Brinkmanship is a dangerous diplomatic tool in a nuclear age

The Donald seems to be taking a page out of his colleague Russian dictator Vladimir Putin's playbook in a way that threatens the wellbeing of every person on the planet.

For nearly three-quarters of a century, American leaders have wisely refrained from becoming directly involved in Israel's offensive moves, limiting their Middle East involvement with that country's hostile neighbours to supplying arms and occasionally by the defensive shooting down of missiles aimed at Israel.

With its bombing of Iran's nuclear facilities in an overt, and illegal, act of war that exceeded his constitutional powers, The Donald, he who promised "no more wars" under his watch (a major reason for his election last November), the POTUS has now inevitably embroiled his nation in what could easily become a forever war.

There is a good reason that the US never got involved in an Iraqstyle regime change operation in Iran. It is a vast and well-supplied nation with huge resources. Now, The Donald seems to be channeling his inner Bush.

To be clear, Iran has actively antagonized the Israelis, supplying arms and expertise to its Iran's proxies, Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon. Iran has threatened to wipe Israel off the face of the map and does just about everything in its power to make its

On the other side of the ledger, Israel has been and is currently engaged in a war of attrition with Iran's proxies following the October 7 massacres that much of the world now characterizes as genocidal in effect, if not in fact as claimed by Israel. In those confrontations children and innocent bystanders are being bombed, starved and otherwise victimized as much of the Western world stands transfixed, locked into a Cold War stance that prevents them from intervening.

There were plenty of indications over the past couple of decades that the Middle East could become normalized, joining the rest of the world in peaceful commerce, as one by one many of Israel's enemies set aside their own genocidal aims towards that nation.

The cut, slash and burn approach to diplomacy of The Donald might be acceptable in the dark underbelly of the kind of business he conducted in the private sector, but in the realpolitik world of multiple nuclear armed adversaries, it is nothing short of madness.

Just as the Russian invasion of Ukraine has cost millions of lives, both Russian and Ukrainian, no good will come of The Donald's latest adventure in world domination.

UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres hit the nail on the head when he said on the X social media platform that he was "gravely alarmed" by the use of force by the United States. "There is a growing risk that this conflict could rapidly get out of control—with catastrophic consequences for civilians, the region and the world."

The Expositor stands in agreement with the secretary general when he said, "There is no military solution. The only path forward is diplomacy.'

Make no mistake, the danger of nuclear Armageddon has never been closer, but even should that Sword of Damocles not drop, the consequences will be severe.

First up, the current truce between the Houthi rebels and the US in the Strait of Hormuz is almost certainly gone. Much of the world's commerce travels through those waters and the impact of those straits being closed would be catastrophic for many econo-

Second, even without nuclear weapons, Iran is a powerful nation and one whose history shows little love for America. Students of history will know that the US overthrew the democratically elected government in that nation and replaced it with a despotic Shah whose SAVAK police service's oppression of the people was arguably even worse that of today's Republican Guard.

Canada has, quite rightly, called on all sides to return to the negotiating table to find a way forward that does not involve a world-consuming nuclear conflagration. Alas, this might be too

It is transparently obvious to anyone paying attention to the big picture that the attacks on Israel on October 7 2023 purported, armed and supported by Iran by its proxies, and the subsequent follow up missile assaults by Hezbollah were more about displacing Western aid to Ukraine in its defence against Russian aggression than any humanitarian concern over the plight of Palestinian refugees in Gaza and the West Bank.

The conspiracy-minded among us might even ponder whether the escalation between nuclear-armed states Pakistan and India figures onto that chessboard.

Humanity's technological advances, which should have by now alleviate all, or at least nearly all, of human suffering, has instead resulted in upping the scale of self-destruction to Olympian levels. It is as though Mother Nature has a built-in self-destruct mechanism for humanity

To paraphrase what that clever mathematician Albert Einstein once said, if the Third World War is fought with nuclear weapons, the fourth will be fought with sticks and stones.

The Third World War has already begun—some might —it is terrifying that we must rely on the brinksmanship of Putin and The Donald and their proxies Israeli President Benjamen Netanyahu and Iran Supreme Leader Ali Hosseini Khamenei to pull us back from the abyss

Let us fervently hope that calmer heads can prevail—Canada has often been among those working for peaceful solutions.

The world is in dire need another Lester B. Pearson.

Concerns about the new UCCM Tribal Police headquarters

<u>Writer calls for a referendum of the band membership on the construction</u>

EDITOR'S NOTE: This letter is addressed to the chief and council of Aundeck Omni Kaning and has been reprinted here at the author's request.

Attention Chief and Council:

I'm writing in regards to concerns raised by members of the community in reference to subject properties (known as the Rowe Farm Properties, situated on Lots 20 and 21 Concession 7, Howland Township, Manitoulin Island) and the proposed activity in that area for a new UCCM Police Services

The lands in question were purchased in 1999 by previous Chief and Council of Aundeck Omni Kaning (held in trust) for our future use and benefit. The lands are currently under the "Additions to Reserve" process, to which, the lands are contiguous to the reserve.

As previous drafter of the "Additions to Reserve" proposals for the Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation in 2003/2004, not much progress/activity has been made over the past 22 years on those proposals. With recent legislative changes coming into effect for the "Additions to Reserve" process by Indigenous Services Canada, the establishment of a new tracking system for "Additions to Reserve" proposals has reported minimal additions or progress. Such poor outcomes continue to cause unnecessary delays and while those lands sit idle, reasonable expectations for prospective community growth and development is stagnant and uncertain.

With recent significant excavation activity on the Rowe Farm properties within the past couple of days and weeks. The membership is wanting answers as to what is being built there and why? I was told by the current band manager that a new UCCM Police Services building project was being constructed on the property. I asked, "Why wasn't I consulted on this? Why wasn't the

community consulted on such a major ambitious project for a new police station?" Many in the community feel a sense of neglect and disrespect for not being consulted.

For those of you on Council who don't know the current process of the "Addition to Reserve" process, it essentially follows a four phased approach that the federal government had instituted for First Nations across Canada and include the following: Phase 1) Initiation by respective First Nation and authorization; Phase 2) Assessment and Review process; Phase 3) Proposal completion; and Phase 4) Approval process and must meet all legislative criteria.

For lands to be added to the reserve, all criteria must meet the following: environmental considerations, survey(s) land to be set apart as reserve, duty to consul) process, public access, municipal service agreements, provincial government considerations, environmental site assessments as well as other specific considerations

While new federal legislation provides for the renewed approval process of Additions to Reserve to be more streamlined and comprehensive, the process continues to experience unnecessary delays in ministerial approvals.

Because all lands to be set aside as reserve or the creation of new ones, all additions are now subject to ministerial orders. In past practices, additions were the responsibility of the Privy Council whose primary fiduciary responsibility was to set out Orders in Councils for that purpose.

Since 1986, the Band (Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation) has made significant financial investments on land acquisitions. That's approximately 1,100+ acres equivalent to 2/3 of the existing reserve. That requires lands to be added to the reserve.

I don't understand why you as leadership would continuously give away our crucial community space, when that space is needed to support future development, such as housing development, economic development, enhancing community spirit, building growth and critical infrastructure needed for that growth.

Having said all that, on behalf of all band membership, I formally request that community meetings be held to show accountability and transparency with the proposed police building project as soon as possible and that disclosure of any and all documents with regard to the Additions to Reserve process be afforded to them.

Proper consultation must always be afforded to us in all circumstances, but when commodation isn't afforded to you as leadership, you complain and condemn the governments for non-compliance, and we suffer because of it. But yet, when consultation and accommodation isn't afforded to the membership, they feel their opinions aren't valued, become aggressive and they have every right to be because they're not part of the decision-making process.

Therefore, I formally request that all excavations, site preparations, tree cutting, etc., be stopped and discontinued immediately and ensure that all legal requirements under the Additions to Reserve process have been met. We deserve better and expect nothing less from you as elected offi-

As leadership, you have a civic duty, a moral and legal obligation to consult with us. If the people of Aundeck Omni Kaning want a new police station in their space and on their lands, then let's have a referendum and vote on it in accordance with our consultation protocol and as our band custom

First Nations leaders allege consent without veto is not consent

First Nations policy analyst Russell Diabo and Grand Chief Linda Debassige weigh in

Local Journalism Initiate Reporter ONTARIO—On June 21, while communi-

ties across the country marked National Indigenous Peoples Day with cultural celebrations, some Indigenous leaders were once again drawing attention to concerns about the ongoing erosion of Indigenous rights through federal and provincial legislation.

In an interview, First Nations policy analyst Russell Diabo emphasized that the passage of Bill C-15 in 2021—Canada's legislation to align federal law with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UN-DRIP)—was fundamentally flawed.

"In 2021, the Liberal-NDP alliance refused to accept any amendments to Bill C-15 to fix the fatal flaws," Mr. Diabo said. "That includes amendments proposed by Chief Ross Montour of Kahnawà:ke, representing the AFNQL (Assembly of First Nations Quebec-Labrador). Those were ignored.

Mr. Diabo points to the Standing Committee on Indigenous and Northern Affairs, where amendments intended to strengthen the bill's protection of Indigenous rights were voted down. The committee included NDP MP Leah Gazan and relied heavily on the testimony of Mary Ellen Turpel-Lafond, a former advisor to the Assembly of First Nations, who was later found to have falsely claimed Indigenous identity. Today, Ms. Gazan makes her platform on issues facing First Nations people, a near about face.

"They ignored real Indigenous leadership and instead prioritized someone who was later revealed to be a Pretendian," Mr. Diabo said. "And they did it while rushing the bill through under socalled urgency."

In March 2021, AFNQL submitted a

formal brief to the Standing Committee outlining a series of amendments that they said were necessary for the bill to be supported: Amend Section 2(2) to explicitly affirm that nothing in the bill limits or erodes Aboriginal and treaty rights protected under Section 35 of the Constitution; Remove non-derogation clauses that could weaken those rights: Move key preambular language into the binding sections of the bill—specifically the repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery; and include a provision requiring courts to apply UNDRIP in rulings related to Indigenous Peoples

In their submission, AFNQL wrote:

"A bill of such great importance cannot be subject to instrumentalization with 'urgency' as its sole argument... We support the principles of UNDRIP. However, the AFNQL opposes Bill C-15 in its current form and has clearly indicated which amendments could make it more acceptable."

The bill passed without any of the

AFNQL's proposed amendments. It received royal assent on June 21, 2021.

Grand Chief Debassige meets with Ford

More recently, concerns about the erosion of Indigenous rights have extended to the provincial level, specifically Ontario's Bill 5—the Building Infrastructure Safely Act. This legislation, introduced by the Ford government, aims to accelerate infrastructure development in the province. However, many Indigenous leaders say the bill could sideline environmental review processes and undermine Indigenous consultation.

Grand Council Chief Linda Debassige of the Anishinabek Nation raised those concerns directly in a meeting with Premier Doug Ford in Toronto this spring.

"We told Premier Ford clearly that Indigenous consent is not a formality," Grand Council Chief Debassige said in an interview. "Consent must include the ability to say no. Otherwise, it is not con-

She added: "Bills like Bill 5 are concerning because they reduce oversight and may allow development to move forward without adequate engagement with First Nations whose rights and lands are directly affected."

Anishinabek Nation First Nations have consistently called for free, prior, and informed consent (FPIC) as defined under UNDRIP-not as an advisory role, but as a binding requirement.

Mr. Diabo clams it a repeated "pattern. He sees Bill 5 as a provincial continuation of the same legislative pattern set by Bill C-15 at the federal level.

"What we're seeing is a patternfast-tracking legislation that impacts Indigenous lands and rights without adopting the protections Indigenous leaders are asking for," he said. "It's consultation without commitment."

He added, "Whether it's Trudeau or now Carney at the federal level, or Ford in Ontario, the government says it supports UNDRIP but refuses to legislate it as law with enforceable standards. That tells you where things really stand.

Section 35 and the threat

of erosion
Section 35 of the Constitution recognizes and affirms existing Aboriginal and treaty rights. Both Mr. Diabo and the AFNQL argue that legislation like Bill C-15 and Bill 5 risks eroding those rights by failing to provide clear protections or legal mechanisms to ensure Indigenous laws and jurisdiction are respected.

"Section 35 is being legislated around—a piece at a time," Mr. Diabo said. "If governments continue to pass legislation that assumes final say over Indigenous territories, what is left of nation-to-nation?'

Looking ahead

Both Mr. Diabo and Grand Chief Debassige emphasized that the principles of UNDRIP remain important. But without implementation that includes veto power, court enforcement, and legal clarity, those principles risk becoming symbolic gestures with no practical effect.

'We're not opposed to development," said Grand Chief Debassige. "But it must be done in a way that respects our laws, our lands, and our leadership.

As Canada continues to promote its commitment to reconciliation, these leaders are reminding the public that reconciliation without enforceable rights is reconciliation in name only.

On Indigenous Peoples Day, we're not asking for celebration," said Mr. Diabo. "We're asking for the truth—and the political will to act on it.'

Line 5 tunnel plan raises red flags for Great Lakes water, wildlife and wetlands

MACKINAC—A long-awaited federal analysis has landed with weight, detailing serious environmental concerns linked to Enbridge Energy's proposed tunnel beneath the Straits of Mackinac. The plan: replace the aging twin pipelines of Line 5 with a 3.6-mile underground corridor carved through bedrock, carrying 20 million gallons of oil and gas liquids per day.

The US Army Corps of Engineers' draft environmental impact statement, released Friday, acknowledges what many Anishinaabe Nations, scientists, and environmental advocates have long said: this is no simple

Wetlands, wildlife and water at risk

The report outlines direct, detrimental effects tied to the project—particularly during its six-year construction period. These include: permanent loss of wetlands and vegetation; disruption of groundwater systems; harm to bat habitats and aquatic wildlife from noise and vibration; obstructed recreational access due to traffic, light pollution, and crane activity; and reduced visibility of night skies at Headlands International



The issue over Line 5 might seem like something a long way off, but given the prevailing currents and the relatively short 120 km to Manitoulin's shores means that any spill that takes place in the Straits of Mackinac could impact the Islands southern shores.

Dark Sky Park.

While some of these impacts may subside once construction is complete, others—like habitat destruction—may leave a lasting mark. And then there's the risk of drilling fluids escaping into surrounding waters, which the Corps identifies as a significant concern.

A diver inspects the state of the current Line 5 submarine pipeline in the Straits of Mackinac that has been struck a number of times by dragging anchors despite strict regulations barring the use of anchors anywhere near the line. The proposed tunnel-enclosed new pipeline would place the line hundreds of feet below the lake bottom, but impact many environmental concerns.

An old pipeline, a new tunnel and a shifting timeline

The tunnel proposal was first introduced in 2018 with an estimated cost of \$500 million. Initially projected for a 2026 permitting decision, the project was fast-tracked in 2020 after a Trump-era executive order called on agencies to prioritize energy infrastructure.

Now, the Corps anticipates a final decision by late 2025, with a separate approval still required from Michlgan's Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE). That approval, however, remains un-

Meanwhile, Michigan Attorney General Dana Nessel and Governor Gretchen Whitmer continue to pursue legal strategies to remove the existing pipelines from the Straits altogether.

Tension between safety and expansion

Enbridge argues the tunnel would offer a safer, modern route—protecting Line 5 from anchor strikes and reducing the risk of a major spill into the open waters of the Great Lakes. That risk is real. But so are the ecological trade-offs.

The Corps' report makes it clear that: while the tunnel may lower the likelihood of a catastrophic leak, it also introduces new environmental burdens during its construction. And critically, it extends the lifespan of fossil fuel infrastructure at a time when climate science calls for the opposite.

This isn't just a question of where oil flows—it's about whether it should continue to flow through the heart of the Great Lakes.

The Army Corps' draft analysis is now open to public comment. Input gathered over the coming weeks will help shape the final report, expected by autumn.

Island artist featured in solo show

GORE BAY—"I am really excited to have this show, it is quite an honour to have a solo show," said artist Linda Williamson of her solo show, 'Grounded,' at the Gore Bay Museum. "The Gore Bay Museum is such a beautiful place. Nicole Weppler has done an excellent job with museum."

"The Expositor reported on my last solo show, at the Sheguiandah Museum in 2021," Ms. Williamson told The Expositor. "And the last time I had an exhibition at the Gore Bay Museum was in 2005, so it's been 20 years."

Ms. Williamson explained, "I've been collaborating with Shannon Farquhar who lives in Mindemoya and did a still life of the Northern Lights. Images from Killarney are all in this show as well."

"I had a plein air art session at the dock at Providence Bay, with my painting focusing towards the south," continued Ms. Williamson.

Ms. Williamson's career has spanned 31 years, and full-time since 2007. She lives in Mindemoya on Big Lake where she operates Lynsart studio/gallery.


She describes herself as

vides a glimpse of its 100 years of evolution as well as that of the town," continued Mr. Nelson.

The building actually started out as a pulp mill and then evolved into a hydro generating station, said Mr. Nelson. "The book provides a look back to when the building was actually constructed, before construction, and how the community looked before, during and after the mill was built."

Construction of the two-storey pulp mill in Kagawong began in the spring of 1925. At that time, it would have been the only pulp mill on Manitoulin Island. By December of that year, the first pulp was produced, ground from spruce and shipped by boat to Wisconsin to be made into paper for Sears-Roebuck catalogues.

The spruce pulp was the key to the mill construction in Kagawong. Spruce was abundantly available and was needed to give the Sears-Roebuck catalogue pages a shiny finish.

To supply power for the mill, water was diverted from the Kagawong River via a canal. Water flowed from the upper village down the hill by way of a large wooden flume, into the building, thus offering the necessary means to provide hydro. Waterpower also turned two large millstones which ground logs into pulp. The pulp mill only operated for five years before the depression forced its closure.

In the early 1930s the Old Mill was converted into a hydro-electric power plant and was the sole source of electricity for Manitoulin Island. Increased demand for hydro finally led to its closure in 1962.

Thirty years later local volunteers restored the building for community use. Today the Old Mill is a multi-functioning building housing the township municipal office, Edward's Art Studio and the museum known as the Old Mill Heritage Centre.

Mr. Nelson is setting up a display of the books at the Old Mill Heritage Centre Museum. As part of the book Dianne Fraser, a long-time member of the Museum

committee wrote a foreword for the book. "We also included a lot of congratulation messages that we have received, including Ontario Premier Doug Ford, Barb Hannah, granddaughter of former Prime Miniter Lester B. Pearson, Billings Mayor Bryan Barker, Alicia McCutcheon, publisher of The Manitoulin Expositor, author/journalist Steve Paikin, Mark O'Neill CAO of the Canadian Museum of History, author/journalist Mike Strobel, Andrew Cohen journalist, professor, and author of a book on Lester B. Pearson." The book also provides wonderful photographs from locals Patrick Kiley, Pat Hess, Craig Jackson, and beautiful sketches from Jenna Carter.

OJ Graphics printed the book with graphic design provided by Kendra Edwards

The museum committee is also hosting a gala the third Saturday in July at the museum and will be talking and sharing its plans for the development of the Mariners Park, as well as having people with links to the Old Mill on hand, said Mr. Nelson, indicating more information will be provided on the gala after scheduling is firmed up.

As well for the annual History Day in Kagawong celebrations in August, the museum committee will be focusing on the anniversary of the Old Mill. There

line that served Manitoulin up until 1980, when the service ended.

The tracks leading to Manitoulin were ripped up and the land eventually sold to another company (although CPKC still holds title). At the time of decommissioning the rail line, the land was offered to the municipalities of Espanola

and Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands for the cost of the steel in the line, but both declined the offer.

At the time, Northeast Town Mayor Ken Ferguson noted in his council's decision that "we are not in the real estate business."

The band contends that the federal government had a fiduciary duty to ensure that the land was remediated and returned to WRFN once the railway no longer had any use for it.

"Canada is at least in part, if not wholly, on the hook for the failures to have done that already and needs to ensure that it gets done now," the band's lawyer Kate Kempton, senior counsel at Woodward and Company, who specializes in

Indigenous rights, told the media.

An environmental assessment of the rail line bed has been completed, and the band is formulating a clean-up plan that they intend to be part of the negotiated settlement.

A statement from CPKC said the company is committed to working toward a resolution with the band and that they have been in communication with

WRFN.

All other parties in the suit are remaining close about the negotiations, citing that those proceedings are part of ongoing legal matters.

WRFN's concerns about the decommissioned rail line are echoed in many First Nation and Indigenous communities across Canada—also including power lines, highways and

Ms. Kempton noted that the deals negotiated with those communities when those corridors were established were not in their best interests and that a number of them have turned to the courts for redress.

Before the French, before the Crown, before treaties carved the map into parcels and politics, the Haudenosaunee and Anishinaabek had their own conflicts over the islands of Mnidoo Mnising. Skirmishes. Shifting alliances. What settler historians once called the "Beaver Wars" were, in truth, wars of survival and sovereignty-two sophisticated nations wrestling for control of the fur trade routes that threaded through this territory like

waine

In the end, the Anishinaabek held the land. But no nation walked away unchanged.

Now, centuries later, two of the largest and most politically powerful unceded nations in the province are writing a new chapter—not with weapons or wampum, but with food, ceremony and shared water.

The paddle was not recreation. It was ceremony in motion.

Knowledge carriers from both nations travelled in the canoes. They brought stories in the lan-

A chef from Six Nations served a meal that blended both nations' traditional foods—a dish that quietly honoured the Dish With One Spoon treaty, an old agreement reminding all of us: the land is shared, and so is the responsibility to care

"We gave thanks for the strawberries this morning," said Ms. Jameson, referencing the strawberry ceremonies currently underway at Six Nations. "And we talked about harvest season coming up. That's relationship-building. That's what it looks like—on the land, through language, over food."

The event was co-or-

ganized by Six Nations Tourism and Wiikwemkoong Tourism—two of Ontario's most dynamic Indigenous tourism teams. The collaboration is already growing roots.

In the fall, they'll carry this experience across the ocean to Berlin's Food Week, where the Two Nations Paddle will become a Two Nations Plate, bringing Indigenous culinary sovereignty to a global audience.

But the deeper work—the work of cultural revitalization—is happening right here. On this island. On these waters.

"To be in the presence of our knowledge carriers to hear those stories firsthand, to sit in those teachings—it's a privilege," said Ms. Jameson. "Our young guides were with us today. They're going to carry these teachings forward. That's how nations strengthen. That's how memory survives."

As the sun moved westward, final preparations began for the weekend powwow, where Haudenosaunee smoke dancers and Anishinaabe woodland dancers will share the arena. The energy from the paddle—its quiet reverence and steady rhythm—will carry forward into the dance cir-

And in a time when provincial and federal governments are pushing forward legislation that fragments land and communities, when Indigenous rights are under calculated assault, this act of coming together—on purpose, with purpose—is medicine.

"There's been a lot of talk about the good mind," Ms. Jameson said. "About laughter, about gratitude. We don't even know yet what we're building here. But it's something powerful. Everyone who was out on that water today felt it."

This is treaty. Not the dusty kind in archives—the living kind.

The kind you taste. The kind you sing. The kind you paddle toward, shoulder to shoulder, heart to heart

Municipality expresses displeasure with Lacloche billboards

LITTLE CURRENT—During the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Island's annual meeting with representatives of the Ministry of Transportation's (MTO) Northeast region held recently, the mayor and CAO were given a somewhat clearer idea of timeframes for the new swing bridge.

Mayor Al MacNevin told The Expositor that the municipality has so many ongoing concerns involving MTO that for a number of years, an annual meeting has been held with top officials. At this year's meeting, the swing bridge was again top-of-mind.

At this meeting Mayor MacNevin and CAO Dave Williamson were again told, as this newspaper has reported previously, that a general contractor would be hired for the new swing bridge project by year's end.

"Our CAO pushed that further and asked when they

(MTO) would start entertaining detailed designs and construction might actually begin," Mayor MacNevin said. "We were told two years."

"I get that it's a complex project, but I don't get the length of time," he added.

The mayor and CAO also brought up concerns with the length of green lights on the swing bridge, particularly in the summer season, and why not a move back to manual controls during peak busy times. Mayor MacNevin said each time the issue is raised MTO officials seems reluctant to entertain the idea. The control booth, central and high above the bridge, is staffed during the summer months, dawn to dusk, should the bridge need to be swung open, on the hour, for boat traffic to pass through. In the fairly recent years, the

Mayor MacNevin shared with council earlier this month that approximately 12 years ago, MTO approached the municipality about offering up sign space for lease on Lacloche Island. The municipality firmly rejected the idea, pointing to the pristine beauty that the travelling public enjoys in the leadup to Manitoulin. They had full agreement from the Fielding/Wallace family, which owns all of Lacloche Island, and the MTO agreed at the time to keep it status quo. Starting last year, however, signs have begun to crop up at a high rate, causing some members of council to raise concerns.





Sometimes a strong emotion such as sorrow or rage initiates a large piece; other times it is the material itself that inspires me. In both cases

"My newer quilts usually rely on cosmic circles or wagering horizon lines," continued Ms. Martin. "I try to craft them well and send them out into the world as emissaries of strength and love. Continuing to make quilts is a spiritual practice for me.'

Her large format textiles are included in several Ontario public art collections (Sudbury, Thunder Bay, Cambridge), the Canada Council Art Bank and the International Quilt Museum (Lincoln, Nebraska). Her work has been exhibited in more than 16 solo exhibitions and 49 group exhibitions across Canada, the United States, the UK, France, Germany and Japan. She holds an Honours Bachelor of Fine Arts, from Lakehead University Thunder Bay (Chancellor's Medal) and Bachelor of Arts, Embroidered Textiles, First Class Honours, Middlesex University, London, England. Judy Martin has been recognized with more than 13 grants and awards.

Ms. Martin has a large international following of quilting and hand-stitching practitioners and lovers of textile art across the globe. The artist shares information about her art practice and work in textiles through her website, judithemartin.com, through her blog, judys-journal.blogspot.com, and through her Instagram, @judithemartin.

Ms. Martin will be at the gallery for a meet the artist in person event on Thursday, July 10, from 5-7 pm.

The artist grew up on a large rural property in Northwestern Ontario. Long solitary summers spent in the shade of willow trees with art supplies and books nurtured an inner dream world that has since become her main subject. For the last 30

His love affair with Broadcast journalism continued at Loyalist College in Belleville where he served as a professor and then Dean and Associate Vice Principal before moving on to become the Director of the School of Journalism at the University of Regina. While in Saskatchewan, Bryan got a kick out of being portrayed as a murder victim in the Gail Bowen novel, "A Killing Spring." More over he loved the wonderful and lasting friendships he developed in Regina as he had in Belleville and Kingston. Bryan travelled to Abu Dhabi in the United Arab Emirates to develop and ultimately lead the communication, journalism and media studies programs at the Higher Colleges of Technology. Bryan loved every academic job he held. He saw each position as new and exciting. He valued his colleagues as true professionals. One of the things he was proudest of was the accomplishments of his many graduates. After his many years of adventure, Bryan and his wife Gail enjoyed a lovely retirement, spending summers at their home on Manitoulin Island and winters in the Villages, Florida. "I don't," stated Ms. Jefkins.

Mr. Gagnon explained every municipality in Ontario is undergoing the same difficulties in handling its waste. "Some are saving the costs of handling their waste is going to bankrupt them in two

or three years. The Bluebox Ontario program is costing a lot more, and with the tariffs, states like Michigan and New York are indicating they could increase the cost of taking hauled waste as much as 1,000 percent."

Under phase one of the proposal, 10 tons of waste per day could be handled in the WEST plant, in a single 8-10 hour shift and under phase two, 25 tons per day could be handled, the meeting was told.

As for how much energy the plant needs, Mr. Gagnon pointed out "19-30 kilowatts per day." He pointed out a local sawmill uses more per day.

"Shipping garbage waste a long distance is not economical," said Mr. Gagnon. As for the natural gas being created in the proposed system, it would go toward heating and cooling the facility.

Mr. Gagnon was asked how many municipalities have indicated they will be participating in the process with WEST. The town of Gore Bay has not made a final commitment, but has endorsed the proposal in principle, as has the municipality of Central Manitoulin, and WEST is having discussions with additional municipalities and First Nations. In total three are showing interest, and the company is waiting on two others and looking at private industry.

In terms of tipping fees to have garbage handled in the WEST facility, it would compare to the system in place with the transfer station through taxation from each municipality paying its share.

Mr. Spadzinski asked how the WEST disposal system compares to any other options like hauling waste to another facility or having a municipal landfill. "We haven't come across a situation where our system would not have saved a municipality money," said Mr. Gagnon. "We are cheaper than any other option and no one is getting a 20-year-fixed contract.

When asked what timelines WEST would have in getting a building in place at the proposed site. "If we receive approval from (Gordon/Barrie Island council) for a municipal zoning bylaw amendment we would be able to get a building here within 90-120 days," said Mr. Gagnon. "But we can't start doing anything until we have all regulations/requirements approved (by the province). If everything went well, the first or second quarter of 2026 we could be in operation.' He said among the many regulations that would have to be met include all safety requirements.

The plant would need a major overhaul in 20 years, and maintenance being carried out on the plant in the spring and fall of every year. "The first pre-production unit will be manufactured in Sudbury and would be our first commercial facility," said Mr. Gagnon.

"I like the idea, I think it is fantastic," said one of the meeting attendees.

Mr. Gagnon said, "we all need to reevaluate how we look at waste. Our process makes sense for rural Northern Ontario municipalities. We can handle the waste here, being environmentally and financially beneficial, and create jobs on top of that.

"Is it necessary, under your proposal, to operate seven days a week, 24 hours a day, to take care of Manitoulin Island waste?" asked April Orford.

Mr. Gagnon said it can be done in five days per week and would only operate during the daytime.

One attendee questioned what WEST will do if it cannot find employees to work at the new proposed plant. He pointed out the company already has some people in place to work at the facility.

It was pointed out by one

member of the public that the company was several years ago involved in a proposal to provide for a wind farm on Manitoulin. but the company sold its part of the project. "You are out to make money, and I understand that, but in this case things got rolling and then it was sold." She questioned if this would happen with this new waste plant proposal.

"We have exited two different initiatives in the past. In both cases we were the minority partner," said Mr. Gagnon. "This (WEST) is my full-time job, and something I want to do for the foreseeable future."

"Why are you looking at this site here, now?" asked Ms. Jefkins.

"We have carried out all the testing and studies in other municipalities and this one is the best for this Manitoulin Island project," said Mr. Gagnon.

As for concerns raised with noise coming from the new facility, Mr. Gagnon explained even with the grinder/shredder operating in the plant, the noise created would be less than 90 decibels. If you are running equipment with less than 90 decibels, it is basically the same as a pick-up truck would make.

"There is no financial risk to the municipalities," said Mr. Gagnon. "If we can't meet all the necessary requirements then municipalities can drop out and continue doing what they have been."

"To me, what is being proposed is a good solution," said Mr. Spadzinski. "At some point we have to deal with our waste, and this seems to be the most efficient way, although I do understand the concerns people have with this facility being close to their property.'

Manitoulin-based equipment mechanic said he can see a couple of flaws with the system, noting it's a gasification unit. "How are you storing the gas?"

"We extract the gas and consume and use it," stated Mr. Gagnon. "We are not storing the gas—it's physically used and consumed."

Everything is under a roof in the WEST proposal, the meeting was told. "Our methodology is different than a gasification unit,' said Mr. Gagnon.

"If you are grinding waste products eight-10 hours a day, running a generator and three phase power, neighbouring residents will hear it," said one man.

"The noise requirements can and have to adhere to all requirements and the generation being inside the building reduces the noise. We will be adhering to all required standards," said Mr. Gagnon.

Odour coming from the plant was another concern raised at the meeting. "There is more smell that comes from the transfer





station than there would ever be from our unit," Mr. Gagnon told the meeting. "This is a closed loop system."

"What happens if you don't get other municipalities to participate?" asked one resident.

"We would have to look at the entire total financial model and see if have enough additional waste being brought in," said Mr. Gagnon, who said WEST would not be trucking in waste from off-Island. "Our objective is to take care of the waste generated on the Island.'

Ms. Orford asked if WEST approached the Island Waste Management Committee on its project proposal and Mr. Gagnon said the proposal has been endorsed by the commit-

As for a backup location if WEST does not receive approvals to locate its plant on the proposed location, Mr. Gagnon said the company can look at another site locally or look off-Island.

The WEST proposal is to build a gasification plant that would take the waste that is currently going to the transfer station (and more) and then trucked off the Island, and they are hoping other municipalities will participate as

As was reported previously, WEST has tested and can take over 400

through its 'waste processing as a service model,' including all types of waste, including municipal, wood, plastic, oil rubber, textiles, organics. Their customers could include government municipal, universities, hospitals. transportation railroad ties, airports, car fluff, manufacturing automotive oil, remote mining sites, food and beverage, grocery stores, distribu-

The WEST technology is a proprietary, non-combustion, climate positive, waste conversion system that uses waste as a source of fuel. The process begins by reducing the waste into small cubes. The cubes are then loaded into a no-presoxygen-deprived

different waste materials chamber where the solid material is converted into a gaseous state. The gas is then consumed as a source of fuel on site. The technology is scalable, stackable and portable, thus enabling a decentralized waste processing solution and contribution to a circular economy. The technology meets EU EPA air emission standards without supplemental air emission treatment. WEST uses waste as a source of energy to produce electricity, heating and cooling.
"We are not in the waste

hauling business, but when we look at the distance and cost of hauling waste from the transfer station to Espanola, with our system everything would be taken to our facility," said Mr. Gag-

non"Everything would be contained under one roof, and items would be ground into the size of a sugar cube, with everything going into a 20-foot box sea container and go through a thermal conversion process, electrically driven."

'Our solution provides jobs, grid stability, with no concerns to the environment," said Mr. Gagnon. "Some of the benefits to the township would be a 20-year fixed contract to handle all waste, a 1,200 square foot new facility from which they would derive property taxes, and employment for at least a dozen and possibly two dozen people." He pointed out the water used in the plant is less per day than a four-person family and

remains in the facility.

The next step in the WEST proposal is for council to consider approval of the municipal zoning bylaw amendment for a renewable energy

generation plant and advance recycling (under site specific), which council tabled at its last meeting, to have the public meeting last week.
