Rainbow Board seeks clarity in accommodating refugee students

SUDBURY—School boards across the province have been networking and evaluating plans in the wake of Canada's pledge to accept 25,000 Syrian refugees by year's end, but they are somewhat hampered by a lack of information on the specifics of the plans and what their role in that national endeavour will be.

"There are two streams to that," noted Rainbow District School Board Director of Education Norm Blaseg. "First there are individuals who are sponsoring refugees and then there is the government sponsored group. We do not know if they are necessarily

Two Wiky youths fly to international kids' climate summit

by Robin Burridge SODERTALIJE, SWEDEN—Wikwemikong youths Autumn Peltier and Francesca Pheasant are attending the Children's Climate Conference in Sweden this week, representing Canada and joining the discussion on climate change along with 64 other children ages 9-12 from 22 countries.

"This is an exciting opportunity and I want to travel to Sweden to share my opinion on climate change," said 12-year-old Francesca prior to leaving for the conference on Monday. "This is going to be a once-in-a-lifetime experience and I can't wait to meet the other kids from around the world and learn about other cultures.'

"As Junior Miss Wikwemikong, I am looking forward to representing my community and my territory at the conference," added 11year-old Autumn. "I am going to get to meet world leaders and other children from around the world and share my ideas. We were given homework and asked to write down what we would say to our future children and what we would like to say to the global leaders. I wrote that Mother Earth is trying to tell us that she isn't well and that if we keep continuing the way we are, she will get sick and die. I am praying and putting my tobacco down, hoping that we can do something to stop

This is both girls' first time outside of North America and Autumn's first plane trip. As of press time Monday the girls had boarded their flight to Sweden. Once settled in, the girls will spend seven days in Sodertalje, with the bulk of their time at the conference from Wednesday, November 25 until Saturday, November 28.

"The purpose of the conference

is to work together to agree on the 'children's demands,' a communiqué handed to the world's leaders at the climate summit COP21, December 3 in Paris," states a press release from the Children's Climate Conference. "The Paris meeting is the most important climate summit ever held. There is no doubt that the world's leaders

OTTAWA—It might seem incongruous to consider the Member of Parliament for the urban riding of Toronto-St. Paul's for the post of Minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs, but that would only be considered if one was not familiar with the Honourable Carolyn Bennett. Dr. Bennett is no stranger to either Manitoulin or Georgian Bay, having visited the Island twice over the course of the past year and being a self admitted fan of her family cottage on Georgian Bay.

There are few ministers taking their cabinet seat who are more familiar with the portfolio, or more passionate about the difficult issues which confront that ministry. In the 41st Parliament she was appointed the Liberal critic for Aboriginal and Northern Affairs and was a familiar face both at First Nations gatherings and in assailing the policies of the Harper government, both in the House of Commons and across the airwaves, being a regular face on APTN broadcasts.



Manitoulin's Municipalities unanimously support paved shoulders on Highway 540

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) is pleased to see unanimous municipal support for paved shoulders on Highway 540 as it will receive resurfacing between 2016-2018. Paved shoulders dramatically increase the safety of all road users and are making the new one-metre passing law a lot easier for all our automobiles, big trucks and tandem trailers.

MICA has forwarded all municipal resolutions to the Minister of Transportation Ontario (MTO).

"Paved shoulders improve the safety of all road users and make passing a cyclist easier," states Maja Mielonen, president of MICA. "They also enhance the longevity of the road by five years. On Manitoulin Island they have brought ever increasing tourism since 2012, with some accommodations reporting up to 20 percent of their annual income due to cycle tourism in 2014 and 2015.'

Municipalities have passed resolutions expressing the desire to make Manitoulin a top cycling destination, "as they have witnessed the direct, positive impact these road safety improvements have brought to Manitoulin along Highway 6 and recently on Highway 551," Ms. Mielonen continues. "Cycling with a road bike is favoured by most of our visitors, which is another good reason to support Manitoulin's lobby efforts for paved shoulders on Highway 540, as they increase the safety and overall satisfaction of our visitors tremendously.'

Nearly 8,000 copies of the Manitoulin Island and LaCloche Mountains Cycling Routes and Road Map have been sold. The third edition will see an addition of over 27 kiloemtres of new mountain bike trails, a summer activity enjoyed by many of our visitors.

The Manitoulin and the LaCloche area offers well over 800 kilometres of cycling loops enjoyed by visitors and locals alike.

With excellent hill training through the LaCloche Mountains, quiet flat paved country roads for roadies and off road trails, our visitors stay an average of 6.5 days on Manitoulin," Ms. Mielonen explains. "That is a few days longer than any other visitor segment. MICA is happy to inform you that our volunteers will be representing Manitoulin again at the three-day Toronto International Bicycle Show in early March 2016. The Chi-Cheemaun, The Expositor and many municipalities continue to support MICA in this effort. Last year we distributed over 1,500 copies of The Expositor's 'This is Manitoulin' publication filled with promotional material."

Ms. Mielonen noted that the ferry walk-on cycle count was up over 14.5 percent and the overall count is up with 5,186 bicycles counted. Last year's Manitoulin Passage ride attracted 240 riders and preparations are well on the way for the 6th annual Manitoulin Passage Ride, June 4 and 5, 2016. MICA is expecting over 300 participants.

MANITOWANING—Rodney Deforge is one busy fellow these days. The social entrepreneur and lead pastor of Cornerstone Christian Assembly has just closed a deal on the former Manitowaning Lodge and work is underway to make the property the new home of Barney's Bargain Barn, the forprofit business that acts as a revenue stream for the church, along with a number of other interest-

The tennis courts of Mani-

ble aspect of the property, with their immaculate courts running alongside Manitowaning's Cardwell Street corridor on the way to Wikwemikong, Rainbow Ridge Golf Course or the Assiginack Curling Club, the former summer home of Barney's Bargain Barn. "The courts have been really well maintained," said Pastor Deforge (whose nickname Barney is the Barney' in the business name). "We have been in contact with the local tennis group and they will be able to use the courts and we have contacted Assiginack Public School in case they would like to use them for a program at their

The plan for the property is twofold, explained Pastor Deforge. "The immediate plan is to relocate Barney's Bargain Barn there," he said. "We had looked around for commercial land in the area and there just wasn't any to be found." The Manitowaning Lodge property is already zoned as commercial property, making it ideal for the organization's plans.

Although there are buildings on the property, they have been out of use for some time, he explained, requiring a good deal of work to prepare the property for its new

"There is a small building there that we are going to add onto," said Pastor Deforge. "The contractor is already in there."

Barney's Bargain Barn has already proven to be a successful operation, generating up to \$900 a weekend, not only through the present. "There are a lot of locals who come out," he said, "so it is still very busy."

In the future, Mr. Deforge hopes that the concept will expand to include small boutique businesses. "But that is probably a little bit down the road," he said.

Barney's Bargain Barn had incorporated a small café offering inexpensive meals as an experiment and it proved so successful that they plan to continue the practice in the new location. "You could get a soup, sandwich and a pop for around \$5, so it was a very affordable meal," he said. "A lot of seniors began coming out and it became a kind of meeting place for people." That sense of community added a lot to the atmosphere they found. "So we want to keep that going.

The funds generated from the social enterprise had another bonus. "We found that we were able to waive the delivery fees for the food supplies that we bring to food banks," he said. "We were

able to fund our operations out of the revenues generated by the business.

The church group has four properties from which they currently operate their various ministries, but the eventual plan is to consolidate operations at the Manitowaning Lodge property and sell off the other properties.

We are going to build a new church," said Pastor Deforge. "It is a little bit of a leap of faith, but we hope that this will result in cost savings."

There are also plans to re-open the restaurant located on the property and the small motel that is currently there has been in operation and has been well maintained.

Chief Dean Roy sets goal of new school for Sheshegwaning

by Alicia McCutcheon SHESHGWANING—Dean Roy's first foray into politics is as chief of the Sheshegwaning First Nation, and he's ready to roll up his sleeves with his "team," or council, beside him.

Chief Roy was nominated by a member of the community, he explained. "People seemed to think I had a lot of good experience to bring to the table," the chief said of letting his nomination stand.

Chief Roy has a varied background, holding a Bachelor of Science from Laurentian's University, working in finance and, most recently, as the information technology and systems person for the Sheshegwaning First Nation.

He explained that he led his platform for chief with his threeyear background on the Sheshegwaning board of education, one of which he was the chair.

"I would like to see a new school built here, to go to Grade 8," Chief Roy said, noting that the current St. Joseph's School offers classes from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 4. "Our students (Grades 5 to 8) go to Lakeview School now, which is a one-hour bus ride, on a

good day. They're having to get up at 6 am.

His first order of business is to see if the community can get a feasibility study done to build a new JK to Grade 8 public school. "The Liberal government has actually committed funding so we're hoping to get part of that.'

Chief Roy added, "I'm not going to be making a lot of decisions on my own—I've got a good team of councillors to work with.'

Manitoulin Mustangs will resume Friday night play starting this week

LİTTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) Mustangs boys' hockey team will take to the ice as usual this Friday, November 27 in Little Current at its prime 7 pm spot playing against the St. Charles Cardinals. The Mustangs are undefeated in league play.

There are some conditions Manitoulin Secondary School had to meet in order to maintain the evening game slot.

There was some concern going into the season that the Mustangs would be forced to play at a new, less busy time of 4 pm at the Little Current arena, this after an explosive January 2015 game against the visiting Lockerby Vikings.

In that game, Manitoulin official Jason Thibault called the game with six minutes and 20 seconds remaining in the third period. Following a hit in the corner by a Mustang in the third period, a check which was deemed 'clean' by the refs, the game began to spiral out of control. One Lockerby player, upset by what he deemed to be a missed call, began to swear at the official, according to his account of the situation. Another Lockerby player then began to taunt the Mustangs bench as well as some of the hometown fans in the crowd.

At the same time, one of the Lockerby players grabbed a Mustangs player by the facemask, not letting go. It eventually took three officials to stop the situation, which lasted more than 30 seconds. This same player also threw a water bottle into the crowd as well as giving them 'the fin-

The Lockerby player was ejected from the game, but was visibly angered by the call and was noticeably agitated at Mr. Thibault as he tried to skate him off the ice, as witnessed by this newspaper. This breakdown in the game raised the ire of the fans, particularly children, who jeered and booed loudly once the game was called (ended by officials) and Lockerby skated off the ice.

As the team left the ice, one of the Vikings took his anger out on the arena door, smashing it and breaking the glass with his stick (an event which was captured by this newspaper on video).

Health unit must step up to shine a light on blastomycosis

Sadly, we are now able to report that there have been two Manitoulin Island area persons who have succumbed to blastomycosis during this calendar year.

The first person died early in January, the second person this month.

People (and dogs and cats as well) are infected with the blastomycosis fungal spore, which occurs in abundance around the eastern shoreline of Georgian Bay and on Manitoulin Island. People and pets are usually infected when they are working with (or near) earth that has been harbouring the blastomycosis spores, and which has been disturbed by construction which can occur on either a large or small

Although the organism is well established as a part of the environment in which we live, blastomycosis infections are unusual enough in humans to often go initially undetected by medical authorities.

In fact, it is the veterinary medicine practitioners on Manitoulin Island who have become adept at diagnosing and treating pet animals who have come into contact with and been infected by blastomycosis spores because of its local prevalence.

But two fatalities within a year means the whole community needs much more education on what blastomycosis means, how it can be contracted, how to avoid it (as much as possible), its symptoms and how an infection can be cured.

This newspaper has taken the issue seriously and has given the

Manitoulin and area people of the real hazards to themselves and to

But, with this second tragic death, it is very clear that the Sudbury and District Health Unit must recognize this as a real threat to human life in our region and mount a sustained public information campaign designed to educate people of all ages about this unseen hazard and its various symptoms.

These two fatalities are not the first people to have been infected with blastomycosis in this area but they are the first, as far as we know, who have perished from the condition.

In several other cases, the condition has been eventually identified and successfully treated and the patient returned to their prior level of health.

But, in the spring and summer, people like to work in their gardens and in ways large and small dig up, turn over and move earth around; the very activities that free the blastomycosis organisms that can invade humans, usually (but not always) finding a new home in their

We hope and expect that the Sudbury and District Health Unit will move the blastomycosis file to the top of its regional hazards list and join this newspaper in a campaign to educate the public in doing as much as possible to avoid the infection and, in the worst cases, to be aware of its symptoms when infection does occur.

A commentary on climate change in quotations

Later generations will classify the beginning of the 21st century as an embarrassing chapter

To the Expositor:

The actual agenda for the climate alarm movement?

The "manifesto" delivered by scientist Bill Jewell in the November 11, 2015 edition was an interesting piece. A call for fact over opinion was followed by the usual avalanche of scare mongering that we have seen time and again. This was followed by his adopted solution in the politics and economics of Naomi Klein. Rather than another go at what the evidence points to, here are of couple of quotations that may give some pause for thought:

When later generations learn about climate science, they will classify the beginning of the twenty-first century as an embarrassing chapter in the history of science. They will wonder about our time and use it as a warning of how the core values and criteria of science were allowed little by little to be forgotten, as the actual research topic of climate change turned into a political and social playground." - Atte Korhola, Professor of Environmental Change, University of Helsinki

'It is a civilizational wake-up call. A powerful message-spoken in the language of fires, floods, droughts and extinctions-telling us that we need an entirely new economic model and a new way of sharing this planet." - Naomi Klein, This Changes Everything: Capitalism vs The

We want polluters to pay

To the Expositor:

The letter to the editor 'A point by point rebuttal of a climate change letter of Nov 11' is misleading and cherry-picks data. For example, the writer points to NASA data on ice growth in the Antarctic presumably to show that global warming is not taking place, but he fails to mention that NASA says globally sea ice is still diminishing. He says the forecasting models used by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change make an error in assuming that CO2 is "driving temperature" and the forecasts are 400 percent wrong. So much for the top climate scientists in the world!

The IPCC in its 2014 Synthesis Report says:

"Anthropogenic greenhouse gas emissions...are now higher than ever. This has led to atmospheric concentrations of carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide that are unprecedented in at least the last 800,000 years. Their effects, together with those of other anthropogenic drivers, have been detected throughout the climate system and are extremely likely to have been the dominant cause of the observed warming since the mid-20th century." In other words, the climate is changing and there is at least a 95 percent probability that we are the

There will be extinctions if we don't reverse the greenhouse gas trend. The IPCC Working Group on the impacts, adaptation and vul-

nerability to climate change reported in 2007, "A warming of 2°C above 1990 levels will result in mass mortality of coral reefs globally...with one-sixth of the Earth's ecosystems being transformed...and about onequarter of known species being committed to extinction." Many plants and animals will be unable to adapt quickly enough. There have been five major extinction events in the history of the planet, and we are heading towards a sixth, the difference being that this time humans will be the cause. It boggles the mind that 7 billion humans can have such devastating effects on other species, but it's not science fiction. For example, when coral reefs die, the entire ecosystem dies too.

The warming effect of greenhouse gases is not immediate. No matter what we do now global temperatures will rise by 0.6°C by the end of the century. But there is urgency now because the Paris Climate Change Conference in December may be the last opportunity to get international cooperation to curb greenhouse gases before it becomes impossible to avoid global warming of 2°C.

Canada's greenhouse gas record is one of broken promises. Our new Liberal government needs to know that Canadians want subsidies for fossil fuels to stop, we want polluters to pay, we want Canada to be an environmental leader.

The writer first met Orma in her cozy room overlooking the North Channel at the Manitoulin Centennial Manor. She is surrounded by numerous photos and memorabilia, carefully extracted from the large home she once owned with her husband Russ. Fading eyesight has dimmed the photos for Orma, but they continue to offer a familiar comfort. Orma charmingly welcomes the writer and smiles warmly as she begins to share her story.

'My grandfather, Joseph Hembruff, was born in 1858. He married Sarah (Spiker), originally from Germany. When they were both young, and before they knew each other, each would walk across the ice to the Big Lake School." At that time transportation was limited and young men often married the neighbour's daughter. "Joseph and Sarah married and had six children, including my dad, Roy."

Grandfather Joseph died in his fifties. "It was winter and he had been outside splitting wood on his Bidwell farm. After the chores were done, he came into the house and said he wasn't feeling well. He laid down for a while and, sadly, died in his bed that afternoon."

Orma Ellen was born on June 26. 1928 to Vivian (nee McLean) and Roy Hembruff. Two siblings were born later, Harvey and Sheila. Since Orma being named after her, her Aunt Nell gave her a five dollar sheep. That's what a sheep was worth in those days. "I

remember visiting grandmother Sarah and getting sugar cookies and boiled raisin cake. She always served me tea and that was really something, because my parents had insisted that I wasn't old enough for tea.'

Bob Bobbing Along.' Sometimes Norbert Loosemore, our teacher, would play along. My mother worked with some of the United Church youth to put on local concerts and plays. We had no television at the time, so this was great entertainment for us and for our families.

'Our dad Roy was born in 1903. He was a super salesman, selling everything from cars to shoes and Raleigh products. It was said he could actually sell refrigerators to Eskimos. He was handy at woodworking projects too. My dad built a doll crib for me when I was about six-years-old. I guess he must have been in a hurry to go somewhere because he forgot to cover it up in the shed. I found it, but my heart sank because I realized there really was no Santa. It was my dad who made the gifts.' Nevertheless, that doll crib was a precious gift for Orma who later bestowed it upon her daughter

Skating on the pond was a favourite winter pastime. "Sometimes we would head out at night and skate by moonlight after we shovelled the snow off the ice. Skating at night was so much fun. In the summer we played baseball, like all the other kids.

Orma started Grade 1 at Easter and was promoted to Grade 2 by ing spells.

"My first job at 14, for \$18 a week, was cleaning and getting meals for a couple who owned a cottage on Bidwell Road." In later years, Orma stocked shelves and did many other tasks in her family's general store, set up in the Hamlet of Bidwell in the mid-1930s. "I remember one disagreement my parents had with the church board. The board thought our store was on their land and they were going to put a fence right through the middle of the store. They needed land for a horse shed. After the survey was done, we were told that we owned the land the store was on and we didn't have to move."

The farmhouse burned in 1950 while sap was being boiled down to maple syrup. Sparks hit the roof of the old homestead, which was used for storage. In 20 minutes, fire consumed the house, the shed, some chickens and the new shingles waiting to replace the old ones on the barn. "We got out with only a few clothes and \$1,000 of insurance money. After the fire, we lived in the back of our store for a while until we bought the old McKay farm in Bidwell in 1951. A vear later we returned to live in the back of our store again. This was the house that my brother, my sister, and I grew up in."

Russ Ferguson was a trucker, hauling gravel and other construction supplies to job sites. His brothers owned the general store in Sheguiandah. Russ would often come to Orma's family store for bread and other items for the Ferguson store run by his brothers and his sister-in-law. "That's how I met Russ," Orma shares. "The first time I saw him, I knew he was 'the one' and he told me later that he had the same thoughts about me. His sister-in-law told me later she was wondering why he was always so eager to come to our store for supplies.'

Russ had recently returned from the war. "He wouldn't talk about his experiences and he was still carrying much of the pain or 'post-traumatic stress,' in today's lingo. "I was 11 when World War II broke out in 1939 and 17 when it ended," Orma explains. "On a movie date, if the scenes included shooting, Russ would instinctively duck behind the seat. In time, we learned to deal with it. We got engaged and we married on September 7, 1951 at the Bidwell church. I remember coming down the stairs in Uncle Jack's farmhouse with my wedding dress and veil on. This was a very momen-

church." Russ was in the shed at the back. Jeff, one of the ushers,

ran to tell Russ the bride had arrived, but he went through a burdock patch. These untimely appendages, 'the burrs,' had to be dispatched quickly prior to the groom making his entrance. Orma's dad, Roy, was fighting advanced cancer but he walked his daughter down the aisle.

"Mr. Gammage, who owned a tourist camp Orma worked at, had decorated the church and donated a bouquet of 36 roses. During the reception. Russ made a vat of tea in a double boiler for the ladies, to which he added two bottles of rye. He wanted to be sure everyone would have a good time." For their honeymoon, the newlyweds took 10 days and travelled to London, Ontario, and to the States. "Russ' brother lent us his new car, a convertible, and we had lots of fun on that trip.'

Russ stopped the trucking work after the marriage. He dismantled the wooden cab on the truck, the one he had slept in when he was too far from home. "That wood went into our first kitchen cupboards on their new farm in Howland Township near Sheguiandah. The couple kept the farm but also bought a trailer and moved to Elliot Lake to be near the Nordic Mine where Russ had found work." The Fergusons stayed in Elliot Lake for three years, until concerns about his health eventually brought Russ above ground and back to Manitoulin. They moved back to their farm in Howland Township.

Orma's dad Roy spent several months at the Toronto General Hospital. He sent weekly letters back home to his wife and his eldest daughter. One letter declared that "the doctor in Toronto was very smart and nice to talk to, just like Dr. Henry" and "I am getting used to this here and am not lonesome yet, but I will be glad when I get out." Another letter dated April 29, 1952 to Orma said, "I guess you will be done moving by now. It would be a big job and no place to put the stuff. Try and him and told Mike to follow her as she ran to the other side of the street. There were no fire trucks at the time but nobody was hurt."

Orma worked for some of the local tourists on Lake Manitou. She even got to London for a brief spell to help a sick lady but returned when she realized her own family needed her too. Russ wrote a letter to Orma explaining that she was needed at home, and she came home right away. Russ was kept busy fixing cars and motors at the garage in downtown Little Current on the waterfront. They expanded in time to include boats and motors. Orma also volunteered for the Little Current United Church and was on several community committees.

In the summer of 1967 and again in 1969, Orma was hospitalized in Sudbury. She loved to get letters from her children. Here is an excerpt from son Tom's letter dated Aug 8, 1967: 'Stan and I went to the house last night and cleaned it all up. It was an official mess...we are getting along real swell...We are going to post our letters together because dear knows when dad would do it.' On February 11, 1969 Tom wrote: "Granny washed yesterday and had a real job ahead of her. She ironed today and got it all done today. She can move very fast, when she wants to, especially when I or someone else does something wrong...As you know we are all waiting for you to come home for we miss you very much...well got to go for supper or they will eat it all on me. He followed that with his name and about 120 x's

On August 4, 1967 Mike wrote: 'still worried about the doctors putting you together wrong. Helped Aunt Sheila wash floors, been a real busy boy...there's lots more to tell you but I have to wax the floor. Make a woman out of me yet...' Orma really enjoyed hearing from her boys, knowing the home front was alright.

The first of April became unique in the mid-1960s. Orma had a habit of looking at mail that Russ would have in his shirt pocket. On April 1 that year, Russ left an envelope in his shirt pocket. Orma could not resist and pulled the envelope out. Russ had drawn a big nose and written 'April Fools' on it.

A year later, on April the first, Orma fashioned a cake consisting of two aluminum cake pans, taped

keep room for me to get in when I get home. Bye, bye for now, Love to all. Dad.

"His last Christmas with us, in 1952, was delayed until February when he was able to come home one more time. Sadly, he had to return to Toronto and we never saw him again," Orma shares. "I was married and pregnant with my first child when he died in June at age 49. We put his new suit on him, the one he had bought for our wedding a year earlier. We laid him in the Bidwell Cemetery."

Russ and Orma had five children: Mike, Tom, Stan, Linda and David. "Mike and Tom were babies when the Bidwell store burned in the mid-1950s. Mom was babysitting. Tom was sitting in front of the wall that was suddenly on fire. My mother grabbed

together, iced and decorated. The kids and Russ where surprised to see that their special treat was an empty shell, but laughed when they realized it was a retaliation for the previous year's joke on Orma.

The couple started their first business in Little Current, Ferguson Marine, where the NAPA store is today. Later it was relocated to where GG's Foodland is today, then finally down the hill to where McQuarrie Motors is located today. When the kids were a bit older. Orma did the books and ran the showroom for Russ who ran the shop.

Ralph Evinrude of Evinrude Motors would frequent their marina. Russ was a Johnson outboard dealer. Ralph declared his own parents were just like Russ

Lock it or Lose it Campaign Kicks into gear for the holiday season

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Manitoulin Detachment is participating in the province-wide Lock it or Lose it campaign and warning motorists about the dangers of property and identity theft resulting from unlocked vehicles or the leaving of valuables in plain view. The campaign is sponsored by the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police's (OACP) and encourages drivers to take precautions to protect their vehicles and vehicle contents from theft, particularly during the holiday season.

"Leaving vehicles unlocked or valuables in plain sight is an invitation for thieves to

steal your values. Our police service wants people to take the time to keep their property safe," said Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb Detachment Commander with the Manitoulin OPP. "Thieves are also looking for anything in a vehicle that allows them to engage in identity theft. Don't give them the opportunity. Keep anything with your personal information with you."

During the Lock it or Lose it campaign, police officers examine parked vehicles to confirm they are locked and that no valuables have been left in plain view. Officers place a small notice on vehicles checked indicating what safety precautions were neglected and offer simple prevention tips for drivers to protect their vehicles against theft. The notices also congratulate drivers who have secured their vehicle.

The OPP urge motorists not to keep personal documents such as vehicle ownership, liability pink slips, credit card invoices, or other documents containing personal information in their vehicles. Identity thieves are looking for such documents so they can assume identities, secure credit card accounts, lease vehicles for export, and even take out a mortgage against victims' properties without their knowledge. Victims may not realize they have been victimized until it is too late, costing them time and money to rectify the damage.



Wikwemikong Athletes form satellite club of Newmarket Huskies

voung Wikwemikong women are working hard with their coach to become a competitive force in the cross-country world, training each day and becoming a four-athlete satellite branch of the AAA Newmarket Huskies competitive track club.

Grade 5 Pontiac School teacher Robin Cooper explained that she saw major potential in runners Francesca Pheasant, Victoria Trudeau, Autumn Peltier and Sierra Pangowish, students at her school. Ms. Cooper is herself a runner, with a background of excellent in competitive high school cross country meets and even earning herself a running scholarship to Augustine University in South Dakota.

"I had been coaching these girls in some sort of capacity since they entered our school system at Pontiac," Ms. Cooper explained. "What separated them from everyone else was not their athletic ability but their sheer dedication and determination to get better each and every day."

"In October of 2014, I came across information on an elementary indoor track meet in Hamilton scheduled February of 2015," the coach explained. "I ran the idea by my principal and got the okay with the caveat that all fundraising would be done by the girls under my guidance. They began fundraising right after I asked them if they would like to compete at an indoor meet. They were ecstatic. They began training right after the Christmas holidays, staying after school every day to train.'


The girls returned home newly confident after their first indoor track meeting with Victoria earning a bronze medal in the running long jump event.

That same winter, the girls persevered through the snow and the cold, training each day with their sights set on the Royal Canadian Legion District H meet in Sudbury this past spring. All that training paid off, too, as each of the girls was rewarded for her efforts with a medal.

"It was after spring track and the school year that the wheels began to turn in my head," Ms. Cooper added. "I figured there had to be some sort of cross country race for elementary kids in southern Ontario. I began emailing various coaches and contacts I had made to see if there were open races for elementary kids—every contact replied unfortunately, no. I wasn't discouraged and knew there had to be something so I began my Internet search and found a series of MTA (Minor Track Association) sanctioned cross country races for kids. There was only one problem—kids needed to be members of a registered athletic club. I knew that there were no Northern clubs that were members of MTA, thus began by search for MTA clubs."

Ms. Cooper then found the Newmarket Huskies AAA track club, which has an atom girls' division, and reached out, asking if they would consider taking on a satellite 'club' on a Northern Ontario First Nation.

Huskies minor athlete head coach Geoff Peat responded and said the club was ready and willing to give it a shot. Ms. Cooper

then held a meeting for the parents, who were also on board and then Francesca, Victoria, Autumn and Sierra were officially Huskies.

The girls participated in four events this fall: in Bolton, Burlington and Etobicoke, taking a first as a team in the atom girls' division and being named the atom provincial champions in Etobicoke. They

also raced on November 15, again in Etobicoke, where they placed third in the bantam girls' division.

The athletes are on a break before Christmas now but will begin training again in earnest for the event where it all started, the Hamilton Games in February.

"What separates these girls from everyone else is simple," their coach boasts. "They demonstrate a desire and dedication to the sport of running. Their commitment is admirable and commendable. They want to improve and they listen and implement training tactics into their sessions"

"These girls train every day after school in whatever weather Mother Nature brings," Ms. Cooper added. "While kids are on their way home after school, these girls are in the change room getting ready for their one-hour training session. They know that in order to be successful, they need to train. They are making that connection to life as well. You want to be successful in any area whether it is in school, friendships, or any sport for that matter—it takes time, it takes dedication and a whole lot of work."

"These girls can accomplish anything they put their minds too—they just have to work for it!" Ms. Cooper enthused.



Central Manitoulin Council Notes

Council determines fishing platform barrier not required

On a motion from Councillors Linda Farquhar and Derek Stephens, council rejected a quote from J.L Richards for the addition of a removable barrier on the Accessible Fishing Platform in Providence Bay "without prejudice." Following debate on the issue, the council determined that the original purpose of the barrier was not required.

"The original concept was based on a platform in Sudbury," noted CAO Ruth Frawley. Upon further investigation it was determined that the Sudbury platform was very similar to what is currently in place in Providence

Council regulates exotic animals

On a motion from Councillors Ted Taylor and Alex Baran, council read three times and passed a motion to "Regulate the Keeping of Exotic Animals." Councillor Derek Stephens requested a recorded vote on the motion, with Councillors Alex Baran, Ted Taylor, Dale Scott, Linda Farquhar and Patricia MacDonald voting for the motion and Councillor Stephens voting against. The bylaw came about as the result of communications with Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board CAO Fern Dominelli, noted Central Manitoulin CAO Ruth Frawley. "They had trouble in one of their units," she said, "but when it came to dealing with it, there was nothing they could fall back

Council defers physician recruitment donation

On a motion from Councillors Derek Stephens and Dale Scott, council approved that a donation in the amount of \$6,000 to the Physician Recruitment Initiative be considered during 2016 budget deliberations, pending the receipt of the 2015 financial report.

Unopened road allowance improvements approved with conditions

On a motion from Councillors Dale Scott and Ted Taylor, council approved the municipality signing an agreement with Rodney Bowie regarding improvements to the unopened road allowance between Concessions 10 and 11, Lots 21 and 22, in the Township of Carnarvon, Municipality of Central Manitoulin.

This follows the council's policy, so long as the applicant adheres to the municipal policy," noted CAO Ruth

No overnight parking signs approved for **Providence Bay**

On a motion from Councillors Alex Baran and Ted Taylor, council passed a bylaw to permit the erection of traffic control signs reading "No overnight and/or vehicle parking between 10 pm and 6 am" on John Purvis Road be given three readings and passed.

The motion addressed an issue where vehicles were causing a safety issue in the area of a boat launch. CAO Frawley explained that the parking issue has been a matter of ongoing concern to the municipality and that discussions are ongoing with the marina operator to find a solution to overcrowded parking in the popular area.

Support for paved shoulders and cycling

On a motion from Councillors Dale Scott and Derek Stephens, council supported the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates' request to the Ministry of Transportation to add paved shoulders when Highway 540 is resurfaced between 2016 and 2018, and further that the munici-

pality would like to see Manitoulin Island recognized as a top cycling destination in Northern Ontario, and further soliciting the Ministry of Transportation's assistance in achieving that objective as municipal roads often do not offer connections between communities.

Culverts approved

On a motion from Councillors Ted Taylor and Linda Farquhar, council approved that the municipality accepts the Cranston Road Culvert and Learmont Road Culvert engineering reports.

Sidewalk tender approved

On a motion from Councillors Derek Stephens and Dale Scott, council approved that the municipality accepts the Belanger Construction quote of \$91,982 (HST included) for the replacement of the sidewalk from Wilson's Corner Store east to Forest Street in the village of Mindemoya.

There was an unusual quote from the Ministry of Transportation on the work.

"That did seem unusual," noted CAO Ruth Frawley, but she suggested that the quotation likely flowed from a question on what it would cost to have the Ministry of Transportation complete the work as they were engaged in construction along that road and would still be in the

Ms. Frawley explained that the proposed extension of the sidewalk included in the replacement originated from a recognition of the expansion of development in that section of the municipality.

Councillor Alex Baran appointed to the library board

On a motion from Councillors Ted Taylor and Dale Scott, council approved the appointment of Councillor Alex Baran to the Central Manitoulin Library Board.

Water line to hatchery approved on condition

On a motion from Councillors Derek Stephens and Alex Baran, council approved a proposal made by Al Holroyd on behalf of the United Fish and Game Clubs of Manitoulin to install a 1-inch buried waterline at the Mindemoya Lake Pavilion in order to provide an adequate water supply to support the proposed hatchery operation conditional upon the appropriate ministry and municipal approvals.

Minutes and financial reports approved

In a series of three motions, council approved the minutes of the Provincial Offences Act (POA) meeting held on September 15, 2015 as circulated, the Minutes of the Community Policing Advisory Committee meeting held on September 9, 2015 as circulated and the minutes of the Manitoulin Centennial Manor Board meeting held on June 18, 2015 as circulated. Council also approved the year to date financial report dated September 30, 2015 as presented. Council later approved the year to date Road Committee financial report ending October 30, 2015 and that the proposed Road Department 2016 operating budget be forwarded to the Committee of the Whole meeting in 2016 for further consideration. Council also later approved the year to date financial report ending October 2015 for the Water, Waste and Education Committee as presented and that the proposed Water, Waste and Education Committee 2016 operating budget be forwarded to the Committee of the Whole meeting in 2016 for further consideration. Council also accepted the minutes of the Mindemoya Arena Advisory Steering Committee minutes from June 9. 2015 and October 14, 2015 and gave permission to allow additional advertising around the ice surface and

Following the game, an official complaint was lodged with the Sudbury District Secondary Schools' Athletic Association (SDSSAA) by Lockerby and, as a result, several sanctions, or recommendations, were put in place for games on Manitoulin.

SDSSAA determined that at least three security personnel (which could be staff members) must be present and wearing visible security jackets or vests; that one staff member will introduce themselves to the visiting team staff prior to the start of each game; tables must separate dressing room access from the main lobby; a school liaison must remain at ice level to keep the dressing room access clear to facilitate access for both teams; and, whenever possible, MSS home games must have one referee and one linesman assigned from Sudbury to work with one referee and one linesman from the Island "to ensure the league mandated policy of assigning four man officiating crews wherever possible." Sudbury officials will be paid mileage by the league and also a \$20 meal allowance at the game, payable by

This disturbs Manitoulin trustee for the Rainbow District School Board Larry Killens as he questions why Manitoulin is being punished when they were found to have acted like responsible young men and did no wrong during the January tilt. "It's a penalty against our community," he told The Expositor.

He explained that if MSS didn't comply with SDSSAA's stipulations, the games would be moved to 4 pm where few fans (both fellow students and adults) would be able to be in attendance because of school timetables, work schedules and transportation issues.

"We need to stand up for our kids and be an example to them," the trustee added. "MSS did nothing wrong. I think we need an applogy"

"We need to recognize the kids for doing a good job, not punishing them," Mr. Killens added.

MSS Principal Laurie Zahnow confirmed that the school would be complying with the "recommendations" from SDSSAA and would see game play at 7 pm this Friday night and every home game moving forward.

She said she did not see the 50/50 split of officials as a slight against Manitoulin, but rather fair play, as it is a known fact that Manitoulin officials are few and far between.

"They're a nice group of guys and a respectful group of athletes," Principal Zahnow said of her team. "We realize how important this is to the community."

As for the recommendations, "they're all positive, they're all good," she said.

The Mustangs are hoping to cage the St. Charles Cardinals this Friday night at 7 pm in Little Current, and so far, are two points ahead of the powerhouse team.

"There are no weak teams in the league this year," said Coach Brad Bond. "There's a lot of parity in the league—the games are very good."

The Mustangs will have a few more home games, including this week's, before the Christmas break when the league gets divided into A and B divisions. Mr. Bond fully anticipates the Mustangs to enter the A division this year.

"It is tight, so every game is important," the coach said. "St. Charles has a good strong team, so it should make for a good matchup."

interim Liberal leader, he asked me what critic post I wanted," she recalled. "I think he thought I would say health, but I said Aboriginal Affairs."

Mr. Rae might have been forgiven thinking she would seek the high profile and challenging health portfolio. Dr. Bennett was an accomplished family physician before moving into politics, as a partner of Bedford Medical Associates in downtown Toronto, president of the Medical Staff Association of Women's College Hospital and an assistant professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto. Dr. Bennett served on the Boards of Havergal College, Women's College Hospital, the Ontario Medical Association and the Medico-Legal

Society of Toronto and had served as Prime Minister Paul Martin's Minister of State for Public Health, in which role she oversaw the establishment of the Public Health Agency of Canada. In opposition, she was the Liberal critic for social development, social economy, seniors, persons with disabilities and public health in the 39th Parliament and Health critic in the 40th Parliament.

"I felt the challenge was something that I wanted to meet as part of my learning,' she said. She threw herself into that learning with all of her passion and dedication. "It was something I felt drawn to as a MP and as a minister.'

Her mission from Prime Minister Justin Trudeau was to "Consider yourself the

is needed," noted Linda Erskine of Little Current, one of the local organizers. "We will have hot chocolate and Christmas baking for everyone to enjoy while dropping off their items."

A post on the Manitoulinrefuge Facebook page provides some details on the approved families.

"We are excited to let you all know the good news," reads the post. "This week we received word that five families are now approved, had their security clearances and are ready to make Manitoulin their home. All of these families are from Eritrea and are currently in refugee camps in Ethiopia."

The families that will be going to each Island community at this point are anticipated to be as follows. In Mindemoya, where the contact is Monic Shaw, they are awaiting a family made up of a father (38), mother (29), daughter (10), son (7), son (5), son (3) and daughter (2).

In Manitowaning, where the contact is Lianne Hovingh, the family consists of a father (66), mother (54), daughter (22), son (21), son (19), son (11) and grandson (8).

In Little Current there will possibly be three families, one family where the first contact is Linda Erskine and consists of a widow (54), son (30), son (25), son (19), daughter (15), daughter (11) and daughter (7); a second family in

Little Current, where the contact is Dr. Ben Quackenbush, and consists of a mother (36), son (7) and daughter (6); and a third family which will be settled in either Gore Bay or Little Current and whose contact is also Dr. Quackenbush consists of a grandmother (49) and grandson (16).

If the sponsorships are private, the route is not as obvious, but Mr. Blaseg noted that there are many more resources in place at school boards and in specialized agencies than was the case during the period when Canadians mobilized on behalf of the Vietnamese refugees following the Viet Nam War.

Typically, he explained, the Ontario government would provide direction to the school boards "on how we can support the efforts." This is particularly crucial for Ontario as not only has it already been determined that Ontario will be receiving 10,000 of the 25,000 Syrian refugees planned before the end of the year, but that Ontario may be enlisted

as a holding centre for another 2,000 refugees that will eventually be going to other provinces when their preparation have been set in place.

In the absence of specific direction, the school boards across the province have not been idle, noted Mr. Blaseg. "There have been a number of discussions taking place between the school boards, OPSBA (Ontario Public School Boards' Association) and our ministry (Ministry of Education)," he said. Those discussions have been taking place with "a sense of urgency" driven by current events.

Among the many questions that need to be addressed are not only those directly related to education and settlement of the refugee families, but also less traditional services

"We take possession of the house we have arranged for the family on December 23," said committee facilitator Linda Erskine. "So we really hope that we will have a couple of weeks to get in and set up the house before they arrive."

Haile Menghistu, his wife Regeat Asmelash and daughter Yohana Ogbamichael of Little Current, tried to provide answers to some of the committee's questions and concerns regarding how to best greet the newcomers and what cultural pitfalls to avoid as the family begins the process of settling into what to them will be a strange culture.

"When they come, they will have come from a big family," noted Ms. Asmelash, adding that the newcomers will probably "be lonely and quiet" at the start.

"What can we do to help that?" asked a committee mem-

ber.

"It is very quiet here, so it will help," smiled Ms. Asmelash.

"Are there things we shouldn't do, colours that we should avoid..." $\,$

"They will be very understanding," suggested Mr. Menghistu.

"We want to make them comfortable," said Ms. Erskine. "Nothing like that, colours," said Ms. Asmelash.

Mr. Menghistu stressed that the incoming families will not be so difficult to accommodate and would likely be quite flexible. "You don't have to worry about the culture," he said, adding that in the matters of language and food, "we are here, don't stress yourselves about that. They are

...continued from page 11 minister of reconciliation'," Dr. Bennett said to the media on the Wednesday following the first meeting of the newly sworn-in cabinet.

One of the first orders of business for the new minister is to start the process of a national inquiry into missing and murdered indigenous women, but that is a process that will have to be undertaken with respect and care. To do that. Dr. Bennett said that she will "listen to wise people" in setting up the inquiry. "We need to consult with the families first," she told The Expositor. But at the end of the process, it is imperative that the inquiry, however it is designed. result in concrete actions to "actively stop the tragedy."

Dr. Bennett has already been in consultation with Justice Murray Sinclair, chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission as to how to begin the process and to incorporate what was learned from that process.

Dr. Bennett said that while the process must proceed with compassion and understanding of the families of the women, she hoped that the pre-consultation phase could be completed before Christmas. As part of that pre-consultation process, Dr. Bennett and her ministry will be collaborating with both the Ministry of Justice and the Minister of State for the

Status of Women.

Few cabinet ministers have entered their portfolio with a better grounding in the issues providing an ability to "hit the ground running," but few have come into their role with higher expectations. Dr. Bennett said that she recognized that challenge, but that she hoped that the "with the support of the leadership, we will hopefully be able to use it as a teachable moment as to the time things take." But then she will be working with communities for whom resolving outstanding issues has generally taken a very long time.

Among the structural

changes Dr. Bennett said that she wants to see communities be able to move forward with certainty in their planning and that this process must proceed in a truly "nation to nation" negotiation and that communities can see that the government's commitment to that process is real.

As to what her appointment may mean for Manitoulin Island and its environs, Dr. Bennett said "All I can say is that my spiritual centre lies in Georgian Bay and that goes straight up the North Channel and Manitoulin Island," she said. "I am paying attention."



...continued from page 12 that the school boards may be called upon to provide, for instance "will we be called upon to house them? There are a number of empty schools located across the province that may be called upon," he said. "Maybe. That is something that we don't know and we are trying to figure out."

There are also questions that have to viewed in the

"Northern" context. Today there are many specialized agencies located primarily in the south that have developed the kind of expertise that is not as available in Northern communities. "We will need to assess the kinds of services that the refugees will need," he said. "Those include housing, health needs, English as a second language supports, as well as social workers.

Many of the refugees have likely been exposed to serious trauma and there will be mental health issues that will need to be addressed."

The RDSB personnel may well require training on particular sensitivities, as well as the children and teaching staff, in order to avoid triggers that may come up. "We want to be as humane as possible," he said.

But, the education director noted again, there are many more supports and social services, both within the boards of education and society in general, than were in place when the last major wave of refugees were welcomed to our shores.

"There are agencies that actively engage with the refugees to assess their needs," he said.

Nonetheless, the way forward will largely be a learning process for everyone and "will take some time."

Many agencies will be engaged in the process, including the local District Services Boards, which will be playing a role.

"We have not been wasting time," continued Mr. Blaseg. "We are currently

working with other school boards, the DSB and the City of Greater Sudbury to make the transition smooth."

Mr. Blaseg noted that, despite the challenges, the current refugee influx will be "a very exciting time. This will be a great humanitarian experience and we will be tapping people's shoulders going forward."

coming here—from a refugee camp."

When it comes to the spices or other foods the families are likely to be accustomed to, he said there were no worries there either. "We can make it," he said.

Mr. Menghistu provided the committee with insight into the Eritrean educational system, noting while from Grades 1 to 6 the education is largely in the national languages (there are several) of the region, and the basics of English, like the alphabet, are taught. "After Grade 6, all the way up to university, the teaching is in English," he said.

Although the educational attainment of the family approved for Little Current, a 54-year-old widow and her three sons aged 19, 25 and 30 and three daughters 7, 11 and 15, is apparently not high, the news came as some relief to the retired professional language teachers who have agreed to assist with the language teaching program for the families. Although Garry and Donna Wolfe have agreed to help oversee the program, their experience is largely in teaching business English from a slightly higher level than the basic introductory level.

Ms. Erskine shared that she had received an email from co-organizer Dr. Ben Quackenbush that a meeting is planned for Monday, November 30 at 7 pm at the Mindemoya Missionary Church which the core group members are encouraged to attend. "It'll give us a chance to make sure we're all on the same page in terms of our plans and expectations," wrote Dr. Quackenbush. "Kathy Clarke, of Parry Sound, will be coming to talk about her experience with refugee sponsorship over the last year and answer any questions we might have." He noted, however, that the meeting "is intended for our already involved group members, not new interested members of the public."

In a second part of his communication, Dr. Quackenbush informed the committee members that "we just learned that all of the people working directly with the refugee families are required to have vulnerable sector checks done through the OPP. If you already volunteer with Mindemoya Missionary Church and have one on file then you do not need to complete another," he said. "What I'll need from each of you is to let your group members know and we'll need to get a list from each of you of who in your group needs to have this done. Our Pastor Ray Kloetstra can provide a letter from the church so this can be obtained at no cost from your local OPP office.

Following the meeting, Ms. Erskine received confirmation that the Gore Bay group meeting at the Catholic church in that community and headed up by Jack Brady have stepped up to sponsor a family as well. "They have secured a house and are furnishing it with everything the family will need," she said.



DSB members assist low-income households with energy program an application. Once at the application is important for a lot of electricity, the an application.

MANITOULIN—Workers from the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) were on hand in Gore Bay and Little Cur-

Board (DSB) were on hand in Gore Bay and Little Current recently to provide assistance to low-income households in determining if they were eligible for the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP)—the province's electricity bill relief program.

Beginning in January 2016, the OESP will reduce the cost of a low income household's electricity by applying a monthly credit directly to their bill.

"The application takes a couple of months to process," said DSB manager Eric Morphet, "that's why we are doing this now, so that if people qualify they will be able to get it right away."

"It's not retroactive,"

"It's not retroactive," added Ontario Works' Case Manager Stéphan Parent, who was on hand at the Little Current Cambrian College computer lab to assist applicants.

The amount of credit a household will receive will depend on two factors, how many people live in the home and the combined income of the household. An example illustrating the potential savings available to low income homes would be that of a four-person household with an annual income of \$37,000. Such a household would receive an on-bill credit of \$34 each month. For a low income household of seven earning less than \$28,000 a year that number jumps to \$70, although the actual amount of the credit is subject to "regulatory approval and may change," there are factors that could increase that amount.

If your home is electrically heated or if you rely on medical devices requir-

ing a lot of electricity, the OESP offers a higher level of assistance and members of the First Nations and Métis will also qualify for a higher level of assistance.

The application process is very simple, but it is important to gather up some key documentation before you begin the process. An applicant will need their electricity bill, the birthdates and names of all the residents in the household as registered with the Canada Revenue Agency and the social insurance numbers (or temporary taxation numbers for residents over the age of 16).

The next step would be to go online at the website ontarioelectricitysupport.c a (or stop in to visit the Ontario Works office if you do not have access to the Internet, Mr. Parent has already assisted many low income families in making an application). Once at the online site (hard copy application forms can also be downloaded and printed from the website) complete the application, readily available on the site's homepage, print and sign the consent form and mail it to the address provided.

An applicant will be notified of eligibility in about six to eight weeks from the date of approval, but the website will let the applicant know if they are likely to qualify within seconds during the first step of the application process. In a simple two entry process, an applicant enters the number of people living in the home and the total income of the household after taxes and deductions.

"Everyone will be hit by a 10 percent increase come January," noted Northern Ontario Service Deliverers Association member Daniel de Chevigny. "This application is important for low income households to not have that increase on their bills." At the end of the day, however, everyone receiving an electricity bill will be paying for this pro-

It is important to have filed an income tax return recently, if you have not or if your situation has changed since your last filing, you can apply for the OESP through a designated agency that can be found on the program's website. When you go to the agency you will need the documentation listed above.

He said his father, Ole Evinrude, wanted to please his mother Bess who wanted an ice cream from the other side of the lake. All Ole had was a row boat and although he did his best, the treat had melted by the time he got back. This convinced him that there had to be a better way to move a boat and he set out to design an outboard motor—the rest is history."

The Ferguson family business sold boats and repaired engines for many years. Mike took over the business from his family. Ten years earlier, Stan purchased Harbor Vue Marina from the two Thompson brothers who had started it. Mike now works in construction in Sudbury. He and Dorothy have two children, Russ and Ellen. Tom is self-employed with his own trucking business. He has a daughter Melissa and he and his wife Judy have a set of twins, Tommy and Becky. Stan and his wife Beth have six children, Lexi, Jill, Erin, Desiree, Curtis and Steve. Daughter Linda is a 'right-hand'

lady for a federal MP in Kitchener. She has three children, Elliot, Alex and Emily. David died at age 27.

"My brother Harvey married Marguerite McConnell of Manitowaning. He also worked at the Nordic Mine in Elliot Lake," Orma explains. "He died quite young with a spinal disease. My sister Sheila moved to Port Colborne and married Robert Halsted. Sheila worked in a rubber factory where they made wind-

shield gaskets. She lives in Welland today."
Russ's father John Ferguson died at a very young age. His mother Nell remarried George Bishop who built the Red Lodge in 1936 and opened it in 1938. They lived at the lodge in the summer and moved to their farm a quarter of a mile away for winter. George was active in politics and community affairs. He was one of the organizers of the Howland Museum and was involved with the restoration of the Batman's Mill. The Red Lodge was sold to Francis Ditmyer in 1965.

Orma was widowed at age 59 but she stayed on the farm until she was 75-years-old. She moved to a cozy home on Blake Street in Little Current and lived there for 10 years. "At 85, I needed extra help and I moved into the Manor. I wanted to stay on the Island so this was the best place for me now. I do like it here."

"All the seasons have their own charm. What would I change if I could go back in time? I wouldn't change anything. I have had a good life and have done so much. There's not much I am afraid of, just mice. They are frightening. I can set a mouse trap, but I wouldn't want to see a mouse running across the kitchen floor. Did I collect anything as a child? Just books. I belonged to a book club. Yes, Russ and I did do some travelling. We took a trailer to Florida. I found it too hot there but he really liked it."

"My strengths? They have always been math and remembering stuff. Making quilts was a favourite pastime. Russ could never figure out why I would cut up all this material and then take all the time to fit the pieces back together again, in intricate patterns. I also enjoyed knitting, baking and cooking in general." She adds with a sigh. "Now my eyesight suffers from macular degeneration and I have trouble seeing most things. Knitting and playing cards have become more difficult too."

"I loved watching the kids grow up. Seeing them reach new milestones and later being there for their marriages and seeing their families grow. I now have 13 grand-children and 22 great-grandchildren. Some of them are on the Island and I get to see them regularly." She adds, "My recipe for happiness is being kind to people. Russ and I lived by that belief. I remember the hired girl saying 'I never hear a cross word between you two.' My favourite verse is the 23rd psalm: 'The Lord is My Shepherd'."

"The world is moving so fast, I wish my family and all others a good future where they can live together in harmony. Manitoulin really is a special, peaceful place. There is nowhere else like it. Of course I am biased because I was born and raised here, but it is a beautiful spot for sure. So many people come here for the beauty and for relaxation. Our Island hasn't changed much; it has stayed the same over the years and that adds a lot to the charm."







4elements outdoor excursions forge a path to inner creativity

EVANSVILLE—It had been a sunny November Saturday morning but by the time the 4elements Living Arts Western Oak Savannah Orienteering and Creative Mapping excursion group met in early afternoon in the savannah near Evansville, the sky was overcast and the air chilly.

Undeterred, the intrepid allages group of about 12 adults exited their warm cars parked on the area's alvars, put on jackets, hats and gloves and stuffed thermoses and water bottles into packs while Suki the dog loped around eager to set off.

Savannahs are plains covered in coarse grasses and scattered trees that are found typically in eastern Africa and South America; on the Kip Fleming Tract just east of Evansville it's easy to imagine elephants plodding through the grass to the bur oaks' acorns or a flock of flamingoes taking off in a pink cloud, so exotic a setting it is almost disorienting.

So, first we had to learn how to use the compasses that were passed around by Elemental Excursions Program Coordinator Heather Thoma, along with a couple of maps for each participant. Many were the blank stares as some came face to face with a compass for the first time. Roy Jeffery, however, had faced this small instrument with a dial covered in numbers, quivering arrows and a mirror since he was a young Boy Scout and so his orienteering expertise had been enlisted to help us uncover its mysteries, along with Veronika Bingaman who had travelled this land before; both are members of the Manitoulin Nordik Ski Club. a partner of 4elements. Other partners include Manitoulin Streams, Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates, Sheshegwaning First Nation and Billings

We peered at the dials as Roy explained the difference between geographic and magnetic poles and how to reconcile them while plotting our course. Using a satellite image of the area, we laid our compass edges on the north-facing line of the highway then pointed them toward our destination, a wetland a couple of kilometres west. Away we went, over thick moss and around large junipers, picking the tart blue berries to eat along the way, holding the compasses in front of our faces, lining up our target through a little gap at the top of the mirror (handy, too, for periodic checks on one's hat placement).

We were in a 420-acre parcel of land that had been purchased in the 1990s by the Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC), a broad savannah of "rare flora and vegetation communities," according to the NCC, scattered with many bur oaks at the edges. "Although bur oaks are relatively common. the Bur Oaks Savannahs that can be found on Manitoulin Island are very rare in Canada, and only occur in southern Ontario and in patches of southern Manitoba. The Kip Fleming Tract is part of the natural area that supports the largest grassland/bur oak savannah complex known on Manitoulin Island.'

"This type of landscape is rare in Ontario and globally," says John Grant, NCC's Program Director for Midwestern Ontario. "These alvars are less exposed than most, the soil is very shallow and this fact, along with hot dry summers and intermittent fires, led to the creation and perpetuation of this prairie or savannah landscape. The NCC

protects the uniqueness of the landscape itself."

Soon we arrived at the wetland, shallow water sloshing underfoot. It was time to recalibrate the compasses as we were now going to head back to our entry point. This walk, part of 4elements' 'Elemental Excursions' program, was to combine learning "ways of seeing and navigating the landscape using a compass and map" with making "artwork using creative approaches to 'mapping'."

For the second part of the out-

ing, we piled back into cars for the short drive to the Gore Bay Airport, where Robbie Colwell, the airport manager, had generously offered the use of the warm lounge. Just in time, too, as the skies opened right then to unleash hail and slushy rain as we dashed for cover.

Inside, Heather Thoma guided us in imaginative play with 'personal mapping'-first writing then drawing with crayons a 'map' of our lives, locating and reading signs and routes to places within ourselves. The fresh air and exercise, the beauty of this rare, protected landscape, the grappling with orienting ourselves by compass, the application of orienteering to our own creative processes, it was all very bracing (and fun!), each activity complementing the other in unforeseen ways.

Heather explains that, in programming Elemental Excursions (funded by the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport), "My inclination and tendency is to create spaces for artmaking where the focus isn't so much on developing specific techniques and skills of painting or drawing per se, but to increase awareness and seeing, both outwardly and inwardly. We always hope to stretch people's creative thinking in new and positive ways!" She hastens to add that 4elements also offers "many sessions which do include [a] more traditional approach to artmaking, to introduce and develop the more expected techniques and skills in painting, drawing, photography, etc."

4elements' Executive Director Sophie Edwards emphasizes that, "Excursions and all our programs offer 'ways-in' to artmaking, some less formal, most designed to not be intimidating, but all engage people in skills and techniques...Even the creative map making encourages people to think conceptually, which is an important step in creating 'formal' art."

The Nature Conservancy of Canada "encourages organized groups to explore the Kip Fleming Tract, although we ask that interested parties contact NCC staff in advance so that we can make arrangements with our neighbours, who own the access laneway leading onto the property. Access during hunting season is discouraged due to use of the property by authorized hunters."

The Manitoulin Nature Club has compiled valuable bird and plant species lists there over the years; school groups have visited and are welcome also.

NHL great Reggie Leach shares behind the scenes on book writing

NHL great Reggie Leach, the Riverton Rifle, may have had one of the deadliest shots in the NHL, scoring 381 goals and 285 assists over his 934 games in the NHL and setting a number of professional hockey records that stand to this very day, but it took some serious coaxing before he agreed to write a book about his career.

"A lot of people over the last 10 years had approached me," he said, "but I wasn't really ready for it yet."

But a couple of years ago a number of things came together that made him decide to wind up and take a shot at that particular net.

"I was approached by a couple of publishers that I had a lot of respect for," recalled Mr. Leach. "Dawn (his wife) and I checked into them and I decided that it was time."

But while a career in the NHL may teach you hard work and discipline, it doesn't really prepare most people for the art of putting thousands of words down on paper. "I had to find a ghost writer that I could work with."

Despite having spent much of his life under the steady gaze of the sports media, Mr. Leach is at his heart a gently private man, not a recluse by any means, but someone who does not open up to someone he does not trust. "I needed to find someone I liked," he said.

Mr. Leach interviewed a number of candidates suggested by the publishers before finding the perfect candidate, writer Randi Druzin.

Ms. Druzin is an accomplished writer, having published 'Between the Pipes: A Revealing Look at Hockey's Legendary Goalies' through Greystone Books, but she was also very well versed in all things hockey, which helped immensely when it came to tracing the events that took place over his 13 seasons in The Show.

Finding a ghost writer to assist him with translating his memories into print was just the very beginning in a very long process. "It was long, over 16 months of going through stuff," he

Mr. Leach had very definite ideas on how he wanted to proceed with the work. "It was through the Seven Grandfathers' teachings," he said. "I wanted to teach young kids not to make the same mistakes I did."

The hockey legend noted that he had many struggles through his life that provided him with many valuable lessons, each and every one learned the hard way. "You learn from your mistakes," he said, "but don't try to use that as an excuse."

Over the course of the year-and-a-half writing process, Mr. Leach had a

number of sit-down, face-to-face meetings with Ms. Druzin, but after the first few meetings the duo set-tled into a rhythm of meeting electronically through Facetime. "I have an iPad and that worked very well," he said.

Pulling up memories of events that took place decades ago presented their own challenges, the veteran right winger agreed, but Ms. Druzin and Mr. Leach's wife and family were of great assistance. "They helped pull it out of me," he chuckled, adding that they were also very good at keeping him on track.

"She (Ms. Druzin) was really good at stats and everything else," he said. "She knew everything." Having someone who was diligent in her research made working together much easier.

"We would talk for a while and then she would go away and put it down, then I would read it, if I liked it we would move on," he said. "I had the last say on everything."

Of great importance to Mr. Leach was that the book be written in his words, not filled with fancy eloquence, but in the down-to-earth language of a lad from Riverton, Manitoba. At first the writing that came back was speaking back from the page in Ms. Druzin's words. "But she came to understand when I explained to her that this book 'is my truth, not yours'," he said.

The result worked out very well, producing a book that is a very easy read.

He also was not interested in writing a "tell all" exposé filled with the dirt on his NHL colleagues, his focus was to be on his own experiences and lessons learned. "Everybody seems to think it is a 'tell all' book—it's not," he said. "I had my struggles with alcohol, but I have dealt with that. It was just a small part of my life."

Mr. Leach said that there are too many books like that out there, but asked if he pulled his punches, he shot back that he "did not pull anything."

"I made some bad choices," he admitted. "But too

many people try to blame everybody else."

Once Mr. Leach had gone over the section completed by Ms. Druzin, the material went on to the publisher. "The publisher went over everything and there were a few things they wanted changed," he said. "But I told them 'this is my book and I want them in there'."

The only moment where the Riverton Rifle found himself checked in the book writing process was when it came to the number of photos that would be included in the book. "I would have liked to have seen more," he said. But in the process of deciding which photos would make the book he found some hard decisions lay ahead. In the end, the photos that were chosen do a good job of illustrating the many facets of his life.


After almost two years, Mr. Leach signed off on the final product and at the end of September, just before its official release, he had the first copy in his hands. "It was great to see," he said.

Since then, Mr. Leach has been criss-crossing the continent doing the obligatory promotional book tours and the reaction to the book has been outstanding.

"We are going into its second printing," he said.





Accounts for payment

Support for physician recruitment

Council passed a motion to give \$3,000 to the Manitoulin Health Centre physician recruitment initiative in its 2016

Councillor Leslie Fields said she was pleased to see the MHC joining efforts with the North Shore.

"It's promising to see they have recruited two new doctors," added Councillor Hugh Moggy.

Tenders awarded

Council approved the sale of three items after tendering them. The first, a 2006 Ford F-250 4x4 diesel with 96" Arctic V-Plow, saw eight tenders. John Ham was awarded the truck with plow for his bid of \$2,000.

The second item, a Comp-Air auto power air compressor was dealt with by the flip of a coin. Both Kerry Bowerman

Manitoulin Centennial **Manor Minutes**

Accreditation Canada

Keith Clement, senior administrator for Extendicare Health Services (the company that manages the Manor), reported that Accreditation Canada would not be able to make its web presentation, but that they had rescheduled for January.

The Manor board has been in ongoing discussions about undertaking the process of accreditation and was hoping for a presentation to learn more of what would be involved in the choice to have the Manor accredited.

Administrators report

Manor Administrator Michelle Bond reviewed her November report with the board. She said that they are continuing to advertise for a full-time registered nurse, but that they had hired a part-time nurse.

"The ministry (Ministry of Health and Long-term Care) was here from the last week of October until the first week of November," noted Ms. Bond. "They lifted our three compliance orders and we held a staff pizza party to celebrate

Ms. Bond invited the board to attend and assist with the Christmas meals on December 12 at 5 pm or December 13 at noon. She added that there would be a resident Christmas party on December 19 at 2 pm.

Ms. Bond reported that the home went \$2,400 over budget in food this month, but that it was anticipated because of the fall meal implementation.

The Manor in continuing to replace the carpet with flooring in residents' rooms, and Ms. Bond told the board that they plan on doing a double room later this month and two single rooms in December.

Strategic plan

The Manor board is continuing to develop its strategic plan. They discussed their last strategic plan meeting and board member Wendy Gauthier handed out changes that the board had discussed. The document development is still ongoing and a final draft has not yet been approved.

Extendicare report

Mr. Clement told the board that Ms. Bond and management staff have been busy working on the 2016 budget.

He explained that there had been some clawbacks from the nursing graduate program from the summer of 2013 and 2014 that would result in a \$12,000 hit.

Draft budget

Dave Ross of Extendicare Health Services called in to the meeting via teleconference to review the 2016 Manor draft budget with the board.

He discussed the home's current financial statement, noting the \$138,000 over budget figure the home is currently seeing to the nursing graduate clawbacks and \$111,000 in

He commended the board on the home being at 99 percent occupancy.

He told the board that the budget reflected a \$31,140 surplus to act as a cushion.

He also reviewed a few "small cuts" that would be reflected in the 2016 budget, but that Extendicare was confident the cuts wouldn't affect patient care.

The board will review the draft budget again at its Janu-

FundraisingMs. Gauthier told the board that the Calling on You campaign for a new call bell system for the Manor was going well with \$35,148 in the bank and another \$5,000 donation to be formally made next week.

"We hope to have \$50,000 raised by January, half our \$100,000 goal," said Ms. Gauthier.

She noted the Tree of Light campaign launched November 19 and that 130 lights had already been sold. The goal is for 1,000 lights to be sold at 10 each equaling \$10,000. The tree was erected in front of the Manor last week with the lights to be lit one string at a time as they are sold throughout the month of December.

Lights can be purchased in memory of an individual, to recognize someone or a group or can be given as a gift. Order forms are available at the various municipal offices across the Island, and at The Expositor.

Bylaws

Council passed Bylaw 15-32 to require the erection and maintenance of fences and gates around swimming pools

"Will there be a fee?" Councillor Moggy asked.

"Yes," CAO Alton Hobbs responded. "It will follow the normal fee schedule.'

"We will have to advertise it well," Councillor Moggy added.

Council also passed Bylaw 15-33 to amend Bylaw 12-19 being a bylaw to establish and regulate fire and emergency services within the Township of Assiginack.

There was much discussion surrounding Bylaw 15-34 to amend the Township's alcohol policy by deleting the following from A.10: "All drinks will be served in plastic or paper cups and all bottles and cans will be retained in bar area."

This, the CAO explained, means that the municipality would allow for bottles on a one-year trial basis.

Mr. Hobbs explained that the change was due to concerns from the Lions Club regarding the possibility of illicit drugs being deviously added by another party to beer dispensed in plastic cups.

Councillor Fields said she was unsure as to how strong that rationale was with Councillor Moggy noting that cups were always used in the past.

Councillor Fields added that all liquor is served in a cup. Council, as a whole, questioned why not cans over bottles.

"I'd rather be hit in the side of the head by a can than a bottle," joked Councillor Bob Case.

"I just think you're asking for trouble with bottles," Councillor Brenda Reid added.

Council then made an amendment to the amendment for no bottles to be allowed.

Bylaw 15-35 was passed to establish a Strategic Planning Committee and to adopt terms of reference for the commit-

Mr. Hobbs explained that six people applied for the committee, but three of those applicants seemingly applied for something that wasn't the strategic planning committee. Staff then decided to send those three applicants a copy of the terms of reference so everyone was on the same page. The three applicants were then invited to reapply after reading the terms of reference and given until the end of the month to do so.

Refugee assistance

Councillor Reid noted that Assiginack would soon be getting a refugee family and recalled that Assiginack had decided against support of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario refugee support program in favour of supporting local charities.

"Should one of us ask if there's a way to help?" Councillor Reid asked.

Councillor Reid then volunteered to do so.

Mould at fire hall

Councillor Moggy asked staff to look into the mould at the fire hall, as this could be a "major expenditure." It was explained that the engineer has been asked to look into it.

Councillor Paul Moffat said they needed to determine what was causing it.






Fall luncheon

Slow moving signs

Slow moving signs belong on slow moving vehicles not to be used as driveways markers. The relevant section of the Highway Traffic Act dealing with posting a SMV sign on a gate post, mail box, etc. is 76.(4) Prohibition: 76. (4) No person shall place a slow moving vehicle sign on or near a fixed object where it is readily visible from a highway. 1994, c. 28, s. 1. Exception (5) Subsection (4) does not apply to a facsimile of a slow moving vehicle sign that is displayed for the information of highway users. 1994, c. 28, s. 1.

There are a number of offenses under the HTA for which there is no set fine. In those cases, such as for the SMV sign provisions, one reverts to section 214, General Penalties which sets fines between \$60 and \$500. Misuse of a SMV sign would qualify for a fi-ne between \$60 and \$500. Not a huge issue, but one that matters and causes confusion.

Beef stew can be boring or you can make it exciting with different spices that will give you the extra "yummy." It is such a hearty, rich, easy to make comfort food. An ideal fall, winter dish that warms up the house and our bel-

Beef Stew with Root Vegetables

The sweetness in the dish comes from the carrots, rutabaga and maple syrup. You can add parsnips, beets or potatoes. The recipe calls for browning the beef and sauté the vegetables but I am usually in a hurry and just throw everything together and depending on what else I am doing will either cook it in the oven or the crock pot.

- 2 tsp ground coriander
- 1 tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- $1/2 \ tsp \ ground \ cayenne \ (optional)$
- 2 pounds stewing beef cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces
- Salt and pepper
- 2 Tbsp olive oil plus more if needed
- 1 pound carrots cut up to ¼ inch thickness
- 2 cups chopped onion
- 4 garlic cloves minced
- 1/2 cup red wine
- 2 Tbsp sherry vinegar
- 2 cups beef or vegetable stock 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 Tbsp maple syrup
- 2 Tbsp chopped parsley
- 1. Preheat oven to 300°F. Combine coriander, ginger, cinnamon and cayenne. Toss with beef. Season with salt and pepper.
- 2. Heat oil in heavy ovenproof pot over high heat. Working in batches, add beef and brown on all sides. Remove from pot and set aside.
- 3. Reduce heat to medium. Add some more oil if needed. Add carrots and rutabaga and sauté until lightly browned, about 5 minutes. Remove from pot and set aside.
- 4. Add more oil if needed and sauté onions until softened. Add garlic for 1 more minute. Pour in red wine and sherry vinegar. Bring to a boil and cook until reduced by half.
- 5. Add stock, thyme and bay leaf. Return meat to pot and bring back to a boil. Cover and transfer to oven. Bake for 2 hours then stir in vegetables and maple syrup. Cover and return to oven for 1 more hour or until the meat and vegetables are tender.
 - 6. Sprinkle with parsley just before serving.

Toffee Apple Cake

I needed a quick dessert and I had some apples that were just about ready to head for the compost. I checked out the cookbook by Robin Hood 'Baking Festival' and found a recipe that would work. I didn't have any toffee bits so I added chopped crystallized ginger to the batter and then sprinkled some semi-sweet chocolate on top. I switched sugars and flours and it was a hit. An ideal cake for lunch boxes. Wrap individual pieces and freeze, then pack when making lunches in the morning.

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar or coconut sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups all-purpose flour or substitute with spelt or whole wheat or go half and half
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 cup sour cream
- $21/\overline{2}$ cups diced peeled apples
- 3/4 cup toffee bits

TOPPING:

- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour or spelt or whole wheat
- 2 Tbsp brown sugar or coconut sugar
- 1/4 cup butter
- 3/4 cup toffee bits
- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F . Grease or parchment paper a 13- by 9-inch cake pan.
- 2. Cream the butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla in large bowl. Stir in the sour cream, apples and toffee bits. Combine flour, baking powder, and baking soda. Gently stir into the wet ingredients. Pour into the prepared pan.
- 3. For the topping combine all ingredients, mixing until
- crumbly. Sprinkle evenly over batter.
- 4. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

On Thursday, vocal specialist Dr. David Buley, a music professor at Laurentian University, went to the Vocal



Manitoulin Pet Rescue a co-ordinated Island-wide effort

by Betty BardswichMINDEMOYA—The 21st century has seen a decided shift in the way people regard animals and their welfare.

In the United States, the Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine (PCRM), headed by Dr. Neil Barnard, seeks, with a great deal of headway, to eliminate the use of ani-

There are several sanctuaries in Ontario and over the years Islanders have played an active role in the rescue of cats and dogs as well as horses.

behind. that have been spayed and neutered. The umbrella group also identifies cases of uncontrollable breeding, the abandonment of pets and animal cruelty.

"We still have work to do with townships and bands to establish and coordinate effective animal control on Manitoulin," Ms. Scott added. "We're anticipating positive things.'

mals in research centres and universities. "All of our current knowledge of medicine and surgery derives from observation of man," Dr. Bernard has said as well as, "surgery can't be learned on animals.'

Professor John Webster of the University of Bristol has written two books concerning animal welfare and has outlined three positive conditions for achieving this result. These are: animals living a natural life, being fit and healthy and being happy. Worldwide, sanctuaries abound to help achieve these goals for rescued animals from primates to donkeys to elephants and chickens. Perhaps one of the best known is the Gentle Barn California, founded by First Nation Ellie Laks and often featured on the Ellen DeGeneres show while another such barn has opened in Tennessee and host Jon Stewart and his wife have opened an animal refuge in New Jersey.

husband Keith of Sandfield recently picked up another rescue, this time a Cavalier King Charles spaniel and Ms. Size spoke to The Expositor about the importance of rescue. "You go to the rescue place and you see all these dogs and cats and you know they want somebody to pick them up and take them home," she said. "Pretty well everyone can have at least one dog or cat, but if you do have an animal, they have to be part of the family. You have to take good care of a pet, and if you can't, do not have one."

Angie Moggy of Mindemoya not only has dogs and cats, she also foster animals and has been doing so for about 10 years now. She is passionate about opening her home to these animals in need and emphasizes the need for more people to be doing so. "Until people step up to foster," she explained, "the comedian and television rescue efforts on Manitoulin will never meet their full potential. There will always be animals left
