(NSSR) have seen a need on Manitoulin and North Shore communities they are hoping to fill by providing specialized equipment to those who are prone to wandering, such as elderly people with Alzheimer's or dementia or autistic children, but they need the public's support.

Bill Noon, president of NSSR, explained that Project Lifesaver International is a well-known program across the United States and is spreading into Canada, including through search and rescue groups across Ontario. In the North, participating search and rescue organizations in Sault Ste. Marie and Thunder Bay are embracing the program.

According to the Project Lifesaver website, "Citizens enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small personal transmitter around the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized tracking signal. If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local Proj-

Police seeking tips on 'true' identity of dead biker-canoeist who traversed Island in mid-September

PORT ALBERT—News circulated on Manitoulin this past Wednesday that a man, who called himself Mitchell Nelson to those who met him, and had seen by many travelling Highway 6 in September—a unique spectacle because of the canoe he was towing behind his bicycle—was found dead along the shore of Lake Huron, near Port Albert, Ontario. Despite receiving over 100 tips, police are still seeking assistance in helping to determine the man's true identity.

"We have received over 100 tips," Constable Jamie Stanley, community services officer with the Huron County OPP, told The Expositor on Monday. "Nothing has materialized from the tips yet, but investigators are working through them the best they can and following up on all leads.

Protect yourself and your family; get the flu shot

MANITOULIN-It's that time of year again, time to get your annul flu vaccine, the first and best way to protect yourself and your family

"The flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits and missed work and school due to flu, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations," states a press release from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). "The more people who get vaccinated, the more people will be protected from the flu, including older people, very young children, pregnant women and people with certain health conditions who are more vulnerable to serious flu complications."

According to the CDC only injectable flu shots are recommend this season (opposed to the nasal spray vaccine). The flu vaccines have also been updated this season to better match the viruses and there will be some new vaccines on the market this season. As well, the recommendations for vaccination of people with egg allergies has also

"The CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccine for everyone six months of age and older as the first and most important step in protecting against this serious disease," the release continues. "In addition to getting a seasonal flu vaccine, you can take every day preventive actions like staying away from sick people and washing your hands to reduce the spread of germs. If you're sick with flu, stay home from work or school to prevent spreading flu to others."

Flu clinics have already begun on Manitoulin, with lots of options across the Island to get immunized.

The Mindemoya Guardian Pharmacy, Little Current Guardian Pharmacy and Manitowaning Guardian Pharmacy are all offering walk in clinics during business hours. A short form must be filled prior to receiving the shot. The Mindemoya location is open Mondays to Saturdays from 9 am to 6 pm and Sundays from 10 am until 2 pm.

2017 DSB budget passed with slight increase to municipalities

meeting, the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) passed its 2017 budget, resulting in a 0.40 percent increase to the municipal share.

For Ontario Works, there was a reduction to the municipalities by \$81,593, a municipal increase to children's services by \$27,930, an increase to social housing by \$25,019 and an increase to paramedic services by \$70,670. At \$15,569,654, the paramedic services budget makes up over half of the DSB's total budget.

Chronic pain strategy must extend into aging rural communities

Nothing says chronic pain like old age. Advancing years almost inevitably bring with them a plethora of aches and pains that are fodder for an encyclopedia of nursing home black humour and jokes told by the elderly. To check on the veracity of that concept, one need only check in on the elderly person living next door or across the street. Chances are they will confirm a marked rise in pain accompanies the accrual of birthday candles. But in the end, it is really no joking mat-

It probably has not escaped the notice of anyone living in small Northern Ontario rural communities that the median age in those communities is rising steadily and inexorably. For most there is no real end in sight to that trend, time marches on, so health issues and particularly those issues relating to access to timely and effective medical services are of considerable concern to a growing number of Northerners, among whom Manitoulin communities are to be count-

Any strategy to tackle the issues accompanying chronic pain need to address the larger proportion of elderly that reside in rural and Northern communities if it is to be an equitable approach to the issue. The solution cannot simply be: move to a larger urban area. It is unreasonable to expect the elderly or other residents of Northern and rural communities dealing with chronic pain to uproot themselves, and possibly their families, to resettle in larger urban centres. Economically, such a move will often result in a marked decline in

the quality of life of the health care refugee, as life in larger urban centres is often a good deal more expensive than life in a small rural community. Such a move to a more anonymous urban centre could result in the loss of those considerable ad hoc support systems that abound in rural communities, where neighbours still know and help neighbours and communities tend to look after their own.

The social disconnection that results from dislocations to unfamiliar communities have also been proven to be ruinous to the health, both physical and mental, of the elderly and infirm. It is well documented that the quality of life of the elderly is highest when they can be maintained in the familiar comfort of their own home.

It is well past time that those who design our health systems take into account the needs of rural and Northern communities and include sufficient outreach and flexibility in those systems to positively impact people living in those communities.

The current provincial government and in particular the current premier has indicated its determination to rebuild its relationship with both rural and Northern communities. If they want to win back the trust of the people outside of metropolitan Toronto and the Golden Horseshoe, a comprehensive strategy to combat chronic pain and illness that reaches into those communities would be a good a place to

Old people do tend to hobble to their way to the ballot box in disproportionate numbers.

Canada's Northern Dancer, whose myriad offspring are winning races all across North America, the UK, and even Australia and Japan. On opening day at Toronto's Woodbine track on April 12 it is a safe bet that many of the winners will be able to trace their lineage back to Northern Dancer, a famous bay born in 1961 at E.P. Taylor's Windfields Farm near Oshawa, Ont. Northern Dancer died in 1990 and is buried at Windfields. After years of neglect, the graves of Northern Dancer and several of his fellow winners were in danger of disappearing but, alerted by public protests and media outrage, the City of Oshawa and the University of Ontario Institute of Technology took action, and the site

is now open to visitors.

On Manitoulin Island we have hard working pioneers and their families buried in the historical Michael's Bay sawmill village, since the late 1800s and early 1900s with no respect. Visitors can visit a famous racehorse but relatives can't visit their ancestors on Michael's Bay Town Site because the Government of Canada owns the property and has Do Not Trespass signs up.

Remembrance for all Canadians. It was adopted from Canadian Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae's poem 'In Flanders Fields,' where he spoke of the poppies growing on the battlefields in Europe during the First World War. His poem became known around the world.

The Legion takes its responsibility to protect the legacy of the poppy and the distribution of Poppy Funds very seriously. All funds collected during our Poppy Campaign are held in trust at every level of the Legion and the use of these trust funds is strictly controlled as outlined in the policy contained in the Poppy Manual.

Poppy Trust Funds assist veterans who are in need of financial assistance and may be authorized for special use expenditures on a case by case basis. Such assistance could include the provision of housing accommodation or care facilities, medical training and research, dropin centres and meals on wheels, accessibility modifications and other quality of life needs such as wheel chairs, prosthetics or for transition programs for veterans related to their training, education and support

The annual Poppy Campaign is organized and run by local Legion volunteers at over 1,400 branches across Canada and abroad. Donations collected support Veterans and their families in need in those communi-

Perhaps the best measure of success for the Legion's Poppy Campaign is the fact that this campaign has set new records for the past four consecutive years. Last year, Legionnaires everywhere distributed more than 21 million poppies and supporting materials. From the 2014 campaign financial statements, \$17 million was returned to support Veterans in communities across Canada.

These funds do make a difference: "The folks from The Royal Canadian Legion, Belleville were over today with a donation to Hastings Manor. We were presented with a cheque. I had my picture taken with the staff. I then cried...We really appreciate the kindness of R.C.L.," says Thomas L. Van Dusen in a recent email to Dominion Command.

Or the comments from chairperson of the Poppy Fund from Legion This year marks the 95th year that the poppy has stood as a symbol of Branch #59 in Moose Jaw, Christine Simpson, who stated to the Discover Moose Jaw newsletter during the last campaign: "All of the money stays here. If there's a veteran in need or the family of a deceased veteran...if they're in financial need of something, a wheelchair (or) a walker then the Poppy Fund puts the money out. Things happen, like if your furnace goes out and (you) don't have the money to pay for it, we pay the furnace company to install that new furnace."

These stories are repeated time and again at Legion branches throughout Canada. For more than 90 years, the Legion has been helping veterans and their families and our important work continues. But we cannot do this without the tremendous support and generosity of Canadians across the country.

The legacy of Gordie Howe: his impact on my life

T's only natural, every kid has an idol or hero growing up, and mine was Gordie Howe. He gave me warmth and enthusiasm in my early years all through the winters during seven particular seasons when times were rough in the bitter-cold country of Northeastern Ontario. For me, growing up in the 1950s wasn't easy.

I was placed in the IRS (Indian Residential School) in Spanish when I was sixyears-old in the early 1950s. This is where I learned how to skate and play hockey. I have to admit the priests were good coaches and good teachers on how to play ice hockey, but they were also strapping disciplinarians. When I came home it wasn't all that rosy-posy either. Running away had entered my mind on several occasions. Mr. Hockey kept me going for seven years even after I left home in 1964.

I was about 11-years-old when I first heard about Gordie Howe. My brothers and neighbourhood kids, we used to skate and play hockey out by the frozen pond near our house at Wikwemikong. One day, so inquisitive, I asked my oldest brother Ray if he knew any NHL hockey players' names. 'Yes,' he said, 'I know Gordie Howe. He plays for the Detroit Red Wings and he's the best in the League.' Ray had just come home for Christmas holidays. He was a chef in Greenfield Restaurant on Woodward Avenue in downtown Detroit, which I would visit 10 years later.


Francis, Eugene and I, had just come home from the Spanish IRS, also for Christmas holidays not knowing this would be our last year in the Indian Residential School. It's obvious my brother Ray was a Detroit Red Wings fan. After all, he lived in the hockey town, the automobile capital city of the world. And this is how I came to be a Gordie Howe admirer. But that's just the way it was—every kid wanted to be somebody else, someone skillful when playing ice hockey out in the frozen ponds.

Gordie Howe kept me motivated for seven years; I became a hockey fanatic. Only my close friends knew it. I started collecting NHL hockey cards, plastic hockey coins, hockey posters, I even ordered the popular Hockey Pictorial magazine, which I received once a month and the Hockey News, which entertained me every two weeks. Both magazines were published in Toronto. It was from these two magazines that I constructed my hockey scrapbook with paste and cutouts. And of course the famous business deal, 5" x 7" Bee Hive Corn Syrup NHL hockey pictures—buy one Bee Hive Corn Syrup and mail in your coupon to Port Credit, Ontario. My hockey collectables piled up. Kids and grown ups alike would drop by, wanting to see my collections, with some readers spending time reading my hockey magazines. I even heard my father say one evening, 'Where's all the syrup coming from?'

Family members started to wonder where the money was coming from. But that's another story. I have been broke many times but I was never poor. There were four people who owned a TV set in Murray Hill in the late 1950s in this satellite community of Wikwemikong: Anthony Trudeau, Alphonse Pangowish, the Murray Hill School, and my father, Jacob Shawanda and on Saturday nights our house would be full of people come to watch the popular Hockey Night in Canada.

There were a lot of hockey fans young and old, most were Toronto Maple Leaf Fans, there was a few Montreal enthusiasts and Chicago Black Hawks fans, likewise Boston and New York Rangers. It seemed I was the only Red Wings Fan around. My parents were Maple Leaf fans so was Francis, and brother Eugene was a Montreal Canadien admirer. But I made sure the people coming in our house knew: Gordie Howe and the Detroit Red Wings were my team. As soon as the neighbours and relatives walked into our house they would see a Gordie Howe picture, 5" x 7", from the famous Bee Hive Company sitting on top of the TV looking superior. He was the Super Star, Mr. Hockey.

Gordie Howe and the Detroit Red Wings never won the Stanley Cup while I was living in Wikwemikong. For seven years I watched them battle it out in the playoffs and in the finals, many times getting beat




A Gordie Howe hockey card remains one of the most cherished pieces of paraphernalia for hockey fans.

out by a single goal. After the finals, my friends and my family and the Murray Hill individuals always celebrated with the Stanley Cup champions, something that was notable in the Murray Hill district. And if it's not the Montreal Canadiens winning, it's the Toronto Maple Leafs. For me those times, those unbearable nights, were hard to swallow. But realizing that the Detroit Red Wings had won the Stanley Cup from 1950 to 1954, four years in a row, and no team had ever done it before made me feel proud. And knowing Gordie Howe won the scoring championship year after year and almost every other trophy awarded in the NHL, he also took home made me feel good too. Realizing this remarkable accomplishment, no wonder I lived satisfied my mind in the hockey world for seven years.

Listening to Detroit Red Wings Hockey games year after year on the radio station with my brother Francis was most exciting and to hear Gordie Howe get an assist, score a goal or score a hat-trick seemed more thrilling than ever. Each year, Howe broke records and set new ones. One night me and Francis were listening to the Chi-Aadaam (Chatham) radio station. Gordie Howe was the attention. This time he was on his way to break the record of another Hockey Great record holder, Rocket Richard, for the all time best season of 544 goals.

Gordie Howe hadn't scored a goal in 10 games, he was on a winless streak. I told Francis it's got to be tonight. It was in the fall, our well water was overflowing, and getting mucky and messy. I had to get water across the road at our neighbour's well. I told Francis, I have to get water now and it will give me a chance for a breather. I was getting nervous. As I walked across the road in the dark with a pail in each hand, I asked God Almighty to help Gordie Howe score the goal he needed to break the record. He had been scoreless to long. It was the first time I ever asked the Creator for anything like that. The purpose of captivating. When I came back, I walked into the house and Francis said, 'Gordie Howe just broke the Rocket's record.' I was so overjoyed I dropped both pails of water and it spilled all over the floor. Francis laughed his head off. He said, 'there's more of that where that came from.' What a fine way to ask for help in the dark and for Creator to answer prayers, I thought.

My hockey days were over when I turned 18-years-old. There was no hockey in a town where I lived and worked, Mt. Clemens, Michigan. And my lifestyle was changing. When a person misses a year playing hockey, it's never the same again as something is lost, the coordination is gone. It's not like riding a bike, where you could be off it for a length of time and still paddle the bike skilfully. I played hockey in Wikwemikong for about seven years. Pee Wee, Bantam and I went to Toronto Hockey School for a week in August of 1963. Our special guest was Red Kelly of Toronto Maple Leafs and there were three Instructors, one was Dave Dry-

den, the brother of famous goaltender Ken Dryden. Fifty of us students went to a field and did a strenuous exercise and 25 hardworking kids were picked to go to Maple Leaf Gardens and watch Toronto Maple Leafs coach Punch Imlach's son Brett Imlach try out for the Toronto Maple Leafs. I was one of the 25 lucky kids picked to watch the tryout game in the Gardens.

To walk into the historic Toronto Maple Leaf Gardens then was a thrill of a lifetime and riding up the escalator was like riding in dreamland. Unfortunately, Brett Imlach didn't make the Toronto Maple Leafs. However, that winter in Wikwemikong, I jumped the league and instead of playing for Juniors, I played in the Intermediate division, a notch higher. Our playing coach was Zaabyea Xavier Fox. My hockey schooling had paid off. But time was moving on for me. It was my last season in Wikwemikong and I missed the hockey town deeply. Wiky was always competitive when it came to playing hockey in Manitoulin Island with the Senior League winning the trophy three consecutive years in the 1950s and Scotty Fisher's Wiky Junior League team also winning three consecutive years in 1960s. The closest I ever came to winning a championship in my lifetime was with Wiky Bantams.

Our coach was my school teacher, Cecil King, now a retired professor in Saskatoon. We lost in Gore Bay in double overtime that evening. Double overtime was rare in those years. There were six teams in Manitoulin Island. Wikwemikong, Manitowaning, Little Current, Gore Bay, Providence Bay and Mindemoya. What I remember was every team was knocked off from the play-offs in Wikwemikong, from Pee Wee, Juniors, Intermediate and Seniors. Bantam was the only team left. When we arrived by car in Gore Bay it felt different without the other teams. We were used to travelling together on a bus. What happened was kind of surprising. Providence Bay Juniors were playing against Gore Bay Juniors right after our game. And it started from the first period, Providence Bay fans were cheering for us, all through the night. Every time we came close to scoring a goal or body checking someone against the boards, they started cheering and chanting 'Go Wiky Go.' that's all was heard all through the night. It may have lifted us a lot, a feeling of appreciation. Even though we lost 3 to 2 to a better team. The 'Porter' youngster was noticeably a super hockey player for the Gore Bay Bantams. Nevertheless, we were the second best team in Manitoulin Island that year.

I lived in Mt. Clemens and hockey was still floating around in my veins at a slow pace. One Saturday I asked my now deceased wife Marge, 'Let's go and see Gordie Howe. He's at Gordie Howe Hockey Land getting prepared for the kids' hockey school in St. Clair Shores.' It was about five miles from Mt. Clemens and we caught a bus to the arena, walked in and I saw Gordie Howe practice slap shots. He slowly turned around and came in our direction and made a slapshot. Marge ducked as the puck landed in front of the solid thick two-inch Herculite glass. Gordie Howe skated over and said, 'Why did you duck?'

We laughed. Amusingly, I said, 'You

would duck too, if a puck came at you 100 miles an hour.' This simply saying, he had the hardest slap shot in the NHL. He laughed and said, 'Thank you' and skated on. This man is my idol and the smallest connection could mean so much.

On Sunday evenings, I would go to Gordie Howe Hockey Land to public skating and try to limber up my legs. I enjoyed skating. That winter, on weekends, I played under Francis Miskokomon's guidance in Walpole Island, Ontario, and one weekend we played at Gordie Howe Hockey Land, in St. Claire Shores. We won about 13-3. I wasn't to pleased with the score. I always preferred competition. Francis Miskokomon was a good coach and good friend. He always made me laugh with his recollections.

I moved to Detroit City in 1969, the Hippy Era, fast life, fast cars and long hair. I thought it was exciting: lots of action, lots of parties, a large number of Anishinaabe people and a few 'Blind Pigs' as they were called, known as speakeasies in the 1920s and '30s. It was a place where people went for excitement after closing time to drink and gamble and listen to music. People called it 'blind pig' because the police would drive by them and pretend nothing was going on in the building, for the reason that the law claimed they were allowed to raid the place once every three or four months. This kind of living eventually will catch up to anyone. Doing the same thing, it becomes boring and sickening.

To get out of this environment which was proving monotonous I went to hockey games and watched Gordie Howe play in the old Detroit Olympia Stadium before he retired. On a few occasions, I got my buddy Kenny Chi-geek Greenbird to accompany me. I waited until the Boston Bruins come to play so I could also watch Stan Jonathon in action. He was from the Six Nations Reserve and was known for acting out as a policeman in the NHL. Likewise, the Philadelphia Flyers. I waited until Reggie Leach come to play, the Ojibwe from Manitoba (who now lives on Manitoulin in AOK) known as the 'Sniper,' a deadly scorer, and there was Henry Boucha, who wore a red headband for the Red Wings, a feisty fast skater and one of the finest all around athletes from Warroad, Minnesota and of course watching Gordie Howe play put me in a clear-thinking mode as I watched him move about with great determination. This man could do everything. He was so good at the game he played, they eventually just named him after it. Mr. Hockey.

Not long after, I was playing in Bloomfield Hills outside of Detroit. The bush league game was fast and close scoring. It was at this time I enjoyed myself the most. I played 12 games in the same arena and I noticed I was getting more tired towards the end, out of shape but still fun. My friends, Bobby Tawadjiwan Lewis and Billy Waabaazii Williams, would come with me for support. After the game I would always find them in the bar section of the arena overlooking the ice surface. They would always say 'Good game, Gordie.' I didn't mind them. I still had a little fun of hockey left in me.

The following year, 1973, was my last. I played for Lansing Tribe in Lansing, Michigan. I would drive to Lansing every Sunday from Detroit with a carload of friends and visit families since, mainly, most families we knew were from Wiky. The men and women worked for General Motors, the home of the Oldsmobile auto factory. Bob Lewis was always with me like a bodyguard. He was a lot of fun to be with. I had fun in Lansing playing hockey. There were lots of laughs, lots of joking, lots of Anishinaabe humour. Me and George Roy was on the same team in Wiky Bantams years back and we were on same line in Lansing, Michigan. We were all from Wikwemikong and in Lansing except the two Debossige brothers from West Bay reserve.

The two brothers, Brent and Pete, were good hockey players and they where always known to say, 'You must be from Wiky.' Wiky players, I guess, were known to hog the puck instead of passing it. They just want to stickhandle it and try to score. George tells me, 'those two brothers, they say that all the time, don't mind them.' And

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Central Manitoulin Council Notes

Public meeting on rezoning application

An October 27 public meeting to hear input on a rezoning application to change a Providence Bay property, formerly a restaurant, from commercial C1 to residential began at 7:15 (before the normal 7:30 pm start of council) and continued until nearly 8 pm.

At question was a letter of concern from an adjacent property owner who voiced concerns about former gasoline tanks and the scent of residual sewage and the possibility of asbestos residuals from the demolition.

The new property owners' representative Peter Ferro, an architect and property development consultant, took council through a detailed rebuttal of the complaint letter, including letters from all of the other adjacent landowners, the real estate agent handling the sale of the property, the demolition company, the Sudbury and District Health Unit and his own extensive experience with environmental issues.

Mr. Ferrell pointed out that had any issue been found, it would have impacted on negotiations for the sale of the property, but no issues arose from his extensive investigations.

The consultant noted that the couple purchasing the property intended to build on a very different footprint and location on the property, a necessity given the Ministry of Transportation regulations and setbacks that come into play due to the property's proximity to a highway and intersection and a desire of the owners given concerns about road salt etc coming from the nearby roadway.

OPP policing costs added to 2017 budget

New trails in Mindemoya now open to all

by Judy OlackeMINDEMOYA—Over the last year, Manitoulin Special Olympics partnered with Community Living Manitoulin to extend and improve the trail system through the maple bush on Community Living and adjacent landowners' property. With the support of Community Living Manitoulin, Charles Love and John and Cheryl Seabrook, the group developed a marked trail system for walking, snowshoeing and skiing. Manitoulin Special Olympics use the trails for our snowshoe and Nordic ski athlete training. Community Living individuals also use the trails for various activities. This is a shared trail. In the winter, volunteers groom accommodate one side of the trail for classic skiing and the other half is for snowshoeing.

All this work was made possible with the support from TD Friends of the Environment, and several local businesses and organizations: Cranston Tree Service, H&R Noble Construction, DA Williamsons and Sons Hardware, Taylor Sawmill, Central Manitoulin Lions Club and Providence Bay Spring Bay Lions Club.

Now the trails can be used by the general public. The group formed the Maple Ridge Trail Club and affiliated with Cross Country (Ski) Canada, which has important insurance coverage for the property owners and club members. A yearly single membership costs \$30 and a group membership costs \$38. These prices include the \$18 that goes to Cross Country Canada and Cross Country Ski Ontario for insurance reasons. All

members under one group membership can use the trails by signing in at the trailhead (ie. family, school group, health program group, hotel customers, etc.). If someone wants to use the trail on a daily basis there is a day use fee of \$2/child, \$5/adult or \$10/family. The Maple Ridge Trail club has kept costs low to encourage active outdoor use. Due to insurance restrictions, no biking by the public is allowed. A convenient and easy way to join the Club can be done online at zone4.ca. One just needs to type in "Maple Ridge Trail Club" and follow the steps.

The Mindemoya trails begin in an open field at the old 'Hope Farm' property of Community Living Manitoulin (at the new Administration Office). The trailhead box offers a trail map and signin sheet. The start has a gentle climb through maple forest onto a limestone ridge. There are views overlooking parts of Mindemoya and opportunities to see wildlife. Along the trails you can spot fossils, huge boulders (glacial erratics) and for the little ones, fairy homes. There is a paved portion of one of the trails that takes you to a picnic area; ideal for persons with mobility issues.

Over time, the club will be adding more interpretive spots/signs to heighten user enjoyment of the area. The trail system includes four well marked trails with mild elevation changes, making the system safe for family and senior users. The main trail loop from the parking area and back is 1.5 km long but greater distances are possible with additional 2 km and 0.5 km loops.

The primary goal of the group has been to enhance opportunities walk/ski/snowshoe within the heart of Mindemoya. They have tried to develop safe, easy to follow trails of varying lengths, with the hope that users will have a quality trail experience that fosters an appreciation of the maple forest around them and have fun being active outside so they return to the trails

"It was Mr. Nelson, his bike and gear back into the canoe for a paddle down the Lake Superior coast as far as Terrace Bay at which point he once again took to the road, admitting there had been some long stretches of the Trans Canada Highway along Lake Superior where the diminutive and wiry 57-year-old had been forced to walk his bike and its entourage up steep and lengthy hills," Mr. McCutcheon wrote of the man's travels, referring to the endeavor as "sysiphus-like" in the September 21 newspaper story.

Mr. McCutcheon said he had encountered the man while driving to Little Current from Manitowaning. The newspaperman got to Little Current and decided to go back to the hill at Green Bush Road, armed with a camera, where he was cycling and find out his story.

"I chatted with him because of the unusual circumstances of towing a canoe with a bike," Mr. McCutcheon said. "He was affable enough, but not loquacious."

"There was a resigned sadness to the guy, and I remember thinking 'I hope he makes it'," the publisher added. "It's a sad commentary on someone who had obviously set himself a task and had almost completed it."

And 'almost' is the operative word here. Mr. Nelson told The Expositor scribe that he planned to take his gear across Lake Huron via the Chi-Cheemaun and then put his canoe back in the water with Grand Bend on Lake Huron his destination after which he would be biking to London where he had family and friends.

An OPP spokesperson observed to The Expositor Thursday that the point where Mr. Nelson's body was found on the Lake Huron shore was only about an hour's paddle north of Grand Bend.

The Expositor spoke with Constable Stanley regarding the investigation into Mr. Mitchell's death.

"The body was found in the surf on a beach north of Port Albert on Saturday, October 15 by civilians," said Constable Stanley. "A post mortem exam was conducted on Monday (October 17) on the body. The cause of death was undetermined, but there is no evidence to indicate foul play."

As to how long the body had been in the water, Constable Stanley said it was estimated to have been a week to a few weeks.

Constable Stanley also said that a search was conducted for his canoe and bicycle, but they have yet to be located.

"Contact information was found on the deceased that led to the reporter from the SooToday," continued Constable Stanley, explaining how investigators initially identified the body.

"We have run the name 'Mitchell Nelson' through many databases which has proven unsuccessful," added Constable Stanley. "We are hoping that through the news and social media, we are able to get the photo out of the deceased and get a positive ID of the body."

Police have been following up on tips, indicating that he may have taken the Chi-Cheemaun ferry to Tobermory, which he had told The Expositor he planned to do.

The OPP has requested the assistance of the Owen Sound Transportation Company (OSTC) in determining when Mr. Nelson boarded the ferry from Manitoulin.

"We do know that he travelled on the ferry," said OSTC CEO Susan Schrempf, "but we are not certain of the date and time." Once that information has been determined, the OPP will be able to interview the staff who may have come in contact with the deceased in his travels. "At this point we can't say," noted Ms. Schrempf, "because we just aren't sure."

There have also been sightings of Mr. Nelson with his canoe and bike travelling on land near Port Albert. Constable Stanley said that investigators are still working on trying to piece together a time frame and travel path.

The end of the Expositor's September 21 story is sad in its foreshadowing.

"Well," he was asked rhetorically by The Expositor, "this trip was a good idea, wasn't it?"

"Was it?" Mr. Nelson responded, setting out again."

Anyone with information can contact the Huron County OPP at 1-888-310-1122 or their local police agency immediately. Should you wish to remain anonymous you can contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS) where you may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$2,000.

"It is unfortunate we have to notify the next-of-kin in this manner, but we have no other option other than to seek help from the public in this instance," said Huron County Detachment Commander Inspector Younan.

Mr. Nelson is described as a white male, average to medium build with balding, grey hair, a thin moustache and, according to what he told this newspaper, 57 years of age. He was found wearing a blue Fluid brand lifejacket, a black fleece-type pullover/jacket, black wind pants with the letters "PEP" on a shield and black Nike running shoes.

Mr. Nelson told The Expositor that he had left Edmonton, where he had been living for the past several years, on Canada Day following the fireworks in that city. He had put his canoe (and presumably his bike) into the North Saskatchewan River on that day and headed north and then east across the prairies and into Ontario on his odyssey.

utes, Councillor Derek Stephens discovered he had a major challenge.

"I will move the motion to put it on the table," he said, with Councillor Dale Scott seconding the motion, "but in regards to 383-16, the minutes indicate that the motion was defeated, but that motion passed." Councillor Scott was in the chair when the motion in question was debated as Mayor Stephens had vacated the chair indicating he wished to speak on the motion.

In response to Councillor Stephens, Mayor Richard Stephens replied that "all the votes were not counted at the meeting. There were six people there, when the chair of the meeting called for the vote, three were in favour, one was against and one voted in abstention (under the Municipal Act, abstentions are counted as negative votes). The other votes were it accounted for."

vote wasn't accounted for."

Mayor Stephens asserted that the sixth vote was not accounted for until the following Sunday, when he contacted Councillor Scott and asked him two questions. "I asked him if he had voted and if he had voted, how he would have voted," supplied the mayor. "He indicated to me that

he would have voted against it."

Councillor Stephens pointed out that the motion had been voted on in open council and declared as carried by the chair of the meeting. He pointed out that the chair of council, normally the mayor, does not vote on motions unless there is a tie or a recorded vote is called for. "The vote was three to two, so there was no tie, so there was no need to vote," he said

The Municipal Act's section 244 declares that "Except as provided in sections 233 and 238, no vote shall be taken by ballot or by any other

method of secret voting and every vote so taken is of no effect." Call around votes by telephone are not an exception.

"My notion is that all of the councillors should vote," replied Mayor Stephens.

"One, there is no such thing as abstentions," agreed Councillor Stephens, "two, the chair of the meeting stated that the motion had carried and three, I don't think it is appropriate to get an opinion over the phone as to how that person would have voted. He said carried."

"That is exactly why I asked the question," insisted Mayor Stephens.

"Traditionally our chair has not voted," pointed out Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "I know if I am doing the vote I look for four hands."

"In Dale's (Scott) case it was threetwo." noted Councillor Stephens.

"His vote had an impact as to how the vote on the motion was going to be decided," replied Mayor Stephens. "As a chair, he didn't have a vote,"

replied Councillor Stephens.
"The chair is at the table," said

Mayor Stephens.

"We had a vote, the vote was three to two, there was no tie," said Councillor Alex Baran.

Councillor Scott, who was sitting as chair during the debate on the motion, agreed. "As Alex said, it was three to two, I didn't feel the obligation to vote," he said. "It didn't matter how I was going to vote, I didn't feel the requirement for it. The vote was three to two, that is why I said carried."

"He has to vote if it would have an affect on the vote," rejoined Mayor Stephens. "It is not a life and death situation."

Councillor MacDonald pointed out that the chair had indicated the motion was carried. "We can't change the minutes because somebody said on the phone that they would have voted against the motion had they voted," she said.

"My understanding is that we are not to vote (if the cast votes do not come to a tie)," said Councillor Scott. "If it had been three, three, I would have had to vote."

Councillor MacDonald suggested that the motion be sent back to committee to be revisited.

"No, I am not willing to do that," challenged Councillor Stephens. "This motion was carried. I think the mayor is changing that because it is what he wanted. To try and work that around is word play. That motion is carried and it should be noted in the minutes as carried."

"In my opinion, all the votes have to be accounted for, I would like to see it sent back," said Mayor Stephens.

"That is what you are doing," rejoined Councillor Stephens. "Getting what you wanted."

After discussion with the acting clerk, the council came to the realization that removing the motion from the minutes was not an option and that sending all of the motions back would be unwieldy.

"I am not in favour of sending everything back to committee," said Councillor MacDonald.

A recorded motion was called for on the motion to approve minutes, with a friendly amendment agreed upon by the mover, Councillor Stephens, and the seconder, Councillor Scott, to indicate that motion 383-16, a motion to approve the drainage report, be carried.

Councillors Stephens, MacDonald, Scott, Baran and Ted Taylor voted for the motion, while Councillor Linda Farquhar and Mayor Stephens voted against the motion. The motion carried.

issue for the DSB; the costs

add more to the DSB budget, but it also means a reduction in response times. "It's a cost, but also a benefit," the mayor said.

"My municipality will look at this budget and say it's not that bad," Mayor MacNevin added.

The total budget for 2017

is \$33,262,397, an increase of 4.36 percent with a total increase across all municipalities of \$42,027 or 0.40 percent.



...Ontario launches opioid strategy to mixed reviews

...continued from page 1 getting people off of the drugs—but that is not its goal. It is hoped that will happen, but it isn't the central goal."

Dr. Cooper said that the addition of suboxone to the arsenal of the battle against the debilitating effects of opioid addictions by making it more readily prescribed is a good thing, but that it is significantly more expensive. "You are looking at around three dollars a dose for suboxone and methadone is pennies, but a lot of the cost is in dispensing fees, so there isn't that much difference in cost to the government," he noted. "It is a safer drug and the efficacy is about the same." Efficacy in this regard is actually measured in the reduction of deaths by overdose and visits to the emergency rooms of local hospitals. When suboxone is used to treat opioid addiction, the risk of a fatal overdose is significantly less than with methadone.

"I am delighted that the government has announced 17 new chronic pain clinics." he added, but there is a significant caveat to that delight. "Where are they going to be located?' queried Dr. Cooper. "I don't expect they will be located in small rural or Northern communities. It probably won't help those smaller communities." Many small rural communities, including First Nations have epidemic proportions of opioid addictions running rampant.

It is a concern shared by Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha. "With 17 pain clinics coming to the entire province I'm very concerned that this will leave Northern Ontario without access," he said.

As for the rest of the strategy, Mr. Mantha also had concerns. "I know of people who need this medication (opioids) to function and this will not help them," he said. "It will only

accomplish two things: one is cause financial hardship for those who can't afford the medication pushing them to the black market and two, causing further health concerns as to the uncertainty of the quality, effectiveness and dosage of the product. We do have an opioid problem but denying the care to the most vulnerable who suffer with incredible pains isn't the answer. Let's make sure supports are in place for those suffering and have pain clinics available to all who need them.'

"Lots of rural people get started on opioids when they are trying to deal with chronic pain," Dr. Cooper noted. "I don't think we do a great job on the issue of chronic pain management."

If the new strategy contains a significant outreach component that will stretch into rural and remote communities, that would be a major step forward for those areas, he suggested. "I would like to see opioid addiction services integrated into primary care." Right now those services are largely separate and that tends to single out and marginalize those seeking help.

help.
"I am also a little bit concerned about the training component," said Dr. Cooper. He noted that there is currently a great deal of training and information available. "It seems like every third email I get in my office is from an organization offering training. There are a lot of resources (currently), so it is not a lack of effort. But you can know how, but the question is 'are you applying that knowledge in an appropriate manner?"," he said.

Dr. Cooper pointed out that while he can prescribe chemotherapy medication, "I wouldn't want to be the one prescribing chemotherapy drugs. It has to be considered carefully by someone trained in that field to safely prescribe and monitor the drugs."

There are three pillars of approach to a strategy that Dr. Cooper said he believes need emphasis. "People with addictive personalities should not be prescribed opioids; we should be managing chronic pain better, there has not been nearly enough research into managing chronic pain; and a huge part of opioid addiction is taking place in shattered communities, opioid addiction is a reflection of underlying issues.

a society approach to addictions tends to only deal with the symptoms of deeper social issues, noted Dr. Cooper. While there are issues that spring from more advantaged parts of society as well, and some of that will be unavoidable, the underlying social issues that provide the most fertile breeding ground for addictions need to be addressed. "Although we tend to hear a lot about it in First Nations communities, the issue is not at all limited to those communities," he pointed out. "There is a common vein running through those communities that are being most impacted and it tends to be those communities that are socially and economically marginalized.'

Ontario's strategy to prevent addiction and overdose includes: designating Dr. David Williams, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health, as Ontario's first-ever Provincial Overdose Coordinator to launch a new surveillance and reporting system to better respond to opioid overdoses in a timely manner and inform how best to direct care; developing evidence-based standards for health care providers on appropriate opioid prescribing that will be released by end of 2017-18 to help prevent the unnecessary dispensing and over-prescribing of

pain killers; delisting highstrength formulations of long-acting opioids from the Ontario Drug Benefit Formulary starting January 1, 2017 to help prevent addiction and support appropriate prescribing; investing \$17 million annually in Ontario's Chronic Pain Network to create or enhance 17 chronic pain clinics across the province, ensuring that patients receive timely and appropriate care; expanding access to naloxone overdose medication, available free of charge for patients and their families through pharmacies and eligible organizations to prevent overdose deaths; and increasing access to Suboxone addiction treatment and improving patient outcomes and integration of care for those using this treatment.

Beginning October 1 stricter controls on the prescribing and dispensing of fentanyl patches took effect and patients are now required to return used fentanyl patches to their pharmacy before more patches can be dispensed.

According to the Ministry of Health, Ontario's opioid strategy was informed by the recommendations of the Methadone Treatment and Services Advisory Committee, which was established by the province to advise on strengthening Ontario's methadone treatment and related services. The

in a few miles from home and search times have been reduced from hours and days to minutes. Recovery times for Project Lifesaver clients average 30 minutes—95 percent less time than standard operations."

The onus is on the family to buy the transmitter (which comes in a bracelet form) at \$350, while the NSSR is hoping to raise enough money to purchase the receivers.

NSSR serves the North Shore, Espanola and Manitoulin areas.

"If we get a call (about someone who's wandered) we look up the frequency and we walk out and start travelling parallel to the signal until we pick up a signal," Mr. Noon explained. "Whenever those signals cross, that's where they are."

Mr. Noon noted the excellent average time that it takes to locate a client, adding that if the NSSR gets a call for a lost Alzheimer's patient using the current means at hand,

the chances are not good at finding them in time.

"We don't get any kind of funding for this, and the receivers are \$5,000 each and we need at least two, but we're hoping for six," Mr. Noon said.

So far NSSR has contacted all of the Lions Clubs in the district and has received \$9,000 in donations to date.

On top of this project, "we also have to raise enough for the team (NSSR)," Mr. Noon added, noting the voluntary road toll the group will be undertaking in Espanola during

the Manitoulin gun hunting season. "We also help at event with first aid for donations."

includes a number of features that will respond to the various strengths and needs of our learners, schools and district school boards. It will promote greater collaboration between everyone, including educators, students, leaders and parents.'

Ms. Theijsmeijer will be that critical link in providing that greater collaboration, particularly between educators in the RDSB. Her region includes the public schools on Manitoulin Island, both elementary and Manitoulin Secondary School, as well as Espanola and "the Valley" (Hamner, Val Caron etc.).

"I will be working with teachers and principals to really identify who needs support," said Ms. Theijsmeijer. She will not only be identifying why those students need support, but also matching up innovative methods to provide that support.

The award-winning teacher is well positioned to meet the challenges of her new position. "I have done a lot of professional development myself," she noted, as well as having produced a number of scholarly papers. That dedication to learning and developing best practices is a symptom of the passion she brings to her job. "Working with other teachers is something I really enjoy," she said.

The new gig does not mean she is turning away from her first love, however, as the appointment is a one-year program. "I will be rebounding back to the classroom at the end of the year," she said.

In the meantime she will be kept pretty

busy. "The learning curve is really steep," she admitted. "But it is a nice change of pace.

The province identifies the Renewed Math Strategy as "an Early Years to Grade 12 strategy that will benefit from and mobilize the latest research and lessons learned regarding effective math learning, teaching and assessment. This will be accomplished in part through "60 minutes per day of protected learning time for effective math instruction and assessment will be required for students in Grades 1 to 8, in addition to embedding the use of math across the curriculum. To support this, the ministry will work with education partners to develop resources that articulate evidence-based practices that should be implemented during this learning time."

Methadone Treatment and Services Advisory Committee is comprised of addiction experts, experienced clinicians and patient advocates from across Ontario.

In addition, Dr. Eric Hoskins, Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, and Dr. Williams have written to all health care providers in Ontario outlining the strategy and enlisting their support to help prevent and reduce opioid addiction and overdose and the government will "continue to seek input on the strategy and identify additional areas for consideration."

Underlying the new strategy are some startling facts. In 2014, over 700 people died in Ontario from opioid-related causes, almost two per day, and that represents a 266 percent increase in overdose deaths since 2002

During the fall of 2016, public consultations will be held with families, caregivers, academics and health care providers, people with lived experience, among others, to seek input on the strategy and to identify additional important considerations. Pilgrims at Poplar Corners

Memoir collection examines life before television


MILLS TOWNSHIP—A mother and son with roots on Manitoulin have teamed up to provide a nostalgic look at a corner of the Island that is frequently overlooked. 'Pilgrims at Poplar Corners' is the result of a collaboration between journalist Margo Little and recording artist Morgan Little. The book has been released using the resources of Manitoulin Publishing.

In a series of memoirs focusing on early childhood in Mills, Ms. Little reflects upon the nature of family and community in Northern Ontario during one transformative decade (1947 – 1957). Drawing upon her own formative experiences in an isolated township on Manitoulin Island, she explores a culture as yet untouched by advanced technology. Through this coming-of-age memoir, mature readers will have an opportunity to revisit the Canada they knew before the digital age and young readers will be able to imagine, and perhaps even appreciate, the values of previous generations.

The purpose of 'Pilgrims at Poplar Corners' is to create a bridge of understanding between a generation raised with chalkboards and textbooks and a generation raised with laptops and smart phones. Although Canadians living in the 21st Century take many creature comforts and technological achievements for granted, there was a time, not so very long ago, when running water, electricity and a reliable food supply were far from guaranteed.

The author chronicles her insular upbringing from her toddler years in a trapper's cabin at Michael's Bay to her unique education in a one-room school house on Western Manitoulin. With wry humour she shares the many childhood mishaps and encounters that helped shape her adult perspectives. The collection of personal essays, although written in the tradition of American authors Eudora Welty and Annie Dillard, serves as a distinctly Canadian homage to

decade when rural Canada was still governed by the values and living conditions of the post-Second World War era. The book is not intended as a formal autobiography; rather it is a collection of vignettes focusing on incidents that had an enduring impact on an inquiring mind.

Although the tales touch upon some tragic occurrences and uncomfortable realities, the publication is in essence a love letter to Manitoulin Island and its people. As the author interweaves present day themes

with episodes from the past, readers may see aspects of their own youth in these anecdotes of universal struggle.

'Pilgrims at Poplar Corners' is available at the Expositor Book Shop. Copies are also available at the Gore Bay Museum and Robertson's IDA. Many of the stories have appeared previously in Highgrader Magazine in Timmins, Ontario. Downloads for Ereaders can be found at Kindle Direct Publishing.

Ms. Little is a charter member of the Sudbury Writers' Guild and founder of the Manitoulin Writers' Retreat. She holds an MA in Interdisciplinary Humanities from Laurentian University. Previously she contributed to a variety of publications including 'The Other Woman was Lady Luck,' 'Meg's Solo,' 'Portraits of Spirit Island, 'Manitoulin Morsels, 'Canadian Crossroads' and 'Manitoulin Cross-pollination Two.' The Pilgrims collection has been released in 2016 to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Manitoulin Writers' Circle.

TIME TO CHANGE YOUR CLOCKS AND THE BATTERIES IN ALL SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS

Clocks will fall back one hour November 6 and the **NEMI Fire Department** is recommending residents install new batteries in their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms when they change their clocks.

In order for smoke and carbon monoxide alarms to do their job, they need to have working batteries. Once a year, old batteries should be replaced with new batteries. When you change your clocks on November 6, the NEMI Fire Department wants everyone to take the time to install new batteries in all alarms."

In order to survive a fire, you need to be provided with an early warning and know what to do when the smoke alarms sound. It's the law to have working smoke alarms on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas. For added protection, it is recommended to also install smoke alarms inside all bedrooms.

Carbon monoxide alarms must be installed outside all sleeping areas if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage.

Tampering with or removing the batteries from your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms is against the law. Failure to comply with the Fire Code can result in a ticket for \$360 or a fine of up to \$50,000.

so I end up with these two brothers on one of the shifts in the third period. Were in our own zone and can't seem to get out. Brent has the puck and he's a real good stick handler as I could see, but won't pass the puck. Pete looks frustrated and shouts real loud to his brother, 'You must be from Wiky.' I cracked up laughing, I couldn't stop laughing. I had to get off the ice. But I remembered that phrase in the Pee Wee days in Wikwemikong. They use to call my friend Harvey Bell Sr. in the Pee Wee division "Puck Hogger." Harvey was a great stickhandler and good all around player. George says, 'those two clowns have the puck all the time and they haven't scored a goal yet.' And more laughs. We played one Christmas weekend in Wikwemikong and got beat about 10 to 3. For the first time. I felt like I was actually working hard on the ice, the fun of the game had left me.

In 1978, I moved to Hamilton and worked for one of the steel companies. Hamilton was desperate to get an NHL franchise. They even built the NHL size arena hoping for an NHL team. The arena was named in honour of former mayor Victor K. Copps, the Copps Coliseum. The Hamilton team had been booted out of the NHL in the 1920s for demanding to strike. They were informed they will never have an NHL team again. To keep Hockey alive in Hamilton, the Russian series took place there. Gretzky and Mario Lemieux were stand-outs


for Canada in the 1980s. It appeared hockey fever was back knocking on my door. I remember standing in line in the cold, freezing rain to buy a package of hockey tickets for the Russian series. But most surprising, previously Mr. Hockey had made a comeback in the early '70s to play with his two sons Mark and Marty Howe for the Houston Aeros in the rival World Hockey League (WHL) and they won a championship twice in Houston, Texas, and a few years later they moved to Connecticut (Quin-netuckut) meaning (long tidal river) in Algonkian and became the Hartford


When I heard they were coming to Toronto to play against Toronto Toros (another WHL franchise) I was excited and anxious to see my idol Gordie Howe play again, this time with his two sons Mark and Marty. I have to see this game, I said, this may be the last time I will see my idol play live hockey. (Mr. Hockey was 51-years-old when he retired in 1981 playing professional hockey. He played with the best hockey players in the world.) I caught a bus to Toronto and when I got on the escalator in Maple Leaf Gardens, my memory takes me back when I was a kid 20 years earlier. I particularly remember riding the same escalator in the early 1960s. 'Not much has changed,' I thought with a grin. I'm still a Gordie Howe follower.

When Gordie Howe got on the ice in Maple Leaf Gardens the crowd stood clapping, a long standing ovation respectfully. I watched him carefully as always. I watch his feet, I watch his legs and stride, his body check, his sharp elbows, and mostly I watch his lightning-fast switch of the hands and I watch him score. That night Gordie Howe scored the winning goal to make it 4 to 3 for the Hartford Whalers. Maple Leaf Gardens was jumping with seventh heaven. Nothing had changed, maybe a step or two, but he was still number one in my book, Mr. Hockey.

My attending the Joe Louis Arena in Detroit on June 13 of this year was for me an important contribution to a memorial service for Gordon Howe. It was a special ceremonial that brought people to give thanks and show gratitude. It's similar to our Rain Dance Ceremony in Wikwemikong for all men, women and children who have gone to the Sacred Tree to pray. It shows a mark of respect. Gordie Howe gave me determination, enthusiasm and affection to the game of Hockey since I was a little kid playing hockey with the best of them on Manitoulin Island. There was always something to look forward to when Mr. Hockey stepped on the ice. He was the only NHL player ever, who could shoot a buck either from left hand and quick ly switch to right hand and score. Gordie Howe showed us how.





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

VON has a wide range of services to help seniors on Manitoulin

MANITOULIN—Seniors living at home on Manitoulin can access a variety of services through the Victorian Order of Nurses (VON) to help them with everything from meals, housekeeping and transportation to medical appointments.

The Expositor spoke with VON Manager of Community Support Services Stephen Brushett about what services are offered on Manitoulin and how seniors or caregivers of seniors can access them.

"We run adult day programs in Wikwemikong on Wednesdays and Mindemoya on Tuesdays and Thursdays," explained Mr. Brushett. "The purpose of the program is to provide therapeutic recreation for seniors that are isolated, frail or have mild dementia. It is also provides respite for caregivers."

A small fee is required to participate in the program, but lunch is provided.

Another service offered by the VON is coordinating volunteer drivers to take individuals to medical appointments.

'We have a lot of drivers that take individuals to Sudbury for appointments," said Mr. Brushett. "We coordinate the volunteer drivers, and individuals are asked to pay

the volunteer's mileage from the Northern Health Travel Grant funds they receive."

Meals on Wheels is also accessed through the VON. "We offer meals to most communities on the Island," Mr. Brushett said. "We have volunteer drivers who drop off frozen meals monthly. The meals are approved by a dietitian and are available for specific diets. We also provide hot meals based out of Mindemoya and Gore Bay. The meals are subsidized and are available for

Assisted living and personal support services are also provided by the VON but must be accessed through the Community Care Access Centre by calling 310-2222

"Assisted living and personal support services are available to seniors living in their homes such as bathing, dressing, meal prep, medical assistance, medical reminders, light housekeeping and security checks," said Mr. Brushett. "The VON's Home Help provides more specific housekeeping such as vacuuming, dusting and dishes for a subsidized rate.'

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


















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


