Unique career choice draws Island man home to Manitoulin

LITTLE CURRENT—Composer William Congreve first penned the oft quoted words "music soothes the savage breast" in the late 1600s, but it has long been recognized that music's powers stretch far beyond the rest of that phrase ("to soften rocks or bend a knotted oak"). Music therapist Jonathan Poenn of Little Current has harnessed music's many powers through his music therapy classes to vastly improve the quality of life of residents in Manitoulin's nursing homes.

"It has made a huge difference with a lot of our residents with behavioural issues," said Wikwemikong Nursing Home Administrator Cheryl Osawabine-Peltier, "and we get to listen to him

"It's been extremely beneficial to some of our residents," agreed Manitoulin Centennial Manor Activities Coordinator Julie Omnet. "It helps on so many levels, cognitive development, emotional skills, it just provides such an overall improvement to the quality of life." Ms. Omnet also noted that the staff also find the music has a very positive impact on their workday. "The staff really enjoy it too."

Mr. Poenn, an accomplished musician himself, practically fell into the musical therapy field by a fortuitous set of circumstances that melded his two main fields of interest, musical and medical, as fate literally brought them togeth-

Ontario set to pass legislation recognizing First Nation education institutes as post-secondary partners

M'CHIGEENG—New legislation has been introduced that, if passed, will grant post secondary indigenous institutions in Ontario such as M'Chigeeng's Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) the right to award their own diplomas, certificates and degrees.

'This has been a long time in the making," said KTEI Executive Director Stephanie Roy. "We have been advocating for this for the last 20 years. This is something that has been always on KTEI's roadmap and we are pleased to work with the province to bring it

Currently, KTEI partners with Ontario colleges and universities to offer degrees, diplomas and certificates.

"We will continue to work with partners moving forward," stressed Ms. Roy, "but we will be evolving to deliver our own certifications, diplomas and degrees. We won't be offering every program—we plan to be selective in what we offer through our own accreditation. One of our first will be a language degree. It has been a long time goal to offer an

Bill raising minimum wage causing business concerns

TORONTO—A bill raising Ontario's minimum wage to \$14 on January 1 and again to \$15 an hour on January 1, 2019 has many business owners concerned about the impact those increases will have on their business's ability to survive—although few seem willing to go on the record about it.

"It's a cutthroat legislation," said one Island businessman who declined to be quoted on the record. "It's a real Catch-22. On the one hand if you speak up about it, people will just say that you don't want people to make a decent living. Nothing could be further from the truth."

The business owner pointed out that there were very few employees in his family's businesses that don't already make more than the new minimum wage already, but that there would be a cascading effect where other employees would naturally anticipate a corresponding increase in hourly rates commensurate with the increase from the current minimum wage of \$11.60.

'You are talking about a 20 percent rise in January," he said. "This after another 10 percent over the last couple of years and then another big jump

in 2018. It's all happening too fast."

Concerns about the escalating impact of the rise in minimum wage have been a common theme in discussions with local employers, but not all have expressed serious concerns. "It won't really have that much of an impact on us," said Denise Lytle, the new co-owner of Little Current's Anchor Inn Hotel and restaurant.

Others have greeted the news with a sense of fatalism. "The government is going to do what the government is going to do," said Luc Noel, of Luc's Restaurant in Little Current. "You can complain about it all you want, but what are you going to do? They will do what they want."

The Progressive Conservative Official Opposition recently announced that they would put the brakes on the rise in minimum wages, with a 25cent annual raise each year to bring the minimum to \$15 in the year 2020, should they be elected to government in 2018.

The Ontario NDP in the meantime have wholeheartedly backed the rise, chastising the PCs for being "out of touch."

Tehkummah Township council given orders by ministry

Have to agree on an inspection investigator for the job

TEHKUMMAH—Following complaint of employee harassment registered by Tehkummah clerk-treasurer Karen Gerrard (who alleged that she had been the victim), council heard from Roger Chenard, the municipality's health and safety coordinator, at its most recent meeting.

Mr. Chenard gave councillors an update on the Ministry of Labour (MOL) investigation of the alleged incident(s).

On October 30, MOL inspector Paul Marut attended the municipality and met with Mr. Chenard and Joe Hannah, acting public works supervisor, acting as a senior supervisor for the municipality. While there, Mr. Marut examined the current policy in place regarding harassment, bullying and violence in the work-

"During this process, the inspector found that there were areas in the policy that were not clear and/or were ambiguous as well as some areas that were not in compliance directly with the act," Mr. Chenard's report to council states. "The inspector collected all available information and provided feedback regarding the requirements of the policy and the training of all staff which had already been started by the Health and Safety Coordinator since his employment earlier in October." The Ministry provided three orders, each with specific terms and deadlines: 1. The employer shall ensure that the harassment program includes measures and

procedures for workers to report incidents of workplace harassment to a person or other employer if the employer or supervisor is the alleged harasser. (November 30 completion date.); 2. The employer shall provide workers with information and instruction that is appropriate for the worker on the contents of the policy and program with respect to workplace harassment. At the time of the visit, the employer has not provided all workers with appropriate information and instruction on the contents of the policy and program with respect to workplace harassment. (November 30 completion date.); and 3. The employer shall cause an investigation to be conducted into the

"This event is a great way to help others and to ensure that everyone has a Merry Christmas," concluded Ms. Wilkin.



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

Progressive Conservative platform a wolf in lefty clothing

The newly released Progressive Conservative platform channels the big rock candy mountain approach to government policy more commonly seen coming from proponents on the left of the political spectrum than the more conservative approach that has been the foundation of that party since time immemorial—or at the very least since the heyday of the "red Tory" reign of Bill Davis's version of the

The (relatively) newly minted leader of the Ontario Progressive Conservative Party Patrick Brown has certainly delivered on his promise to put a new face on the party, designed to win back what he has termed "natural" PC supporters, including civil servants like police, EMS workers, nurses, doctors and private sector groups like the small business portion of the middle class.

Mr. Brown has been accused by his opponents as being weathervane a politician, switching his direction to suit the moment. Certainly his rise to power as leader of the party that forms the Official Opposition seems to bear that out. The heir apparent to the PC crown, Christine Elliott, and her team were effectively blind-sided by Mr. Brown's courting and mobilization of social conservative interests to sell memberships that eventual won him that crown—only to almost immediately swing about face to march in Pride parades and declare abortion and other right to life pillars as off-limits to his rank and file

Mr. Brown's new platform seems to have been designed more on the pattern of Justin Trudeau's Sunny Ways than any fiat of the governHe promises lower taxes for the middle class (although the touted 22.5 percent cut is not quite as trumpeted on close examination) while claiming that under Tory rule the province will "move ahead." Hard to envision how that will play out, particularly in light of the \$12 billion cuts to government services currently enjoyed by Ontarians that is underplayed in his PR work.

Politics has always been a game of spin, with smoke and mirrors and policy sleight of hand playing a larger role than the truth—but we seem to be entering a whole new era these days where politicians are letting slip the reins of truth in the naked pursuit of power in a way rarely seen since the heyday of the Cold War Politburo and Comintern communicates, sadly leaving the public with little clue as to how the carriage of state will veer once a new driver has taken the

Little wonder that the common person is tending to say "a pox on all their houses," and electing the Trumps of this world in retaliation, even though it is the common person who will suffer the ill in the end.

We must each of us resist the temptation to turn our backs on our democracy and make every effort to grasp back the reigns of our governments from demagogues and charlatans of any ilk. Ontario Energy minister challenges NDP electricity narrative

Opposition would rather play politics with rate relief and mislead people

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter from the Minister of Energy is in response to a November 17 article in the Manitoulin West Recorder 'NDP allege Liberals' hydro hike to fund private profit, CEO pay,' Page 4. To the Expositor:

I'm not surprised to see the NDP misleading people on electricity prices, and trying to confuse the conversation around rate applications. Utilities are given the opportunity to state their case to the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) for updated rates through a regular application cycle. Whether it's Hydro One, Greater Sudbury Utilities, or any other provider, each has infrastructure that needs to be maintained and occasionally upgraded to ensure the electricity system remains reliable for families and businesses.

But let me be clear. Regardless of the outcome of any rate application before the OEB, electricity bills would not be impacted beyond the rate of inflation, as per the Fair Hydro Plan. In the case of Hydro One's Draft Rate Order for transmission costs, it's estimated that the bill impact for 2017 would be an increase of 0.1 percent, and 0.2 percent for 2018.

It's also important to remember that this is only at the application stage with the OEB. The OEB is an independent regulator with a mandate to protect the interests of ratepayers and to set just and reasonable rates. It also has a strong record of reviewing rate applications with the consumer in mind. For example, in 2010 Hydro One asked for a rate increase for distribution and actually received a nine per cent reduction on its distribution rates. And in 2012 Hydro One asked for a rate increase for transmission, and received a three per cent reduction

Through Ontario's Fair Hydro Plan, our government cut electricity bills by 25 per cent on average for all families, along with as many as half a million farms and small businesses. It is the single largest rate reduction in the province's history and for each of the next four years, any increase will be in line with inflation. Customers in some rural and northern areas are seeing even greater reductions. The latest figures have Hydro One customers seeing an average reduction of over 30 per-

Our plan is about real relief for Ontarians and a way to ensure greater fairness in our electricity system. Neither opposition party has offered anything practical or substantial when it comes to reduced electricity costs for Ontario families and small businesses. In fact, they voted against our Fair Hydro Plan. They would rather play politics with rate relief, and mislead people when it suits their interests.

Doug first opened his eyes on January 24, 1948 and remained their only child. He remembers getting a special Christmas ornament at age two. "Somewhere, there sits a photo of me hanging this ornament on the tree in 1950.

he would drive to the ferry at Tobermory and head for Manitoulin. In the winter, he drove around every two weeks or so, to visit friends on the Island. "When the ferry was running, I would load my cycle on the back of my truck, drive to Tobermory, park the truck, and take the dirt bike on the ferry which would be the Norgoma or the Norisle, at the time." Back in Hamilton, Doug had a job with Otis Elevator from 1968 to 1974. "We also helped design the scenic elevator on the outside of the CN tower while at Otis. But that was a desk job and I had to wear a suit every day. I didn't like that.'

In April of 1974 Doug had a deciding moment. "It was the most compelling change in my life at the time," he confirms. On April 30 of that year, he said good bye to his parents and headed for the Island.

"I met my future wife-to-be, Candy Tracy, daughter of Harry and Helen Tracy, in 1974 in Kagawong, the year the Chi-Cheemaun started making the island trips. Candy was from Manitoulin and worked as a teacher at a place called Shining Tree, near Sudbury." She left that job and moved back to the Island where she wanted to stay. Doug lived in a trailer while he built their own home on a back street in Kagawong. "My skills were automotive, not woodworking, so I sought help from others for carpentry skills.'

That same year Doug conveniently found work with Noble Lumber, during hunting season. the third week of November. He was filling in for missing hunters that week. "I wound up staying and learned a lot over the next seven years. Many employees had woodworking skills and they

Doug and Candy were married on July 27, 1981. Candy knew that it was two days before Princess Di married Prince Charles and she may have wanted to add an element of surprise to her own nuptials. "In order to put up the building, I had to go to council to get the zoning change for this site. When I arrived at that meeting, I saw lots of cars and I was worried that there might be opposition. To my delight, the opposite was true. They were all there to support me and the zoning change was easy, with additional help from the township. The location adjacent to Bridal Veil Falls is ideal for me too. Lots of people see the shop and stop in or call."

"We have hosted Hot Wheels races for many years. I built a race track and the kids have come to compete with their cars. Doug made elaborate trophies to give out to the winning participants. Ruth Farquhar, in her Sudbury Star column of June 11, 2007 states: "Everything gets underway on the morning of June 16 when classic cars, motorcycles and vintage sleds will set up...an original Hot Wheels race track will be set up and run all day." Doug adds that he has a few Hot Wheels cars that he has collected, and he lets the kids play with

that is adapted to wheelchairs or other needs. I make chests of drawers, wooden swings, tables and many other items," he adds. "I love to meet my customers and have a little chat. It's fun to find out where they are all from.'

The Clark ancestors resided in the Hamilton area. "Both my grandparents came from that part of Ontario. Paternal grandfather,

Harris Clark, (wife Gladys) was in World War I and his son, Al Clark, my dad, was in World War II. Maternal grandparents were Carl and Maime Slipp. Carl was a war veteran also.'

Doug's parents Al and Eileen (Slipp) Clark met at a dance in Hamilton during the war while Al was on leave from his job as an airplane mechanic. Both had been regular visitors to Manitoulin priEach year it would come out and I would hang it up for all to see. I still have it.

"Another cherished memory is going out to the shop and watching my dad working on vehicles, at age three or four. He loved to fix up old cars. Neighbourhood kids would come over to watch too. Our house was a gathering place for youth. When we got older we liked to help him as much as we could. It was a great hobby. I learned from him that hard work

Whenever I mentioned Manitoulin to anybody at school, they would give me strange looks. People generally didn't know where the Island was then and that still seems to be the case for many." High school football was fun we are told; Doug was a lineman, but main passions were still cars and now, motorcycles. "I liked the dual-purpose dirt bikes that Yamaha made.'

After Doug got his licence at 16,

shared them with me. One such person was Tom Christiansen of Gore Bay. He was in his '70s but he worked with me for seven years. I learned the finer details about cabinet making." At Noble's, Doug also made deliveries and he met a lot of good people. "It took six months to build our bungalow. Some of it was trial and error but I succeeded in the end."

MNRF hunting charges down from last year

MANITOULIN—Rifle season on Manitoulin was quiet from both an Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) standpoint, with conservation officers (COs) laying significantly less charges over last year.

"The MNRF (COs) contacted 231 individuals and laid 28 charges and 32 warnings," said MNRF Supervisor Dave Scarlett.

OPP arrests impaired driver at ride check

On Tuesday, November 21 at approximately 11:57 pm, officers from the Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were conducting Reduce Impaired Everywhere Driving (RIDE) checks on Highway 540 in Gordon Township.

Officers checked a pickup truck and determined that the driver had been consuming alcoholic beverages.

As a result of the police investigation, a 71-year-old male of Gordon Township has been charged with: driving while ability impaired by alcohol and driving with over 80 mg of alcohol in blood.

The accused's driver's licence was suspended for 90 days with an Administrative Driver's Licence Suspension (ADLS), and his vehicle was impounded for seven days.

The accused released on a Promise to Appear (PTA) and is scheduled to appear at the Provincial Court of Justice in Gore Bay, Ontario on January 9, 2018.

RIDE check yields drug charges

On November 22, members of the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service were conducting RIDE checks on Highway 540 in Aundeck Ömni Kaning First Nation. As a result of one of the vehicles checked, a 29-year-old male from M'Chigeeng First Nation was found to have a quantity of amphetamines (speed) in his possession.

The male subject was charged with possession of a controlled substance under the CDSA and also for having an open container of liquor under the LLA. He was released on a promise to appear for December 14 at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay.

Driver sought in fail to remain

Manitoulin OPP investigating a fail to remain collision that was reported to police on Monday, November 20. The collision happened on Sunday night, on Highway 540 near Silver Water. year when there were a total of 52 charges laid and 53 warnings issued. In 2015, the MNRF connected with 318 hunters, laying 36 charges and issuing 84 warnings. In 2014, the MNRF laid 41 charges and with connected hunters, while in 2013 they only laid 11 charges (an uncommonly low year). In 2012 the number of charges was also 41, while in 2011 there were 33

charges laid and 50 in 2010. The breakdown of the 28 charges laid this year were: three hunting big game without a licence; three failure to immediately attach seal to deer; seven

This is down from last unlawfully possessing a firearm at night; five unlawfully having a loaded firearm in a conveyance; one failure to wear hunter orange; one failure to wear a proper helmet; three trespassing for the purpose of hunting; two interfere with lawful hunt; one failure to notify party of kill; one hunting without having a licence on person; and one failure to provide required information on

Community Services Officer Constable Marie Ford with the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP said that it was a quiet week for police enforce-

"We had lots of RIDE checks which resulted in (charging) one impaired driver," said Constable Ford. "It was a very quiet week generally, which is good. A lot of people were staying at their camps. We had another call regarding individuals shooting from the road but we directed that to the MNRF."

Last week the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP had 150 calls for service with charges including: one driving under suspension; one liquor licence charge; 10 other Highway Traffic Act violations; and 19 speeding charges.



AUNDECK OMNI KANING— Alex McGraw fell in love with the mixed marshal art of jujitsu shortly after finishing high school, attending the tri-weekly Troope Manitoulin sessions at Aundeck Omni Kaning under the tutelage of Darren Madahbee. Mr. McGraw continued his intense connection with the sport and recently was rewarded with two gold medals at the Grappling Industries Gi Nogi Jujitsu tournament held at Toronto's Ryerson University, where he won all 10 of his matches, but a year and a half ago things were looking pretty grim.

"I wasn't expecting to win all 10," admitted Mr. McGraw. "But as it turned out I won nine of my matches by submission and the other one by ref's decision.'

Mr. McGraw now trains with Sudbury's Troope MMA under 2nd degree black belt Richard Nancoo, but back in the day it was all Manitoulin. "Darren started it all," he said. "Now I try to get on the mats every day.'

"I am very proud of that young man," said his former mentor Mr. Madahbee, who admitted he did not at first see the champion in the making. "To be perfectly honest he came in with a bit of a chip on his shoulder," he laughed. "But then he got a bit of humble pie. We all get that at the start, I know I got plenty of my share. But he stuck with it and that's what separates a champion.'

Sticking with it is right. A year and a half ago, Mr. McGraw was in a car accident that left him with a pelvis broken in three places along with five broken ribs. "The

first thing I asked the doctor was 'will I be able to wrestle again, will I be able to do jujitsu?'" he said. Mr. McGraw heaved a sigh of relief when the doctor told him it would be six months to a year before he could return to the sport. "I was back at it in six months," he recalled. A year later he was in top winning form.

Today the 23-year-old Manitoulin Secondary School graduate is working in Sudbury at the Townhouse Tavern as a doorman/bouncer and working out on the mats every chance he gets. "I love the job at the Townhouse," he

said. "I get to listen to great music and the people are great."

His next tournament will be in Toronto on December 2. Are the Olympics in his sights? "Jujitsu isn't an Olympic sport," he said. "Maybe in 2020, but that's okay, there are a lot of big tournaments.

The Aundeck Omni Kaning Troop Manitoulin Jujitsu sessions are open to everyone and take place three times a week, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays at 7 pm. Apparently it's where champions get their start.





Proud to Parent Conference invigorates Wiikwemkoong

recent two-day Proud to Parent conference was hosted at the Wiikwemkoong arena by Naadwe-chige Wikwemiking Health Centre Children's Services Program and brought parents together with leading parenting counsellors to share best practices in building healthy family units based on traditional values.

Over the two-day conference keynote speaker Janet Fox discussed topics of Traditional Family Parenting/Reclaiming our Indigenousness.

Ms. Fox hails originally from Red Deer, Alberta and is a member of the Samson Cree First Nation.

"Every First Nation is facing the same cycles of poverty, diabetes, suicide, addictions, high dropout rates, high incarceration rates, gangs, violence and high numbers of children in the child welfare system," said Ms. Fox. "We can start promoting the pride and rich traditions to the youth in our communities by sharing the teachings. our languages, customs and traditions so that they have a brighter future. The teach-

ings have always been there and they can be revital-

"On the first day I dealt with how our parenting skills were impacted by four generations of residential school," she said. "Each child was removed from their parents' care and placed in a very authoritarian system. Ms. Fox pointed out the residential schools, operated by staunch Christians, tended to follow a very Victorian and industrialized school of thought when it came to raising children-and any hint of

Indigenous culture was forbidden and severely pun-

"I was forbidden to know my language," said Ms. Fox. "I was taught to be ashamed of who I am. The textbooks I saw, especially in high school, painted the Anishinaabe as savages and heathens.

It wasn't until she reached her 40s that she started to really understand the effects of residential schools and the trauma that they inflicted on generations of her people.

"So we are working

through these cycles," she said. "Due to the policies of assimilation we have to fight to find our roots."

On the second day of her talks, Ms. Fox explored the teachings that predated the residential schools. "The teachings that were there,' she said. "We need to understand where our ancestors came from.

Among the topics Ms. Fox explored were the various traditional medicines that Indigenous mothers and grandmothers utilized as part of their childrearing.

Other topics discussed at the conference included 'Coparenting, the Good the Bad and the Ugly' presented by registered aboriginal midwife Sylvia Recollect from the Oneida Nation and Nadmadwin Mental Health Services counsellor Cody Wassengeso; 'Breast feeding and Post Partum Depression, 'Looking at the Evipresented dence,' Stephanie George; 'Understanding Temperament in the Family' presented by a child and parent group facilitator at Merrymount Family Support and Crisis Centre in London, Sarah Wells; and finally 'Anishn-Men's Roles

Responsibilities' presented by Dan Garcia. Day two's schedule included 'Breast Feeding: Our Children Can Help Heal Communities From Intergenerational Trauma,' presented by Stephanie George; 'Transitioning Together: The Move to School or Daycare' presented by Sarah Wells; 'Mirror Communication,' by Assinewai; 'Reclaiming Our Anishinabe Roots,' by Dan Garcia.

As part of the handout package for the conference was a Best Start booklet supplied by Kina Gbezhgoentitled 'A Child Becomes Strong: Journeying through Each Stage of the Life Cycle.' The booklet contained a wealth of traditional knowledge about Anishinaabe child rearing practices and cultural learning, as well as great explanations of the various stages of development of children.

'We have had a great response from parents for this booklet," said Daphene Corbiere, maternal health worker with Kina. "It helps parents who are trying to get back into traditional teachings, getting into culture with your children and understanding how they develop."

"These teachings awaken the spirit in us and we can balance our emotional, mental, physical and spiritual parts so that we can make change in our communities," said Ms. Fox, who emphasised that Anishinabe traditional parenting skills can be reclaimed despite generations of residential school trauma and the lateral violence it has engendered.

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

"They like to talk a good game, but I'll tell you this—I was shocked to hear that they're happy to have workers continue to earn wages that won't even pay the rent and put food on the table," said NDP Leader Andrea Horwath following the Tory announcement. "We are in favour of a minimum wage increase, we have been for a long time, but the fact that the Conservatives are saying people have to wait another four years before \$15 minimum wage is in place in Ontario shows how utterly out of touch that party is."

Unions are also largely on board with the increases. "When working people say what they need, they have the power to get it," said OPSEU President Warren (Smokey) Thomas. "Bill 148 is a significant step forward for workers' rights, and I think every union, community group and individual who helped make it happen should take a bow."

But the province's hospitality industry, a major player in the lowend wage market, is likening the rapid increases as "approaching a disaster," citing absorbing the rapidity of the increases as the major challenge facing their industry.

Other negative voices came from reports from the TD Canada Bank and the Canadian Centre for Economic Analysis, who both estimated the potential for between 90,000 and 185,000 jobs lost in Ontario as a result of Bill 148. Ontario's own Financial Accountability Office warned that 50,000 jobs could be lost.

But these assessments fly in the face of numerous economists who maintain the increase in minimum wage will, in fact, boost the Ontario economy by putting more money in the hands of lower income consumers. Those most likely to spend a larger percentage of their wages on the necessities of life.

Bill 148 is entitled the 'Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act, 2017' and contains a great deal more than the headline grabbing rise in minimum wages, even though most are making less waves than the income rises.


Among the coming changes in Ontario's commercial environment are: the addition of a critical illness

leave; the expansion of family medical leave; the expansion of the list of professionals who can certify statutory leaves; a revision to the "three-hour rule" that will entitle employees to more pay guarantees; exceptions to the on-call and scheduling rules for employers who provide essential public services (this was in response to a clarion alarm raised by small rural municipalities who envisioned having to pay their local firefighters for their 24/7 oncall job requirements); clarification on what Equal Pay for Equal Work will apply in that the duties performed by workers do not necessarily have to be identical, but rather "substantially the same"; deletion of the hours-based "seniority system" exception to Equal Pay for Equal Work; the expansion of what employee information may need to be provided to a union during a union organizing drive; and a ban on mandatory high-heeled shoes in the workplace under the Occupational Health and Safety Act (except for the entertainment industry).

tion while collecting visitor data."

Mr. Wassegijig founded the annual Wikwemikong Ice Fishing Derby in 2008, attracting over 500 anglers from across the province each year. He also worked with trail groups to assist in developing a hiking trail system in Wiikwemkoong starting in 2010.

"In 2012, they (Wiikwemkoong Tourism) opened the Bebamikawe Memorial Trail with over 14km of trail complete with educational signage, outdoor fitness stations and authentic Indigenous lodges," the press release notes. "This tourist attraction now draws over 3,500 users to his community. Also in 2010, he initiated a partnership with the Georgian Bay Coastal Trail to develop a rugged hiking trail along Georgian Bay. From there he reignited the vision of the Point Grondine Park which opened to outdoor enthusiasts in 2016. The Point Grondine Park is a phased development to create a First Nation owned and operated Eco Resort and Campground where traditional Anishnaabek culture meets a peaceful eco-retreat in one of Ontario's spectacular regions."

Mr. Wassegijig and his team have been training and helping build hiking trails for First Nation communities across the province through Wikwemikong Tourism's Trail Development Services.

"Not only is he the tourism manager, he is also an entrepreneur and is the proud owner of Wass Tours," the release concludes. "He has diversified his business from a private island cottage rental to now offering scenic/historic boat cruises and fishing charters on Georgian Bay. Wass Tours was featured on national TV programs such as Canadian Sport fishing with Italo Labignan and Fuel the Fire TV"

Over 300 delegates from across the region gathered for the Summit from November 15 to 17, participating in over 24 workshops and sessions.

"It was nice to see Luke Wassigijig of Wikwemikong Tourism receiving the 2017 Tourism Champion Award from Nature and Outdoor Tourism Ontario (NOTO) congratulations," said the Chair of Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocate (MICA) Maja Mielonen, who attended the summit. "Succession planning for businesses was well attended as so many businesses owners in the north reach the age where they would like to find young entrepreneurs that want to continue what they had created through their life," said Ms. Mielonen of the summit. "A pilot project opportunity for businesses called Experience Fishing was presented for businesses that want to include fishing experiences for new guests that may never have had an opportunity to experience fishing. MICA was happy to see the release of the Cycle Tourism Plan booklet we have assisted with in the past two years. We found the significance of the Manitoulin Passage Ride as a excellent product that is sold out year after year mentioned amongst many other important cycling information."

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


Islander authors release their collected stories

This investigation is to be conducted, at the expense of the employer, by an impartial person possessing knowledge of the workplace harassment provision under the Occupational Health and Safety act and be qualified to conduct a workplace harassment investigation and to provide, at the expense of the employer, a written report by that person. At the time of this visit an investigation had not com-(January 31, menced. 2018 completion date.)

Tehkummah placed a request for proposal for an investigator to conduct the MOL investigation, as this is not done by the ministry. The municipality had heard from five interested parties, with the reeve supplying his own firm for consideration, and pushing for council to approve his submission that night.

"Let's get this over with," he said. Mr. Chenard gently

warned council that the MOL has to approve the investigator.

"What's 24 hours?" Councillor Hierons asked the reeve, noting that the submission date for the request for proposals was November 22. "We don't swing at the first pitch."

Mr. Chenard noted that council can request more time from the MOL to be in compliance if needed.

Reeve Russell suggested

that the health and safety coordinator was threatening them with Mr. Chenard responding by saying that he was simply helping them complete their due diligence. A back and forth between the merits of waiting for a review by all interested parties and a move to hire someone that night occurred between Councillor Hierons and Reeve Russell.

Council decided to meet as a committee of the whole following the council meeting to review the submissions to date with Mr. Chenard.

As of press time Monday, a firm or individual had not been chosen by council to act as MOL investigator.





...continued from page 1 getting really good at the cello," he said. (Those who had the opportunity to listen to his playing prior to leaving for school would readily testify that he was already "really good.") "When I finished that, like most people who study music at the undergraduate level, I was looking around for what to do next and settled on 'more education'."

He had his eye on the Glenn Gould masters program at the conservatory in Toronto. "I just sort of assumed I would get in," he said. "I didn't get chosen." It was his first real academic setback. "It was a shock," he admitted. "It was a very humbling experience."

Undaunted, Mr. Poenn then set his sights on a one-year program at Sir Wilfred Laurier and focussed on playing in groups, orchestras and string quartets, even a rock band. "The rock band wasn't part of my course of studies," he laughed. Taking on the Sir Wilfred Laurier program was to prove a very fortuitous decision.

"As I was looking at my elective choices I saw one 'Introduction to called Therapy,' he Music recalled. "I thought to myself 'that sounds interesting,' and it turned out to be really fascinating." The same university offered a master's program in music therapy. "I applied and got in," said Mr. Poenn. "I found it synthesized two opposing interests, health

care and music."

After a number of placements and working for a while in southern Ontario, Mr. Poenn found himself drawn back to the Island where he hoped to be able to employ his newfound dual skillset.

Soon he was working at two of the Island nursing homes, as well as taking on individual clients and the odd private gig.

The cognitive function impact of music therapy can be immense. "There are so many domains that music plays an important role in," he said. "Emotional, physical, social, spiritual—especially spiritual."

Ms. Osawabine-Peltier said that the impact of Mr. Poenn's work with the residents of the Wikwemikong Nursing Home has a wide reach. "We have residents who really don't take part in the normal activities here," she said. "They don't do bingo or anything that the other residents take part in. But those residents that don't take part in other activities will sit there and

listen to Jonathan play for hours, some of them even follow him around when he goes to visit other residents."

While Mr. Poenn plays the guitar and the piano, his favourite remains the cello for a variety of reasons. "The great thing about the cello is that it is very loud," he explains. That allows the instrument to dominate the space and to help listeners focus on the sound. "When you are playing in an enclosed space, you can feel the vibrations from the cello in your body." Those who may begin listening in an agitated state are soon calmed by the music.

"Music helps to trigger memories of old friends and acquaintances," he explains, and when the music brings back those memories people often find themselves calmed and lost deep in thought.

deep in thought.

"Long term memory is one of the last things to go," said Ms. Omnet.
"Short term memory goes pretty fast, but long term memory stays around."
Music is inextricably linked to events and people in a person's past and when an old favourite is played, it can bring those memories flooding back.

In addition to the group and individual sessions that Mr. Poenn conducts in the long-term nursing homes, he also is available for private therapy sessions. With the growth of palliative care options on

Manitoulin, Mr. Poenn also hopes to see his schedule expand there as well.

And then there are the opportunities to play to audiences in a "non-medicinal" setting, which he still enjoys.

"I still play at various functions," he said. "In fact, this weekend and next I am playing down south at functions. It's going to be a pretty busy couple of weeks."

...continued from page 1 tions under the Municipal Act, 2001."

"If council wilfully ignores its obligations under the statutes, there may also be the question of whether the members are acting in bad faith and in breach of their fiduciary duties and responsibilities to the electorate," the memo continues.

"With regards to filling a vacancy on council: the statute itself does not set out a remedy as the requirement to fill a vacancy on council is mandatory. Interestingly, even if council eventually fills the vacancy, it will still have been in breach of the Act after November 10, 2017, but we're not certain what consequences that failure may have created, if any," the memo states.

"Ramifications of this failure to comply with the Municipal Act in filling a vacant seat or by not paying for the property repairs, or by failing to adhere to its own bylaws and policies, may jeopardize any decisions made by council by potentially rendering them voidable if someone should challenge any bylaws or resolutions enacted.

"Council cannot believe that it can continue to operate as normal," the memo stresses.

"Any qualified elector can go and challenge council business," Ms. Gerrard told council.

It was noted that a vacant council seat does not have to be filled if it falls six months prior to the next election. This instance falls outside of

that scope, however, as the next election is almost a year away.

There was much discussion, and confusion, over the inability to vote on a motion to overturn a vote regarding how to deal with the vacant seat, which Councillor Paul Bowerman attempted to do at council's regular meeting held earlier this month.

Councillor Lori Leeson accused Ms. Gerrard of leading them to believe falsehoods about filling the vacant seat. Ms. Gerrard pointed to the Municipal Act and what it states concerning the subject.

With this new information in hand, Reeve Eric Russell asked council if they wished to go ahead with the meeting.

"I'm willing to go forward," Councillor Bowerman said. "I'm not afraid of anything I've done."

"I've tried to represent everybody fairly," the councillor added. "I always thought of everybody else when sitting at this table," going on to note that he's been "threatened, bullied, discriminated against and intimidated."

In reference to Councillor Bowerman trying to overturn his vote, Reeve Russell said he thought that while the motion had to be made by someone on the prevailing side, it is not clear whether whoever sec-

support of council since the beginning, "a positive relationship" they would like to see moving forward.

In 2008, the BWTP's first production after a long hiatus, the group approached council to ask for a \$1,000 donation to be used toward start-up fees. Mr. Baumgarten explained that this is the only time the Players have approached council for a hand out. Instead they have contributed almost \$14,000 to the municipality through a portion of ticket sales from 2008 to 2013 almost \$3,000 each year. The Players, he added, also reached out to local restaurants and church groups during the shows' runs, encouraging them to put on events or specials to create a theatre package that only sought to benefit the people of Manitowaning.

Mr. Baumgarten also spoke to the community inclusion that each play brings, seeing actors varying in age from 5 to 90 involved in the plays.

"We have 1.000 audience members every season, even people who schedule vacations specifically for these shows," he said.

He also reminded council that the BWTP helped to pay for a new roof and a brand-new lighting system, which was only used once season. "Structurally, the building is sound," he added, "it's all about the building codes."

"We feel we're being compared to the Steamship Society," Mr. Baumgarten said. "We find that a very unfair comparison. We're nothing like them except that we're both an historical asset and our theatre is located a stone's throw from the Norisle."

With the completion of the required building code improvements to the Burns Wharf Theatre building, it will mean an asset for the municipality for decades to come, he said.

...continued from page 11 onds Councillor Bowerman's proposed vote has previously had to be on a particular side too.

Councillor Ron Hierons asked what was wrong with holding an election. "It would have been over and done by now, ne said, noting that this is how council had filled a vacancy during the last term of council.

"Because it was three years until the next election," Councillor Leeson responded.

Reeve Russell asked the clerk-treasurer why items he asked to be put on the agenda were being left off. followed Debate whether it was an intentional move, with Ms. Gerrard assuring the reeve that it was not.

When reeve and council got to the business of approving the agenda, Councillor Bowerman said that he would not approve the agenda because he too failed to see items on the agenda that he had requested to be there, well in advance.

meeting went The ahead

has no money sunk into the Burns Wharf, unlike the Steamship Society that has, reportedly, over one million sunk into the aging ship so far, he added. "We're nothing like the Norisle and to compare us to the Norisle is unfair," he reiterated.

Mr. Baumgarten reminded council that at one time, repairs to the Burns Wharf Theatre were a priority for council and while that may have changed, there is no reason they can't apply for grants on the Players' behalf and make them a funding priority. He also reminded mayor and council that for the people of Assiginack, the restoration of Burns Wharf is a priority, according to a strategic planning survey undertaken by the municipality.

"We're asking for the township's assistance, and not even a lot of it," he said.

Mr. Baumgarten said that the Players do not mind doing the "legwork" for funding applications, as long as municipal staff and council will provide feedback on those applications in order to get them back in the Burns Wharf.

As for incorporation, "it's not a simple process, and it's a costly one," Mr. Baumgarten continued, listing the many items a group must do to become incorpo-

"If incorporation is the only way forward, I'm not sure what will happen to our group," he admitted.

"We're not like Friends of the Norisle, we're not like Manitoulin Streams, we're a social group," Mr. Baumgarten continued. "If anything, we're more like minor hockey than any of the other groups.

He pointed to the fact that some members of council feel that the Players don't need a dedicated space as they can continue to use Debajehmujig's black box theatre, as they have done for the past two summers. "Debaj has been accommodating, but they've already given us signals that this arrangement isn't going to last," Mr. Baumgarten said.

And as for the Assiginack Public School gym, it's not conducive to a theatre group.

"We need to get back into the Burns Wharf building and we hope to do so without being incorporated," he again stated.

Mayor Paul Moffatt said the reasons stated for not incorporating don't hold any weight, noting that it doesn't take much time and it's not expensive.

"If you were incorporated, then the municipality could give that venue to you then you could raise all the money," the mayor said.

"I fail to see why the township wants to download the building from your plate on to ours," Mr. Baumgarten replied. "There are not a lot of assets in this community. If we don't feel we can incorporate, it could be another thing gone from this township.'

"I fail to see why you think it's so difficult to incorporate," Mayor Moffatt reiterated.

'We still don't understand why we should be incorporate," Marilyn Wohlberg, BWTP artistic director, interjected. "Why is this absolutely necessary?" she questioned, asking if this was a direction from the municipal lawyer due to their other legal problems regarding township assets of late. "You must have a reason for insisting on this?"

"If and when your organization becomes incorporated, we can transfer that venue to you," the mayor repeated.

"Why is the township not taking responsibility for the building?" Mr. Baumgarten queried. "We're not hearing an answer as to why.'

"We don't' really want building,"

"Philip Edward Island is one of the most beautiful places in the world," Mr. Phillips said of the Killarney-area island, "and we've been very blessed to do a lot of travelling. It's one of the most sacred places in the world for us."

One of the reasons Mr. Phillips said he is so drawn to the area is due to the dynamic quality of the environment—the ebb and flow of the water levels, the change in seasons.

"We are the product of our nurturing, no doubt, both in terms of your incredible land and our love of horses." the group that would care for him and name him when he was a baby. Manitoulin was born of a risky caesarian section and in the world of thoroughbred horses, C-section foals have a 50/50 chance of survival. "It was a miraculous survival."

Mr. Phillips gathered his fishing buddies, hunting pals and the veterinarian who delivered him when settling on a name and, as most of those people had vacationed at the Killarney family cottage, the name Manitoulin was decided. "He's named for an area that's brought us all together"

Manitoulin first raced as a three-year-old colt.

"He has a very strong personality—he is a charac-

ter," Mr. Phillips said. "He is very much an energetic and playful horse. It's why he went from a colt to a gelding. He didn't want to train, he liked to play; he bucked, he walked on his hind legs. He wasn't mean by any means, but he loved to play and get loose. He wasn't very focussed."

Anishinaabemowin degree and diploma. We are looking forward to offering specialized degrees." Currently, for example, KTEI offers teacher training accreditation through Queen's University.

"Ontario is taking an historic step in recognizing the unique role Indigenous institutes have in the province's postsecondary education system with the introduction of new legislation that, if passed, will transfer key functions and oversight to Indigenous people," states a press release from the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development.

Deb Matthews, minister of Advanced Education and Skills Development, and David Zimmer, minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation, were joined by the Aboriginal Institutes Consortium, chiefs, leaders of Indigenous institutes (including KTEI) and students from across the province in Toronto last Thursday, November 23 to mark this step on the path to reconciliation with Indigenous peoples.

"The legislation, if passed, would recognize Indigenous Institutes as unique and complementary pillars of Ontario's post-secondary education system and support

the independence and sustainability of the institutes," the release continues. "It is also another important step on the path to reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. The changes would create a framework for ongoing collaboration between Ontario and Indigenous institutes and would support a strong, independent Indigenous institutes sector, overseen by an Indigenous controlled and governed council. The council would, among other functions, provide quality assurance for postsecondary diplomas, certificates and degree programs offered by Indigenous institutes."

The proposed legislation is the result of joint policy co-creation between the Indigenous institutes, represented by the Aboriginal Institutes Consortium, and the government

"Working in partnership with Indigenous institutes to promote Indigenous language, culture, identity and community well-being is a key step towards reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in Ontario," re-iterated Minister Matthews in the press release. "This legislation goes a long way to create greater access to lifelong learning

he began to focus and soon discovered that running was fun.

Mr. Phillips likened thoroughbred race horses to dogs in the retriever family—they are born and bred to do what they love to do. In Manitoulin's case, that's run. "They're competitive by nature."

"It took us a while to figure him out, and now he's a graded stakes winner," Mr. Phillips added.

Manitoulin's father, Awesome Again, and mother, Soaring Softly, were both Grade 1 stakes winners for the Darby Dan Farm. Interestingly, Manitoulin's jockey, Mike Smith, has had the privilege of riding both of his parents.

Manitoulin's speciality is the mile-and-ahalf run, on firm earth. "He likes to hear his feet rattle."

Following his Del Mar win, Manitoulin will return to Kentucky for some R and R. He'll be walked for a few days, then let into a small paddock, then a larger one to play and mess about.

Manitoulin will then head to Florida until the end of January before he comes home to Kentucky to get ready for more turf racing next summer, hopefully in the stakes

"A happy horse is a horse that goes out there and makes stakes," Mr. Phillips said. A charmed life indeed.

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
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Rockin' The Rock announces line up

them too." This was a big event for Kagawong. The Island classic car club also borrows the track each year for their event."

"I am not a member of the local associations but have donated to them for good causes. The Lions Club may get a bird feeder for their silent auction. I don't make windows or regular doors because other businesses make or sell those. I don't want to compete with other Island firms. I do make wooden screen doors in different sizes. Retirement, anniversary and thank you gifts are popular such as two chairs and a table or two Adirondack chairs. The high school buys chairs for retirees. Components for trailers have been made too."

"In addition to chairs, dressers and picnic tables, I make special sizes such as wider or higher chairs as needed. We made such chairs for a fly-in camp. The chair bottoms,

sides and back had to fit into the fuselage of a plane. I have made yokes for canoes and rough-cut panels for people who like to carve. Specialty items for school are on my list too. I like to say: 'treat people the way you want to be treated.' That has always done well by me." If a chair or table is damaged by a falling tree or otherwise, Doug will fix it for free. He enjoys making people happy.

"The wood we use is harvested from small local farmers with portable mills. The hardware comes from Williamson's, Castle or Home Hardware. When you buy locally, business comes back to you. Even the gas station across the road knows our schedule and sends people over."

"All the boards are cut specifically for each piece of furniture so not much of the wood is wasted. The shavings are

used for chicken bedding, gardens, composting toilets and fertilizer. The sawdust blows into a trailer attached to the building and it is picked up by local farmers. Small pieces of wood are collected and used for firewood starter in local camps."

This story is being recorded with pen and paper on the work bench with a newly finished chair elevated by 'two by fours' so the writer was high enough to use the bench. Several people dropped by to check on their orders. One lady requested that scallops be added to a dresser, another person ordered a rocking chair, and some stopped in or called just to touch base. Everyone was well received; business as usual. The short injections of discourse added to the ambience.

"My strengths are building creative projects that customers ask for. It's fun to find solutions to problems and make the people smile. Many are repeat customers from all over the province and the country. They come now for the fall colours and often they stop in here. "If we go for a boat ride on the lake, we can see all the furniture and screen doors that came from our shop. It feels good to know that after I am gone, there will be a lot of our furniture around, my legacy to the future."

Doug is proud that one of his chairs was used to hold the Stanley Cup when it came to Manitoulin on August 26, 2007. Randy Carlisle, coach, and Dave Farrish, assistant-coach of the Anaheim Mighty Ducks, brought the cup that year the Ducks had won. "We took the students from the Hope Farm to the Manitowaning Airport and brought one of my chairs. The two coaches signed it and I have a photo of the cup in the chair." The chair was later raffled off for \$2,000 for the Special Olympics. A slight impression of the cup was left in the seat of the chair and that added to the appeal.

"I don't think much about getting older. I get up in the morning and go out the door. I plan to be productive, to make, say, three chairs and meet some new people. At the end of the day, I feel good if I can say I made those three

chairs and additionally, I met two new people." Doug likes to listen to country music and '60s music while he works.

"We have a cat named Diesel. He is a tough cat. He chases mice and sits by the dock most of the day," Doug muses. "There is also a neat story about a St. Bernard that showed up at a neighbour's door one day. The family tried to find his owner over several weeks but finally gave up and kept the dog. One day the dog left, and the kids were heartbroken. He came back two days later with a kitten in his mouth. It appears that he had gone back home to find this male kitten and bring him to a safe home. Luckily, they kept them both."

"Candy and I built our retirement home here and moved in three years ago. We are very close and do a lot together in our free time. We see our son daily. Digger is a good role model. He is the real thing as far as I am concerned. I am proud of his accomplishments. Having a career is important and he chose to stay on the island where he is wellaccepted"

"On Fridays, I visit some of my former students at Community Living and share some time with them. I visit Hamilton from time to time to see a cousin and his two children. They are all the family I have left there, and they often come here in the summer. Some of the kids from the old neighbourhood, the ones who hung out in our garage with dad, come up to Manitoulin and rent cottages too."

"I just love the Island, always have. I love the people, the fresh air. Life goes on at a leisurely pace. If I have one regret, it's that I could have moved here sooner. When I am accused of not being a Haweater, I respond, 'You were born here, but I chose to live here.' That should count too,"

opportunities for Indigenous people so that they have the skills, training and education to succeed in Ontario's highly skilled workforce.'

The legislation was introduced on November 14, 2017.

There are currently nine Indigenous institutes throughout the province (the Aboriginal Institutes Consortium is the industry association) of which all are Indigenous-governed and operated institutions, receiving their mandate from Indigenous communities, and providing postsecondary education and training to Indigenous

It was also announced that, over the next three years, the government will be investing \$56 million for Indigenous institutes to expand their capacity and strengthen their role as an important and unique pillar in Ontario's postsecondary education system. Kenjgewin Teg has already begun to expand its programs with the groundbreaking earlier this fall for a dedicated trades school at its M'Chigeeng campus.

"This is going to be really good for Manitoulin," said Ms. Roy. "Good for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous individuals. We want to include everyone as we continue into the next chapter and become the third pillar (joining universities and colleges) in the province.'

Wohlberg added.

"If you are an incorporated body we can enter an agreement with you," CAO Alton Hobbs responded. "We're involved in a number of issues currently. Our solicitor suggested that if you want to go down that route, then a logical way through this is incorporation, then lease.

"What you're saying is that you're not willing to work with us," Mr. Baumgarten said. "We're not asking staff to search for the money, financial or manpower resources, just cooperation.'

'You're saying that because a lawyer said that because you're in hot water with one group you can't help another, then I'm concerned with how this municipality is run-

'I believe council sees this as a business decision and therefore we should develop a business relationship," said Councillor Leslie Fields who went on to cite poor plumbing and sewer in the theatre building as it now stands.

Ms. Wohlberg said that the building's issues are the township's and not the Players.

"You have to realize that we're struggling financially," Councillor Fields said. "That building could have more and more issues. You may not ask for money now, but even-

Councillor Hugh Moggy said he personally wished to see

the funding application go through for the BWTP. "I don't want this to become adversarial," Mr. Baumgarten said. "We feel that the building has value to the community and we will keep fighting."

There is absolutely no way we can see ourselves going through six months plus the cost (of incorporation) only to find the lease is something we can't work with," he continued. "We would need to see the specifics of that lease."

"We've been leading these people on for the past two

years," Councillor Moggy said.

The mayor told Councillor Moggy he thought his com-

ment was "out of order."

Councillor Moggy responded that he didn't think he was, noting that when the budget was set, there was money in the working funds reserve so that if the FedNor grant (that was not applied for in the end) had been approved, they would have the municipal contribution there. "Why are we as a municipality not working to help these people to see if there is funding?"

Councillor Brenda Reid said the problem, as she saw it, is that the funding application could be better used on a new fire hall, public works garage or ice plant, for example.

"It's (Burns Wharf) an asset for the community and if there are no people coming here you're going to be paying a heck of a lot more in taxes," Councillor Moggy said. "It's not just the BWTP that can use that building.

Mr. Baumgarten reminded council of the summer concert series and the municipal-run youth theatre camp that was also housed at the Burns Wharf, with Ms. Wohlberg noting that she could bring the camp back again.

Ms. Wohlberg pointed to the many projects undertaken by the municipality recently, like the beautification of the beach, the seniors' park and the amphitheatre and encouraged them to have "courage and faith" in the Burns Wharf

The mayor wished them the same back and encouraged the Players to "not lose their vision."

An emotional Ms. Wohlberg cited "roadblocks at every

turn" by council.

"No one at this table has ever wanted the Burns Wharf (Theatre Players) to not do well," Mayor Moffatt said.
"The goal posts are shifting," Mr. Baumgarten said.

"You say there's support, but we're not feeling it."

Mayor Moffatt reminded the Players that much has shifted over the last four years, alluding to the everincreasing municipal download by the province, pointing to a multi-million-dollar revamp of the municipality's water system that must be undertaken in the next few

The delegation from BWTP ended with assurances that the two parties would sit down to work on a lease proposal.

Howland drainNortheast Town CAO Dave Williamson reviewed the final costing of the Howland drain with coun-

He reminded council that this drain goes from the lagoon, past Ferguson's property, past Jeffery's property, to the landfill, across Highway 6 and down to the Strawberry Channel.

"The final costing of constructing the drain is \$1,054,140.15," said Mr. "Of Williamson. that amount, the Ministry of Transportation is paying for \$740,000 because of the culvert going under the highway.'

Councillor Michael Erskine asked what the "bottom line" is for the town. Mr.

Williamson responded, "\$105.000."

Council carried a motion to approve the bylaw for the actual cost of the Howland

Pyette-Ferguson drain

Greg Pyette sent council a letter indicating that he was having issues on his property in regards to the Pyette-Ferguson municipal drain located on Lot 10, Consession 8 in Bidwell.

Under the drainage act, Mr. Pyette said he was giving council and the town notice that maintenance of the drain is required.

"I would like verified: if there is naturally occurring obstructions of the waterway, if there has been alterations manmade

obstructions of the waterway, if the drain was not designed or constructed properly and what corrective measures will be taken."

Mr. Williamson explained that Mr. Pyette wasn't to tile drain his field.

"The drainage superintendent inspected the drain and came back and advised staff that there are no issues with the drain and it is working as it was designed to do," said Mr. Williamson.

He said that a meeting will be held with the landowners along the drain to see if they are having shared experiences and it will be looked at to see if it is indeed a maintenance issue, otherwise it is a drain

improvement and the cost will have to be borne by Mr. Pyette alone.

Fire department

Northeast Town Fire Department Chief Duane Deschamps presented council with the November report

He noted that there had been three calls for service since his last report.

On October 27 the department responded to a fire call on Highway 540, but the fire ended up being in M'Chigeeng.

The department also responded to a fire at 40 Meredith Street, the Valu-Mart's sprinkler alarm.

On November 6, there was a strong smell of propane reported at Superior propane. When the department responded, it turned out that an employee was purging a tanker truck for servicing.

"The arena ice is running at normal capacity and staff are completing maintenance. regular said Mr. Taylor. "The Manitoulin Panthers Alumni game went well and was well attended."

This month at the recreation centre Mr. Taylor reported that the Soup to Tomatoes Program started on November 20 and that adult and child programs are starting on November 29. He also noted that there is a Canada 150 skate day

being held on December 10. Mr. Taylor said all the buildings and docks have been winterized and closed and that the parks and buildings will be monitored regularly over the winter.

For upcoming events he listed the Little Current Santa Claus Parade on December 2 and the Festival of Trees at the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah November 24 and 25.

Public Works Manager Gary May said that winter operations have started on the roads and that staff are touching up grading when the weather permits. He added that the roadside brushing had been completed for the year.

ing controls report, noting that there had been a total of 59 permits issued this year. The total value of construction to date is \$52,82727, with a total building permit revenue of \$66,888.43.



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Golden anniversary

Whitefish River First Nation celebrates 50th anniversary of band administration

WHITEFISH RIVER FIRST NATION—Whitefish River First Nation celebrated the 50th anniversary of band administration this past Saturday with a large gala for community members and neighbours following the annual Christmas parade.

The evening got started with entertainment from Elijah and the Back Burners.

A buffet dinner was served following opening prayer and remarks.

The keynote speech was given by Councillor Esther Osche, '50 Years and Going Strong.'

Councillor Osche explained in her opening remarks that she was asked to prepare a walk down memory lane as "no celebration is complete without a peek into the past to see and reminisce about our earliest beginnings."

"Long after the treaties were signed and our community was permanently established as Whitefish River First Nation No.4, the Indian Act and the Indian Agent became the first form of administration we were to experience," said Councillor Osche. "Our leaders and community members would work within this system in an effort to take care of their needs as their lives changed from a free lifestyle to a very regulated lifestyle, controlled in large part by strangers and government officials. This slowly began to change following the Great Depression and World War I and II.'

Councillor Osche said that the restrictive lifestyle created a "stirring" in the community for something better.

"Our leaders of the time saw the treaty promises fading and the society around them growing wealthy and making progress with the use of an inheritance that rightfully belonged to our people," she said. "It was a time for action and to take back our own autonomy and get more control over our own affairs once again."

The individuals of Whitefish River started to change as Indigenous people across Canada began gaining more equal rights. Councillor Osche said these changes sparked WRFN leaders to organize themselves and fight to reclaim their political rights and the power to govern themselves.

"Our leaders' successes grew because they were united and focused," she explained. "These are the days after World War II, the Indian Agent became less visible and less involved in our daily affairs. Our chiefs won and reclaimed their rights to establish their administration over their own daily affairs."

Despite reclaiming their rights to govern, Councillor Osche said there were new challenges such as financial constraints.

"Our first official administration office was opened in the home of former Chief Bill McGregor in his living room at a big desk," she shared. "There he would run the affairs of our community and attend meetings to advocate our rights and seek out funds to develop our community."

Some time in the late '50s or early '60s, Councillor Osche said that the community centre was built as the hub for the community to gather. She added that it even had a projector room for showing movies.

"When former chief Art Nah-

wegahbow took office he recurred the funds to build a small two room office addition to the community centre," Councillor Osche continued. "There were three desks and a safe and the community centre closet room served as the post office. Later the two room office made space for a small library."

One of the offices was occupied by Chief Nahwegahbow and the other office was for the administrator of the time, Jean McGregor Andrews.

Councillor Osche said that when necessary, the chief would invite the Indian Agent, Vern Robinson, who was based out of an office in Manitowaning, to a council meeting to inform the band what could be available for land development.

"When former chief Jim McGregor took office, a clerk position was opened with only one applicant applying, Dennis McGregor, who held the post for nine years," she said. "Dennis reminisced with me how there were only two phones and an old-time copier to work with. Space was limited so when Chief McGregor stepped out, Dennis would need to utilize the office to organize meeting minutes, band council resolutions and various correspondences."

In 1973, Dennis McGregor

received permission to create and distribute the first community newsletter.

In 1974 Pauline Andrews took over the role of band administer. When Chief Leona Nahwegahbow took office, she created more positions within the band administration and additions were built to the existing community centre to accommodate the growing staff.

"This was surely an exciting time of growth and without planning it, we became an all female run administration," said Councillor Osche. "Many of the positions opened held multiple jobs because of the shortage of funds, but spirits were high and folks rolled up their sleeves and dived into the work. It was great to work for community development and see the community beginning to really grow."

The administration continued to grow when Chief Franklin Paibomsai took office and the office space expanded with the changes.

"I remember one time a carpenter saying if we built one more addition and changed the roof again we might be mistaken for a flying unidentified object from sky view," she with a laugh. "Yes we had grown, and now we had outgrown our humble beginnings. Down came the old wall

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














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Providence Bay News and Notes

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Debajehmujig celebrates Premier's Award with Christmas retrospective

MANITOWANING—To say that winning the 2017 Premier's Award for Excellence in the Arts left the Debajehmujig Storytellers troupe giddy might be a bit of an overstatement (they are a pretty excitable bunch at the quietest of times), but that isn't so far off the truth—so small wonder they decided that this year's Christmas dinner and a show would focus on the accomplishments of the past three-and-a-half decades.

"Well, we figured out it isn't quite 35 years," admitted Debaj artistic director Joe Osawabine, "that isn't until next year." But then they checked their poetic licence, saw it was fully up to date, and forged ahead.

Each of the Debajehmujig Storytellers troupe was encouraged to think back upon their favourite scene over the course of the past 34 years and to put together a vignette featuring that scene. The wealth of possibilities lay out before them and the crew rolled up their sleeves and

"The original plan was to put on Tomson Highway's 'The Rez Sisters'," admitted Mr. Osawabine, but in the end the logistics and cost proved too daunting. "We figured that in order to fully cast the play, we would have to bring in some artists from places like Toronto and that would have cost upwards of \$10,000 to \$12,000. Kind of counterproductive for a fundraiser. But when we thought of this idea it actually seemed more appropriate."

So the 35-year retrospective, minus one, will take to the stage for dinner theatre on December 11 through 14 for business Christmas parties, with public shows on December 15 and 21.

'There are at least a dozen pieces, from past productions, including 'Elders Gone AWOL,' 'Indian Affairs,' and the 'Rez Sisters' being prepared for the retrospective," said Mr. Osawabine. "In addition, Audrey (Wemigwans, 30-year plus Debaj veteran) and I will be relating inter-spliced anecdotal stories from our experiences through the years."

The progressive development of Debajehmujig down through three-and-a-half decades has been impressive as they moved from a somewhat traditionally structured theatre troupe to the holistic land-based artistic organization that it is today.

The dinner theatre production will feature tables of 10, with smaller groups sharing tables and larger organizations sometimes booking the entire night. "We have one booking that will be offsite, taking place at the new Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current," he said. "Our capacity here at the Creation Centre in Manitowaning is about 100.'

Mr. Osawabine said that Debaj was also excited to be presenting the 'New Constellation' show at the Creation Centre tonight (Wednesday, December 29), with two showings at 7:30 pm and 9 pm. "Those shows are close to being sold out already," said Mr. Osawabine. "The young guys in our company tell me that July Talk is a really big name these days."

July Talk consists of singers Peter Dreimanis and Leah Fay, guitarist Ian Docherty, bassist Josh Warburton and drummer Danny Miles and has been taking the alt-rock scene by storm since being formed in Toronto in 2012.

The Debajehmujig Storytellers Christmas show is entitled '3 Decades of Debaj'ery' and features an evening of dinner theatre costing \$45 per person. Dates for booking staff parties are December 11 through 14 and December 18-20 (December 18 is fully booked). Performances with no dinner will take place Friday, December 15 and Thursday, December 21 at \$25/seat.

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
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






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Sometimes, when it comes to baking cookies that are really special, I bite the bullet and go all the way, white flour, white sugar and butter. A marriage made in heaven. This holiday season I found two new recipes that will go into my file as "make every year and share." They are delicious.

Coconut Apricot Cookies

I changed the recipe to suit me. I used unsweetened coconut flakes (using sweetened desiccated coconut makes them super sweet) which give the cookies more "chew." Try and find apricots or mangoes that don't have sugar added to them. Read the ingredient list on the back, it should just say apricots or mangoes! Use whatever nuts you like but make sure they are chopped. This recipe calls for rolling the dough into a log, then chilling, then slicing. I didn't

have time so I formed the dough into small balls, pressed them into thin circles with a fork and baked.

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 1/2 tsp baking powder

3/4 cup butter, at room temperature

1 cup granulated sugar

1 egg

1 1/2 cup sweetened, desiccated coconut

1/2 cup chopped dried apricots or mango

1/2 cup coarsely chopped almonds, hazelnuts or

1. Preheat oven to 325°F.

2. In a medium bowl, stir flour with baking powder until evenly mixed. In a large bowl, using an electric mixer beat butter with granulated sugar at least 2 minutes. Beat in egg, scraping down side of bowl as necessary. On low speed or using a wooden spoon, gradually stir flour mixture into butter mixture until evenly mixed. Stir in coconut, almonds and apricots.

3. Divide dough into 4 portions (or follow my directions). Shape each into a rectangular or round log about 6 inch long and 11/4 inch wide. Wrap in plastic wrap. Refrigerate until firm, at least 1 hour or up to a week. Or seal in a plastic bag and freeze up to 1 month.

4. To bake, remove wrapped logs from refrigerator and let stand at room temperature for about 15 min. so they're easier to slice. With a serrated knife, using a gentle sawing motion, slice into rectangles or rounds about 1/3 inch thick. Spread slices out on a parchment lined baking sheet.

5. Bake in centre of oven until cookie edges are lightly browned from 8 to 10 minutes. Remove cookies to a rack and let cool completely. Cookies will keep in the refrigerator up to 2 weeks or in the freezer up to 1 month. Good luck on keeping them that long!

Mini Fruit Cake Balls

No baking for this recipe! Great for snacks—your own healthy granola bar in a ball. The secret in keeping the dough together is in how fine you grind the ingredients in the food processor.

1/2 cup almonds

1/2 unsweetened coconut

1/4 cup cashews

1/2 cup pitted packed dates, chopped

1 tsp almond extract

1 Tbsp orange zest

1 Tbsp lemon zest

1/3 cup mixed dried fruit with no added sugar (goji berries, mulberries, raisins)

1 Tbsp lemon juice

1/4 cup fresh orange juice

1/4 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Frosting Ingredients:

2 Tbsp melted coconut butter (small squares of solid coconut)

1 Tbsp raw cashew butter or almond

2 Tbsp melted coconut oil

1 Tbsp maple syrup

1. Soak the dried fruit in the lemon and orange juice for about 1 hour or overnight to soften and absorb the flavours. Strain the fruit but keep the juice.

2. Grind the almonds, cashews, and coconut down to crumbs in the food processor. Add the dates, extract, and zests. Process until the dates are broken down and the mixture is combined.

Add the soaked fruit mixture and pulse several times to incorporate it. Add up to 1 Tbsp of the juice as needed to create a dough that holds together. Stir in the pecans by hand. If it doesn't hold together mix in some more of the juice.

3. Using a small scoop to create balls of dough place them onto a parchment paper-lined tray. Place in the freezer while making the frosting.

Frosting instructions:

Place all ingredients together in a bowl set over a pot of hot water to melt. Whisk together, then set aside to cool. While cooling whisk periodically until it starts to thicken slightly, about 10 minutes. Pour a little over each chilled ball and it will firm up quickly. store in the



MINDEMOYA—There is no shortage of good quality restaurants on the Manitoulin and Islanders will be happy to know that another has opened in Mindemoya. Dubbed Miller Tyme, the new family eatery replaces the Roosterant that has been closed for some time.

The signs for the new business, created by Julie Beacon, reflect Mr. Miller's passion for fishing as do the walls inside the building that sport rods and antique reels. When asked about his favourite kind of fishing, Mr. Miller replied, "I like everything and anything."

Roger Miller and his wife Kim have always wanted to have their own business and their wish became a reality when they moved here in September. The Millers are from Brantford and had been coming to stay at Island Spring Cottages for over 25 years. They have one daughter, Kassandra, who attends Haileybury College where she is enrolled in the veterinary technician three year course.

Mr. Miller became a chef at the age of 22 and has been in the restaurant business

since he was 16. He has worked at different spots in southern Ontario and has spent the last 13 years at the Brantford Golf and Country Club.
