Elementary teachers reach 11th hour pact, end job action

TORONTO—The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) is advising its members to suspend strike action in light of a tentative agreement that has been reached with the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA) and the provincial government.

"If you saw my face today there was certainly a smile on it," said Charles C. McLean teacher and ETFO steward Heather Jefkins, who was joined in a rainy day rally by dozens of teachers held on the Highway 6 sidewalk outside the Little Current recreation centre late last week.

ETFO members have been without a contract over 14 months, the last contract expired

on August 31, 2014.

"This round of bargaining has been exceptionally lengthy and

Minister of Health assures Expositor of continuity of care for patients

MANITOULIN—Opiate addiction doctors on Manitoulin (Dr. Dressler, providing service to the M'Chigeeng Health Centre and Northeastern Manitoulin Family Health Team, and Dr. Sankey, providing service through the Sunrise Clinic in Wikwemikong) have notified patients that they will be withdrawing services on the Island and have referred patients to their offices in Sudbury. This change has left Island health organizations scrambling to come up with solutions for patients, but the Minister of Health and Long Term Care Dr. Eric Hoskins has ensured a continuity of care for Manitoulin methadone patients.

"Our first priority is to ensure

the 150 individuals (opiate addiction patients) are supported and their continuity of care," Minister Hoskins told The Expositor during a Monday afternoon phone interview. "We are working with the communities and we are confident we are going to be able to provide support and make the transition as convenient as possible."

"Wikwemikong has a new doctor (Dr. Koka) already working at their clinic in the community and M'Chigeeng is also in conversations with the same doctor and is hoping that he can provide the same service in their community," continued Minister Hoskins. "Dr. Dressler has agreed to continue providing

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—With the sound of happy children playing in the background, Anishinabek Nation (Union of Ontario Indians) Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee, who is the campaign champion for the Healthy Kids Community Challenge, welcomed everyone to the launch of the Manitoulin's Healthy Kids Community Challenge campaign.

"This is an approach we should probably take in the other areas of health in our communities," suggested Chief Madahbee, "the preventative approach."

In his address, Chief Madahbee noted that a lot of the habits we develop and continue into adolescent and adult behaviours are formed when we are children. Chief Madahbee noted that he has seen tremendous changes amongst the activities of children in his own community.

"I am shocked when I hear that nobody goes to the apple trees up on the hill anymore," he said, noting that the wonders of the bush surrounding the community remain largely unexplored by the children in the community. "I am of an age when our parents would send us outside in the morning and we were not expected home until suppertime."

A program that seeks to turn that sedentary lifestyle on its head and encourages children to "run, jump and play," is long overdue, he

MANITOULIN—The Little Current refugee steering committee was jubilant with the news that they have been approved for the Eritrean family they are sponsoring and plans are advancing well to prepare for their arrival.

"We have a family," said group coordinator Linda

Erskine. "We have confirmed that it will be a widow and her six children, three sons and three daughters."

The family consists of the 54-year-old widow and her three sons aged 19, 25 and 30 and three daughters 7, 11 and 15. They are Eritrean refugees currently

Derek Debassige honoured as a McMaster distinguished alumni

HAMILTON—Every other year since 2013 McMaster University has embarked on an initiative to honour its distinguished alumni. This year, the second in which such recognition has been preferred, Derek Debassige of M'Chigeeng First Nation was recognized as a 2015 PT (physiotherapist) Distinguished Alumni Recipient. Mr. Debassige graduated from McMaster with a BHSc(PT) (Bachelor of Health Sciences) in

"I was kind of surprised by it," admitted Mr. Debassige. "You find vourself in the trenches, doing the work and you are not really sure anyone notices.

As surprises go, the phone call informing Mr. Debassige that he was selected certainly falls into the category of pleasant. "It's nice," he admitted. "It's been 15 years since I graduated from McMaster and it was great to go back for the dinner and ceremo-

Mr. Debassige said that he found the McMaster of today had changed considerably, remaining the same. "It is just as exciting a place to be as it was then," he said, "but there are a lot of new buildings and the student population has grown.'

As to whether anyone had been noticing his work "in the trenches" any question was soon dispelled. "They start reading off the list of the work you have done," said Mr. Debassige. It is an impressive list. While he has been deeply immersed in his work, the physiotherapist has contributed

articles furthering the understanding of his profession, been appointed to the board of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine and regularly hosts students in his clinics.

Not only has he contributed to his profession, Mr. Debassige is an active member of his community, having been elected to the M'Chigeeng First Nation Band Council in 2013 and was appointed as chair of the community's Health Services Committee.

"Mac students have always been known for being very versatile," noted Mr. Debassige, whose other "stream" at McMaster involved playing on the volleyball team, a highly regarded varsity team that is noted for producing some of top Canada's Olympic athletes in volleyball.

Just as any dedicated health professional, Mr. Debassige is embarked on a lifelong learning process. "You have to like reading," he laughed. "There is a lot going on in the field all the time, things are constantly changing and we are learning more about how the human body works all the time. You might as well like it, because you are going to be a lifelong learner whether you like it or not. It is important to be passionate about what you are doing and staying on top of the field.'

As he networked with some new friends and reconnected with old, Mr. Debassige admitted that it was gratifying to see his photograph hanging on the wall at his alma mater, recognized as a distinguished alumnus.

Sheguiandah election

EDITOR'S NOTE: This weekend, members of the Sheguiandah First Nation will head to the polls to elect a new chief and council. Three are running for the position of chief: Andrew Aguonie, Orville

Aguonie and Ron Aguonia (Neganiwina). Orville Aguonie's interview before the Friday election follows here. Despite repeated attempts to contact the other candidate, this newspaper was unable to reach them.

Andrew Aguonie: Keeping on the path of community healing in Sheguiandah

SHEGUIANDAH—Andrew Aguonie has two main platform planks in running for the position of chief of Sheguiandah First Nation. "I would like to keep things much the same," he said, "and enhance what is there." But first and foremost amongst those areas in which he would like to see enhancements are education and housing.



"Those are the most press- Andrew Aguonie ing areas of need in our community," he said. "If we are going to prosper as a community, if our members are going to be able to get ahead, they need to have the education that qualifies them for better paying jobs, and everybody needs to have a place to

Mr. Aguonie, a father of four, is currently employed in construction, but he spent many years working as a youth mental health worker at Enaahteg Healing Lodge in Victoria Harbour, in

"I approach everything with kindness and respect," he said. "That is what Anishinaabek means, kind people. Be kind in everything you do."

The candidate notes that most of the skillset he brings to the council table is based on "general lifeskills," but that his approach to dealing with issues in the community are founded on the principle of putting people before the paper. "We are dealing with peoples' lives," he said. "We have to separate that from the dollars." The focus must be on people and their needs first.

Mr. Aguonie said that healing is one of the things that the Sheguiandah community needs. "It is one of the things we have to look at," he said. "We have to find our way to a point where people are not afraid of each other." Mr. Aguonie said that "if we can open dialogues between ourselves, keep the peace and remain civil to each other," the community can start to build the bridges that will close the rifts that have plagued the community for years.

One of the first tasks facing the new council will be economic development," said Mr. Aguonie. "We need jobs for our community members." He pointed out that the band has a large amount of heavy equipment that could be leveraged, with band members educated in their proper use, to look at taking on off-reserve building projects.

Funding transparency a must for Sheguiandah FN moving forward: Orville Aguonie

SHEGUIANDAH—Orville Aguonie says he is ready to bring his past years of experience—four as a band councillor and four as chief—back to the table to once again serve his community of Sheguiandah First Nation as chief.

"With my previous experience, I plan to hit the ground running," Mr. Aguonie told The Expositor. "I know what needs to be done.'

If elected, Mr. Aguonie plans to implement a custom election policy "to get out from under the Indian Act so the community decides how council is elected." This, he says, would be tailored to the community's needs.

He would also enact a code of conduct for chief and council, which would also be voted on by the community. "This would set the stage for how chief and council governs, like mandatory monthly meetings," Mr. Aguonie explains.

'We have so many issues on our reserve—the single biggest one is corruption," Mr. Aguonie claims, pointing to redirected government funds, employees being hired without funding and pre-election home renovations. He also pointed to the half-million dollars, the community's portion of the Northland Power wind farm money, that was, he says, claimed one year ago. "Where has it been spent?" he asks.
From his previous time as chief, Mr. Aguonie said

there are numerous projects that were started but never finished due to the protests of two band councillors that all but shut down band council proceedings in 2012. One of these is a 48-lot subdivision housing plan that would see lots developed and then built upon as needed. For economic development, he pointed to a grant awarded to the First Nation to see the roundhouse up and running as a business, with plans stopped during the protest.

"I'm also really looking at agriculture," Mr. Aguonie says. The Sheguiandah First Nation owns 600 acres of farmland that he would like to see developed into a sustainable farming venture that could provide jobs as well as affordable, good food for the

Land claims is another issue Mr. Aguonie would like to see brought to the forefront. "There are a

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin is blessed with many outstanding young members of the Island community who deserve to be recognized for their accomplishments and contributions and the 35th Annual Ontario Junior Citizen of the Year Awards, coordinated by the Ontario Community Newspapers Association (OCNA) of which The Expositor is a proud member, provides an ideal opportunity to recognize these exceptional young citizens.

The Ontario Junior Citizen of the Year Awards recognize individuals between the ages of six and 17 (no older than 17 by the November 30 deadline) who are working hard to make their community a better place by volunteering for various organizations, making donations, saving lives and maintaining top grade aver-

The Expositor urges members of the community to nominate these young people of Manitoulin in one of the five areas of the award: a person involved in worthwhile community service; a special young person contributing to their community while living with a physical or psychological limitation; an individual who has performed an act of heroism

each recognized for their contributions in 2010; Kristina Renwick of Little Current has been chosen as Manitoulin's nominee for the 2011; and Blake Priddle of Espanola, who has Manitoulin family connections nominated in

The Manitoulin Expositor also recognized Skylar Trimmer (aged six at the time) in 2005 for his efforts in saving his father's life, although Skylar (who was nominated by Les Fields of Manitowaning) was a year too young to make the official shortlist for the provincial award, he most certainly was deserving of recognition for keeping his head at such a young age and saving a life through his heroic efforts.

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

Job ideas for Island-sponsored refugee adults anticipated

mitted individuals are currently meeting in small groups with a view to hosting refugee families fleeing parts of the world where their safety is in peril because of civil strife. In all likelihood, there will be (at least) three such families among us and this could happen very soon.

Many people will remember that, about 35 years ago, St. Bernard's Catholic parish in Little Current sponsored a Vietnamese refugee family from the aptly-named "boat people" cadre who were fleeing their homeland in the flimsiest of crafts, subject to harassment and intimidation by pirates. In the same way, refugees are currently leaving the chaos of their lives in war-torn Syria and Eritrea, among other nations, and are bobbing across the Mediterranean Sea to the clos-

As with the Vietnamese boat people of the late 1970s and early 1980s, modern-day refugees are also often subject to the bullying tactics of foreign government officials (in the countries they're escaping through) and cruel opportunists who charge them more than they can afford in return for a hazardous boat ride.

It is almost certain that any refugee families who will find refuge in Manitoulin's communities will have their own personal versions of these kinds of experiences so we must be prepared to demonstrate to them the personal safety that Canada, with its rule of law and Charter of Rights and Freedoms traditions, affords.

That is the very least that will be required of us.

Refugee sponsorships are a one-year commitment while these newcomers find their feet in our country and come to terms with a new language, social norms, new and different food, placing their children in our local schools and all the rest.

As much as possible, it is practical and useful for adult members of refugee families coming to live among us to be able to find employment. Besides the obvious advantage of having some income, workplace experiences are important in mastering a new language and in becoming socialized in a new country and culture.

The Little Current community offered the significant adult mem-

ber of the Vietnamese boat family (their family name was Luong) work in a restaurant. As it happens, adults in a Syrian refugee family currently being sponsored in nearby Massey have also found employment in a restaurant there while their children are attending the local elementary school, a useful model for Manitoulin Island and its upcoming sponsorships.

There is no questions that finding employment for people who may not have much (or any) facility in the English language will be one of the difficult hurdles the sponsoring groups may have to face so resourceful thinking on this important topic must be a priority beginning right away.

One thoughtful person who has already been thinking about this has suggested that there could be hundreds of small jobs available locally in assisting elderly people who are still living in their own homes and who require a myriad of basic support services to enable them to continue to do so.

Such services, he suggested, would not only be of useful social benefit to the elderly people on the receiving end but would also be useful entry-level jobs for refugees while they gain their footing in a new homeland, giving them some income and social and workplace experiences in the process.

An obvious corollary to this line of thinking would be for the sponsoring groups to determine ways and means of transportation to and from the work available at seniors' homes and these are precisely the sorts of challenges that will be faced and for which remedies will be found by people of good will.

This is just one example of the practical thinking in which people are already engaged on Manitoulin as we anticipate giving a home to, for a while, families from unimaginably difficult circumstances.

A rebuttal to climate change skeptics

Without changing course humans will be the dominant cause of the next mass extinction

To the Expositor:

The letter to the editor 'Climate change and the fog horns' (October 14) begs a reply. The author claims that warnings of climate change are based on "voodoo" science. Let's check the basic science. Carbon dioxide and nitrous oxides absorb heat, a discovery made by John Tyndall in 1861. In the atmosphere, these gases prevent heat from escaping into space as it would otherwise. That's why they were dubbed "greenhouse

Ignoring the basic science, climate change skeptics cherry-pick observed data or misrepresent research to make their case. It reminds me of the controversy in the 1960s over whether smoking causes cancer. The fact is that greenhouse gases act like a blanket around the Earth. And burning fossil fuels creates greenhouse gases.

Some skeptics admit the climate is changing but say the greenhouse gases we create are insignificant. The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), sifting through thousands of scientific studies, concluded it is extremely likely that human activity has been the dominant cause of global warming (my emphasis). In plain words, the climate is changing and we are the main reason. Why? Mostly because we're burning huge amounts of fossil fuels and have been for decades.

Left unchecked, global warming will profoundly affect life on Earth. People can prepare in a myriad of ways, from air conditioning to new irrigation systems to levees along coastal cities, to accepting refugees from flooded or drought-plagued countries. We can and should prepare to mitigate the consequences to society. But we can't prepare nature.

Left unchecked, climate change will doom many species to extinction.

So we also need to tackle the problem at the source. Ignoring the source is like putting on a life jacket in a leaky boat instead of plugging the hole. And there is a tipping point. Already feedback loops are starting to accelerate the rate of global warming. For example, white polar ice reflects the sun's energy back into space, but when it melts, the water and land exposed absorb more of the sun's heat, adding to global

I think most people now recognize the connection between greenhouse gases, global warming and climate change. But there is a huge disconnect between what we know and our actions. We know that fossil fuels are the problem, but at the same time we blithely use more and more. Do people realize the connection between climate change and the extinction of species? Do people feel powerless? Or is it that we just don't care?

We need to stop using fossil fuels and invest in alternatives. In Canada we need to stop expanding the tar sands and ditch plans for more pipelines. We need to push our new Liberal government for action at home and at the international conference on climate change in Decem-

If we don't act, we humans will become the dominant cause of the Earth's next big extinction event.

Full house engages at Kenjgewin Teg Annual TRC Teach-in

M'CHIGEENG—The Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) Truth and Reconciliation 9th Annual Teach-in saw a packed house on Friday, October 23. Organizers of the teach-in expressed satisfaction that those attending the event came from a wide range of demographics.

"That is what we had aimed for," noted KTEI Director of Business and Training Beverley Roy-Carter. "It is good to see people from so many different communities coming out to learn more about the Truth and Reconciliation Commission report and what it means going forward."

The event was opened by elder Gloria Oshkabewisens-McGregor, Mukwa Dodem (Bear Clan), one of KTEI's Anishinabek traditional knowledge holders, who also provided the closing teachings focussed on 'An Understanding of Reconciliation' and filling the void within through the Seven Grandfathers connection to the body.

The keynote speaker for the teach-in was Joan Riggs, a founding partner of Catalyst Research and Communications who teaches for Ryerson University and the First Nations Technical Institute, and Gloria Oshkabewisens-McGregor.

The teach-in focussed on the questions of "What has the TRC report process told us?", "How does this report apply to our community and day-to-day work and lives?" and "Moving the Report Forward."

Ms. Riggs began by providing an overview of the major findings and 94 recommendations of the TRC report and what the potential impacts might be on government policy as a result of the report for First Nations and for Canadians in general and what the response has been from the government and Canadians.

There were high points and low points during the TRC process, with the first gathering in Winnipeg posting an unmitigated disaster. "I refused to be part of that event because I could see where it was heading,"

said Ms. Riggs, a result that she suggested came about in part because of the sheer volume of survivors that came out to tell their stories at that first gathering. She explained that there were so many survivors at the first event that they were forced to sit in rows, harkening back to how they were forced to sit while attending residential schools. The result was that "They were traumatized and there were not enough support people and elders there to counsel and support the survivors." Worse, having steeled themselves to provide their stories, hundreds of those survivors attending the Winnipeg gathering found that, due to the numbers attending, many were unable to make their statements.

The second event in Inuvik was better, admitted Ms. Riggs. In fact, as time went on the TRC learned to improve what was and

Solutions other than bounties exist for coyote control

Association for the Protection of Fur Bearing Animals offers alternatives

To the Expositor:

Re: Farmers demand wolf bounty back following loss of sheep to coyotes (October 28, Page 1).

Landowners who are struggling to manage wildlife conflict are right to be frustrated–particularly when what they believe to be an easy answer seems readily available, yet not utilized. But your article on coyote depredation in Manitoulin lacked several solutions that are available – and would avoid the devastation of a bounty.

 $Bounties\ or\ culls\ can\ wreak\ havoc\ on\ ecosystems,\ partic-$

ularly with science now showing conclusively that they are ineffective at eliminating or even reducing conflict. Further, coyote (including the unique Eastern coyote) populations are now known to actually increase in size when persecuted.

Utilizing livestock guardian dogs, patrols with shepherds, hazing techniques, and other non-lethal measures such as noisemakers and motion-sensor activated lights or sprinklers, can virtually eliminate depredation by coyotes on livestock.

The Association for the Protection of Fur-Bearing Animals is willing and able to connect individual landowners or communities in Manitoulin and across Canada with resources on any of these options. More can learned at www.TheFurBearers.com.

Claim that the loss of 50 residency positions doesn't impact access misleading

We cannot afford to lose physicians in the North

To the Expositor:

A recent article discussing the increase of five residency positions in the North, but the overall reduction of 50 residency positions in Ontario not affecting access to care is misleading. The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care has cut physician services by almost seven per cent this year and as a result Ontario's publicly-funded health care system will be put under immense strain and patient care will suffer. Yet, the ministry continues to refuse to resume negotiations with the Ontario Medical Association, the association that represents the doctors of this province.

Minister of Health Dr. Eric Hoskins claim that the ministry is committed to helping regions with high needs and that the ministry will make evidence based-decisions in health care planning is also misleading. I have represented

rural physicians across the province at the Ontario Medical Association for the last four years and at no time has the ministry approached us about improving sorely needed health care resources and reform in rural communities. In fact, the ministry has made cuts to rural health care.

Not only is the population of Ontario growing and aging, so is the average age of Ontario's physicians. It does not take much foresight to know that the physician shortage of the last 10 years will return. In larger, southern communities, patients can expect to see increasing difficulty accessing care. In smaller communities, like those on Manitoulin, a doctor shortage can become a crisis with only one or two physicians relocating or retiring, leaving many patients with no reasonable access to a doctor.

Physicians are mobile; within the province, across the

nation and around the world. We cannot afford to lose physicians in the North. By only moderately increasing the number of residency positions in the North, yet reducing them across the province; by dramatically cutting physician services by seven per cent this year; and by refusing to have meaningful discussions with the OMA about care, the ministry is hurting patient care everywhere, including the North. The residency reduction is not a gain for the North it is a loss for all of us.

Spring bear hunt returns

MANITOULIN—Ontario is proposing an expanded spring bear hunting pilot program to gather further information to assess concerns voiced by Northern communities about humanbear conflicts, and to support economic growth and tourism in Northern Ontario. This includes Manitoulin Island.

The proposed spring bear hunt pilot expansion, now available for public comment on Ontario's Environmental Registry, would include: extending the pilot by an additional five years, through to 2020, to all 88 wildlife management units that currently have a fall bear hunt (Manitoulin is one of them) and be made available to non-resident hunters.

Under the expanded pilot proposal, it would still be illegal to hunt bear cubs and females with cubs. Anyone convicted of this offence could face a fine of up to \$25,000 and up to oneyear imprisonment. In most cases, each licenced hunter would only be allowed to hunt one bear in each calendar year. Baiting of bears during all bear hunting seasons would be regulated to help address possible public safety con-

"Managing the bear population responsibly through an expanded pilot program would allow us to

gather further information to assess the impacts of an early black bear season on concerns voiced by Northern communities about human-bear conflicts, and to support economic growth and tourism in Northern Ontario," said Bill Mauro, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, in a press release.

Bobby Tuomi, a former spring bear hunt guide of Kagawong, is pleased at the province's decision. "I'd say congrats to whoever brought it back," he said.

"There were three of us that ran a (spring bear hunt) business here," Mr. Tuomi explained. "We did well."

He noted that the fall is a hard time to hunt bear. "Food sources are pretty decent on Manitoulin—there are acorns and apples in abundance."

Manitoulin has never been a hot spot for bear hunting, Mr. Tuomi continued, adding that there are not many who are knowledgeable in the ways of the hunt.

As for places like Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie which report problems of nuisance bears on a regular basis, Mr. Tuomi said that the spring hunt will definitely alleviate the issue, and bring tourist dollars back.

"There is potential here, it's just a matter of getting into it," he added.

The ministry states that Ontario is home to a healthy and sustainable black bear population with up to 105,000 black bears living in the province.

Currently across Canada, each province and territory with black bears has a spring and fall bear hunt except Nova Scotia and Ontario, which only have fall hunts.

For 2014 and 2015, Ontario held a two-year bear management pilot program in eight wildlife management units, all of which reported high levels of nuisance bear activities. The hunt was open to Ontario residents from May 1 to June 15. Communities in and around these units include Timmins, Thunder Bay, Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie and North Bay.

Justin Trudeau and cabinet to be sworn in at Rideau Hall

OTTAWA—Liberal leader Justin Trudeau will be making history at Rideau Hall this morning (Wednesday, November 4) as Governor General David Johnston presides over the swearing in of the new Trudeau government. Mr. Trudeau will not only become Canada's 23rd prime minister, replacing Stephen Harper after the Liberals defeated the Conservatives in the October 19 election, but he will be the first son of a former prime minister to be sworn in as a prime minister in his own

Mr. Trudeau and what is expected to be a 25-member cabinet will be sworn in at Rideau Hall and members of the public have been invited to watch Trudeau and other members of Parliament arrive for the event. The arrivals have been open to the public for the last several years, but there was no public announcement of that invitation.

The swearing-in ceremony, beginning at 10:30 am Eastern Time, is to be followed by an official photo session with the governor general, the new prime minister and his new government ministers. There has been much conjecture

as to who be standing beside the new prime minister in that photo.

As to who he will anoint as his cabinet ministers, especially with the embarrassment of riches afforded by his majority win that includes a number of former government ministers from previous Liberal governments, there are many new faces with prestigious credentials on their curriculum vitae.

The incoming prime minister vowed to make his cabinet gender-balanced, with equal numbers of men and women, during his election campaigning, but he has also hinted that his cabinet will be smaller than what has been seen in recent years. His job will be made somewhat easier by the record number of female MPs, that number is 50 and comprises 27 percent of the 184 Liberals elected on October 19.

Mr. Trudeau has a number of challenges facing him due to his broader promise to craft his cabinet to reflect the face of Canada today, but the strong contingent of minority members elected under the Liberal banner, including former cabinet ministers, will make that somewhat easier.

Whoever becomes indus-

try minister at the ceremony will also take on responsibility as the country's registrar general and be presented by the Governor General with the Great Seal of Canada. At today's swearing in ceremony, Mr. Trudeau and his new ministers will be following a time honoured tradition that includes the Oath of Allegiance, an Oath of the Members of the Privy Council for those who are not already members and an Oath of Office.

The oaths, which end in "so help me God," can be altered should individuals chose to "affirm" their oath, in which case the word "swear" is replaced by the word "declare," and the expression "so help me God" is omitted.

Outgoing Prime Minister Stephen Harper will have submitted his resignation to the Governor General shortly before the signing in ceremony.

Mr. Harper had 26 cabinet ministers, and an additional 12 ministers of state or junior posts, in his cabinet. Of those, women held 12 portfolios, including transport, environment, public works and labour.

The first election of a woman to Parliament was in 1921, when Agnes

Macphail, a 31-year-old school teacher, was the first woman to sit in the House of Commons. It would take more than 30 years for the first woman to be appointed to cabinet—Ellen Fair-clough, who was named to the cabinet of John Diefenbaker in 1957 and who went on to hold the portfolios of postmaster general and secretary of state of Canada

The new prime minister's father, Pierre Elliott Trudeau, appointed three women to his 1968 cabinet, while Brian Mulroney had 11 women serve in his cabinet during his time in office and Jean Chrétien had 16 female ministers.

As to aboriginal representation around the cabinet table, the Liberals saw eight of their 18 aboriginal candidates win a seat in the House of Commons, including Yvonne Jones (Inuit) in Labrador, Michael McLeod (Métis) in the Northwest Territories, Vance Badawey (Métis) in Niagara Centre, Robert-Falcon Ouellette (Cree) in Winnipeg Centre, Don Rus-(Anishinaabe) in Thunder Bay-Rainy River, Hunter Tootoo (Inuit) in Nunavut, Dan Vandal (Métis) in Saint Boniface-Saint Vital, Manitoba, and

Jody Wilson-Raybould (Kwakwaka'wakw) of Vancouver Granville, a former Crown prosecutor, treaty commissioner and regional chief of the BC Assembly of First Nations.

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

remains a very traumatic experience less onerous on those attending.

One of the seminal events to take place during this period was the unveiling of a stained glass window designed by renowned Metis artist Christi Belcourt. This stained glass window, filled with poignant symbols, now resides in the central foyer of Centre Block in the House of Parliament.

"The apology was just words," noted one survivor. "This was real."

"When the parliamentarians come out of the House, they see that window," rejoined another.

By the time the TRC hit Saskatoon, it had become a very powerful gathering, and when the Vancouver gathering took place in that city in the fall of 2013, that community dedicated a week to recognizing the work of the TRC.

"There were 60,000 people who came out in the rain in a show of support for the cause," said Ms. Riggs. "This is what we can do when we come together as a community."

The final gathering took place in March 2015 in Edmonton and by then the TRC had largely gotten the process right, the importance to the reconciliation process of events such as the KTEI Teach-in in helping to build bridges between mainstream Canada and the indigenous peoples on whose territories the nation was founded was clearly demonstrated by Ms. Riggs when she relayed the anecdotal experiences from a snap survey done on the streets of Edmonton, when it was hosting that final seventh gathering, following on years of media exposure. "Less than 50 percent of Edmontonians knew about the TRC and what it meant," she noted, surmising those results suggest that "when you are in a place of privilege, you can avoid seeing."

"This is a part of your history as Canadians," said Ms. Riggs. "That so many people still do not know the truth tells us that there is still a lot more to do."

"Today," noted Ms. Riggs, "there are more aboriginal children apprehended (in care by child protection agencies) than were in the residential school system." The issue, she noted, is far from over, even though the last residential school closed its doors in

1996. "Not so long ago," she said.

More children died in care during the reign of the residential school system (one in 25) than died fighting in WWII (one in 26), noted Ms. Riggs. "Today, every small community has a memorial to the fallen in the war." But those fallen in the residential school system remain unremarked in most, if not all, communities.

Following Ms. Rigg's presentation on the chronology of the TRC process and its recommendations, those attending formed into smaller circles to work on an exercise to create a pictorial representation of the impact of the residential school system on our communities and every day lives.

Many of those pictorial representations focussed on the plight of the more than 1,200 murdered and missing Native women and the need for a national inquiry, the loss (and revitalization) of culture and language.

As part of the 'Moving the Report Forward' part of the teach-in, the combined group put together a draft of a letter to the prime minister designate, Justin Trudeau, calling on him to honour his pledges to build a renewed relationship with indigenous peoples. The letter will be distributed to those attending the teachin to send in to the incoming prime minister and to the Ontario premier,

as many of the concerns outlined impinge on areas of provincial responsibilities.

Elder Oshkabewisens-McGregor took the assembly through a presentation focussed on the teachings of the Seven Grandfathers, their relationship to the parts of the body and how the teachings can assist in filling the void created within by the impact of the residential school system and hundreds of years of genocidal policies imposed by the government and various church organizations.

An honour song was sung for the two residential survivors who were in attendance at the KTEI Teach-in before the conclusion of the event.

Ms. Riggs noted that the reconciliation process will be ongoing but as it stands, funding for the work of reconciliation and the social service programs aimed at survivors and their descendants has ended. The work going forward will have to become part of the curriculum in school systems and integral to the fabric of the social service systems across the nation.

It is not yet certain whether the KTEI Teach-ins will be able to continue, but Ms. Roy-Carter said that it was the hope that they could continue in some form in future years

...continued from page 1 service in the community until November 20, as they work to find a replacement doctor."

Effective November 5, the 26 patients of the Northeastern Manitoulin Family Health Team (FHT) will be accessing the services of Dr. Dressler at his Espanola clinic at the Espanola Family Health Team.

Espanola FHT Manager Jon Brunette confirmed that Dr. Dressler's Northeastern Manitoulin FHT patients would be transferring to Dr. Dressler's care at the Espanola FHT.

"He will be moving his clinics to Friday, which is a less busy day here, in order to mediate interference with our other patients," said Mr. Brunette.

When asked if funding will be provided to assist individuals having to travel to Espanola or to the First Nation communities to provide a replacement doctor, the minister responded that he has asked his ministry to look into both.

"On October 1, 2015, changes were made to the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) billing schedule," states a press release from the FHT. "This change affects physicians who are working in methadone clinics. Physicians saw their billable services revenue cut by roughly 30 percent. The this consequence of change is that smaller programs, with fewer than 50 patients, are no longer financially viable for stand-alone physicians, those not associated with a company.'

Manitoulin Health Centre Chief of Staff, Dr. Stephen Cooper, who is also the acting chair of the Rural Expert Panel of the Ontario Medical Association, further explained this change to The Expositor.

"The government has cut physician fees three times since 2012 alone," explained Dr. Cooper. "This fall the government made the decision to make further cuts and chose specific areas, one of which was the fee for urine testing."

He shared that with the classic doctor fee for service structure, doctors can bill OHIP for appointments with patients as well as urine tests.

Methadone patients are required to do urine screening from once a week to two times a week depending on the patient's treatment and how long the patient has avoided illegal drugs.

Dr. Cooper said with the government cutting the costs of urine testing, clinics with low volumes such as in Little Current, where the doctor isn't physically seeing patients as often (the doctor most typically meets with patients through teleconference), the urine testing was a main component in covering the rental space, staff and

other operational costs of clinic. running the "With their large clinics in Sudbury, doctors have other sources of income to make the clinic work," said Dr. Cooper. "My argument is that the government is urban-based, and while maybe the cuts made sense in urban clinics, the MOHLTC didn't think the idea through and its effect on rural practices and, in turn, patients. MOHLTC hasn't The been focused on rural medicine for the last 10 years. This is evident by the fact that they made a mistake and didn't even realize they were making it in this case.'

Minister Hoskins argued that the urine testing fee change was an evidence-based change and that there are a number of other billable services that make practices viable.

"With private practice fee per service there are a number of services that physicians can bill for (through OHIP)," Minister Hoskins. "When they meet with patients or assessments it can be anywhere from \$30 up to \$144. They also receive a monthly maintenance fee for each patient enrolled in their roster which is upwards of \$30. They can also bill for counselling from \$60 up to \$100. We reviewed the fees for urine testing and found that it was too high and recommended a reasonable change from \$29 to \$15."

"The change was never intended to drive the financial aspect (of methadone practices)," added Minister Hoskins. "Frontline physicians, including physicians in the North and rural areas throughout the province, through a combination of fee structures, are adequately compensated. As evidence by Dr. Koka taking over services in Wikwemikong, the model is still viable."

"Dr. Koka started seeing patients on Tuesday, October 27," said Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier. "He is transitioning patient care to his practice at the clinic in Wikwemikong. Addiction services are still be provided in the same building, the only change is the physician.

"Dr. Sankey provided notice on October 5 verbally and in writing on October 8 to patients that he

would suspending operations in Wikwemikong on October 30 due to cutbacks from the ministry of health effective October 1," continued Chief Peltier. "We were forced to seek out alternative care for our clients. We were lucky to find an alternative physician in time. We are happy that we are able to keep our families together and our members in the community."

Representatives from the FHT, M'Chigeeng Health Services and Wikwemikong Health Services met last Friday to discuss the gap in methadone services now on Manitoulin and look at options.

"Our capacity to deliver care is already strained on Manitoulin Island; this will further negatively impact this reality," stated the FHT press release. "Limiting patient access goes against the stated priority of the LHIN as well as that of the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care. This most certainly applies to the Island-wide philosophy held by our collective team of health providers. Patients will be forced to endure limited or no access to needed methadone treatment and, for lack of a realistic option, they will abandon their treatment resulting in withdrawal and unnecessary psychosocial stress. Regretfully, due to unilateral and unduly hasty revisions undertaken by the Ministry of Health, in the absence of any community consultation, particularly rurally, we are currently unable to give methadone clients any viable treat-

ment options."

Though solutions have now been reached for Wikwemikong patients and temporarily for FHT patients now forced to travel to Espanola and hopefully for M'Chigeeng patients, all parties agree that a long-term plan needs to created.

"This is an opportunity to look at how effective care can be delivered," said Minister Hoskins. "We can look at how we can work together to develop a better approach. The ministry's primary health team and the Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) is committed to finding a solution through consultation."

Grand Council Chief of the Anishinabek Nation Patrick Madahbee told The Expositor he spoke with Minister Hoskins on behalf of all (methadone) patients on Manitoulin and that it was a positive conversation.

"He has assured myself and Chief Isadore Day (Ontario Regional Chief) continuum of care for patients for the next three months or longer and will be giving the issue top priority," said Chief Madah-bee. "We have called up frontline workers on Manitoulin and will be creating a working group with the Union of Ontario Indians Health Team to brainstorm a long-term solution. We have also been on the phone with Health Canada looking at funding to help with transportation costs. We will also be working with the federal and provincial governments on this matter, as well as looking into the matter across Ontario, seeing if any other areas in the province have been affected."

Northeastern Manitoulin FHT Director Judy Miller said that she learned of nine other family health teams dealing with methadone program closures due to the fee cut change after sending a request out to her colleagues. Minister Hoskins said he was not aware of any other similar methadone clinic closures.

The Expositor will continue to follow this transition and negotiations to develop a long-term solution for opiate addiction patients on Manitoulin.

MANITOWANING—Over the past several Ms. Stec added. years, the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society, formerly, "Friends of the Norisle," has invested thousands of hours and dollars in developing a restoration plan for the recommissioning of the S. S. Norisle as a Great Lakes 4-star cruise ship. The funding initiative will seek financial support from citizens, corporations, associations, government and visitors from around the

"The initiative was met with enthusiasm by the Hon. Michael Coteau, Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport," stated Abby Stec, executive director of the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society. "Since that meeting, a great deal of support has been demonstrated by the minister's senior staff. They indicated that the refitting of the S.S. Norisle and her subsequent return to active service would represent a unique opportunity to share an iconic vessel with the general public as part of the Great Lakes heritage and culture. It is clearly recognized that this ambassador of the North will stimulate a new economy within the tourism sector across the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Seaway,"

At present, the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society is awaiting funding confirmation from the Tourism Development Fund for an application submitted in September. This funding will allow for an updated feasibility study which will further support the campaign momentum, the applicants hope.

The society's new website is poised to launch and the campaign chairs and senior leadership committees will be announced in the upcoming months.

Built in the Collingwood Shipyards in 1946, the Norisle, a hand-fired, coal-burning steamship, provided regular seasonal passenger ferry services from 1947 to 1974 between Tobermory and South Baymouth. It was replaced in 1974 by the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun

The Norisle was acquired by Assiginack council and its museum board in 1975 and has been moored in Manitowaning Bay since that time.

We will ensure our growth adheres responsible tourism guidelines that promote sustainability, environmental stewardship, innovation and technology.

"We respectfully engaged our aboriginal partners, communities, businesses and champions to be part of this critical step in mobilizing ATO," said Great Spirit Circle Trail CEO Kevin Eshkawkogan. "The time is now. We have diligently done our homework with limited resources and now is the time to get the support ATO requires to help improve the economic era we're in. We need to put our plan into

"We have been supporting this grassroots initiative with limited resources since 2008," added Mr. Eshkawkogan. "If ATO is going to work, we need to do it right and not part time with limited resources. We are experiencing positive growth in the industry and we can't provide the support our industry deserves without proper investment. ...continued from page 1 residing in a refugee camp in Ethiopia and are of Kunama descent.

'Two speak some English, the 25-year-old and 19year-old sons," noted Ms. Erskine, adding that the committee is currently seeking someone who can act as an interpreter for the family.

Ms. Erskine explained that the widow fled Eretria after the death of her husband, taking her family with her to escape persecution. She cannot return to Eritrea as she left without permission. She is considered a 'woman at risk'," said Ms. Erskine. "Her sons refused to join the military, so they will be killed if they go back.

The Little Current group is well advanced and their family could arrive as soon as four weeks from now, while the Mindemoya and Manitowaning groups are not very far behind, noted Dr. Ben Quackenbush. "The Mindemoya group has chosen their family and are just waiting confirmation as to whether they are getting them. The Manitowaning group is in the process of choosing their family," he said. "The Gore Bay group has had a meeting and there were about 20 interested people who came out. They will be setting the time for their next meeting sometime soon.'

According to Dr. Quackenbush, the families could arrive within one to four months of confirmation.

The possible short turnaround time has put the Little Current group under a little bit of pressure, primarily to find suitable housing for the family. "If someone out there has a house in Little Current large enough for a family of seven it would be wonderful if they could get in contact with us," said Ms. Erskine. Dr. Quackenbush noted that the Mindemoya group has already secured a house for their family. "The people who sold us the house not only dropped their price a bit when they heard what we wanted the house for, but they also threw in a lot of their household items as well. The house is pretty much ready to go."

A number of Little Curbusinesses have stepped up to offer support for employment for the family members, noted Ms. Erskine, "but we are encouraging people who have opportunities that might be suitable to let us know.

While the Manitoulin refugee committees have been hesitant up to now in soliciting donations for the project, the infrastructure for that is now better defined. "People can either donate directly to the Mindemova Missionary Church or, if they are more comfortable donating to their own church and having the church pass it on, that works fine as well," said Dr. Quackenbush. "If people are not associated with a church, they can their send donations marked for the refugee program to the Mindemoya Missionary Church."

The program was originally supposed to be a fiveyear initiative, launched with significant fanfare in the fall of last year and an announced \$1.29 million budget, but due to the late funding announcement by the province it is now a three-year program and funding will be \$525 million. The original program end date was 2018, but there is hope that there will be an extension. The late funding announcements had much the same impact across the province.

The program itself is based on a highly successful strategy developed in France, noted Project Manager Sabrina Legault.

The work-to-rule situation at Manitoulin Island public schools is also presenting a challenge, in that the programming planned for those institutions must navigate those labour shoals. But there are plans in the works to deal with those issues. "We have a steering committee meeting to figure out how we can move forward with the programming in the schools,' said Ms. Legault.

The program is a key part of Ontario's Healthy Kids Strategy. That strategy is a cross-government initiative promote children's health that focuses on a healthy start in life, healthy food and healthy active communities.

The program is part of the Ontario government's 'Focus on Healthy Kids: Strategies That Target Risk Factors for Unhealthy Weights', including improving nutrition and physical activity, aimed at benefiting all children by focussing on positive health messages.

The program builds on the recognition that healthy kids live in healthy families, schools and communities. To that end, the strate-

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
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Crime prevention is a shared responsibility in all our communities

For the OPP, the theme encourages combined efforts of police, government and communities to work together to address concerns, create strategies and decrease crime in Ontario.

The OPP identifies the importance of strong community partnerships and how they are essential in creating effective crime reduction prevention strategies and reminds the public of the highly effective community safety programs that help keep fami-Ontario communities safe includ-Crime Prevention Design (CPTED), Safe-



- · Crimes and criminal behavior have a negative effect on our communities so reporting crime can help reduce this impact,
- You may find it helpful to talk about what has happened and your feelings about it

You can report a crime for anyone, especially if they are unable to do so themselves. The police prefer that the victim reports the incident directly because they will know the full details of what happened.

You may know the victim and be aware that they have concerns about talking to the police. In such cases, they may find it helpful to talk to someone else for support. LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Tourism Association (MTA) held its annual general meeting (AGM) and the inaugural Manitoulin-North Channel Tourism Awards Gala recently in Little Current at the Welcome Centre, reviewing the last year of the organization and recognizing the hard work of the many MTA volunteers.

After a delicious dinner, MTA President Ron Berti and MTA Director of Operations Shelba Millette commented on the importance of the volunteers to the organization, noting that they are the "lifeblood to much that happens on Manitoulin."

Mr. Berti said that for many visitors to Manitoulin, volunteers are often the visitor's first impression of the Island and that they "set the tone for the experience ahead of them."

He added that this is the first year for the new awards, but that the MTA plans on continuing to develop and expand the awards in future years

The first award was the Rising Star Award which was presented to Barb and Keith Flaherty, "up and coming leaders for their exceptional efforts to achieve excellence in front-line service."

There was a tie for the Shining Star Award, which was given to Carolyn and Fred Hunter and Sheila and Graham Fogal, who were all recognized "for their good spirited nature" and being "exceptionally friendly, outgoing and continuously creating enjoyable visitor experiences whereby making our region shine."

The World-Cass Leadership Five Star Award recipients were Marilyn and Hugh Moggy, honoured for their "outstanding contributions to tourism and commitment to the industry."

All the award winners were chosen by their peers by formal ballots prior to the gala and each couple received a 16 GB 10-inch Samsung touchscreen tablet. The awards were partially funded by the New Horizon for Seniors Program

Additional tourism gifts of thanks were presented to Shirley Bond who helped Marilyn Moggy set up the Assiginack Information Centre and worked in tourism for over 15 years, Tootie Blake and Glen Lewis, who have been extremely dependable and outgoing volunteers at the Manitoulin Welcome Centre for years, and Marcel Gauthier, who has also been a dependable and outgoing volunteer at the Welcome Centre.

MTA Treasurer Sam Nardi reviewed the 2014-2015 financial statements with the MTA board of directors and members present, noting that not a lot has changed in terms of the MTA's finances. A motion was carried to accept the financial statements as presented.

Next was Ms. Millette's director of operations report. She began by stating that the MTA employed seven summer students this year, which included four returning senior summer students. She also commented that the senior students did a great job training the new students.

"They also spearheaded additional research and tourism stats collection projects this summer," said Ms. Millette. "These projects resulted in valuable stats for the MTA and local townships and businesses to help in projecting future tourism trends. These stats were sent out to the MTA membership by email."

She said that there were two MTA volunteer gatherings held this past year and the volunteer input was valuable and used to improve tourism service by way of updated information and to further a better communication process.

"Volunteers are the backbone of the Island tourism industry," said

Ms. Millette. One significant change was the installation of a touchscreen computer on the Chi-Cheemaun which had on average 400 hits per day during the peak season. We are planning to implement the installation of more touchscreens for the upcoming year."

Ms. Millette also reported that both the Manitoulin Welcome Centre and Chi-Cheemaun traffic stats are up over last year. "Although the official stats have not yet been released, ridership is said to have increased in excess of seven percent in 2015," said Ms. Millette. "The Manitoulin Welcome Centre also saw an increase of seven percent in traffic which can be attributed to the marketing off the Island in the Greater Toronto Area by the Owen Sound Transportation Company (OSTC) during the Pan Am Games as well as to the lower Canadian dollar."

Rita Gordon, MTA member and Gordon's Park in Tehkummah owner, added that many of her patrons throughout the summer were from Toronto and attributed it to the OSTC marketing efforts.

A motion was carried to accept the director's report.

MTA board president Mr. Berti presented the board with his annual review. He thanked the board for supporting him the last two years and embracing change.

He said that the year was filled with important meeting with funders and that he believes these meetings will lead to support in future projects.

"People of Manitoulin are aware of the change with the MTA and we have been gaining new members and seeing the return of old members," added Mr. Berti. "I'm confident that if the board stays focused, we won't let our fellow Islanders down."
















Many changes still ahead for Manitoulin Community Living

MINDEMOYA—The Community Living Manitoulin (CLM) Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on September 23 at the Mindemoya Curling Club with board members president Melissa Peters, Ron Kenney, Karlene Scott, Tyler Madahbee, Janyn Towns, Karen McGraw, Terry MacKenzie, Sam Bondi and Steven Clark present.

Ms. Peters began the meeting with approval of the minutes from the last AGM and told those in attendance that the auditors were unable to present a completed audit for the 2014/2015 fiscal year as they were waiting for supporting documentation from the bank and the audit would then be completed and the report made available to members as soon as possible.

Ms. Peters began her report by noting that it is hard to believe that so much has been accomplished over the past year. "We had recently lost an executive director, a finance manager and a program manager," she said. "and we were dealing with numerous complaints from our individuals, their friends and caregivers, our staff, our management as well as former staff, management and board. There were over 50 complaints at the time."

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Djibwe Cultural Foundation celebrates traditional corn

M'CHIGEENG—The Ojibwe Cultural Foundation's (OCF) popular workshops continue their work of supporting and rebuilding Anishinaabe culture and traditions with the 'Pay if Forward: Teachings of Harvesting Traditional Corn" workshop held at the OCF's M'Chigeeng site.

"Elder Lewis Debassige had a vision that the locals learn how to harvest traditional corn." noted OCF Executive Director Peggy Simon. "The workshop is a three-part series."

Part one, she explained, was an on-site traditional teaching from Dan Kimewon that focussed on demonstrating how to prepare the corn. While part two would continue the steps with the first group, on how to prepare a batch for traditional feasts during the year. A guide will be produced so that the tradition will continue and in part three, each of the participants were provided with seeds to plant the corn.

The instructor, Dan Kimewon, who is originally from Wikwemikong and

now resides in Saugeen, came to the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation to share the teaching he learned as a child, explained Ms. Simon. He credits his knowledge on his early years spending time learning the old ways from his mother Angeline Kimewon.

The process followed by Mr. Kimewon is to start seeds in an eggshell and soil indoors. When the seedling reaches approximately eight inches, it can be transplanted outside.

"Plant corn on a mound beside pole beans," he advised. "Besides providing the necessary nutrients, the beans have something to climb on. Around the corn, plant squash which keeps weeds to minimum and keeps out critters." To avoid contamination of the traditional seed stock, he advised the participants to "make sure there is no other type of corn planted nearby."

In the harvesting process, corn is braided and hung to

dry before being shucked as needed.

To process the corn for use, ashes from sugar are required. "Although any hardwood will work, oak, ironwood and the like, I prefer to use maple as there is still the sweetness of the medicine in the wood," he said, adding that only cedar and birch bark should be used for kindling. "After ashes have cooled off, sift the ashes using a wire strainer," he said. Then boil water in a stainless steel pot (an enamel pot may also be used). Save half of the water and put it in another pot. Add one measure of ashes to two measures of corn into boiling water.

The colour of corn will change from white to orange/red to yellow as it approaches readiness, noted Mr. Kimewon.

Mr. Kimewon made a tray with chicken wire, leaving a hole in the corner.

"Keep stirring the pot and drain and rinse through tray with wire mesh after about one hour,' he said. "Rub the corn until kernels fall off and then rinse the pot well."

Add the boiled water into the pot that has been rinsed and rub the corn again before rinsing again, put the corn back into the boiling water, and, holding the tray over the pot, pour the corn back into the boiling water through the hole in the corner of the tray. Boil the corn again until it goes back to a white color and then boil it one more time.

"Harvesting traditional corn is a very time consuming activity," admitted Ms. Simon, "but people who try it agree it is well worth the effort."

It is hard, sometimes, to keep everyone happy with cookies. The requests are crispy, chewy, lots of chocolate, they should be sweet (after all it is a cookie), big ones (no point in just having two bites), not burned on the bottom (sometimes that is just the way it is), and then if all the stars line up bake up a huge batch so we will have a good supply on hand which means we can eat more!!!!

I listened and thought, 'hmmmm, they need to bake their own cookies.' So I went and baked some cookies that were super, duper healthy and then Maria made a dessert that, well, was half healthy. Compromise.

Walnut Chocolate Chip Cookies

I went all out on these cookies by buying chocolate chips sweetened with stevia from the Paris Health Food Store in Sudbury and switched the canola oil to coconut oil. The cookies are very crunchy at the start and then soften up a

1 cup Loon Song Oats

1 cup walnuts

1 cup Loon Song spelt or whole wheat flour

½ tsp cinnamon

½ tsp sea salt

½ cup maple syrup

2 Tbsp canola, sunflower seed, or coconut oil

½ cup applesauce or mashed banana

1 cup chocolate chips

Preheat the oven to 325°F. Oil a cookie sheet or use parchment paper.

Using a food processor, grind the oats and the walnuts

together into a coarse mixture. Place in a bowl.

Add the flour, cinnamon, and salt and mix well. In a separate bowl, whisk together the maple syrup, oil, and the fruit puree. Add the dry mixture to the wet mixture and add the chocolate chips. Combine. Using a 1-ounce scoop or a tablespoon, scoop out the dough onto the prepared cookie sheet. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes until golden brown.

Banana Carmel Pudding

Maria picked out a recipe she wanted to bake and I did a quick cruise through it and said "oh did you buy some stocks in Redpath?" We compromised. The brown sugar for the cake was changed to coconut sugar and only a 1/4 cup (the banana is sweet and the caramel sauce and ice cream will make it even sweeter). The flour was changed to half spelt and half unbleached white.

1 ripe banana, mashed with a fork

1 cup brown sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter, at room temperature

½ tsp vanilla extract

2 eggs

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking powder

11/2 cup all-purpose flour

½ tsp baking powder Vanilla ice cream, for serving

Caramel Sauce

6 Tbsp salted butter 1cup brown sugar

½ cup 35% cream 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter 6 small oven-safe jars or ramekins (Mason jars work well) and set aside.

2. In a bowl, whisk together the banana, sugar, and butter until smooth.

3. Whisk in the vanilla and eggs and set aside. 4. In another bowl, combine the flour, baking powder,

and add it to the banana mixture. Stir well and then divide it evenly among the jars (around ½ cup each).

5. Place the jars on a baking sheet and bake for 25 minutes. Set aside. 6. In a small pot, combine all the caramel sauce ingredi-


ents. Cook, stirring until the butter is melted and the mixture is smooth. 7. Pour ¼ cup of the hot caramel into each jar and then let them cool for a few minutes.

8. Serve warm with ice cream.

Fire Department report

Northeast Town Fire Department Chief Darren Bailey presented council with the October fire report. He explained to council that there were three calls for service in October including a hydro pole fire on September 19 on Hwy 540, a fire alarm at Little Current Public School on October 2 and a motor vehicle accident on Highway 6 south. Fire Chief Bailey also reported that the department equipment and apparatus is in good working order and that the team is gearing up for cold weather responses.

Community services

Reid Taylor reviewed the community services and pub-

lic works report with council. He reported that the ice is being used at the recreation centre and that user groups are continuing their programs such as ballet, martial arts, sea cadets and fitness classes.

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

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
