-million fund dedicated to rural and Northern municipalities.

Priorities in the funding stream include investments in roads, bridges, air and infrastructure. marine Once the federal government approves these projects, they will be ready to move into the execution phase.

Ivan Wheale continues his philanthropic tradition

SUDBURY—A chance phone call from old friends piqued the interest of Manitoulin's elder statesman of (oil paintings that is) Ivan Wheale. By the time he had hung up the phone the famed artist had committed one of his iconic Georgian Bay oil paintings to a fundraiser for Afghanistan war veteran William Kerr.

"I had a phone call from some friends and I asked 'what have you been up to?' and they told me about how they were involved in this fundraising event for an Afghan vet," recalled Mr. Wheale. "I said 'you know I would like to help.' They said 'really?' and I said 'why not?""

So it came to be that an oil painting of "a couple of rocks appearing out of the water on the other side of Killarney with lots of pink granite" became a key part of the efforts of the fundraising efforts of a group of seven artists who exhibited pencil sketches, watercolour paintings, portraits and oil landscapes to an exhibition fundraiser. Admission was free, but public contributions were accepted at the door by members of the 2912 Sudbury Irish Royal Canadian Cadet Corps.

Corporal William Kerr, late of the Second Battalion Irish Regiment of Canada, who now lives in Chelmsford, lost both of his legs and most of one arm on October 15, 2008, during his second tour in Afghanistan. Mr. Kerr was four hours into a foot patrol when a remotelydetonated explosive device went off underneath him, shearing off his legs above the knee and severing his left arm just below his elbow. The veteran deals daily with the physical effects of his experience overseas with determination, patience and the support of family. But to help him become even more independent, artist Judith Van Boxel and a group of other artists decided to raise funds for a vehicle that can be modified for use by a triple amputee.

"He had a vehicle that was modified for him before, but that one is more than 10 years old and has reached the end of its useful life," said Ms. Van Boxel. "When I received the call from Ivan's friends saying he wanted to help, we were over the top."

"It's a good thing I asked how things were going and what my friends were up to," said Mr. Wheale, "otherwise I probably would never have known." He said that he was very pleased with how the event turned out.

The fundraising event raised a significant portion of the cost of a new vehicle.

"We really have to thank those young cadets who helped out at the door," said Ms. Van Boxel. "They were there all day long and were a really big help.

The unveiling of Mr. Wheale's 2019 paintings will take place at Spring



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...LaSalle's Griffon remains missing but new shipwrecks found

After interviewing Ms. Forsberg near Niagara Falls and sharing the back story of the misadventure, the show moved to northern Lake Michigan where a search resulted in visiting a previously-identified ship-

The show then moved to Manitoulin Island for its conclusion, meeting Mr. Kohl and Underwater Archaeological Society of Chicago co-founder Valerie Van Heest at the William Purvis Marine Museum in Gore Bay. The two joined the rest of the show's crew on the trip to Magnetic Reef, off the coast of Cockburn Island in the Mississagi Strait, in search of Le Griffon's resting place.

"My wife and I could never get anybody to take us out there to Magnetic Reef to show us what it was like, because it's a very dangerous body of water—I've been told by commercial fishermen that they avoid it like the plague," said Mr. Kohl. "I welcomed the opportunity to go out there and see what these six square miles is all about. And it is extremely danger-


Magnetic Reef has rocky outcroppings that either breach the surface or come up to two feet below the waterline, then immediately drop down to a depth of 30 feet. The bottom drops from the shore to past 100 feet deep in just 300 metres from land. The bottom is made up of shifting sands, which Mr. Kohl figures would have buried the wreckage by now, if it exists in the location at all.

The main identifier of the ship that would tell a diver whether or not they had found the right wreck is locating one of the two cannons or one of the five swivel-mounted guns that were aboard Le Griffon. Mr. Kohl maintains that he and his wife believe the ship would have wrecked on Magnetic Reef and drifted across the strait to the Mississagi Lighthouse area.

Although many have claimed to have found the wreck of Le Griffon, the vast majority have been thoroughly debunked. Despite Le Griffon remaining elusive, the search did bear some fruit in that the team discovered the wrecks

and the tow barge Louisa. Both were wrecked on the same date in 1890, though no lives were lost.

"When we found the wreckage of the two shipwrecks, I knew it pretty much had to be those two. It's the only case of two ships sinking at the same time that I was aware of," said Mr. Kohl. "One did definitely look like a tow barge, and one had equipment that made it out to be a steamer."

The episode ended on the underwater footage of the two wrecks, but Mr. Kohl said the show only touched upon the very tip of the content iceberg they had created during the filming process.

"I had no idea what they were going to present. In fact, I said to my son Jeff after, it looks like 95 percent of what they videotaped ended up on the cutting of two ships in close prox-room floor," he said, adding ship's alleged discovery

Mississagi Lighthouse only appeared for a few seconds in one shot during the entire episode. The crew spent a considerable time in the area around the Mississagi Lighthouse and Campground, located on the Manitoulin side of Mississagi Strait.

"The Discovery Channel team had approached the operators of the Meldrum Bay Lighthouse campground for lodging facilities in the park during their filming of this program. The staff of the campground were thrilled to have such an exciting event take place in Meldrum Bay. They set out to make these special visitors welcomed," noted a letter to the editor from Marilyn Norris in the April 24 edition of this newspaper.

The Mississagi Lighthouse was also important in the original story of the imity: the steamer Bruno his disappointment that the many years ago; the light-

house's first keeper Albert Cullis learned of a shipwreck just north of the lighthouse. However, that wreckage drifted away in the mid-twentieth century whereabouts remains unknown.

"I wish they could have had more on Manitoulin Island. There's a lot more to the story," said Mr. Kohl. "But I was basically happy with it."

The crew also went into one of the shoreline caves where the skeletons had been found and Mr. Gates used a metal detector. He found a square-sided nail underneath a foot of moss, but this was much more recent than Le Griffon.

"I have to say thanks on behalf of my wife and myself. The people of Manitoulin Island have always made sure we had a wonderful time," said Mr. Kohl, noting that he will be making a presentation at Kagawong's history day event on August 8.

Although there were no conclusive answers after this search, Mr. Kohl and his wife still firmly believe that the Mississagi wreckage is the best claim of being Le Griffon.

"Nobody has got a clue as to what that wreckage could be if it wasn't the Griffon. That's a very important consideration, but I don't know if we can say it is just tion. It could still be a while," he said.

Eagle-eyed viewers may have noticed Island photographer Peter Baumgarten in a few of the brief scenes depicting rose-tinted historical re-enactments. These scenes were shot in Wiikwemkoong last August.





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

...continued from page 3 that no soap or bubbles is allowed in the area, reminding council the ill effects phosphorous has on the aquatic environment.

Mr. Williamson explained that the runoff will first go into a ditch and then into the lake.

Councillor Bruce Wood questioned the splash pad's winterization process. He was told that it will be designed so that antifreeze can be pumped through it in the fall.

Councillor Al Boyd asked about the sand that will be brought into the splash pad have on the drainage system. It was noted that a foot rinsing station will be placed in the pavilion which will hopefully alleviate some of the problem.

Councillor Laurie Cook asked if the splash pad would mean additional insurance costs to the municipality. Williamson said it would not mean any further costs.

"What's the total cost of operation?" Councillor Ferguson asked. Mr. Williamson said he estimates an initial \$5,500 for the first year (including water), noting that the student workers from the municipally-run Spider Bay Marina and that installation costs will likely run about \$3,800.

"How do we rationalize wasting this amount of water when we ask people to conserve; how do we do Councillor Cook this?" asked.

Councillor Erskine said he didn't see this as a problem as the water being pulled from the lake is also being returned to the lake.

Councillor Cook asked for a recorded vote.

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

...continued from page 3 we may not agree with the conclusion that the Toronto Conference arrived at in this matter, it was their decision to make," wrote Rev. Hall.

The LCPC had expressed their concerns that a decision of this nature could possibly set precedent for future disputes of faith, potentially leading to the weakening of the faith-rooted traditions of the United Church.

In the letter, Rev. Hall stated that the settlement reached between the two parties in question does not involve precedent.

"Its conclusion in no way changes or influences denominational policy or doctrine. Nor does it establish a precedent that binds any future complaint," he wrote, adding that any substantive changes such as an adjustment to faith requirements would have to undergo a multi-year, transparent decision-making process that would involve a full majority (more than 50 percent of eligible voters voting 'yes').

"For these reasons I remain confident in the integrity of the faith and the doctrine of the United Church of Canada," he concluded. "As you have done, coming back to our base of belief and reaffirming who we are and whose we are takes control of this discussion."

Mr. Mosher said several others had written similar letters of concern to the national body and he felt that this was a standardized response that didn't fully address his concerns about what actions the church would be taking in the future should this situation arise again.

"I have spoken with others in the church and it's left a bit of a sour taste in

their mouth—this incident, the settlement that's been reached," said Little Current United Church Pastor Paul Allard.

Mr. Mosher told the gathered meeting that a September 2016 report into Rev. Vosper's ministry had deemed her not suitable to continue as an ordained minister. However, a statement released in November 2018 from Toronto Conference stating that the issues had been settled and Rev. Vosper would remain in the ordained ministry at West Hill. He wondered aloud what had changed between the two dates.

This decision also comes among studies that as many as one third of churches in Canada are expected to close within the next decade, calling for a strengthening of the church community.

We're not trying to go after anybody, we would just like to see that, going forward, the United Church tighten its procedural matters in these regards a little more closely," said Pastor Allard.

Church members Betty and Ivan Edwards also wrote a letter to United Church of Canada general secretary Nora Sanders in early March and requested a personal response. One month later, they received a phone call from Ms. Sanders who informed them that the decision was out of their hands. She added that she was sorry for the theist ministers who have to live with the decision that had been made, but said it offered an opportunity for many to strengthen their faith.

Rev. Don Nelson was in attendance to represent the churches in Western Manitoulin and said he had distributed a five-point questionnaire at a Sunday service as well as through

email to other members not present. Of the 74 surveys, they received 41 responses.

A total of 80 percent of the respondents rated the degree of their displeasure with Rev. Vosper's continued ministry, on a scale from one to 10, as an eight or higher. A further 84 percent said they would not accept an atheist minister in Western Manitoulin and a similar proportion said it would affect the local church. Nearly half said it would change their relationship with the United Church of Canada.

Based on the concerns of the church community, Mr. Mosher and church mem-Rick McCutcheon teamed up to write a draft resolution for an upcoming United Church of Canada general council meeting.

The resolution requests a strengthening of the policies of regional council oversight over communities of faith, Office of Vocation oversight of ministry personnel, accountability and Office of Vocation action on ministry personnel. This move was aimed so that more action would be taken in the future if a minister renounces their vows.

"I thought it was wellwritten and spoke constructively on how to move forward with some suggestions of how the church could potentially deal with matters of this nature," said Pastor Allard. "It was really nice to see the council step forward to put this letter together. I really couldn't craft it better myself.'

Although the Rev. Vosper settlement is final, Mr. Mosher said he hopes this may lead to stronger policies for the future, something integral to the operations of some of the largest organizations in the world such as corporations.

"This shouldn't shake anyone's faith necessarily; this is just one individual who's taken an extreme view of divinity by calling themself an atheist. I don't think that's representative of ministers in the church and who we are as a faith community," said Pastor Allard.

Since the cluster meeting, the motion has been added to the Canadian Shield Regional Council meeting's agenda, held in Sault Ste. Marie from May 31 to June 2. Mr. Mosher said he may attend the meeting.

Mr. Peltier instituted an arts program that inspired an entire generation of Anishinaabe youth to pursue a career in the arts that Ms. Cheechoo and her husband Blake had both attended in their own youth.

Weengushk Film Institute (WFI) is a non-profit, artist-focused film and television-training centre, "dedicated to unlocking the creative potential of Indigenous vouth and is a nonprofit, artist-focused film and television-training centre, dedicated to unlocking the creative potential of Indigenous youth."

Ms. Cheechoo is also currently writing the script for a movie involving hockey and the involvement of Indigenous players in the sport as seen from a variety of Native and non-Native perspectives.

"It's been challenging," she laughed. But when passion is involved, doors tend to open and Ms. Cheechoo's career has proven that perseverance and determination can take you from a small Northern Cree community to the pinnacle of national and international recognition.

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Learn how to harvest, prepare local wild food

MANITOULIN—Noojmowin Teg Health Centre is
running a series of three
workshops this weekend to
teach participants about
the many species of edible
plants that are native to this
area, as well as tips and
techniques of how to harvest and prepare them from
culinary experts.

"Our facilitator Karen will be guiding them through the trails, talking about the medicinal properties of the plants they see as well as the sustainable harvest of the plants. Participants are welcome to pick the plants they see," said Noojmowin Teg's interim Indigenous foods co-ordinator Bnehns Gordon-Corbiere.

The facilitator she mentioned is Karen Stephenson, a frequent summer visitor to Manitoulin Island and wild food educator who manages

EdibleWildFood.com. She is a chartered herbalist and attended Lakehead University's Ontario Master Naturalist certificate program.

Ms. Stephenson will be overseeing the first hour of the two-hour event, taking participants on a guided walk on the trails. However, Ms. Gordon-Corbiere noted that there will be significant off-trail deviations and advised participants to dress for rough terrain. The trip should be suitable for all skill levels of hikers.

In the second hour, the group will reconvene at a community kitchen. There, Noojmowin Teg child nutrition co-ordinator Cody Leeson will show the group how they can turn their harvest into a healthy and delicious meal.

"Cody and I have gone out throughout this week to collect morels, fiddleheads and wild leeks. Those are the main ingredients so far," said Ms. Gordon-Corbiere. She added that she was hoping to get local elders to visit the three events to speak at greater length about the traditions associated with the collected foods.

These wild edible walkand-talks are running as part of Noojmowin Teg's Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing (Turtle Island Roots) program, an initiative that's part of the Manitoulin Community Fresh Food Initiative and grouped within the health centre's Child Poverty Task Force. It receives financial support through the Ontario Trillium Foundation's fund to reduce poverty in communities.

These initiatives promote food sovereignty, improve access to fresh food and create community-based systems.

"Providing a workshop of this nature allows Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing to promote, support and sustain the Indigenous Food Sovereignty movement being driven within the communities of Mnidoo Mnising (Manitoulin Island) and the surrounding district," said Ms. Gordon-Corbiere.

Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing provides spaces in which communities can gather, share and learn about traditional ways to sustainably harvest, hon-



Noojmowin Teg's Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing, or Turtle Island Roots program is hosting a series of workshops around Manitoulin this weekend that will showcase the many edible foods that grow in this region. our and prepare fresh foods sourced from area forests, fields and waterways.

"These traditions have supported and sustained our communities and our ecosystem for thousands of years. Celebrating and transferring knowledge to community members is one way Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing supports the mission of the Manitoulin Community Fresh Food Initiative," said Ms. Gordon-Corbiere.

Indigenous foods co-ordinator Courtney Kurek, who is currently on leave from Noojmowin Teg, had sent out a survey to First Nations on the Island to see in which activities they might have an interest. The

three communities taking part in these hikes—M'Chigeeng, Aundeck Omni Kaning and Sheshegwaning—showed the most interest in foraging and wild edibles.

"They also represent the west, centre and eastern parts of Manitoulin so people from all over can attend," said Ms. Gordon-Corbiere.

These walks form only one stage of Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing. Ms. Gordon-Corbiere said the health centre hopes to compile all the gathered knowledge into a resource book. It is also working on creating a website solely focused on sourcing, harvesting and

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

Mr. Preston's lawyer Margaret Bojanowska told the court last April that Ms. Douglas and Mr. Preston had consensual sex that night and that Ms. Douglas pressed charges for financial gain.

Ms. Douglas shared with the court during the sentencing hearing that following the assault she has lived with a series of health problems, including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. She now works to encourage other survivors to come forward and share their stories through her Facebook page Life After – Inspirational.

In 2003 Mr. Preston, then an officer with the Toronto Police Service (TPS), was convicted with assault for punching a


Somali refugee, an event that was caught on video. For this conviction, Mr. Preston served a 30-day jail term and was dismissed as a police officer with the TPS.



Ms. Berti noted that most of the women who were approached had expressed their honour at being invited into the group and all were deeply interested in and supportive of the artist's intent. "The women were courageous, honest and compassionate about their busy lives."

Ms. Aeschlimann's work, her use of colours, her choice of backgrounds and other elements leap out at the observer from the canvas with the full force of her subjects' remarkable personalities. An Islander walking down the hallway past the portraits will be struck by how many of those subjects they recog-



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



Tehkummah Council Notes

Phragmites delegation

Council heard an update on the Manitoulin Phragmites Project from co-ordinator Judith Jones. She emphasized the importance of the project for maintaining wildlife habitats, a balanced ecosystem and preserving the property values in the township. The group has performed extensive work at Michael's Bay in recent years and is making significant progress. This marks the third and final year of funding for the phragmites program and Ms. Jones said she was hoping to spend \$30,000 in 2019, the same as the previous

She requested four items from council. First, to have the public works crew clear out the piles of cleared phragmites from the previous season. Second, to have the township's approval of both proceeding with the Truxor equipment and having a public works crew available for two days in the week of August 12, as well as approval to continue the carefully controlled use of herbicide to kill the plants. Finally, she requested some funding assistance from the township to pay for an extra day of having the Truxor machinery on site, a total cost of \$6,800. She said she was looking at other grants that would cover at least half of the cost.

Councillor Rick Gordon asked if phragmites is considered an invasive species, to which Ms. Jones replied that it is indeed one of the worst invasive plant species in the area.

MICA delegation

Maja Mielonen and Guy Nielen from the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) requested council's support in principle of hosting a bike share station on municipal property in South Baymouth. The group is applying for grants to implement a traditional and electric bike sharing system on Manitoulin and required a commitment in principle from municipalities who would be willing to host a station for a five-year

The stations require internet and electricity access in their most robust form, though MICA has committed to pay for the connection costs and any increases in electricity costs. They will be seeking funding through either the Ontario Trillium Fund or FedNor via the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and not be run like a camp-

Sport.

The Owen Sound Transportation Company has expressed their willingness to promote the service, though they did not wish to host the bike share station on their property. MICA will cover insurance costs for the bicycles.

Clerk-administrator Roy Hardy said having the bike share service available in the township may spur community development and encourage people to spend more time riding around the town rather simply passing than through. It also creates a new public transportation service for those without access to a car who are wishing to travel within the

Fees and services bylaw

Council passed the administration and building permit fees as well as the late payment fees, schedules A, B and F of the bylaw, with no changes from the draft. Schedule C was modified to change the \$5 burn permit charge, valid for one burn, to a \$5 annual charge. Anyone holding an annual permit who wishes to burn must notify the township in advance of their plans.

Schedule D, concerning capital fees and charges, was held back. These charges are largely to recoup costs for operating the water and sewer system in South Baymouth and to plan for future expansion. Some of the changes, such as a \$25 site visit charge to turn on or off water or conduct an inspection, were met with reservations from Councillor Lorie Leeson, who requested that the water and sewer committee be consulted first. Council-Michael McKenzie requested to defer this schedule until the following

Schedule E concerned other user fees and charges. Council spent time discussing camping costs, including a bump in the seasonal rate from the proposed \$1,575 to an even \$1,600. This also brings the increase closer to the tax rate increase. Councillor Leeson suggested overnight tenting costs should be \$20. up from the proposed \$10, to better reflect other camp-

grounds in the area. A resident in attendance interjected that John Budd Park was donated land to the township and should

ground, and left the meeting. Councillor Leeson suggested a \$30 rate for overnight camping with hydro, and a \$450 monthly rate with no services.

Next came marina fees. Councillor Leeson had concerns about a parking charge and was worried that it may cause negative impacts for employees trying to manage the services. Councillor Eric Russell called a parking charge "nickel and diming" and council resolved to remove the parking charge, making the daily launch fees \$7 and \$8 for residents and non-residents, respectively.

Council approved a \$100 per hour rate for residents wishing to hire the township's backhoe, with each job being subject to council approval.

Mr. Hardy told council the \$2.500 in landfill revenues was dwarfed by annual operating costs of \$70,000 to \$80,000. Councillor Leeson requested the non-resident fee category be removed, since only residents should be using the landfill. Council resolved to remove the landfill site visit charge for the time being, but will revisit it at the next meeting.


Fire chief's report

Fire Chief Jeff Wilson informed council that the township was the successful bidder on a 1999 model year fire truck, currently located in Pickering and being moved to Dependable Emergency Vehicles for inspection. The bid was \$45,000 and Mr. Wilson expected a worst-case repair on the truck to be \$10,000. The truck has 19,000 kilometres and is riding on new tires. The fire department may consider rebuilding the truck to extend its life in the

Provincial one-time efficiency grant

Council discussed how best to make use of the \$228,000 grant. Mr. Hardy suggested that future items in the 10-year capital plan could be moved up to the current year. One item a tandem axle was plow/sander as requested by the roads superintendent, paying a 10 percent upfront cost at about \$30,000. Mr. Hardy also suggested looking at a 12- to 13-tonne compactor for the landfill, or allowing the roads superintendent to explore other options such as renting a unit. Mr. Hardy iden-

tified \$35,000 for the landfill's front end including fencing and drop off bins. Other items included getting a mobile portable generator, utility pickup truck and propane generator for the municipal office and fire hall. His total plan amounted to \$165,000, leaving a balance of \$63,000 for future items.

Municipal policies

Council passed its credit card, delegation of authority and strategic asset management policies. Discussions on the recreation committee terms of reference, hiring and procurement policies were pushed to a later meeting.

Library flooring

The library board requested to seal and cover the asbestos tiles in its space, based on a quote of \$11,716 from Flooring by Bruce (Wilson), who recently completed the same work in the municipal office. Council agreed to the board's request to help research any applicable grants that may assist with the cost of the important work.

Closed session resolutions

Out of the closed session, council resolved to direct Mr. Hardy to hire the cho-

sen seasonal public works candidates, as well as an update to discussions happening with the Manitoulin Tourism Association.

The Mousetrap by Dr. Janice Mitchell

he May long weekend is coming up and this often means the offiopening of the camp/cottage/cabin. This brings with it the excitement and anticipation of sunny days ahead and yet there is a danger that may sometimes lurk within these summer abodes. In the previous fall, bait traps may have been laid out for marauding and invading mice and these may pose a great danger for your pets. This month's topic: mouse poisons, otherwise known as rodenticides.

Rodenticides are not all

the same. When I first learned about them in vet school, the list was simple as it boiled down to one kind, with a couple of variations. These were the warfarin kind of poisons, the ones that when ingested, would cause little Mickey or Minnie Mouse to bleed out. These are called the 'anticoagulants' and most of us are familiar with these as warfarin is used as a preventive in human medicine for people who may have been diagnosed previously with threatening blood clots. When a dog or cat eats an anticoagulant mouse poison, it does the same thing it does to a mouse: it knocks out the body's ability to clot blood. It may take a day or it may take a few days, but eventually they start bleeding. It could be anywhere: lungs, joints, eyes, brain. This does sound nasty, and can be, however the good news is that it's very treatable if it's caught early on before the bleeding begins in one of those bad places. The antidote is vitamin K, and it works quite well. For patients that are bleeding, they may need some extra treatment as well, like a blood transfusion, but the vast majority of dogs (and rarely cats—they're pretty smart) that ingest anticoagulant mouse poison do pretty well with appropriate treatment.

So, what are the variations? These anticoagulants can be either first or second generation rodenticides. First-generation anticoagulants, such as chlorophacinone, diphaciand none warfarin, include the anticoagulants that were developed as rodenticides before 1970. These compounds are much more toxic when feeding occurs on several successive days rather than on one day only.

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Secondgeneration anticoagulants, such as brodifacoum bromadiand olone. were developed beginning in the 1970s

to control rodents that are resistant to first-generation anticoagulants. Secondgeneration anticoagulants also are more likely than first-generation anticoagulants to be able to kill after a single night's feeding. These compounds kill over a similar course of time but tend to remain in animal tissues longer than do firstgeneration ones. These properties mean that second-generation products pose greater risks to nontarget species that might feed on bait only once or that might feed upon animals that have eaten the bait.

This sounds downright scary however there is a subtle silver lining. Under new federal rules, sales of highly toxic second-generation anticoagulant rodenticides are restricted to professionals. Public retail sales of less-potent, firstgeneration poisons must include bait stations to further reduce unintended poisonings. As Martha Stewart would say, "it's a good thing."

However, anticoagulants aside, there is a new bad kid on the block that is registered for use for rodent control in Canada. Enter bromethalin. Bromethalin is downright terrifying. It is a potent neurotoxin that causes irreversible brain swelling, seizures and paralysis. There is no antidote. It is usually fatal if

None of these options are poisonous. I would also like to suggest that should you use any poison, know what it is and make 110 percent certain that your pet or kids cannot get into it.

If your dog does get into it, get to the vet ASAP. Get-

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

Selecting crop varieties

Genetics, weather/environment and management are the three key factors that govern production potential of a crop. While we can hardly do much about aberrant weather (such as 80 mm or more rain pouring in a single day or no rain at all during peak crop water requirement stages), we can manage the other two factors to achieve maximum economic vields. Buying cheap seed rarely works! Select crop varieties best suited to your local agri-climatic conditions. While \$250/MT seed of an old/prevalent variety may seem attractive to \$800/MT seed of a new high yielding variety, it may not yield as much as the new variety. Remember, you aren't spending \$800/acre. Calculate the extra seed cost per acre from the new variety and compare it with likely extra yield. If the latter's value exceeds extra seed cost, go for the new variety. New and better varieties are added each year of which producers can take advantage. However, don't discard a time-tested variety that has been giving consistently high yield just for the sake of a new variety. Put some acres under the new variety for evaluation against the time-tested variety to decide upon extended cultivation of new variety next year(s).

Selling directly to consumers

The Direct Farm Marketing Business Resources publication provides the following information resources for farmers who sell or wish to sell directly to consumers: six case studies of farmers who sell direct to the consumer through a variety of market channels (e.g. on-farm market, farmers' markets, festivals and events etc.) explore key problems faced by the farmers and their successes and challenges in addressing these issues. Information sheets addressing the importance and uses of business intelligence and market research, business use of social media, product pricing issues and selecting the right marketing channel. Nine direct farm marketing best management practices are summarized from the case studies, interviews with farmers and other research. 

Council upholds building permit cap

The motion, moved by Councillor Al Tribinevicius and seconded by Councillor Steve Shaffer, would have lifted the limit on building permit fees that sees a \$2.5 million home building permit cost the same as that for a \$250,000 home.

erable debate.

"We have a building boom here in Central Manitoulin," noted Councillor Derek Stephens. "Is it because of the building permit fees?"

"I am kind of leaning toward agreeing with (Councillor) Derek (Stephens)," said Mayor Richard Stephens. "We may be losing out on the fees portion, but are we making it up on the larger tax base? I would much rather see large homes with a large tax base than a small increase in building fees."

"A \$2.5 million building will bring in more tax dollars," said Councillor Stephens.

"I am similarly torn," said Councillor Angela Johnston. "I am in favour of looking at fees. I would like to see the cap set higher. To just go back to the 2005 level, however?"

"Is there any downside to not proceeding?" questioned Mayor Stephens.

Clerk Ruth Frawley noted that someone planning to build a \$2.5 million building is not likely to be looking at the relatively minor cost of the building permit.

The council vote split two to two with Mayor Stephens voting against the motion. The motion to essentially remove the cap on building fees was defeated.






